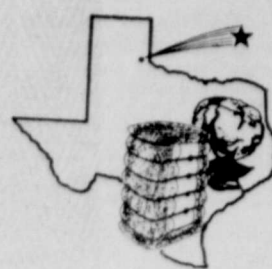

Hall County Farm Tour Wednesday Made As NT Research Demonstration

Influences of weather is very evident on crop yields as shown on the Hall County farm tour of Northwest Texas Research Demonstrations, Wednesday, Oct. 9, said Warren W. Mitchell, County Extension Agent. Twenty-nine farmers from all areas of the county were present for the tour. The first stop of the tour was on the Jim Lemons farm one-half mile north of Brice where ten varieties of hybrid grain sorghum was planted under irrigation. The second stop was on the Linton Gardenhire farm near Lesley where twelve varieties of irrigated cotton was tried. The tour members inspected a new self-propelled broadcast cotton stripper while at the Gardenhire farm. The group took time for a cup of coffee at the First National Bank before continuing to the Rayford Hutcherson farm to study sixteen varieties of cotton planted on dryland. The last stop of the tour was on the Dvain Ellerd farm where ten varieties of hybrid grain sorghum was planted under dryland conditions. The group then went to the

Junior Gridders Play At Home, 3 Games Today

Football games begin today at Cyclone stadium as all three junior teams play Shamrock. The 7th graders play at 4 p. m. and the 8th graders play at 5:30. The Junior varsity teams meet at 7:30 p. m. Fans will have opportunity of seeing the new scoreboard in action and three hotly contested games. The Shamrock JVs are as tough as any team the Memphis JVs will play this season and this game should really be a good one if the local JVs can have a good effort and play well.

The Memphis Cyclone travel to Shamrock Friday night to play the Irishmen in one of the key District 2-A football games of the 1974 season.

Memphis will be favored in the contest, on the strength of four previous victories as compared to Shamrock's four defeats, but the Irishmen, despite their 0-4 record have been impressive this season.

Memphis defeated Childers 14-12 and Childers downed Shamrock 13 to 9. That's an indication. Last week, Clarendon edged the Irishmen 22 to 18, with extra points determining the final outcome.

Shamrock has a large team, in physical size and weight, and the team has good football speed, Coach McMurray told local boosters Tuesday night.

The Irishmen use the "Denver City" offense, a spread apart T formation with the running backs stationed close to the line of scrimmage.

FB Davenport, a 215 lb. junior, HBs Reeder, 170 lb. junior and Thompson, 145 lb. sophomore, and QB Vinyard, 190 lb. senior, make up the Irishmen's backfield. Although the Irishmen are predominantly a running team, QB Vinyard is adept at passing with End Ramsey, 150 lb. sophomore his favorite receiver.

Leading the line is Guard Moya, 165 lb. senior, who also is the team's center linebacker and most aggressive player. Tackles are Shields at 200 and Seymour at 180, with Galmor, 175, the center and Olsen, 220 at left guard. Split end is either Stokes or Barefoot.

Defensively, the Irishmen have utilized four different alignments during past four games and are expected to have a special defense to use against Memphis.

The importance of this contest is obvious. The winner of this game could easily represent District 2-A, and the Cyclone camp is greeting the game accordingly.

Coach McMurray said, "We have had real good workouts this week. We're all healthy, and very much aware of the situation at hand."

"Each game is a step toward the ultimate goal of District Championship and this game is one of those steps," he said.

"Our starting lineup will be the same as against Wellington," the coach said.

The Cyclone alternates guards throughout the game bring in plays from the bench, and the Memphis mentor said, "with four guards, all capable of good performance, and all about equal, its just natural to alternate guards."

Facing Skeletons

In 1974, a year of soaring food and fertilizer prices as well as adverse weather conditions, the world has been forced to recognize the spectre of imminent famine in many developing countries. For the first time in its history, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) has felt compelled to declare a World Child Emergency. In "normal" times civilization faces the challenge of 10 million children close to starvation; this year the number has risen to a chilling 400-500 million.

Every day famine pushes its path further around the equator. Last year it came to prominence after years of devastating drought in West Africa and Ethiopia. Already it is making its mark in India, and in such areas as Bangladesh, Bolivia, Central America and the Caribbean hunger is a way of life—but one that cannot last long.

