An art, craft and hobby show has been planned in connection with the annual Bob Wills Day celebration to be held Saturday, April 26, in Turkey, according to an announcement this week.

## Chamber of Commerce To Have Wills Banquet Fri.



Dr. Charles Townsend, Canyon, a West Texas State University history professor who speaks his lectures with musical interludes, winner of the coveted Grammy Award for his album notes in the 1974 recording of country swing of Bob Wills, is the principal speaker at the 55th Annual Banquet of Memphis Chamber of Commerce at 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 4.

The Memphis Community Center is being carefully decorated to carry out the theme saluting the honored Bob Wills, as the county pays month-long homage to its best-known entertainer.

Dr. Townsend, who seldom accepts offers as a banquet speaker, has been enthusiastic about his speaking engagement in Memphis, and has contributed much to preparation for the affair in helping prepare for the salute to Bob Wills.

He won the Grammy for a booklet he wrote for United Artists to insert in each double-album recording of "Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys — For the Last Time", released last year for nationwide sales. The narrative traces the life of Wills, famous country swing artist in Texas and throughout the nation two decades and more ago.

Dr. Townsend's biography of Wills is published by the University of Illinois Press later this year.

Dr. Townsend has prepared for the Memphis Chamber a short paper entitled "Bob Wills and the Birthplace of Western Swing" which the Chamber is publishing to be given with each of the Commemorative Coins and to others. The paper covers the life of Jim Bob Wills and how he developed his unique western swing style by blending frontier western music with blues and swing of jazz. This was done in the cotton fields in this area.

Members of the Bob Wills immediate family are due to attend the banquet, and they will receive a set of the Commemorative Bicentennial Coins. The coins, first ten sets, will be auctioned off by T. W. Tippet, auctioneer, as the last part of the banquet program.

John Kehr, president of the chamber, will be toastmaster for the banquet, and he will pass the gavel on to Incoming President Mike Branigan. Community service awards and "Work Horse of the Year Awards" will be presented during the banquet to local chamber members who have worked in the interest of bettering the community.

Bicentennial flags will be presented to Hall County, and the four communities of the county during the banquet.

The theme of the affair is "Hall County . . . Home of Bob Wills", and chamber officials feel that this will be the finest banquet ever staged by the organization, because of its entire county-wide flavor and the importance of Bicentennial activities, one-third of which centers around Bob Wills and the Bob Wills Celebration in Turkey the last of this month.

The banquet program, printed on Postex Hall Plant sheeting, in patriotic colors of red and blue, on white, carries the official proclamation of April, 1975, "Bob Wills Month."

## Schools, Cities To Have Elections Sat.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. in respective polling places over the county in city and school trustee elections Saturday.

In Memphis, at the City Councilroom of the Municipal Building, the joint election will name two school board trustee and a mayor and four alderman.

The Memphis ISD ballot has two names, Dr. R. E. Clark and Jerry Montgomery, both incumbents, seeking two places.

The City of Memphis ballot has Kenneth Dale for Mayor, and Leo

Fields, W. R. Parker, Olton Pate and Ed Foxhall, for Aldermen, wards 1 through 4 respectively.

Three places on the County School Board will be filled in the elections Saturday. From Precinct No. 1, George F. Helm is on the ballot, Precinct No. 2 had O. E. Gardnere, and Trustee-At-Large, Roy Gresham has filed for the position and is on the ballot. All four school districts vote on the trustee-at-large.

The City of Lakeview election will be held at the City Office. Russell Payne has filed for Mayor, Barney Byers for a one-year unexpired term and W. M. Gowdy, Jr., for a two-year term.

The Lakeview ISD election, to be held in the School Auditorium, has two men filing for position, and a third vacancy has not drawn a candidate.

J. L. Byars and W. O. Clark have filed to have their names placed on the ballot. Voters can vote for three people in the election.

The City of Estelline and the Estelline ISD trustee elections will be held at the City Office Building.

Two men have filed for the two councilman positions on the Estelline City Council. They are Paul Collins and Melvin Long.

The Estelline ISD trustee election has three positions to fill, and three names have been filed and are on the ballot. These are Thomas Tippet, Tom Cope and Franklin Wyatt.

## Geo. Thompson, Former Memphian, Killed in Dallas

George McClellan Thompson, 36, former resident of Clarendon and nephew of Mrs. Byron Baldwin, was dead on arrival at Parkland Hospital in Dallas early Saturday morning after being beaten, stabbed and robbed in a Dallas parking lot.

