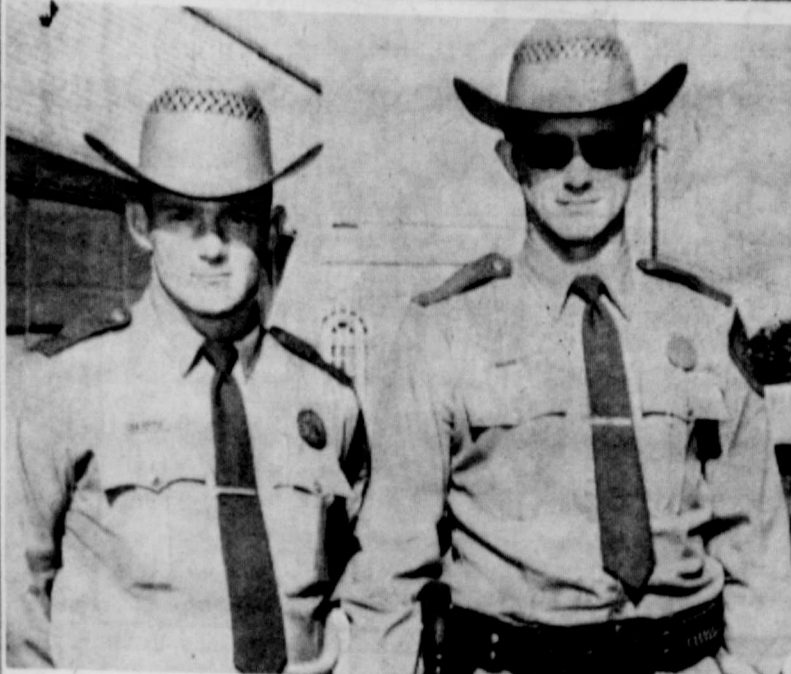

One Injured When Trailer Smashes Here

A 18-foot camper trailer on the Liner Trailer Park was up-ended and smashed Monday evening about 8:45 by a twisting truck. Mr. James Montgomery was inside the trailer.

He received a severe cut to his right arm and was rushed to Hall County Hospital. Mrs. Montgomery's condition has been listed as satisfactory.

Mr. Montgomery had left the trailer to get his two children, Cindy 10 and Bobby 8, who were visiting in another trailer on the lot. The twister formed on the vacant field southwest of the trailer lot, located at 12th and Boykin.

One witness said there were three smaller dust devils on the field and these three joined together just before they reached the trailer lot.

When the twister hit Mr. Montgomery dashed into the back door of the Richard Liner home. Siding was blown off the Liner home, and the other three trailers were damaged. The large trailer home of Dale Lawrence was damaged the heaviest with the exception of the Montgomery camper trailer.

Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery have been in Memphis for two months as he is a roofer. Their home is in Sintenal, Okla., and the family has five children. Girls four and three and a boy nine months old, remained in Sintenal.

A lot of discussion has been generated as to whether or not the damage was caused by a tornado or not. Many local citizens saw the dust devils forming on the field and watched the big one grow. The whirling wind was only visible on the ground, however, and no one reported seeing a top in the cloud.

Actually, very little rain accompanied the cloud, and strong winds were spotty and short in duration.

Pre-publication orders for the book "Donley County—Land O' Promise" a history book of Donley County by Virginia Browder are now being taken by the Clarendon Press, publishers, in Clarendon.

The book, which will sell for \$15.00, can be ordered now for \$12.00 plus 60 cents tax.

Mrs. Browder, a writer of some renown, has previously published a book of poems and has written columns and feature stories for papers of the area.

An excerpt from the book is as follows:

Partone: The Promise Land

Much water has gone down Carroll, Kelly and Allen creeks:

collected in wagon ruts, been gulped from greasy hat brims and cupped hands by hard ridin' cowboys; drunk from gourd dippers by the settlers; sipped from Bostonian goblets, been wished for, fought over, and fallen in abundance since an ambitious Methodist preacher and land speculator named Carhart decided, in 1878, on a location for his "Christian Colony" and called it "Clarendon" to honor his wife Clara . . . a settlement destined to become the County Seat of Donley County.

