Memphis High Names Nine Students Eligible For Academic Award Jackets

Nine students at Memphis High School have successfully completed four six-weeks, and need sufficient grades during the fifth six-week to receive an academic award jacket, the first such jackets ever given by Memphis Schools.

## Cyclone Trackmen Win Ranger Meet

The Memphis Cyclone Track Team will compete in Clarendon meet this Saturday, before entering into competition as the host team at the Memphis track meet on March 23. A Jr. High meet will be held here Friday, March 22, Coach Clyde McMurray said.

Track Coach George Berry said this week in announcing that his team won the Ranger meet and placed third in the Possum Kingdom Relyas at Graham, said, "I'm pleased as punch with our mile relay team. They cut 10 seconds off their time since last week."

The coach went on to say he was also pleased with several individuals who showed a lot of improvement.

The MHS team captured 120 points at Ranger to win that meet Friday, then competed Saturday in the Possum Kingdom Relyas.

The 440-yd. relay team of Wayne Davis, Ricky Spruill, Jimmy Melton and James Beck ran a 45.8 in both meets, winning first at Ranger and fourth at Graham.

The mile relay took first at Ranger with a 3:35.8 and third at Graham with a 3:35.6. Melton, Spruill, Douthit and Beck ran at Ranger and Spruill, Bryley, Melton and Beck ran at Graham.

Ben Smith, pole vaulted 11 feet at Ranger and 12'-3" at Graham winning first in both meets, and at Graham he tossed the shot put 45 feet to take second.

James Beck took first place in both meets in the open quarter, running times of 51.4 and 51.8 and the high jump 5'8".

Bobby Hall ran a 16.0 and 15.9 in high hurdles for third and fourth places in the meets.

Ricky Douthit took two firsts in the 880 and a first and second in the 330 hurdles. His 880 best time was 2:06.1 and he had a 43.3 in the hurdles. Don Davis ran a 42.7 in the 330 hurdles.

Gary McKay took second place in the mile run with 5:14 and Jay Campbell took fifth in the 880 with 2:10.4 times.

Ricky Spruill took first in the long jump with 19'5 1/2".

## Two Sentenced For Burglary Of Lakeview PO

## EDITORIAL

### Rainfall . . . Blessing For Everyone!

The Holy Scriptures tell us it rains on the just and the unjust alike, and if you are in Hall County when it gets really dry and stays dry month after month, a little spiritual faith helps.

In Biblical terms "just and unjust" covers about everyone and when Hall County gets moisture there is no doubt that everyone is receiving a blessing.

When you really consider it, it's real nice to live in a place where all the moisture, regardless of how it falls, is a blessing of some kind.

It hadn't really rained much (or snowed) since last September, and this area has already been through several sand storms.

A farmer answered an inquiry from this editor one afternoon when asked, "when do you think it will rain?" in this way. "I don't know, but one thing I am sure, we are one day closer now than we were yesterday."

The rains most of the county received measured in around three inches, falling Saturday and Sunday. Farmers will get real busy now and the spirit of everyone has lifted.

Hall Countians remember vividly the circumstances of 1970 and have no desire to live through another dry year.

### A New Kind Of Letter Jacket!

This year students at Memphis High are vying for a new kind of letter jacket. This is one that every student is a candidate, and competition begins fresh at the starting of school each year.

The new program is entitled an academic award jacket and to be eligible a freshman, sophomore, junior or senior must attend Memphis High a whole year.

Secondly, all academic grades for each of first five six-weeks must be a "B" or above.

Third, the average of the academic grades for each six-weeks must be 92 or above.

Fourth, band and physical education grades are not considered as academic grades in the above requirements. They have their own award programs.

Principal C. E. Voyles following the conclusion of the fourth six weeks, released the names of four seniors, one junior, two sophomores and two freshmen who, according to their grades are still eligible to receive these jackets if they continue with their present marks the fifth six-weeks.

People sometimes criticize public school systems saying, "all they care about is athletics (or whatever)." The Memphis school board approved this program to encourage scholastics and they are to be commended for this.

These academic award jackets go to students regardless of whether or not they have or to receive athletic or band jackets. Only one jacket can be issued, however, so repeat performers will receive shoulder patches to go on their jackets in following years.

One of the really nice things about this program is that all students can participate. Secondly, some students make or even above average grades during certain stages of their high school career, but maybe as juniors or seniors, decide to pursue an avocation which requires good grades and these students bear down and make As. Because of weaker grades earlier in their schooling careers, they can not be top in their class, but they can earn an academic award jacket.

Students who make As in their school work have one thing in common, they study. This program offers recognition to those students who study and make top marks. It is a fine program.

