Bi-Dist. Game Is Nov. 22 In Canyon

The Memphis Cyclone, hosting Claude Mustangs in the final game of the regulation season, Friday night, will be representing District 2-A as the District Champions in the Bi-District game against the Stinnett Rattlers, winners of District 1-A, in a game to be played in Buffalo Bowl in Canyon at 8 p. m. Friday, Nov. 22.

Officials from two schools, Memphis and Stinnett, met Wednesday morning and decided on the site in Canyon, and Memphis won the flip of the coin and will be the home team in the crucial Bi-District encounter.

The game Friday night with Claude does not figure into the playoff berth in the district, as Memphis has defeated all teams in the district which could, by right of record, represent the district.

The Wellington Skyrocket, with a victory over Clarendon, plus an upset victory by Claude over Memphis, could share in the title as a co-champion, however.

Memphis, on the other hand, is heavily favored over Claude, as the Mustangs have won only two games this season.

Nevertheless, Cyclone Coach Clyde McMurray said Wednesday, "Claude will be coming to play ball, and my advise to the Cyclone is they had better be ready."

One lineup change is expected for the Cyclone in the Claude encounter. FB Dick Hutcherson will be starting as a right half back, Coach McMurray said Wednesday.

"We're going after a new school record, a 10-0 season, and trying to capture our 14th straight victory when we take the field against Claude," he said.

"Workouts this week have been spasmodic. We've had some good days and some not so good," he said. "We're hoping our fans will show up in good numbers and give our young men enthusiastic support Friday night," he said.

Claude Mustangs
Claude lost last week to Clarendon 34 to 2, with the only bright spot a safety. The only district game they won is against McLean.

The Mustangs utilize the same offensive strategy they used last season, but Coach James Anglin's Mustangs are feeling the loss of Greg Forbes as field general. Sophomore QB Wayne Campbell is developing with experience, and he has two good running backs in Robert Taylor, a 193 lb. senior, and Tony Stephenson, 163 lb. senior, in the backfield. End Kevin Wisdom is a good receiver, and Joey Bible, 224 lb. tackle, are the line standouts. Local fans will remember that Claude's offense is a wide open affair, with backs in motion, sprint-out passing plays, and a lot of razzle-dazzle.

Defensively, Claude will have its work cut out for it to try and stop the Cyclone's balanced offense which is putting 30 plus points on the scoreboard.

About Wheeler
"We were hot and cold at Wheeler last Friday," Coach McMurray said. We made a lot of mental mistakes we should not be making at this time of the year, but we put 30 points on the board."

On the plus side, the coach said, "linebacking looked good... defensive line play was good... Don Davis had a good ball game... Candy Reyes was in on many, many tackles, and Kenneth Fields played real well."

Offensive standouts were QB Ricky Miller who completed seven of 14 passes, and Buddy Ballew, tight end, who was an outstanding blocker throughout the game.

The coach said he didn't want to take anything away from Wheeler's defense, which was the toughest Memphis has faced in district play.

The Memphis junior varsity will wind up its season playing Shamrock JVs in a game at Shamrock tonight, the only other game scheduled this week. Last week the JVs were open, while the Whirlwinds (8th) defeated Wheeler 20-0 and the 7th graders tied Wellington 6-6 in season finales.

Caprock Translator Is Erecting 350' Tower

Work on the erection of a new 350-foot tower for Caprock Translator system should be completed this week, weather permitting. The tower is going up within a few feet of the old 300 ft. tower.

The new tower was purchased from, and is being erect by Utility Tower Co., Oklahoma City, under the direction of Arnold Cruze, Caprock Translator Engineer.

The old tower has become increasingly unsafe to maintain and to climb. The high winds of last year had damaged the old tower, to the extent that it was unsafe.

The new tower, being erected, is not only higher but is a much larger and stronger built tower. This will enable Caprock Translator System to install newer and much larger antennas and equipment on the tower. The added height should give better reception, especially to the fringes of the viewing area.

The cost of the new tower and equipment is approximately \$17,500, including erection and installation of all equipment.

The purchase of the new tower and equipment was possible only by financial support of KVIL-TV, KMAR-TV, Amarillo; by the cooperation of the First National

Rotary's Fifty Years!

Over 80 people were in Memphis Tuesday evening for the 50th Anniversary Banquet of the Memphis Rotary Club, an organization which was chartered by Rotary International on November 14, 1924.