Not only did Captain Marcy, in his streak across what was much later the Texas Panhandle, decide that this country was unfit for man or beast but, according to Mitchell's School Atlas of 1873, Indians (Kiawas and Camanches) inhabited "northern Texas". Most of the land west of the 100th meridian had not yet been divided into counties. Railroads were few and "Galveston City" was the state's largest city.

Truly this was "the land of milk and honey" for those men of vision who, like Henry Lewis Carhart, fired with ambitious energies could recognize a priceless opportunity and possessed the will to seize and hold fast to it. Nor did the "milk of human kindness" and the "honey of good will" always manifest itself with those blustering pioneers.

The times and the hardships tried the emotions and tore at the dispositions as well as the physical stamina of the frontiersmen. But despite all hazards, they persevered and blazed the trails. To further their cause the government set up military outposts with trained troops to safeguard their ventures in The Promised Land.

Hall County's Bicentennial Program

Hall County and the four incorporated cities of Hall County, Estelline, Lakeview, Memphis and Turkey, have separately and jointly issued proclamations expressing desires to take an active part in the Bicentennial Celebration planned for 1976.

This will be the 200th anniversary of our Nation and these are endorsing the basic recommendations as set forth by the Hall County Bicentennial Committee.

The official application for a Bicentennial Community of Texas to the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas had been made.

Members of the Hall County Bicentennial Committee are composed of Loran Denton, Turkey, General Chairman; Larry Parks, Wendell Harrison, Jay Eudy of Turkey, Jim Edd Wines, Lee Vardy and W. R. Parker, serving as Heritage '76 Chairmen, Festival U. S. A. Chairmen, and Horizon '76 Chairmen, respectively. (group of two).

These men, along with the following, serve on the committee: Vera Topp Gilreath, Bill Leslie, Mike Branigan, Paul Collins, Ted Bruce, David Parker, Mildred Stephens, Barney J. Bevers, Johnny P. Fowler, Byron Baldwin, George Berry, James Fuston, and Homer Tribble.

The Bicentennial Goals and Projects listed include under Heritage '76 the development of the existing museum, Hall County Heritage Hall in Memphis and the marking of cattle drive trails through Hall County.

Under Festival, U. S. A. events include the Hall County Picnic for the third weekend in September, 1974, 1975 and 1976 in Memphis, Bob Wills Reunion the last Saturday in April 1975 and 1976; and the Cotton Boll National Enduro motorcycle race across Hall County.

Under Horizons '76 the activities include: Hall County Heritage Hall (Museum), Public Park and picnic grounds at the site of Bob Wills Monument in Turkey, Public Park and picnic grounds at the location of the Old Settlers' Reunion in Memphis for renovation of grounds and facilities.

Each community as well as Hall County will receive a flag and certificate from American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas upon the acceptance of the application.

Our citizens can make Hall County's participation in this better if each of us will participate and support the activities designated by the county committee.

There are many things that can be done to improve our city parks, our museum and events sponsored by our communities and our county.

It takes a lot of cooperation and work to make a success of voluntary activities and the leaders who accept the responsibility to work on project appreciate all the help they can get from each and everyone of us. Without volunteers to do the work nothing very successful is ever accomplished.

What Other Editors Say

The Metric System
The conversion of the United States to the metric system of measurements may not be as inevitable as it once seemed.

A bill designed to transform our way of measuring from inches-miles to centimeters-kilometers has become snarled in the House of Representatives, and at least one very influential congressman says it may be held up "forever."

That solon, Rep. Olin E. Teague of Texas is the chairman of the House Science and Astronautics Committee, which recommended passage of the bill to set up a federal agency to supervise and coordinate volunteer conversion to the metric system within 10 years. One of the bill's chief sponsors, Rep. Teague apparently underwent a conversion of his own about the proposed legislation. Says he now, "As far as I'm concerned, we aren't ever going to pass a (conversion) bill. It may be held up forever. I don't care whether it passes or not."