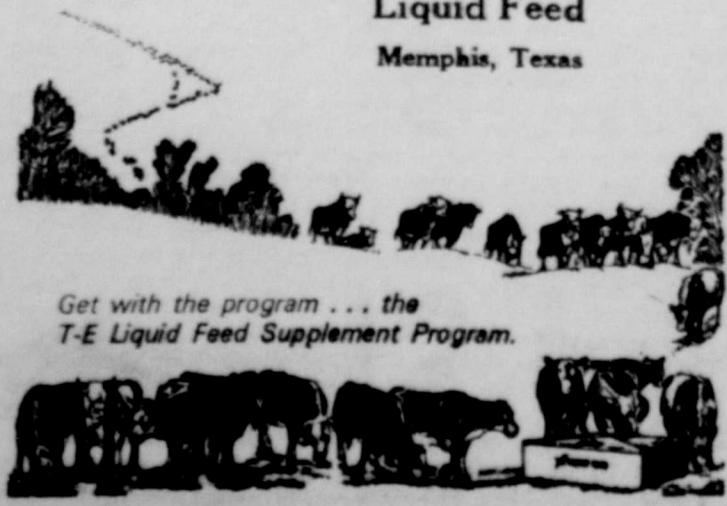

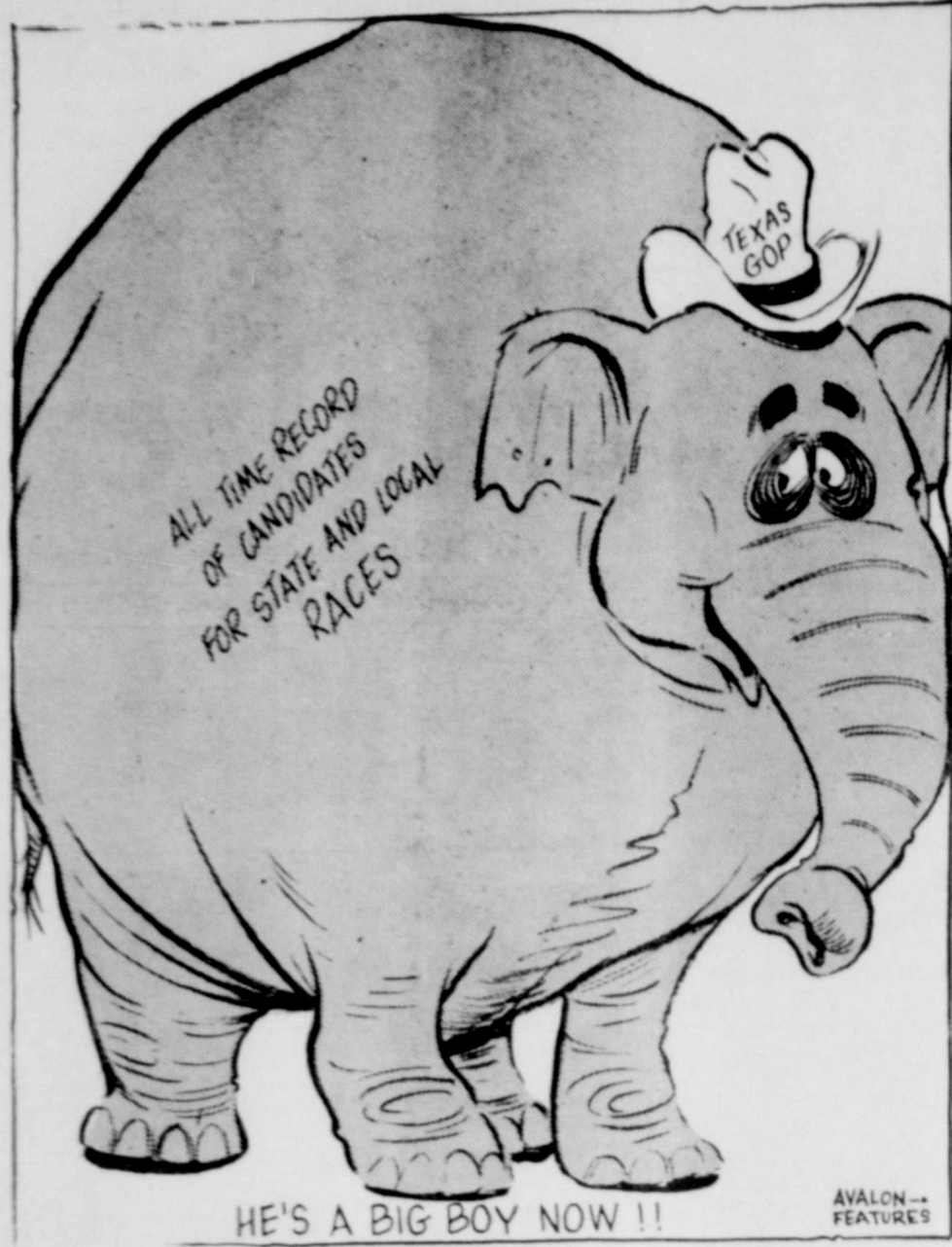

### Running Out of Wheat?

An example of how the world situation touches every corner of the nation is shown by the interest being shown these days in Perryton concerning the wheat situation.

