"Let's Talk Memphis Cotton Capital Of The Panhandle"

Rain, Snow Tuesday Delays '74 Harvest

Snow, sleet and rain Tuesday brought to a halt the harvesting of the 1974 cotton crop in this area. Although moisture contents were very light, less than .10 of an inch to a trace, heavy frost the past two mornings has kept the harvest at a snail's pace.

However, if fair weather continues, as it is today, farmers should be back in their fields soon.

Hall County's 12 gins have received a total of 16,831 bales of cotton, a telephone survey this morning revealed.

Most gins reported few bales have come in since the snow and rain.

W. E. Cain, In Charge of the USDA, Agricultural Marketing Service Office, said harvest should increase next week as cotton plants become more dry.

The Memphis, Texas Office classed 13,200 samples last week to bring the season total to 15,650. This compares to 47,500 on the same date a year ago.

The predominant grade was grade 41 with 42 percent followed by grade 42 with 22 percent, and grade 51 with 14 percent.

The predominant length last week was staple 31 with 52 percent followed by staple 30 with 33 percent, and staple 32 with 12 percent.

Micronaire readings showed 50 percent in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9, 12 percent 3.3 to 3.4, 20 percent 3.0 to 3.2 and 12 percent 2.9 and below.

Pressley tests showed 91 percent tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average for the week was \$2,000 psi.

The cotton market remained dull to inactive over the Memphis, Texas area last week. Growers continued to resist bid prices. Offerings were light and prices were about steady compared to last week. Prices for grades 41, 51, and 52; staples 31 and 32; ranged from 32.00 to 35.00 cents per pound. This was for cotton in the 3.5 to 4.9 mike range.

The average price paid farmers for cottonseed at the gin was 120.00 per ton.

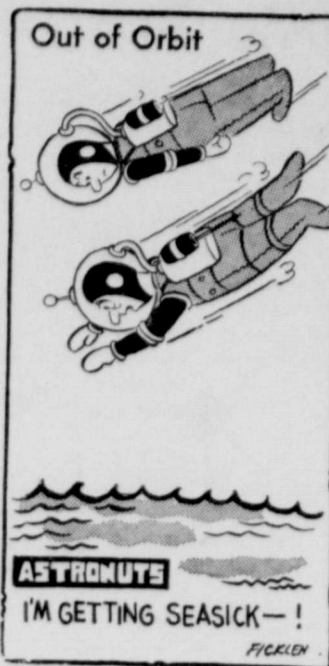

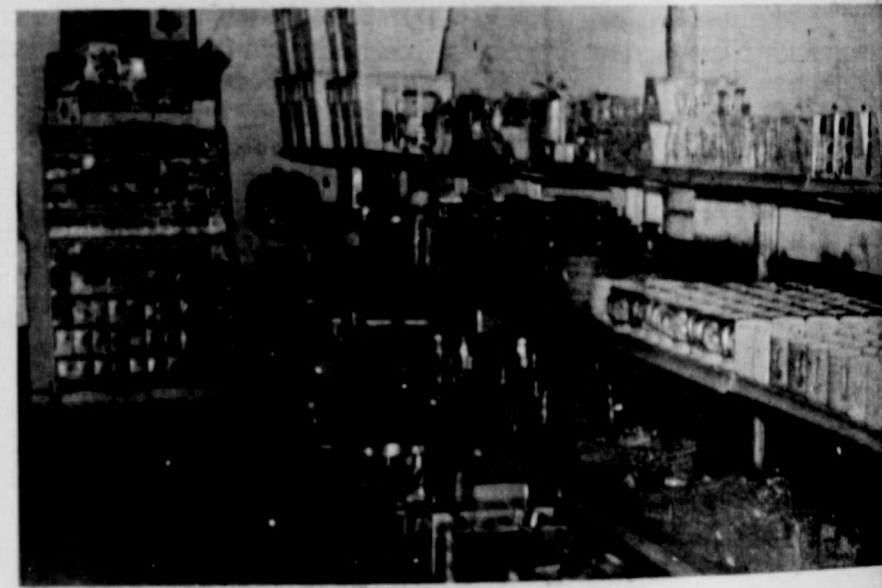

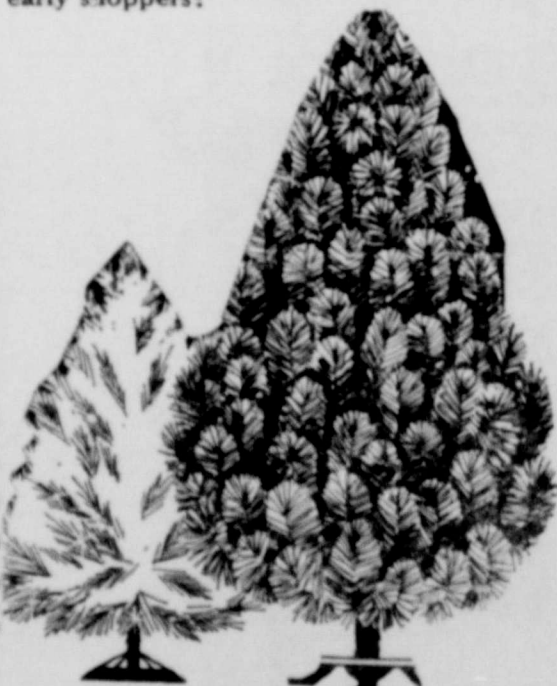

GIVE THEM SOME FOOD!

