Serious Crime In U. S. Skyrocketing!

Attorney General Edward H. Levi announced this week that serious crime in the United States rose 17 percent - the largest increase in 14 years

Crime spurted 19 percent in the final quarter of the year after recording advances of 15 percent in the first quarter, 16 percent for the first six months, and 16 percent for the first nine months.

In 1973, by comparison, crime rose 6 percent on the heels of an actual decline of four percent in 1972.

"These figures represent a dismal and tragic failure on the actual decline of four percent in 1972.


These figures represent a dismal and tragic failure on the part of our present system of criminal justice," Mr. Levi declared.

In breaking it down, suburban law enforcement agencies reported a 20 percent rise in crime, while the rural areas reported an increase of 21 percent. Cities with 100,000 or more inhabitants reported an increase of 13 percent.

There are many, many causes of crime. But the only real deterent appears to be swift apprehension and conviction and punishment.

The Attorney General said, "Unfortunately, these results were predictable. In many areas of our country only a small percentage of these arrested for a felony are convicted ence on the Middle East for en- ket.