It just may be that there are many Garza countians and other Texans who see things Rep. Teague's way. Triggering the Texas congressman's exasperation about the whole affair was the controversial question involving compensation for individual workers who would have to buy new tools calibrated in centimeters rather than inches. Rep. Teague accused congressmen representing labor union strongholds of blocking the metric bill until they could get the federal government to pay for any new tools workingmen may have to buy. The issue froze pro and con solons into such rigid positions that the bill is being held in limbo by House Speaker Carl Albert.

Opponents of the bill seem quite satisfied with the status quo. Commented one foe of the metric system, "It is not what you'd call an emergency, is it? For 200 years, we've gotten along without it."

Sick Leave?
An English newspaper, "The Manchester Guardian" reports of an accident happening to a construction worker in the British West Indies. In a letter to his employer, the worker gave this account of his accident:
"When I got to the building, I found that the hurricane had knocked some bricks off the top. So I rigged up a beam with a pulley and hoisted up a couple of barrels of bricks.
"When I fixed the building, there was a lot of bricks left over. I hoisted the barrel back up again and secured the line at the bottom, and then went up and filled the barrel with the extra bricks. Then I went down to the bottom and cast off the line.
"Unfortunately, the barrel of bricks was heavier than I was and before I knew what was hap-

pening the barrel started down, jerking me off the ground. I decided to hang on and halfway up I met the barrel coming down and received a severe blow on the shoulder.
"I then continued to the top, banging my head against the beam and getting my fingers jammed in the pulley. When the barrel hit the ground it busted its bottom, allowing all the bricks to spill out. I was now heavier than the barrel and so started down again at high speed.
"Halfway down I met the barrel coming up, and received severe injuries to my shins. When I hit the ground I landed on the bricks, getting several painful cuts from the sharp edges.
"At this point I must have lost my presence of mind because I let go of the line. The barrel then came down giving me another heavy blow on the head and putting me in the hospital. I respectfully request sick leave."

