Mr. Boren was at one time in the grocery business in Lakeview and moved to Memphis in 1921 where he operated a Chevrolet agency and a Ford agency from 1922 to 1928. In 1928, he began operation of the theaters here which he continued until 1961 when he retired. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

He was united in marriage to Dorothy Hodges Feb. 14, 1967.

Mr. Boren is survived by his wife of the home; one son, Bill Joe of Lubbock; one daughter, Mrs. Jackie Lee Hall of Dallas; 8 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

The Memphis Cyclone travels to Crowell Friday night for a non-conference encounter with the Crowell Wildcats and the game promises to be a real exciting affair between two Class A powers.

Memphis is ranked fifth in Harris Polls this week while Crowell is ranked 7th. The game will be played on a wet field as reports late Wednesday indicated that Crowell's football field has caught a heavy amount of moisture this week.

If conditions are wet by game-time, the Wildcats, with a big, powerful, team with average speed, will have possible advantage as the Cyclone is lighter and quicker.

Crowell has defeated Quannah 24-0 and Seymour 22-7, scoring three TDs and a field goal in each contest. Their squad scrimmaged Childress to a draw earlier this season.

Defensively, Crowell has been allowing their opponents only four first downs per game, so obviously, the Cyclone is facing a real test when the local lads take the field against Crowell Friday night.

Crowell's backfield is made up of Senior quarterback Randy Prince (150), Halfbacks David Bell (205, junior) and Don Sparkman (senior, 160), and fullback Allen Tapp (senior, 190).

The right side of the Crowell line is made up of 190-pounders with Frater at end, Glasecock at tackle and Rodriguez at guard, while Naylor at 180 is center. The left side contains Daniels at 165, Williams at 180 and Meyers at 170.

Offensively, the Wildcats run out of a T or power-I formation and have not previously thrown the football very much, but fans will remember last year the Wildcats put the ball up 17 times against the local team.

Defensively, the Wildcats utilize five or more different defensive alignments, mixing them up during the contest.

The Cyclone Coach Clyde McMurray said Wednesday afternoon that the Cyclone will start with the same players as last week on offense and defense.

"We've had a kind of natural let down after beating Childress last week; however, I'll expect by Friday night our team will have to be ready to play four hard quarters of tough football if the team has any intentions of an undefeated season this year," the coach said.

"Crowell's defense has been impressive, giving up only four first downs per game, and David Bell is a fine place kicker, already having put one through from 45 yards this year," McMurray said.

James Becq, Cyclone Safety End, and halfback, was cited for receiving the "big lick" award, selected by local coaches, in the Childress game.

Coach McMurray said, "We believe our linebackers, Candy Reyes and Gary McKay played a fine game against Childress and deserve special recognition for the job they are doing."

"Also we must recognize Rickie Spruill for making a key pass interception setting up our winning touchdown," he said.

"Our defense showed poise under pressure during the crucial periods of the game and the coaches were proud of all of our players," he said.

Coach McMurray said he agreed with the Childress Coach that Don Davis and Duck Richards played well on defense.

Offensively, the coach said the team did a good job and moved the ball steadily against Childress. Mistakes, however, cost the team in turnovers.

"There's room for improvement," the coach said, "and we are working to eliminate as many mistakes as possible."

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## EDITORIAL

### Antagonism or Dejection?

The President of the United States, Gerald Ford, in granting President Richard M. Nixon a full pardon, to "spare the nation further turmoil and division over Watergate", created a situation in which the President said "created more antagonism than I anticipated."

Many citizens we have talked with are more dejected, disappointed, down-hearted, and disgruntled than antagonistic over the whole "pardon" affair, after having their hearts lifted by the resignation and foreseeing a time when the judicial process could be taken through to its just conclusion.

Even President Ford had said previously that no pardon would be forth coming until the judicial processes were carried through.

Wrong doing is unpleasant at any level, but Americans definitely expect better from those in authority. It's only natural that we don't like to see our preachers engaged in illegal activities, nor do we want to see our law enforcement officials breaking the law. This is also true of public officials, school officials and faculty members, coaches, and about everyone else who holds a position of trust or authority in our lives.

The President, in Monday night's speech, referred many times to the claim that there had been no deals made between the former President and himself, nor between aides, over the granting of a full pardon, and that there was no comparison between the pardon and his order earlier for conditional amnesty for Vietnam war resisters, except for the common goal of "healing the wounds of the nation."