President Bill Wood and Memphis Rotarians had their best foot forward as they planned the affair, with Rotary District Governor Emil Prohl of Tahoka on hand to make the address and the only surviving charter member of the club, Tom Ragsdale of Austin, making special efforts to be on hand, along with two of his sons, also Rotarians in their home towns.

Mr. Ragsdale's comments after President Wood presented him a wall plaque, were emotionally packed with inspiration and warm friendliness. He said that the years from 1923 to 1931 when he and his family lived in Memphis were "the most wonderful years of our 61 years of married life."

He said Memphis citizens took him into their community and made them feel they were strangers no more, when they moved to Memphis, not knowing a single individual in Memphis. "Especially do we want to say that Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Dial (father and mother of Vera Dial Dickey), a pioneer rancher and businessman, helped us so much and treated us with such kindness that we loved Memphis from the beginning."

His only advice to the club members was: "If the office of president of the club is offered to you, don't make the mistake of turning it down because you feel you do not have time to serve, that year will be the most rewarding year you will ever live."

Governor Prohl admonished the club to let the 50th Anniversary be the "end of the beginning." He said it should be the beginning of greater service to the club, the community and to the Rotary movement. Rotary International President and Executive Secretary of Rotary International both honored the club for its first half century of service.

Rotary is an organization composed of business and professional men dedicated to the principle of honest and fair business practices and seeking to live up to the motto: "service above self."

District Champions - 1974!

It has been a dedicated group of young men who represent Memphis High School and our community on the gridiron this year, dedicated to a dream of a championship, and another dream of greater achievement than any other Memphis team has accomplished.

The dream began to come true last Friday night at Wheeler when the team won the right to represent the district in Class A State Playoffs. The team won at least a co-championship title, and with the 10th victory of the season here Friday night can cinch the overall title of District Champion.

The victories of the 1974 season are impressive, winning the key games in district by no less than 18 points. This dominance of District 2-A has not made many friends for Memphis in schools of the district, but it has earned a respect for the high caliber, hard-nosed football the Memphis Cyclone is playing.

Our young men should not be deterred from dreaming their dream of advancing as far in the playoffs as their preparation, their strength, their skill and their spirit will take them. This editor has been assured in personal conversations with game officials that the Memphis team is not a "dirty" team, nor is it a team which engages in unsportsmanlike conduct on or off the playing field, regardless of those who would try to label the team with these charges. We have also been informed that the blame for the brief fight following the Wheeler game rested on the Wheeler side of the field, not with Memphis.

Let our young men prepare themselves for hard games in future weeks. We'll all pray that good fortune will smile to keep injuries at a minimum, and victory will come to the team that plays as a champion, executes to the best of its ability, and is the best prepared.

A word about preparation. The Memphis team members, without exception, have prepared themselves to play the game. They have spent long, hard hours working off-season, sweating and straining to build their bodies and their skills. They know they must abide by the rules from UIL and their coaches, accept the authority of their team leaders, and possibly the most important of all, they respect each other, and take their participation in athletics most seriously.

We are proud of them, proud for them and their coaches. And it is obvious, the members of the Cyclone have pride and cooperative spirit, which blends together into that hard to define reality often referred to as teamwork. This was obvious in the first quarter against Childress, and was seen on the last play against Wheeler.

Call it maturity, or whatever, this spirit has been growing in Memphis among athletes since the 1970 season. The win-loss records bear it out. It is with confidence we say the team will represent our school, our community, and our district well in the playoffs.

Passenger service on the Fort Worth and Denver was delayed about nine hours in Memphis Sunday due to a derailment in the yards at Chillicothe.

I have been talking to several members of the Hall County Heritage Board and the opinion is that during the winter months, it would be feasible to open on Friday, Saturday and Wednesday afternoons. If I was adding another initial to Ernest Neal, I would make it a Capital "T" and that would stand for turnip. He came by our house a few days ago and gave us 4 turnips as I think the 4 weighed about 20 pounds. I measured one of them and it was not the largest one and it measured 16 1/2 inches in circumference and the actual turnip was 9 inches long. They were solid without any pith and one turnip would overflow a large bowl. I think he could compete in the World's Fair in the turnip growing show.

Another man I would put an extra initial on would be Olton Pate, with a capital "C" for cantelope. As he had me look in the back of his truck for a sample and what I mean they were firm and had the right flavor. I don't think Florida or California

could beat them. While on this subject, I think of another man who gave me a treat of some good home grown sweet corn. This man I would have to call O. T. C. Hook. The "C" standing for corn. The most delicious we ever ate.

