

The Dec. 31, 1974, end-of-year totals possibly reflect the agriculture marketing situation, as much of the 1974 cotton crop did not sell in the market before the reporting date as price offers were unattractive to most sellers.

With 1973 a remarkably good year for agriculture, the banks' financial statements were at all time record highs during the first three quarters of 1974, but the final quarter could not keep pace with the trend. Possibly the most eye-opening

figure in the recent report, is the loans figures, up to \$18,565,-147.26, an increase of \$5,361,-019.39 over the Dec. 31, 1973 figure for total loans of the three banks.

Total assets was \$30,807,710.93 at the close of 1974, a decline of \$467,557.03 from the total assets figure of Dec. 31, 1973.

Total deposits of the three banks totaled \$27,506,185.76, a decline of \$1,145,570.76 from last year.

Another interesting comparison is that total assets of the banks are up about \$400,000.00 ove. the October, 1974 report, and total deposits are up about \$500 000 for the same three month period. Total loans are up about \$3,600,-000,000 for the same three mon-

The powers that be, whether this be government, business leaders, or whoever, have been like the New England minister, (a resident of Salem) who had a spoiled brat for a daughter. This undisciplined child was cared for during the day by a governess. Because her parents made no effort to teach the child obedience, she soon learned that she could get almost anything she wanted by throwing a temper tantrum. She would fall to the floor, kick and scream, and hold her breath, whenever she was denied anything the wanted.

Her indulgent and naive parents, concerned about her behavior, asked her why she behaved as she did. Her answer was that she really had no control over herself . . . that her governess cast a spell over her which left her powerless to control herself.

Convinced that their child would never "tell a story," their parents accepted the explanation at face value and took action against the governess whom they accused of being "devil inspired." Because of the close association of church and state and the influence of the local minister, the governess was cast into prison and threatened with execution.

This set the stage for many, many other families, who had misbehaving children, to seek out the witches in their children's lives for punishment.

An undisciplined economy results in misbehavior. What we need, and need desperately, is good parents who teach discipline in matters of economy. The blame rests with each of us, not with some scapegoat. The virtues of thrift, hard work, personal initiative and the ability to live within one's means, can become increasingly important.

Brighten Festive Table With A Merry Popcorn Man



Tis the season to be jolly but economical too. Try making novel popcorn goodies for fun and savings too. Get the family together, pop plenty of Jiffy Pop, then create garlands for the tree, balls for early eating and a merry popcorn elf to decorate the center of the table or mantle piece. Eyes, nose, mouth and earmuffs are edible gumdrops, while mittens and scarf are fashioned from colorful felt. Here's how to make your popcorn man.

3 packages (5 oz.) Jiffy Pop Popcorn (butter-flavored) cup light corn syrup

cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt

Prepare popcorn according to package directions. Combine corn syrup, sugar, and salt in a saucepan. Cook over medium heat. Stir constantly until mixture comes to a boil. Cook for 4 minutes without stirring. Remove from heat, stir in vanilla. Gradually pour over popped corn. Stir until evenly coated. Grease fingers lightly with margarine, pack into medium-sized bowl; round top. Remove popcorn from bowl; round bottom. Do the same in small bowl for head. Use remaining popcorn mixture for snowballs. Place large ball on tray, press smaller one on top. Place half toothpicks in gumdrops and attach to head for eyes and nose. Cut gumdrop for mouth, flatten for earmuffs. Use toothpicks to secure as with eyes. Cut scarf and mittens from felt or other bright-colored cloth. Arrange and press to popcorn man. Place holly or fir in ball at side.

NEW YORK - To what extent rising living costs and bigger taxes offset are wiped out the income gains that Hall County workers have obtained in the last few years?

Where does the average local family stand today in the nip and tuck race between mounting costs and rising wages!

For a while, most families in the area were able to keep ahea of the game because their incomes were going up more rapidly than their living costs.

In three of the last five years, however, the reverse has been the case. The erosion of income was most pronounced in the past year, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Nationally, it reports, although weekly earnings rose about 7 percent, on average, consumer prices surged by nearly 12 percent. As a result, there was a loss of close to 5 percent in net spendable income in the year.

A study by the Tax Foundation, shows how inflation and higher taxes have been putting the squeeze on the family pocketbook.
