This week is National Crime Prevention Week . . . and in light of several developments, maybe it is time to consider seriously the terrific growth in crime in this country during the past two years or so.

First off, crime prevention as a goal is very worthwhile, as is accident prevention, disease prevention, fire prevention, etc., but it will not be effective as a project until circumstances change at the root of the crime ladder. An example in point is the reduction is the number of fatal traffic accidents when the speed limit was reduced on U. S. highways and streets. This reduction in speed did more to bring about positive results in the traffic accident prevention campaigns than anything ever used, and it was not accident prevention which brought on the reduced speed, but fuel shortages which caused this step to be






BAKING. Plan your oven meals. A complete meal can be cooked in the oven as economically as one food item. Get foods into the oven as soon as it's preheated - or don't preheat at all.

BOILING. When cooking vegetables, use a small amount of water. It takes less time to bring them to a boil. As soon as water reaches the boiling point, you can cut the setting back. When boiling water for coffee or tea, heat only as much as you need. Remember, too, that water comes to a boil quicker in a covered pan.