UNICEF's emergency relief combines the efficiency of long experience and the urgency of this unprecedented crisis. It has been rushing highprotein food and intravenous rehydration fluids to children and mothers in drought-stricken West Africa and Ethiopia. UNICEF is also supplying well-drilling equipment to these areas to provide the desperately-needed clean water for drinking and sanitation. As part of longer-range emergency action UNICEF will assist governments with nutrition policies and education, food production and the monitoring of the over-all child situation.

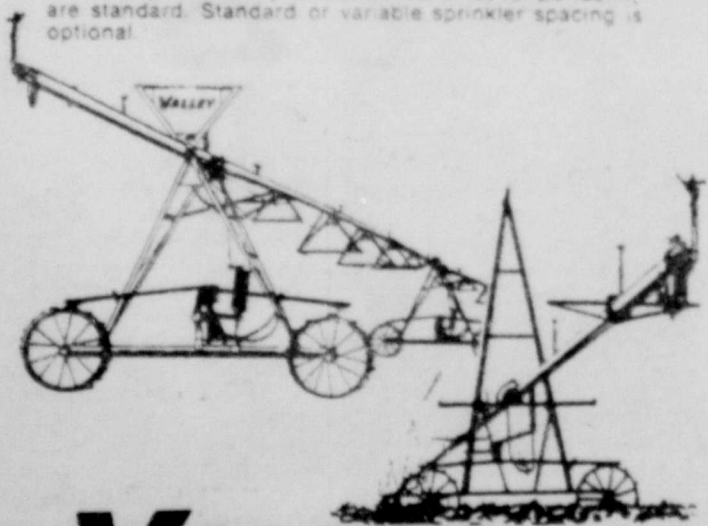
An estimated \$40 to \$50 million more a year will be needed for several years to help alleviate the problem. When Trick-or-Treaters come to your home collecting for UNICEF this Halloween, remember the spectre of children with no doors to knock on for their vital food. Remember there are now at least forty times as many, and give as proportionately as you can. Behind all the glitter of make-believe, real-live skeletons haunt our world.

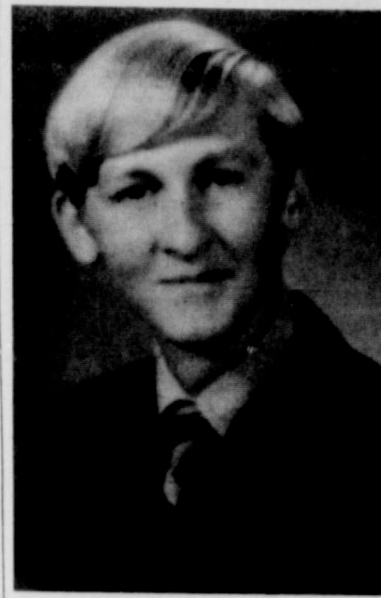

Father Wolko is the instructor for the instruction and the ladies of Guadalupana Society are the sponsors and are working with the program.

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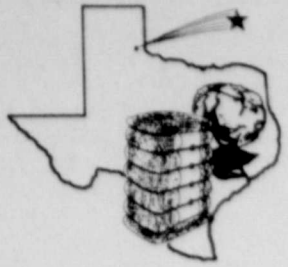

Cyclones Win 1st Dist. Game Over Wellington

Memphis Cyclone won the first round of district play with a 24-0 victory over the Wellington Skyrockets Friday night.

The game was a see-saw battle in the first half, with the Cyclone leading 14-0 at halftime; however, the Rockets broke the tie in the third period to tie the score. The Cyclone's comeback came late in the game.

The Cyclone utilized a balanced attack and a conservative defense to insure the first of two necessary victories for the district season.

Wellington had an aggressive young inexperience, that made a mistake free in the game. The Rockets' offense was mistake free in that their offense did not let up the football on punts and interceptions throughout the night, and managed to win the football nine times with one punt traveling.

The Cyclone on defense played more cautiously than in recent games but managed to shut out the first opponent of the season. Wellington ran 68 plays (including punting plays) and averaged 2.3 yards per play. They had 11 first downs, 102 yards and completed five of 21 passes.