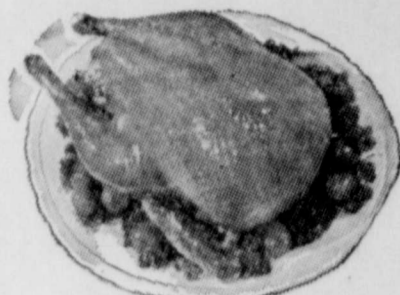
I had a short visit with Pauline Muncie Peterson of Hedley. Her grandfather moved to Donley County in 1900. Her father, Lester Muncie, passed away in 1929. She remembered attending the Bray school, riding horseback. When about 10 years old, she was caught in a headrise on the creek. She and the horse with limbs and logs were washed downstream where her mother rescued her. She graduated from Canyon High School. While attending West Texas State College, she was a tennis star and made most of the tournaments. She married Foster Peterson in 1936 who worked for the Amarillo Daily News several years. Pauline moved to California in 1943. She has led a very colorful life, working for the federal government in F. D. I. C. and I. R. S. She has written two books, one of which is just now coming off the press. She has a brother, James, who is a retired major in the Air Force. He has been working with Lockheed the past 15 years. Pauline moved back to Hedley the past July and is living on the land that has been owned by the Muncie families for the past 75 years. This family arrived in Donley County before the town of Hedley was founded. I would call them "old timers" of our neighborhood.

It is hard to keep up with our home town boys. Word just came to me that Lt. Col. Sim Goodall, who was stationed with his family in Australia for several months, was transferred to Georgia sometime ago and is now going to be transferred to Hawaii. I understood from his father, O. R., that he had a choice of Hawaii or Germany and he accepted Hawaii. I guess Sim was looking ahead and thinking how much better the scenery would be.

Here it is about the middle of November, too wet to plow or pull cotton, and we have beautiful roses in full bloom over our town and our population is increasing. While visiting the hospital last Saturday, I found out that we had 8 new babies arrive in one week.

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Culture Club Enjoys Program On Wales Wed.

The Woman's Culture Club met November 6, in the Home Ec Dept. of Memphis High School with Misses Nancy Hillery and Jackie Culbert as hostesses.

Mrs. Theo Swift opened the meeting with prayer. During the business session, the members voted to have a garage sale, Nov. 16, from 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. at the home of Mrs. Jeanette Irons. The proceeds will go to the city library.

Continuing the theme, "Women Take Giant Steps Through Travel," Mrs. Robert Moss used the quotation by Robert Louis Stevenson, "I travel for travel's sake," to introduce the program on Wales.

"What is Wales, and why does it have a prince?" was discussed by Mrs. L. A. Stilwell.

"Wales is a country of two million seven hundred thousand people living in the mountainous western section of Great Britain. The Welch people have close connections with the Scots, the Irish and the Bretons. They are all members of the great Celtic race. In true historic fashion, the Welch have a Prince. The story goes back 600 years to King Edward I. Ever since, the heir to the British throne has been Prince of Wales," quoted Mrs. Stilwell.

Miss Alma Bruce told about "The Welch People: What are they like?" The inhabitants of Wales range from hill farmers, forestry workers and sheep herders in the north to coal miners and steel workers in the valleys of the south.

Along the north coast many are hotel keepers in the resorts of the coast, and in the south farmers raise fat cattle and pigs. But several things all of them have in common—a love of poetry and language, a love of singing, and a deep and emotional religious piety, said Miss Bruce.

Mrs. Frank Ellis told about "Wales: Land of Wonders." 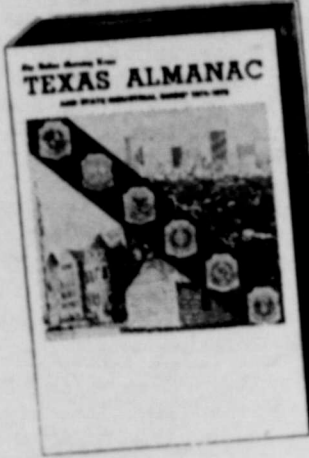
Graveside Services Held At Paducah For Havins Infant

Memphis Cyclones Cinch Playoff Berth With 30-12 Victory Over Wheeler Fri.

Dreams become reality sometimes, and for the 1974 Memphis Cyclone squad the first part of the dream has come true. The local team will be competing in the Class A State Playoffs, a right the local team earned by defeating the Wheeler Mustangs Friday night at Wheeler, 30-12. Stinnett will be the Bi-District opponent.

