## Crops Hit By Hail, Wind

Hall County farmers suffered a double blow this past week as many fields of freshly planted cotton were blown out, or partially blown out last Saturday, and then an area west of Memphis and southward was hailed out Tuesday.

The wind affected the cotton throughout the area and caused more general damage to more fields, but the hail storm wiped out the area it hit.

Hit by the hail was a three-mile strip beginning north of Lakeview-Lesley area and this strip ran southwest into the Turkey-Quitque and Flomot territory and seemed to widen and intensify as it went.

The ground was covered with hail stones, windows in farm homes knocked out, high winds tore up self-moving irrigation systems on several farms, a roof of a shed was blown off.

Turkey area reported from two to three inches of moisture and hail from the system as this area has repeatedly caught damaging storms this year.

Some farmers have already replanted cotton fields three times this year and most are surveying damages with a critical eye to determine which will need replanting again. Farmers in the hail zone have no choice however as fields were wiped out.

Farmers also face a situation of lateness of the season, with only two weeks remaining in June. Insects and an early freeze could cut yields as much as fifty percent or more.

Farmers had an almost ideal year last season for crop production, but 1974 is being adverse and rugged.

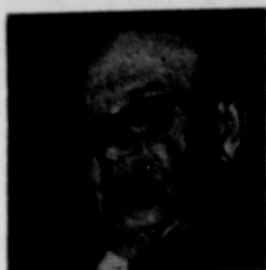


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## B. B. Shots

June 5th last week was the 6th birthday of Hall County Heritage Hall being opened to the public for inspection. There was a pre-show to the Lakeview Schools the latter part of May, when they gave us a good sing-song program with Maud Milam playing the organ that was given to the Hall by the Milams. I have the tape recording of their program and with each of the pupils names that were in that day.

Idea are born on a coffee break. It was a little over 6 years ago, I was having a cup of coffee with O. V. "Shorty" Alexander, and Gyp McMurry, when O. V. made the remark, "Why don't you start a museum in that bank building?" My reply was, "Why don't you start it yourself?" That was when we started, as he said "given me a check and I will start", which he did, and passed a check for Gyp to sign, and another one to me to sign, which I did and that was where it started in Tarver-Stanford Drug Store.

After leaving the drug store I met Maude Milam and Minnie Kinslow who were the next contributors to get this starter before it was organized. It has been a very cooperative operation with donations from many towns and different states, and also in free labor and showcases and antiques for display.

The only item I think that Heritage Hall has bought for display is the buffalo head and hide. It was priced so that we could not afford to turn it down.

In the past 6 years the number of visitors coming in Heritage Hall, I would estimate conservatively to be about 4 to 5 thousand each year during the Hall County Picnic.

A few months ago we had some antique dealers from California who estimated Hall County Heritage Hall having a value of 4 million dollars. It does not seem possible but we hope it is, and we will not regret that 15c worth of coffee drinking. Thanks to everyone for their cooperation.

She and Jack have 4 children and 6 grandchildren. Other members of the Bernard family now living are L. G. and Ilene of Roswell, N. M. and Albert Ray of Fort Worth, and Oteka of Clarendon.

On the return of the \$5 who made the Sage Elena trip, my observation was that they all needed a rest after all of the cooking, dishwashing, well digging, and ditch digging. This was a mission trip which was very successful. No sickness or accidents outside of sunburn and sore muscles.

Mr. Allen Grundy had as her guest in Heritage Hall, her sister, Elizabeth (Montgomery) Ricker of Kansas City, where she has lived the past 30 years. Other people I asked Elizabeth about were, members of the Trueblood family who operated the cotton compress for several years. She reported that Manne Trueblood, who worked for the Missouri Pacific railroad many years is now retired in Kansas City. Gladys, Naomi, and Hope, she thought were now living in Spade, Texas.

Elizabeth recently visited with the wife of the late Jet Montgomery in Mt. Vernon, Ill and reported that she is getting along fine. Mrs. Montgomery will be remembered as Eileen Herod, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. N. C. Herod, who operated a dry goods store in Memphis. I had the pleasure of introducing Elizabeth to her cousin Blackburn, whom

she did not recognize.

Linton H. Estes of Wichita Falls was a visitor in Hall County Heritage Hall Wednesday, June 5th. He will be remembered as the son of Joe Estes, and brother of Herbert. His uncle Joe and Ben Smith operated a harness and saddle shop in a sheet iron building on the lot where Heritage Hall is now located. One of the main missions of Linton to Heritage Hall was to put on display a saddle which was made by his uncle 64 years ago. Linton used this saddle on his ranch in Colorado a number of years, and when he left the ranch he gave the saddle to one of his cowboys. After the opening of Heritage Hall, Linton gave the cowboy a new saddle for the old one, so it could be placed on the ground where it was born.

Another special thing that Linton came to see about, was some of the family graves in Fairview Cemetery. His grandfather, David Craig, was born in Scotland in 1802 and died at Newlin in 1896. He put a bronze marker on his grandfather's stone. Linton was born at Newlin, Texas.

I asked Linton Estes about young Fred who graduated from

Memphis. He reported that he was now living in North Carolina.

Grady Bonner Jr. of Wichita Falls was the pilot for Linton. He thought Heritage Hall was outstanding for a small town with such a collection of artifacts. Linton says he was born in 1893 but he looks and gets around about like a 55 year old. His father was the postmaster in Wichita Falls, Texas. Linton and his two sons have been in the wholesale paper business for several years, and also have ranches near Wichita Falls. Linton gave us a copy of the story printed in the Wichita Falls Times in May headed "Footsteps of history", and underneath a picture shows Linton shaking hands with chief Lone Bear of the Kiowa Tribe, which stated, "The Hatchet Buried". The chief was one of a band of 35 Indians which killed Joe Earle in 1879 and narrowly missed adding Estes' father, Joe, to their list of victims. The following remark was made to the chief by Linton, "To you Chief Lone Bear, thanks to your slow horses and poor aim I am able to be here and greet you today." We will try to run the complete story later.

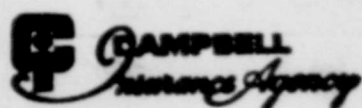