The Cyclone, on the other hand, had a total of 395 yards for a remarkable 7.9 yards per play average.

Quarterback Rickey Miller had a passing night of 13 passes, one intercepted, and a yardage of 121. One pass was intercepted.

The running backs rushed with Fred Alexander leading rusher with 10 carries for 91 yards (9.1 yd. average) and Don Davis carried 12

times for 84 yards and a 7.0 average and Charles Bryley carried 11 times for 76 yards averaging 7.0.

Miller aided the rushing cause with four rushes for 15 yards and James Beck had two for three yards, and Ricky Douthit had one for five yards.

The Cyclone opened the game with a 61-yd. scoring drive. Two offsides penalties against Wellington gave the Cyclone its first, first down of the game. Then Don Davis carried twice for a total of 15 yards, Fred Alexander added 16 more and QB Miller passed to George Wiggins for 12 yards, giving End Wiggins his first competition catch of the season.

From the 8-yd. line, HB Charles Bryley got the call twice in a row. He was stopped for a short gain the first time but the second carry saw him tear loose and score. Candy Reyes kicked the first of two after TD conversions with Miller holding and the score was 7-0.

The remainder of the first quarter and the second quarter remained scoreless, as Memphis saw one good drive die when the football was fumbled away to Wellington on the Skyrockets 17.

The second half was all Memphis, however, as the Cyclone scored on three of its first four possessions after the half.

Charles Bryley returned a Wellington punt to the Memphis 46 starting the first scoring drive. Seven plays were used moving the football 54 yards.

Getting the drive going was QB quarterback sneak on a fourth down. Then HB Bryley took advantage of an excellent fake by FB Don Davis who attracted four Rocket defenders to find daylight outside and he raced to the endzone, being knocked from his feet on the Rocket's one-yd. line. James Beck dived into the endzone for the touchdown moments

later. Candy Reyes booted the point after and the score was 14-0.

Beck kicked off and the ball squirted away from a Rocket receiver and by the time the ball was fielded the Rocket was swarmed under at the Wellington 5-yd. line.

A bad punt after three unsuccessful attempts at moving the football gave the Cyclone the ball on the Rockets 24.

FB Don Davis made three yards on the first play. Then, FB Davis on the trap got just the daylight he needed to go darting through the Skyrocket secondary for the touchdown. Cited for outstanding blocking on this play by Coach Clyde McMurray during game film viewing at Booster Club Tuesday were tackles Kenneth Fields and Candy Reyes, Guard Audie Moore, Center Ed Hutcherson and the off-side guard, and End James Beck who made a fine downfield block. Candy Reyes just missed the point after kick and the score was 20-0.

An "off the side of the foot" kickoff by Beck which traveled 20 yards and alert play by Dick Hutcherson who grabbed the loose ball just before it went out of bounds, set up the Cyclone's next scoring opportunity on the Wellington 36.

The Cyclone marched rapidly to the Rockets' 7-yd. line, when a jump pass by Miller was intercepted by Wellington and the Rockets took over on their own 3-yd. line.

A short drive got Wellington away from the endzone, then the drive stalled and a punt gave Memphis the ball on the home 46 with only seconds remaining in the third quarter.

The Cyclone ran a pass play on first down and QB Miller fired a sizzler toward the west sidelines and End James Beck got three steps behind his defender. Beck took the ball in full stride and there was just no catching the state's Class A second place quarter miler in track. The try for the extra points was no good and the score was 26-0.

The final score came with less than a minute on the clock as the Cyclone marched 66 yards in seven plays.

A 15-yd. pass to Beck started the drive. Then, HB Ricky Douthit made five yards, and QB Mil-

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Burlington Initiates Safeguards in Wage Employee Profit Sharing

Greensboro, N. C., Sept. 20, 1974—Burlington Industries today announced a new employee benefit providing safeguards against extreme changes in the value of investments held by the Company's wage employee profit sharing retirement plan.

The new policy will affect 40,000 hourly paid employees who are members of the Company plan, beginning January 1, 1975.

Burlington has established a "guaranteed base value" for every employee's profit sharing account, which will be guaranteed by Burlington even if the profit sharing plan investments decline in value.

