Barbara Bush To Be Inducted

Governor Bill Clements today announced that First Lady Barbara Bush will be in Austin March 27 for induction into the Texas Women's Hall of Fame.

The governor and Mrs. Clements will participate in the induction ceremony, with Mrs. Bush receiving a special achievement award for community service in Texas and throughout the nation.

The awards ceremony, at which seven other Texas women will be inducted, will be held at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 27, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Austin.

Sally McKenzie, chairperson for the Governor's Commission for Women and sponsor of the event, said Mrs. Bush was a unanimous choice of the Hall of Fame awards committee.

"She has inspired a national resurgence in volunteer activities, ranging from Literacy

of AIDS education," McKenzie said. "Long before the national spotlight was on Mrs. Bush, she worked tirelessly in community service programs in her home town of Houston, in Texas and across the country. This award is a fitting tribute to her past accomplishments and her ongoing commitment."

CENSUS '90 Be Partners In Census '90



Every resident of the United States should become a full fledged partner in the 1990 Census, said the head of the Census Bureau for this area, as 106,000,000 questionnaires were mailed to every household in America.

"If the people join in, by answering the questionnaire and encouraging their friends and neighbors to do so, we will have the most complete and accurate census in our 200-year history," according to John E. Bell, Regional Director of the Census for Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, "and we will all be better off for it."

The Census, he explained, is a responsibility we all share. It is too big a job for the Bureau to do alone.

"Some people understand the personal benefits as well as the absolute secrecy of answering the Census," he said.

"But some people don't"

Those who don't understand are the principal worry of the Bureau as the Nation's 21st Decennial Census approaches.

"Yet if people will simply help their friends, their neighbors, their employees

and co-workers--especially the disadvantaged, the elderly, the illiterate--to fill out the questionnaire and send it in by Census Day, April 1, we will have achieved the most successful and beneficial nose-counting in all history," Bell said.

He cited the fact that the states of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, and the communities within them, have literally hundreds of millions of dollars in federal funding to gain by encouraging everyone to answer the census questionnaire.

"Conservatively, we estimate that communities could lose about \$150 in federal funds for every individual who fails to complete

their census form," Bell said.

He also emphasized the total secrecy of the information people write down on the questionnaire.

"The IRS can't see it," he said. "The immigration people can't see it. The police can't see it. Not even the President of the United States can get a look at that personal data until it is thoroughly de-personalized and combined with the data of millions. That's the law."

Furthermore, the questionnaire is easy to fill out, and there is help available to those who need it, both from volunteer assistance centers, and via 800 telephone numbers in nine different languages, including 1-800-999-1990 for English; 1-800-283-6826 for Spanish;

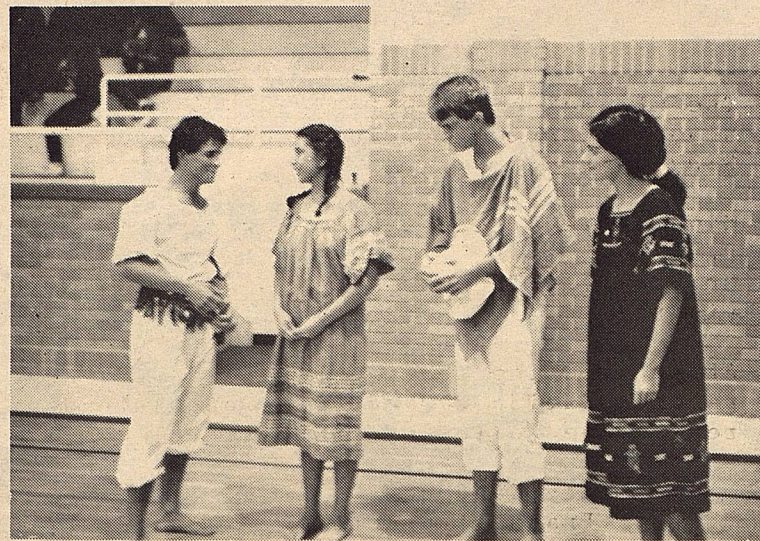

The Superintendent's Report included the financial report, the attendance report, and the personnel report.

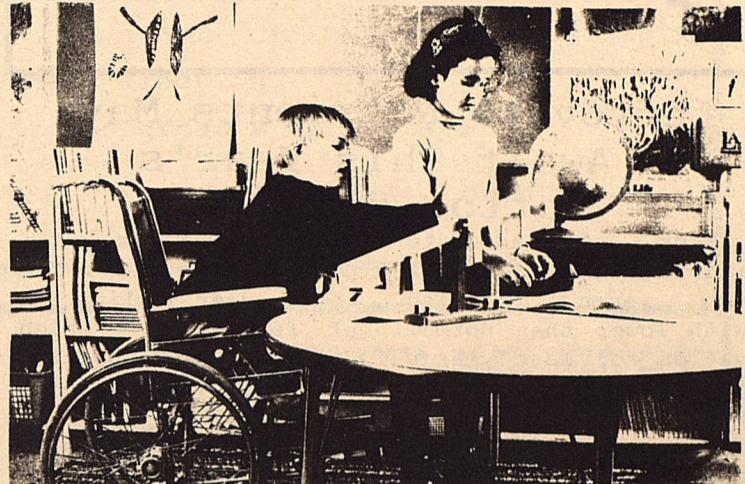
It was reported that the school was operating within the budget at the present time. Attendance was reported at 131 in elementary and 70 in high school for a total of 201.