The Cyclone offense showed maturity in putting scores on the board, mounting four scoring drives of 59 yards, 50 yards, 45 yards and 60 yards, one in each of the four quarters.

Wheeler's first score came in the third quarter, on a 20-yd. drive with TD Kent Ware carrying the football four times to make the distance. QB Don Brown tried to carry for a 2 pt. conversion but he was stopped short.

Wheeler scored in the closing minute and a half of the game on a 34-yd. pass play from QB Brown to End Robert Williams. Williams made a sensational catch of the football as he when high over Defender James Beck to catch the football. Beck was waiting for an easy interception, when Whiteley seemed to come out of no-where to make the remarkable play. The forward wall of the Cyclone blocked the point after kick.

Memphis scored on its first possession. Two running plays from the Memphis 41-yd. line netted Don Davis a total of five tough-to-get yards. Wheeler seemed to have half its defense keyed on Davis he drew a crowd everywhere he went. On a third and five, QB Miller off the play-action, passed down the field to End Audie Moore and Moore "plowed" his way to the Wheeler 15, a 39-yard gain.

Wheeler's defense continued to be tough to run against, as HB Charles Bryley made one yard, and HB James Beck was thrown for a two-yard loss. On third down, HB Bryley took a pitch out from Miller and skirted the end for a 12-yd. gain to the Wheeler 4-yd. line.

Memphis jumped before the snap and was set back to the 9-yd. line. On the first play, Bryley charged up the middle for four yards. Then Bryley on the dive play netted three more. FB Don Davis

smashed into the line for one, and it was fourth and one.

HB James Beck got the call on the dive play, and running behind Guard J. D. Evans and Tackle Kenneth Fields, knifed through into the endzone for the score. Candy Reyes tried a point after kick which was blocked and the score was 6-0.

In the second quarter, Memphis recovered a fumble near the 50 and it took five plays to score, HB Bryley skirted the end for a 15-yd. gain on the first down. From the Wheeler 35, FB Davis fought his way for six yards. Then, HB Bryley, running hard, made four to the 27, a flag was thrown for late hitting, and officials marched off 15 yards against Wheeler to the 12-yd. line.

Two more carries by Bryley, one for nine yards and the other across the goal line put the Cyclone's second TD on the score-board.

A roll-out pass to the right saw QB Miller hitting HB Bryley in the endzone for the two-point conversion making the score 14-0, and that's how it stood at half-time.

Wheeler scored first in the third quarter, making it 14-6.

Memphis came into possession of the football on the Wheeler 45 following a short punt by Jim Verden, 235 lb. sophomore tackle.

Using a backfield of HB Don Davis, FB Dick Hutcherson and HB Charles Bryley, the local team marched for a TD. HB Hutcherson, knifed through a big hole to make 10-yds. to the Wheeler 35. He carried again and made five more. HB Bryley tested the defense but made only one. HB Davis, on the next play, found an opening and made eight yards for a first down on the Wheeler 21.

In the next series, Davis carried for five, an off-sides penalty cost Wheeler 5 more. Needing only inches for a first down, FB Hutcherson made these and more as he moved the football to the 9-yd. line.

HB Bryley, who rushed for 85 yards against Wheeler, picked up seven yards on the next play. From the 2-yd. line, HB Davis carried on the dive play behind Tackle Candy Reyes and Guard Matt Monzingo for the score.

On the conversion, Wheeler was off-sides on the first attempt. Then, Reyes tried to kick the point after, but the snap from center was high, and QB Miller, the holder, raced around left end, and leaped over a tackler into the endzone for two points. The score was 22-6.

Early in the fourth quarter, Memphis got another drive going, with QB Miller passing to End James Beck for a 25-yd. gain to the Wheeler 35. On a third down and 12 needed, QB Miller hit HE Bryley in the flat, and Bryley almost broke, but a lone defender jumped on Bryley and brought him down for a 21-yd. gain to the Wheeler 16.

Bryley carried for 5 yards on the next play. On second down, a down and out pass pattern to Beck, a beautifully thrown pass from Miller, was perfectly executed and Beck went out-of-bounds on the one-half yard line. QB Miller sneaked the ball over for the score.

Going for a two-point conver-

sion, QB Miller pitched the ball out to HB Bryley, and Bryley turned the corner at the flag and slipped over for the conversion.

Wheeler scored on a pass play late in the game to round out the scoring for the evening.
