



Volunteer Army Idea Is Working!

Aided by two hard facts of life, higher inflation and increasing unemployment, the volunteers are filling all quotas for service in the nation's military branches, and R. O. T. C. ranks in college and university campuses are swelling to mid-1960 figures.

This editor attended R. O. T. C. at Texas Tech. in the years after the Korean War and during peace-time years, and frankly, R. O. T. C. was very popular amoung the male students.

Today, however, many students are turning to R. O. T. C. to give them financial support through their college careers. Plus, upon graduation, the commissioned officer can expect a job of an annual salary of \$10,000 a year, plus travel expenses, per dem, etc., and living in an environment of controlled housing costs (if married) and PX privileges.

Considering that this nation is not currently involved in any military operations, serving in the Army, Navy or Air Force is far more attractive for young men and women than it was during the years when Viet Nam was almost a sure station point.

The enlistment tide is running so strong that recruiters are turning away marginal applicants they might have accepted six months or a year ago.


All four services are meeting their enlistment quotas. A high percentage of the new recruits are men and women with skills and aptitudes the armed forces can use.







Burns Cites Six Dangers In America's Future

Federal Reserve Board Chairman Arthur F. Burns says the U. S. must solve six problems if it is to have lasting prosperity. Here they are:

I. Corporation debt must be reduced. It now is equal to girl was any different from most stockholders' investment today, while in the 50's it was about of us humans? half. It is difficult, if not impossible, for companies to raise funds through the sale of new shares of stock today.

2. A decline in the "real" earnings of corporations. Profits. when adjusted to include inflation and rise in value of inventories, are actually not even large enough to cover the divi- at all. dends being paid tostockholders-let alone to provide for building up the business.

3. Double-digit inflation of the past year is the principal cause of the decline in economic activity.

4. Shrinking gains in productivity, known as output per manhour, has been declining. "Workers nowadays are well trained, but many of them work with less energy than they should, and absenteeism has become a more serious problem, Chairman Burns said.

5. The mounting tax burden is affecting the fundamental precept that there must be adequate rewards to stimulate individual effort. Twenty-five years ago a family of five paid. one per cent of the worker's total weekly earnings in federal income and Social Security taxes. Since then, that fraction has to worship gadgets of this world steadily climbed and reached 13 per cent in 1974.

6. The decline of the U. S. Dollar in world markets is another problem which cannot be solved until exchange-rate stability can be achieved, and this can not occur until financial conditions have been put in better order.

Kent Creek - The Kent family were early settlers in the county. Lakeview - The town was named for Deep Lake, four miles a-

way. Lesley — This name honors the son of James P. Montgomery, Lesley Montgomery.

Little Red River - This river is a tributary of Prairie Dog Town Fork of Red River.

Memphis - Dr. Brice, while in Austin, saw a letter addressed to Memphis, Texas, with a notation, "No such town in Texas." The name was submitted and accepted. Mountain Creek - The creek

flows through a small group of mountains or hills.

Mulberry Creek - Mulberry trees grow along its banks. Newlin - In the early 1870's Col. Charles Goodnight, Emmanuel E. Dubbs, and a Mr. Newlin, while on a buffalo hunt, camped one night in the valley just north of the present town. Sometime later Mr. Newlin returned and is said to have assisted in plotting the town in 1889.

North Pease River - Jacob de Cordova named the river for Governor E. M. Peace of Texas.

Olks Creek --- A surveyor named Olks was surveying near the Red River and discovered this creek

Oxbow Creek - The creek was shaped like an oxbow near one of the camps of the Shoe Bar Ranch. The creek has since changed its course.

Panther Creek - A panther was killed near this creek.
