

## Clearify Political Advertising!

New laws have been passed throughout the nation, and in Texas in particular, concerning campaigning for public office. One of the things changed was in political advertising.

Now a candidate or campaign manager for a candidate must pay for advertising in advance to comply with new laws. Also candidates must file campaign expeense reports indicating expenditures in campaigns.

Last week in newspapers throughout the 13th Congressional District and advertising signed "Get Out & Vote" which was pre-paid in compliance with publishing requirements, listed what the ad labeled "significant area polls concerning Democratic Primary in the 13th Congressional District race for U.S. Congress.

The ad listed Ray Ruffin as leading Wichita Falls 54 per cent, to Jack Hightower 38 per cent, & Louis Finney 3 per cent with five and a half per cent undecided. Actually, Wichita County voted 10,652 for Hightower, 3,535 for Ruffin and 882 for Finney.

The ad went on to cite polls from West Texas State University, Midwestern University, Pampa, Borger Area, Amarillo in which Ruffin was a big leader in the polls.

What actually happened in the election was that Hightower carried all counties by a two to one over both other candidates.