This is wheat country, and farmers are still pinching themselves to make sure this \$5 wheat price is for real. It is not unexpected that not only farmers, but others who depend upon farm income, are also quite interested in the world wheat situation.

The American Bakers Association is making a lot of noise, predicting that the nation will run out of wheat for a few weeks this spring and there will be a "bread blackout."

This means that there will be no "hamburger buns, no rolls for hot dogs at the ball games, no bakery snacks for children, no birthday cakes and no pizza," the bakers say.

This is not likely to happen, according to predictions of most grain marketing experts. The bakers, long accustomed to depending upon surplus government stocks for cheap wheat, now have to get out in the marketplace and bid for wheat and it is painful for them.

The Agriculture Department says that some 480 million bushels of wheat sold for export last year

is still sitting around in storage and 131 million bushels are ticketed for "unknown destinations." The department believes that a great deal of this wheat can be purchased from those who bought it for export.

Wheat from the 1974 crop will be moving into trade channels by early spring, and while right now the wheat crop looks pretty dry and unpromising in these parts, over the entire wheat producing area the prospects are at least fair.

It is a new situation to see this concern over the shortage of wheat because just a couple of years ago it was the wheat surplus that was the problem.

Tighter and tighter wheat acreage allotments, more and more government controls were said to be

necessary because this nation had a glut of wheat on hand. Not only that, but American eating habits had changed so, with diets so common and restricted bread eating so mandatory, that it was unlikely that this nation would ever use as much wheat as before.

Now we find that wheat is no longer a stepchild. People took wheat for granted for so long, and assumed that there would always be cheap bread, until it came as a downright shock to find that the wheat surplus turned into a shortage overnight.

It is not likely that this nation will really run out of hamburger buns and birthday cakes this spring. But it may be that there will be enough shortage of wheat to keep the price up.

And while farmers like \$5 wheat, we suspect that they wouldn't be too despondent right now if they knew they could get \$3.50 for it.

#### Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commission of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 1973, Texas, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article VII, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, producer control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork. The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election. Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed. Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

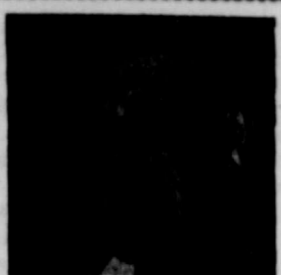

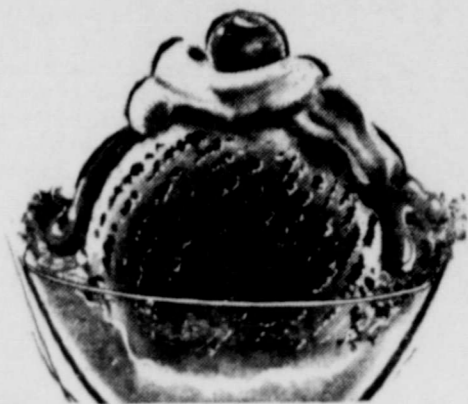

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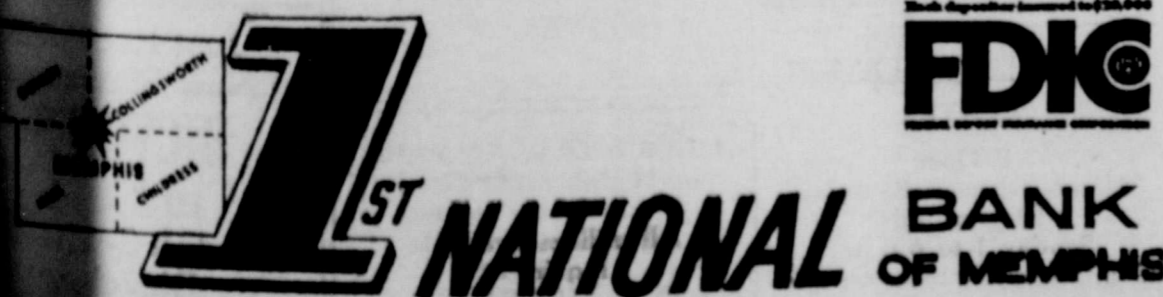
