Hall County farmers suffered a double blow this past week as many fields of freshly planted cotton were blown out, or partially blown out last Saturday, and then an area west of Memphis and southward was hailed out Tuesday.

The wind affected the cotton throughout the area and caused more general damage to more fields, but the hail storm wiped out the area it hit.

Hit by the hail was a threemile strip beginning north of Lakeview-Lesley area and this strip ran southwest into the Turkey-Quitaque and Flomot territory and seemed to widen and inten-

The ground was covered with hail stones, windows in farm homes knocked out, high winds tore up self-moving irrigation systems on several farms, a roof of a shed was blown off.

Turkey area reported from two to three inches of moisture and hail from the system as this area has repeatedly caught damaging storms this year.

Some farmers have already replanted cotton fields three times this year and most are surveying damages with a critical eye to determine which will need replanting again. Farmers in the hail zone have no choice however as fields were wiped out.

Farmers also face a situation of lateness of the season, with only two weeks remaining in June. Insects and an early freeze could cut yields as much as fifty percent or more.

Energy Conservation!

The American people are urged to conserve on all types of energy giving materials, and there are many ways we can all cooperate in this, and save for ourselves some money to combat broadened the social horizons of inflation at the same time.

First off, service stations throughout the nation will be able to obtain both leaded and unleaded gasoline in monthly allocation under a rule change being proposed by the Federal Energy

The FEO Administrator also announced a temporary ruling on the pricing of unleaded gasoline for the month of June. The proposed price is essentially the same as the price for premium gasoline. So motorists can expect to pay premium gasoline prices for the new-type fuel necessary for new model auto- panding his access to schools, a mobiles. It is necessary to make unleaded gasoline from the more costly and higher octane-rated premium product, even though the octane rating in the final unleaded product falls into the same octane rating as that for regular gasoline, John C. Sawhill, FEO Administrator explained.

The necessity of allocating the two types of gasoline is due to a regulation by the Environmental Protection Agency which requires that all gasoline stations selling more than 200,000 with his car and won't give it up gallons per year must provide one grade of unleaded gasoline by July 1, 1974.

The EPA rule was promulgated to conform with clean air travel is still being done sole in standards and both domestic and foreign automobile manu- the automobile. facturers, in response to these standards, are equipping some 60 to 85 per cent of their 1975 models with catalytic converters to meet them.

These converters are very sensitive to gasoline with lead additives," Sawhill said. "In fact, just a few tank loads of leaded gasoline would cause irreparable damage to them."

Most cars manufactured since 1970—when pollution control equipment first began appearing on cars-are able to use unleaded gasoline. In time, most gasoline refineries will probably eliminate the addition of lead to the gasoline refining process. But service stations will not be allocated a total amount of leaded and unleaded gasoline exceeding the total gasoline allocation for that month.

Engineers tell us that unleaded gasoline will have a poorer performance than leaded gasoline in our cars and with gasoline

prices continuing to increase conservation practices are in order. Another place to conserve energy is in the home. -Home owners can save fuel and money, and at the same time

increase home value, if they make certain home improvements. Engineers pinpoint windows as the biggest energy drain in the home. One square foot of glass can lose as much heat as ten square feet of wall. This same single pane of glass in summer will store and reradiate some of the sun's heat.


Storm windows, or double glassing, by trapping air between panes of glass, provide insulation, cutting heat loss from the house in winter and reducing heat gain in summer. Weatherstripping doors and windows, caulking cracks and opening will help.

Insulation is another important energy saving in a home, both summer and winter. Heating and cooling costs can be reduced about 20 per cent through insulation. Air conditioners work better on the shaded side of a house

A lot of little things also add up. Cut T. V. sets, lights, regulate thermostats upward or downward when homes are not being occupied. Do laundry, ironing, baking and other hot tasks in the cool of the morning.

Twenty per cent of the total energy used in the United States is used for heating and cooling 70 million living units, so energy conservation at home is important. Even small savings by individual families add up tremendously on a nationwide scale.