President Ford felt that the "full story of Watergate" would be made public to the American people at some time in the future.

Can each of us truly say that the granting of the pardon is healing our wounds, or is it opening afresh our wounds to our belief that we are a nation of law and order and a nation of the people, by the people and for the people, each deserving equal treatment under the law? Pardon is an act of mercy, granted to release a person from the liability of an offense.

The offense of Watergate was perpetrated against the American public in its execution of the selection of a man to fill the highest office of the land. It had its roots, obviously, in the high office.

The turmoil and division citizens have experienced over Watergate are not of the nature of civil disorder, but over a question of justice.

### Take Heart Over Progress

Although the reasons are not certain, the death rate from heart disease in the United States has fallen steadily since 1963.

The decline comes after a rise which took place over a period of decades, according to a new government study.

The decline has been most substantial, the figures indicate, among white males, particularly in middle age. Even so, white males still have a higher death rate from heart attacks than either women or non-whites.

"It's surprising to many people, but something good really has happened," said Joan Klebba, a statistician at the National Center for Health Statistics and chief author of the study. "We've spent billions on medical care and research. Some of it may have taken hold in recent years."

The study shows that the coronary death rate, when adjusted to take into account the changing age pattern of the U. S. population, reached a peak in 1963. It fell between then and 1971 by 10.5 per cent. Preliminary figures from later years indicate that the decline has continued.

From 1950 to 1963, the coronary death rate had risen by 19 per cent and slightly less than that during the previous decade.

Dr. Peter L. Frommer, head of the cardiology section of the National Heart and Lung Institute, said, "The changes seem to be real. We're impressed by them."

Since the 1960s, when coronary care units were first established in hospitals, physicians have been paying "more aggressive attention to coronary disease," Dr. Frommer said.

"Now we know you can do something about it," Dr. Frommer continued. "And it (the treatment) isn't just a matter of giving a patient a bed to lie in." Too, he noted that there has

been more widespread treatment of high blood pressure, more attention paid to limiting fats in the diet and less cigarette smoking, particularly among middle-aged men.

Dr. Frommer said it is a mistake to say one factor or another caused the decline in the coronary death rate "but all of these things do add up."

Despite the drop in the coronary death rate, heart attacks remain by far the leading cause of death in the United States. About one-third of the deaths in the United States annually are coronary deaths.

Although the reasons aren't certain, it figures that all the money, all the research, all the warnings, all the efforts have paid major dividends. In a day when the news out of Washington seems so disheartening, it's good to get this particular report.