Horace C. Jones, Burlington Chairman, said the new benefit is being introduced to help offset severe declines in stock market prices such as have occurred over the past 12 months.

"Up until this year, the plan had shown steady progress through market value growth of fund investments. We feel that stock market conditions will improve and that our profit sharing fund investments will rise in value," Mr. Jones said, "but we do not want our employees to take the risk of possible large drops in value in the meantime. The new 'guaranteed base value' limits the risk involved."

Under the new policy, each member's share of company profits will be guaranteed, and in addition a fixed rate of interest similar to interest rates available on passbook savings accounts will be credited. Initially, the interest rate is expected to be six percent. "In times of normal economic growth, we are confident that the profit sharing retirement plan will provide benefits in excess of these guarantees," Mr. Jones said.

"If an employee retires at a time when his profit sharing account has fallen below the guaranteed amount, due to stock market declines, then Burlington will supplement his retirement payment up to the guaranteed level. The same policy applies to employees receiving benefits due to disability, termination of employment, or death."

The Burlington profit sharing retirement plan, one of the first in the textile industry for hourly-paid employees, was established

in 1963. It is funded entirely by Company contributions and has paid over \$35 million in benefits since its inception.

Employees are eligible for membership after two years of service with the Company. The Company has placed a share of corporate profits into the fund each year since its inception with the funds invested for future growth. Each member has a personal account which benefits from growth in market value of investments, but also declines when market values go down.

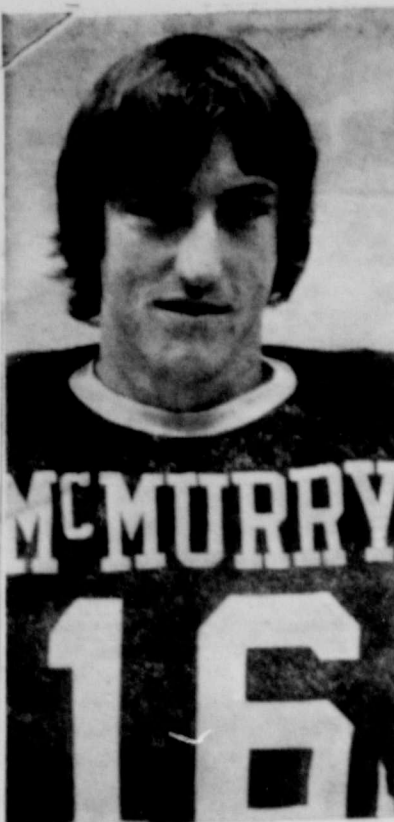

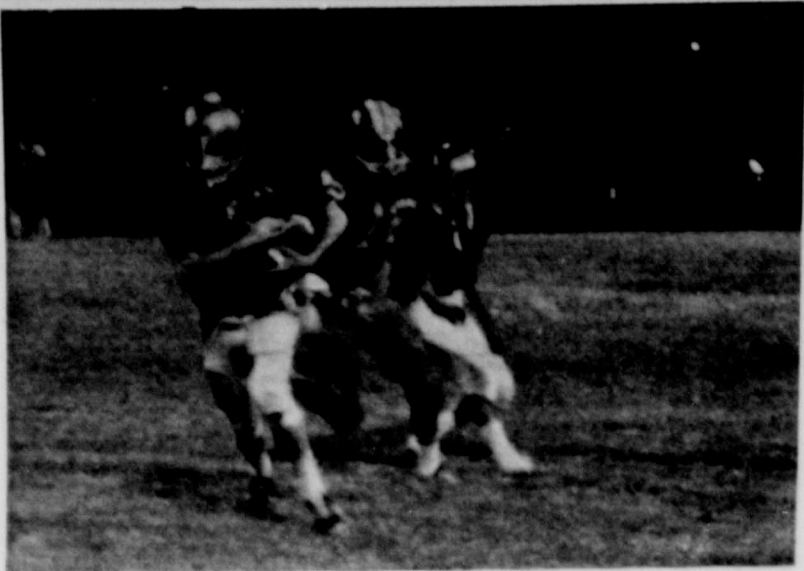