Teach Your Children About Disability



Young children often do not know how to interact appropriately with people with disabilities. Parents, by discussing disabilities and setting a strong example, can eliminate the fear and confusion that children may develop at an early age.

"Children need not be frightened or timid when they meet a person with a disability," Dr. Wasco said. "A little education can break down a lot of barriers."

"Teach your children to treat a person with a disability as they would anybody else," said Dr. James Wasco, medical director at the New Medico Head Injury System. "Explain that everyone is different; people with disabilities just have differences that are more obvious."

Approximately 35 million Americans have physical disabilities, and an increasing number are able to live independently. "With improved medical care, people with disabilities are able to get back to the community much easier today than ever before," said Dr. Wasco.

Dr. Wasco also suggests:
• Tell your children to gently offer, but never insist, on assisting people with disabilities. A polite, "May I help you?" is very effective.

• When talking with a person with a disability, your children should speak directly to that person, and maintain eye contact.

• Don't panic if your child asks a blunt or embarrassing question. Most people understand a child's curiosity — explain that the person has a disability but otherwise is just like everyone else.

• Ask the teachers at your child's school to help educate students about disability. One idea is to ask students to simulate a handicap — use just one arm or sit in a wheelchair for an entire day.

• Encourage your children to include their disabled friends whenever possible — at birthday parties, play, lunch, etc.

"Setting a good example for your children is crucial," Dr. Wasco said. "Our program at New Medico helps head-injured individuals return to their communities, work and schools. People with disabilities just want to be treated like everyone else." For more information on New Medico's head injury program, call the toll-free

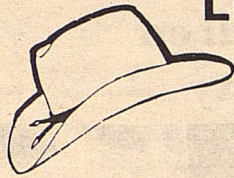

Leftovers Nutrients May Await This Year's Cotton Planting

Lack of adequate rainfall for the past two years, coupled with lower than normal yields for last year's cotton crop, may mean South Plains cotton farmers already have enough of some nutrients stored in their soil for this year's crop, says a soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Considering the drouth we have experienced over the last two years, particularly last year, with the reduced yields that we had over the entire area, residual soil nutrients must be considered," Dr. Michael Hickey, head of the Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock, cautioned cotton farmers.

"The low-yielding cotton we grew last year was unable to utilize the fertilizer materials that were applied," Hickey said. "And from harvest until the present, we haven't had moisture that would leach any appreciable nutrients, in particular nitrogen, deep into the (soil) profile."

Much of the fertilizer applied last year will still be in the soil and can be used by this year's crop, which is yet to be planted, the soil chemist explained.

"If we don't consider

those materials, the possibility exists for the over-application of fertilizer," which could have harmful effects, Hickey said.

Especially late in the growing season, high soil nitrogen levels coupled with excessive rainfall could cause regrowth problems, with the plant devoting energy to producing new foliage instead of maturing existing bolls.

Hickey recommended that farmers collect soil samples which are representative of their field and have them analyzed by the Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock or some other laboratory of their choice.

He said local county extension agents have instructions on how to properly collect samples and could suggest laboratories. In addition to the sample, the farmer should enclose as realistic yield expectation for the crop he plans to grow in the field, Hickey said.

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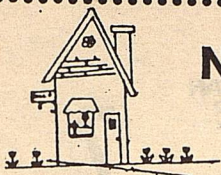

Making The Most of Your Food Dollars\$\$\$

Using your food money wisely means more than cutting your food bill. It also means making sure you get good nutrition and eating pleasure for the money you spend on food. Wise use of food dollars is a challenge, requiring planning and the use of basic tools to make sound cost comparisons. Here are some tips to help you sharpen your food money management skills:

- Plan meals first, then make a shopping list. Use your list to save trips to the supermarket and help you avoid buying items you don't really need.

- Shop at a store than gives you the best price and quality for products you typically buy. Make sure the cost savings from shopping at several stores justifies the extra time and transportation cost.

- Try to avoid shopping when you're tired, hungry, or rushed.

- Use unit pricing to find best buys. Large packages, store brands, and sale items are often, but not always, cheaper than other brands or container sizes.

- Use itemized receipts from computer-assisted checkout systems to help track food costs. This is especially helpful when prices aren't marked on products.