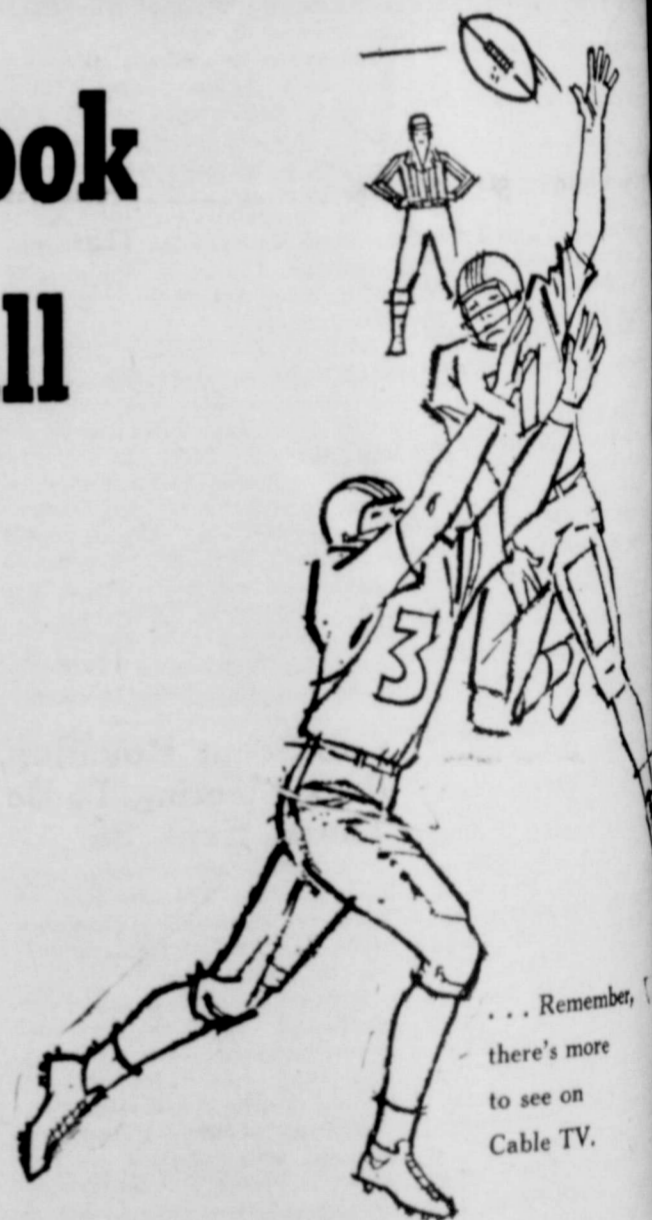

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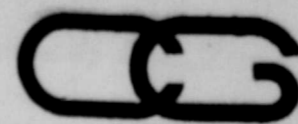

# Childress Dropped Cyclones 14-12

Memphis Cyclone, before a jubilant crowd of home-owners, watched the final seconds of the most exciting game of the season as they tried to capture a 14 to 12 victory over the Childress Bobcats in the final game of the season.

The contest contained all the elements of a classic war, with offensive and defensive momentum shifting back and forth between two teams and players on the field making heroic efforts to win the contest.

Before the opening kickoff, the Cyclone had previously proven its ability to win a well balanced game, capable of scoring from point on the field.

The Cyclone, however, was un-able to score in the offensive half, and the defensive line had been impressive in scrim-mage, but even this was not a fit-ting ground as was the Cyclone's defense, the Bobcats, the favorite in 2-AA.

There were only a few fans who seriously con-sidered that victory over Childress was a good possibility. But coaches and most of the fans felt the game could go either way.

The Cyclone team appeared to be in form from the opening through the final minutes, the Cyclone steadily against the Bobcats and was forced to punt losing the ball twice to Childress on a pass inter-ception.

The Cyclone's defensive unit, however, was in its own in the final minutes of the game, and the Cyclone's defense was the glory of the game, as the Bobcats any-thing the Cyclone's defense.

An example of the outstanding defensive play came on a second down and four to go for a touch-down, when Bobcat Fullback Hernandez got the handoff and was hit immediately by defensive tackle Duck Richards and downed for a two-yard loss, making it third down and six.

Childress Coach Charley Johnson paid Richards and Davis a compliment this week when he reported that Childress had yet to block these two defenders on the Cyclone's forward wall.

The debut for the Cyclone gave the local squad at least a fighting chance at one record no team has ever mastered in the history for the local school and that is a possible 10-0 record. Childress was the first big hurdle. Crowell Friday night, ranked third in the state, is the second big hurdle. It has been since 1967 that a local team has defeated a Childress varsity squad and the 14 to 12 victory caused soaring spirits here over the victory.

hson made a spectacular 23-yard catch after bobbing the initial contact with the football and re-clutching it as Safety James Beck was tackling him.

From the 8-yd. line, TB Hawkins got the call three times and scored from the two-yr. line. A pass for points was broken up and Childress lead 12 to 8.

Childress didn't get to keep the lead very long, however, as late in the second quarter, Ricky Spruill came up with a crucial pass interception about midfield. Spruill was hit after the whistle ending the play and the Bobcats received a major penalty, giving the Cyclone the football on the 17-yd. line with 34 seconds left to play.

On the first down, QB Ricky Miller rolled out to his left and passed the football to End James Beck at the northwest goal line flag, and Beck made a sensational catch on the football over a Bobcat defender's head for the touchdown.

A pass for two points bounced off several hands going incomplete and the score was 14 to 12.

**Second Half**

The Cyclone defense shined in the second half, as the Cyclone offense only had possession of the football for 17 plays, giving up the football twice on fumbles and once to a pass interception, but the Bobcats could not take advantage of their opportunities.

The first break for Childress came when Memphis fumbled on the Memphis 43 yardline. The Cyclone started a good drive only to lose the football on a fumble to Defensive Tackle Kenneth Fields who alertly pounced on the ball after a Childress back was racked up hard on the Memphis 13-yd. line.
