

EDITORIAL

FEDERAL BUDGET TIME!

Everyone is concerned with budget matters, whether it be household, business, corporation, personal, city, state or national, at the end of the calendar year. But few budgets will ever seem to accelerate as fast as the U. S. Government's budget has been going.

American's seem to take the Federal Budget information to lightly. Ask the average man on the street whether or not the U. S. Government ever paid off its "national debt" and chances are you'll get some "strange" answers. Yes, the National Debt was paid off, in full, by President Andrew Jackson, "Old Hickery", who played a big part in winning the battle of New Orleans a few weeks after the War of 1812 ended with the British.

It took 60 years combined, from 1789 to 1848, before the U. S. Government spent its first billion dollars. Under President Gerald Ford's proposed budget for 1975-76, the U.S. Government should manage to spend about a billion dollars per day. A billion dollars is written in figures like this: \$1,000,000,000.00.

It has just taken three decades (30 years) for federal outlays to skyrocket from 10 billion dollars a year to the proposed 350 billion per year.
