Comptroller Bob Bullock Sends City Sales Tax Payments Month Earlier

Bullock surprised 809 Texas towns payments more frequently than their children. and cities Feb. 27th with \$64.1 once a quarter. million in quarterly city sales tax payments coming a full month earlier than usual. paign.

"I said we would speed up the payments and we did," Bullock said.

The payments covered the October - December, 1974, quarter. Last year payments for that quarter were sent on March 25, Bullock said the earlier payment will help all cities with cash flow problems but he also noted that the total payout was worth some \$400,000 in one month's interest alone if the cities simply invested the money.

Accompanying Bullock's news release concerning the city sales tax payments was a 16-page tabustate.

Checking this listing, the City Memphis received \$14,202.03 of as the City's share of the one percent sales tax collected. The State retains a two per cent service fee for processing charges. The \$64.1 million for the October - December 1974, quarter of 1973.

Cattle on feed in Tenas have been out virtually in half in a year's time. The number of cattle on feed a year ago in the state totaled 2,341.00 head. Compare that with the atest figures and you have a 47 per cent decline.

Nationwide, cattle on feed in the seven major feeding states -Tezzas, Iowa, Mebraska, Colorado, Arizona, California, and Kansas are down 37 per cent from a year ago. As of Feb. 1. cattle numbers in these states totaled 0,050,000 head compared to 9,632,000 a year ago.







WASHINGTON, March 9-Donley County Feedlot, Inc., of Hedley, Tex., has been charged with violating payment requirements of the Packers and Stockyards Act, the U. S. Department of Agricul-

ture (USDA) said today. The respondent is a custom ral hundred farmers and feedlot that operated as a dealer -buying, feeding, and selling cattle as the agent for investor clients located in southern California, Kentucky, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, and Wisconsin. It is not operating at this time.

USDA's Packers and Stockyards Administration charged in an administrative complaint that during July, 1974, the respondent:

Issued insufficient funds checks to investor clients in payment for more that \$72,000 worth of cattle sold to packers from the feedlot; and Failed to pay, when due, the net proceeds due its clients from

the sale of the cattle. Filing of the complaint does not prove that Donley County Feed-

lot, Inc., has violated the Packers and Stockyards Act. The firm has a right to a hearing to determine whether the evidence supports the charges.

If the charges are proven, the firm would be placed under : cease and desist order.


Livestock dealers and market agencies are required - under the Packers and Stockyards (P&S) Act-to pay promptly for live-

stock. Issuing insufficient funds checks in payment for livestock is considered to be an unfair business practice. The P&S Act is a fair trade

practices law. It promotes and maintains fair and open competition in the marketing of livestock, poultry, and meat.

The record in this case is open to the public. Copies of this complaint, P&S Docket 5063, may be obtained from the Information Office, Packers and Stockyards Administration, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250.