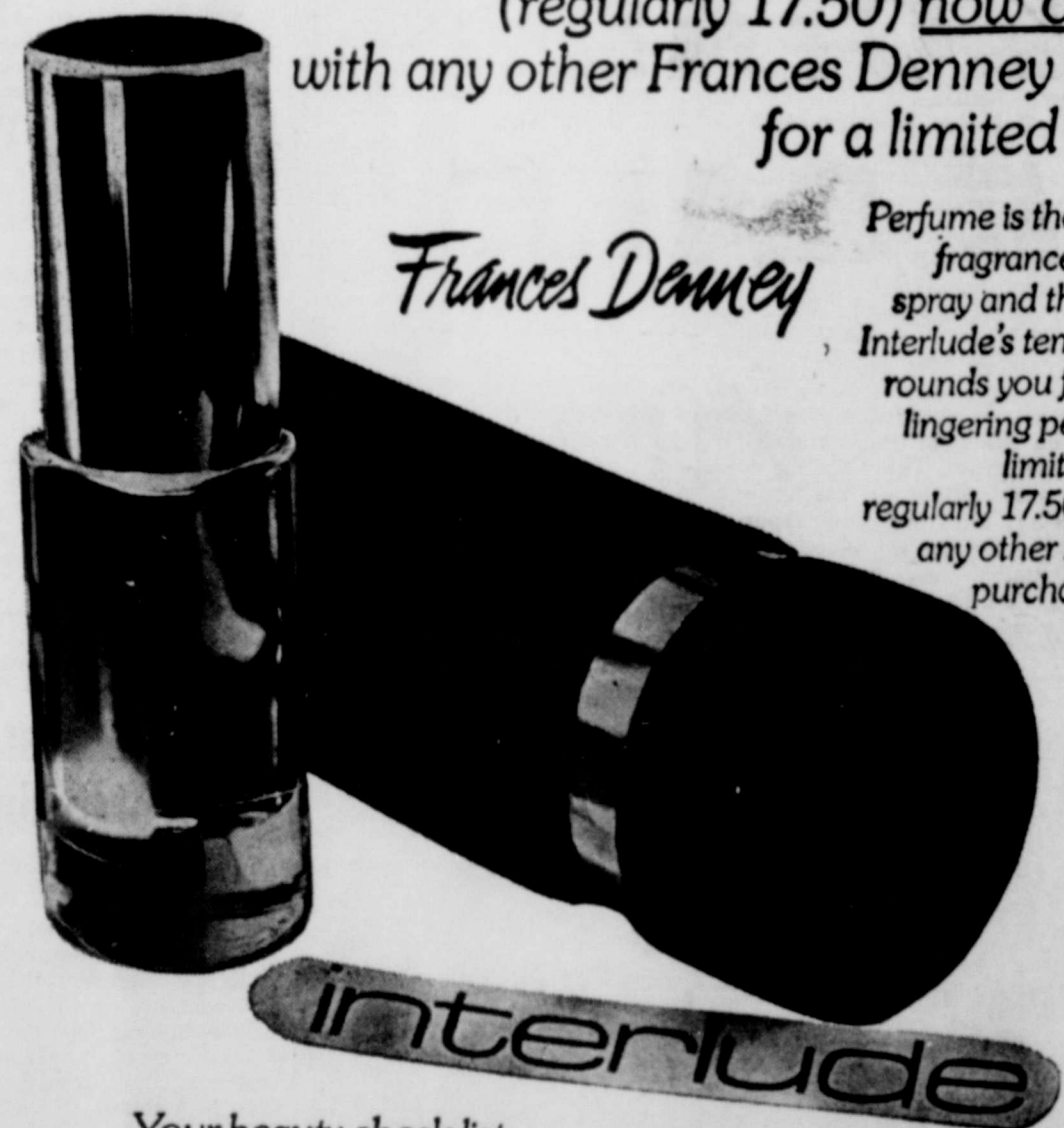

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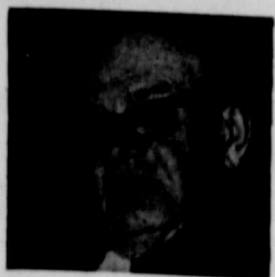

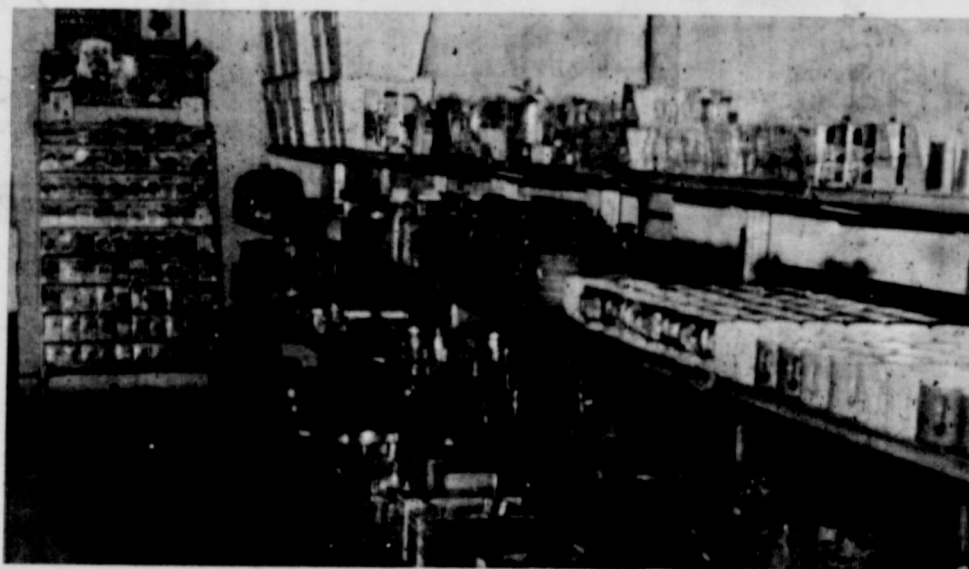

REDDY'S VACATION TIPS

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Slaut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.
