Students Lacking In Basic Writing Skills!

From colleges and universities over the nation comes the same report, "many high school graduates come to college lacking in the basic skill to write on a college level."

Fred Hargadon, dean of admissions at Stanford University. recently reflected that "this is the generation of students affected most by the media revolution." In a recent article, Hargadon said, "Many of our students are viewing and listening types as contrasted with reading types."

The article revealed that the number of high school juniors and seniors scoring at high levels on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) has dropped dramatically since the mid-1960s. Data from the College Entrance Examination Board indicates that between 1967 and 1974 the number of high school juniors and seniors scoring above 700 on the SAT fell from approximately 32,000 to 16,000. The number scoring above 600 fell by a third.

Sam A. McCandless, program services officer of the College Entrance Examination Board's admission testing program, observed that "there has been a decline in the developed reasoning ability" of students entering college-the kind of reasoning ability, along with mastery of the language, involved in theme writing.

Many young people don't see their language as a manifestation of their own personalities. They can see how music, art, hair styles, clothing, etc., reflects their lifestyles, but not language. Few seem to recognize that their language says much about what they are and who they are, and how successful they may become.

Vagueness, wordiness, generalities and lack of paragraph development in writing sprinkled with grammatical errors are some of the major problems plaguing college students who ed like a Boy Scout" we reviewaren't prepared to write on a college level. These are not the kind of skills which can be overcome in a single semester.

Consumers, faced with terrific price increases, one on top of the other, on all economic fronts, and reading about, or being the Department of Health, Educainvolved with, unemployment, began trimming purchases.

Warehouses began filling up as demand for products fell. off. In order to encourage renewed interest, rebates are being offered. Businessmen make no bones about it. The big reason they offer rebates instead of just slashing prices is that they want their official prices to stay up-in case the Government again clamps a freeze on prices.







She offered a rhetorical challenge to all other states to meet this reputation. After a happy, "Aren't we gliad we are Tenans ?", she led the group in pledging allegiance to the flag.



By BILL COLLIER Branch Manager Q: I've been told some grocery stores have their own meat grades. Is there more than one system for grading beef cuts?

A: Some meat packers utilize their own grading systems known as name brand or inhouse grading. However the grade you see in the supermarket is almost always that assigned the meat by the Standardization and Grading Branch of the United States Department of Agriculture. Meat products will generally carry a label reading "USDA -Choice, USDA-Prime", or whatever the appropriate grade. USDA grading is done on the basis of carcass classification and is supposed to reflect the eating quality of the meat. A US-DA grading system seldom noticed by consumers is the Yield Grade. Purpose of the Yield Grade is the determination of the relative cutability of the carcass. Specifically, how much of the carcass can be used in the four major retail cuts of beef. Highest Yield Grade for beef is USDA-1. Lowest is USDA-5.