- Make substitutions for items on your shopping list if you can save money or get a higher quality product, and if the item will fit into your meal plans.

- Use coupons for products you usually buy. Stock up on store specials in reasonable amounts.

- Buy store brands

and generic items when their taste and quality suit you needs.

- Salad bars can be costly--buy only those items you need in small quantities. Pick up basic ingredients--lettuce, cabbage, celery, carrots, cucumbers, onion--elsewhere in the store.

- Buy bulk foods (when available) for high quality, a lower price, and the exact amount you want.

- Make sure convenience foods are worthwhile buys. Some (packaged mixes, canned vegetable, frozen juice concentrates) are good buys, while others (frozen dinners) cost much more than home-prepared versions.

- Avoid overbuying (particularly perishables) to minimize food waste.

- To protect food quality while you shop:

- *Pick up perishables (salad bar ingredients, frozen vegetables, meats, dairy products) last.

- *Pack frozen foods and meats in insulated bags. Keep cold items together.

- *Minimize time foods are in the car. Keep perishables out of direct sunlight.

- *Put foods away promptly.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company hereby gives notice that it has filed an application requesting the PUC to declare Southwestern Bell's intrastate Billing and Collection market subject to significant competition and to authorize the following form of pricing flexibility: detariffing of the rates, terms and conditions of the Billing and Collection services now offered in Section 8 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff. Approval of the application as filed would result in all tariff sheets in Section 8 (Billing and Collection) of Southwestern Bell's Intrastate Access Service Tariff being cancelled, and the service thereafter being provided on a contract basis. Through this application, using procedures established by P.U.C. SUBST. R. 23.27, Southwestern Bell seeks to obtain uniformity of rates, rules and regulations for intrastate and interstate Billing and Collection services.

Approval of this application would remove all rates, terms and conditions applicable to billing and collection from Southwestern Bell's Intrastate Access Service Tariff. Intrastate billing and collection service would continue to be subject to PUC regulatory oversight only to the extent that (1) Southwestern Bell would be required to maintain current price lists at the Commission for the service, and (2) the revenues or losses from the service would be subject to the regulatory treatment specified in P.U.C. SUBST. R. 23.27(p). Further, under procedures established by P.U.C. SUBST. R. 23.27, the PUC's General Counsel, the Public Utility Counsel or any affected person could seek a subsequent review of the rates, terms and conditions of this service.

The PUC has assigned this matter to Docket No. 9224. A prehearing conference will be held on April 19, 1990, at 9:00 a.m. at the Commission's offices at 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard in Austin, Texas. The deadline for filing motions to intervene is April 26, 1990.

1-800-937-1953 for Vietnamese; 1-800-288-1984 for Thai; 1-800-888-3208 for Laotian; 1-800-444-6205 for Korean; 1-800-365-2101 for Chinese, Mandarin or Cantonese; and 1-800-289-1960 for Cambodian.

"We have been hammering away with those facts," said Bell, "in meetings and get-togethers, through Complete Count Committees, and through the generous help of the media outlets like this one, for more than a year."

Bell asked all responsible residents to help spread the news to those who haven't heard, and to do five things:

1. Satisfy yourself that the Census really is personally important to every resident of this country. Talk to your local census office or to your community's Complete Count Committee. Ask questions. Be informed.

2. Talk to your family members, co-

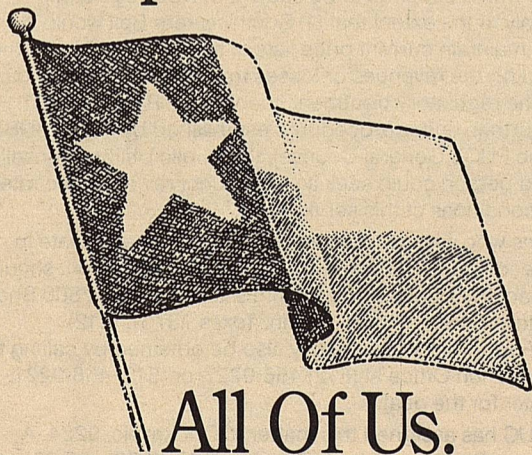
workers, employees, friends and associates—particularly those who may not ordinarily read the papers or watch TV or listen to the radio—about the urgency of filling out the questionnaire that will come in the mail to most residents. Convince them that it is both absolutely safe and extremely important to respond.

3. When the questionnaire comes to your house, fill it out completely and promptly. Get help if you need it. Make it a family affair.

4. Offer your encouragement and help to your neighbors and any others who may, for whatever reason, be fearful or reluctant about filling out their own questionnaire and mailing it in. Direct those who are unsure to a volunteer center or an 800 number for help.

5. When the census effort is complete, sit back and enjoy the feeling of having been an effective partner in the largest and most important statistical survey in the history of the world.