Hunger, it appears, is to be the Spectre of the Seventies. Since the last edition of this paper came out (it is published monthly) as many persons as the population of Tulsa have died from starvation or from malnutrition - related diseases.

The problem, in essence, is not one of production of food, but of distribution. Enough grain is currently produced to care for a population of 5 billion, with each person receiving the 400 pounds of grain they need for life. Citizens of the United States and Western Europe consume nearly 2,000 pounds of grain a year, however, with only 150 pounds of it in direct consumption — the remainder goes to the production of the high quality and expensive forms of protein — poultry, pork, beef, milk, eggs, cheese. It takes seven pounds of grain to produce a pound of what we love.

Now what's interesting is that in this Christian nation what we formerly called "surplus grain" we now call "food reserves." When there were lots of surpluses, we were only too glad to share with

the benighted heathen, and thus fulfill our Christian duty. But now it's different.

Yep, you've caught me meddling in politics again. I do it on good authority: When Jesus' disciples discovered the horrendous statistics about hungry people (five thousand, to be precise) they planned to meet that need by referral: "Send the crowds away to go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Good old rugged individualism, eh what? But our Lord did not set up a committee to study hunger, nor even select Hunger Enablers (that's an interesting title, incidentally; it looks like we've got plenty of hunger around without enabling more of it!) nor write a position paper: "You give them something to eat," He said.

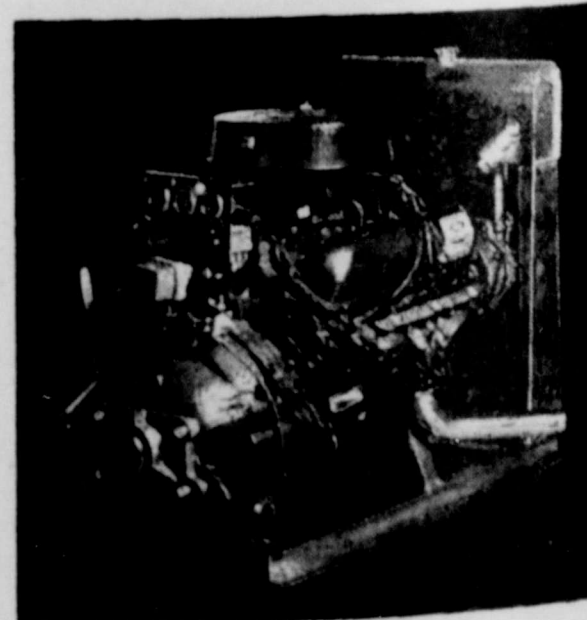

Don Davis Is Cyclone's Leading Rusher, James Beck Is Top Scorer

FB Don Davis is the Memphis Cyclone's leading rusher, and also maintained the best per carry average of any of the Cyclone running backs, but End-HB James Beck proved to be the Cyclone's leading scorer for the 1974 season, scoring every way except by kicking points after.

James Beck scored a total of 94 points, by catching Ricky Miller thrown passes, by running over two-point conversions, and finally by intercepting opponents' passing and returning them for touchdowns.

Don Davis was the second leading scorer with 84 points, followed by Charles Bryley with 68, Fred Alexander with 60.

Dick Huteherson scored 24. Candy Reyes 23 (all by kicking) Ricky Miller 20, Rickie Spruill 12, Joe Reyes 8, and Ricky Douthit and Buddy Ballew six each. George Wiggins scored two points and the final two points were given to the Cyclone team via a high punt snap by an opponent. The team scored 409 points to their opponents' 80 points in 13 games.

Don Davis rushed for 1253 yards on 166 carries averaging 7.55 yards per tote this season. This is a remarkable fete for the 165-lb. fullback, as almost all of his yardage came from plays running between tackle and tackle.

Fred Alexander was the second leading ground gainer with 842 yards on 122 carries averaging 6.9 yards per carry. Charles Bryley also carried the football 122 times, but he made 784 yards and averaged 6.4 yards per carry.

The fourth leading ground gainer is End James Beck, as a pass receiver picking up 778 yards on 33 catches averaging 3.5 yards per catch. Beck also made 81 yards as a ball carrier from scrimmage on 19 carries.

QB Ricky Miller had fine statistics as a quarterback, completing 48 passes, throwing 56 incomplete and only allowing six interceptions all season. He tossed 11 TD strikes during the year with Beck, Bryley, and Buddy Ballew on the

receiving end. One of the major reasons for the offensive success of the 1974 Cyclone team was the molding of one of the finest offensive lines to ever be assembled for the black and gold.

These young men, James Beck, Kenneth Fields, J. D. Evans, Ed Huteherson, Matt Monzingo, Candy Reyes and Buddy Ballew developed into an effected blocking cadre. At the first of the season, Memphis coaches had but three returning regulars, Beck, Fields and Reyes, but as the season wore on the line jelled into a remarkable effective unit.

As for as the offense is concerned, this is the most balanced set of statistics every compiled by a Cyclone team.
