LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor

We are a wildlife group promoting abundant useful wildlife over predators. The predator is to wildlife what the weed is to the garden and farmer, a predator that, if not controlled, takes over! We need wild predator facts from your readers who would write us about the wildlife situation in your especially farmers, ranchers and hunters and those who like to see wild game.

Questions are: has the hunting and wild game declined or increased over the last 25 years in your area? How about predators, skunks, crows, fox, coyotes, coon, mountain wolves, lions, eagles, magpies, etc. Have they increased and has it effected your abundance of game? Example: South Dakota 20 years ago was estimated to have 32 million pheasants and called the Phesant Capital of the World. Today they estimate one and million. one-half Monitoring of 82 pheasant nests by game showed officials, predators prevented production pheasant from the entire 82 nests!

Over Wyoming ranch deer hunting is down 90% due to coyote predation on deer fawn. We're seeking a picture of game and

predator abundance or disappearance in North America.

You may ask why not go just to the wild game experts, biologists and game wardens? We would but many are silenced by their superiors and all that can be obtained is a formal statement, saying virtually nothing. We can give many examples of this.

In cooperation with Common Man Institute which has spent over 3 years extensively researching wolf history, we discovered a tremendous game and bird predator problem in many areas. Hunting is down as much as 90%





1990 Farm Program (04-13-90)

April 13, 1990 is the final date to sign into the 1990 Acreage Reductiaon Program (ARP). A farm not signed into the 1990 ARP by April 13th will be rendered ineligible for Deficiency and Price Support Programs.

1990 PERSON DETERMINATION (4-13-90)

April 13, 1990 is also the date used to determine if an individual or entity qualifies as a 'person' for payment purposes. For instance if some indivudual(s) were interested in forming a Coporation the final date to have everything in order, (charter, tax number, etc.), is April 13, 1990. If a Corporation, Limited partnership, Trust or any other entity is organized functional by April 13. 1990. ASCS will recognize that not entity for 1990 crop year payments. Another instance would be a minor who's birthday falls after April 13th, that individual would be considered a minor for 1990 crop year payments.

LIVESTOCK FEED PROGRAM (4-19-90)

The Livestock Feed Program ends April 14 1990. Any 'Feed on Hand' after April 25th is ineligible for cost consequently share, any cost share received for feed that is 'on hand' after April 25, 1990 would need to be refunded.

tickets A11 feed must be submitted no later than 30 days after the end of the feeding period. that means to be eliqible for cost shares feed tickets must be submitted by May 15, 1990.

SMALL GRAIN CERTIFICA-TION DATE (5-1-90)

The final date to certify all small grain, whether it be for grain or cover, is 1, 1990. This des all small includes grain, ACR, CU etc.

HAYING AND GRAZING OF ACR AND CU FOR PAY

month grazing period for ACR and CU for pay begins April 1, 1990 and ends August 30, 1990.

If you have small grain you are grazing you should be prepared to pull off by April.

PROVISIONS OF THE 1990 ARP PROGRAM

Just a reminder the 0/92 program is available for grain sorghum and wheat.

If you choose to go into the 0/92 program on grain sorghum you

would be guaranteed a 91¢/bushel deficiency payment on the acres designated as CU for pay. If you chose to go the 0792 route on your wheat you would 90¢/ guaranteed be bushel deficiency payment on the acres designated as CU for pay. For more details please contact this office. Please, look at this program closely.

There is a 50/92 program available for cotton

This program works similar to the 0/92 program however their no guaranteed deficiency rate. To be eligible for the 50/92 program you would have to plant at least 50% of your maximum permitted. Again for further details please contact this office.

ACREAGE CONSERVATION RESERVE

A. Maintenance

provisions require ACR be adequately protected from wind, and water erosion. ACR must also be kept free of noxious weeds, insect infestation, and rodent in festation.

B. Size and Width Requirements

ACR must:

1. be at least a chain wide at its narrowest point.

2. be at least 5.0 acres.

Exceptions to size and width

1. an acceptable skip row pattern with a consistent skip of 4 normal row widths, each skip at least 160' wide.

2. a whole field



Texas A&M's literacy clearinghouse hopes to close its doors for good

COLLEGE STATION - The new Adult Literacy Clearinghouse at Texas A&M University would like to go out of business.

But until the need for adult literacy is gone, the clearinghouse will strive to expand the borders of current adult literacy associations even as it pushes to circulate improved instructional materials to literacy teachers throughout the state, say the directors.

The clearinghouse, a collection of teaching materials for adult education teachers, is now operating from Texas A&M's "Riverside Campus" under the direction of Drs. Don Seaman and Mike McCallister, faculty in the Texas A&M College of Education.

The resources of the clearinghouse could benefit many of the smaller groups with curriculums, teaching materials and other support and to improve the networks, McCallister said.

Illiteracy estimates range from 17 million up to 72 million, noted Seaman, who is also interdisciplinary education coordinator at Texas A&M.