Dallas police said Thompson walked out of a night club early Saturday when the incident took place. A witness saw three men running from the scene.

Mr. Thompson was an executive representative for Ray MacDonald Advertising Associates of Dallas. He was born in Memphis and lived in Dallas for nine years. He was a member of the United Methodist Church.

Memorial services were held on March 31 at the First Baptist Church in Clarendon with the Rev. James O. Brandon, Rev. Weldon Rives and Rev. Owen McGarity officiating.

Mrs. Baldwin said George was a dearly loved member of the younger generation of the George M. Thompson family of Memphis. He was the namesake of his grandfather and father, both deceased. Numerous relatives and others here mourn his untimely death. We see the truth in the words of the song which say: "We do not know what the future holds; but we know who holds our hand."

Survivors include his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Sibley of Clarendon; three sisters, Mrs. Charles Hammell of Clarendon, Mrs. Mike McCully of Clarendon and Mrs. Odell LaGrone of Canyon; two daughters, Faith Renaee and Tracy Lee of the home.

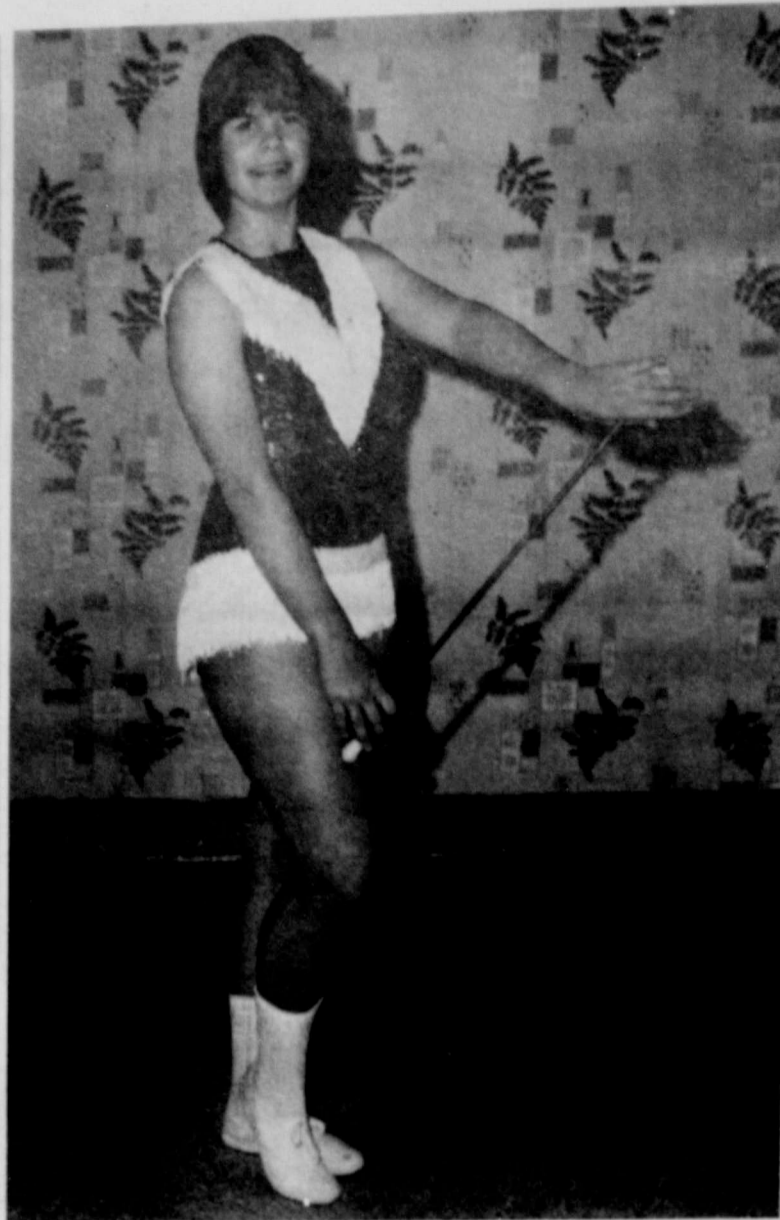
Mr. Grady passed away Saturday at the Leisure Lodge Nursing Center in Childress.

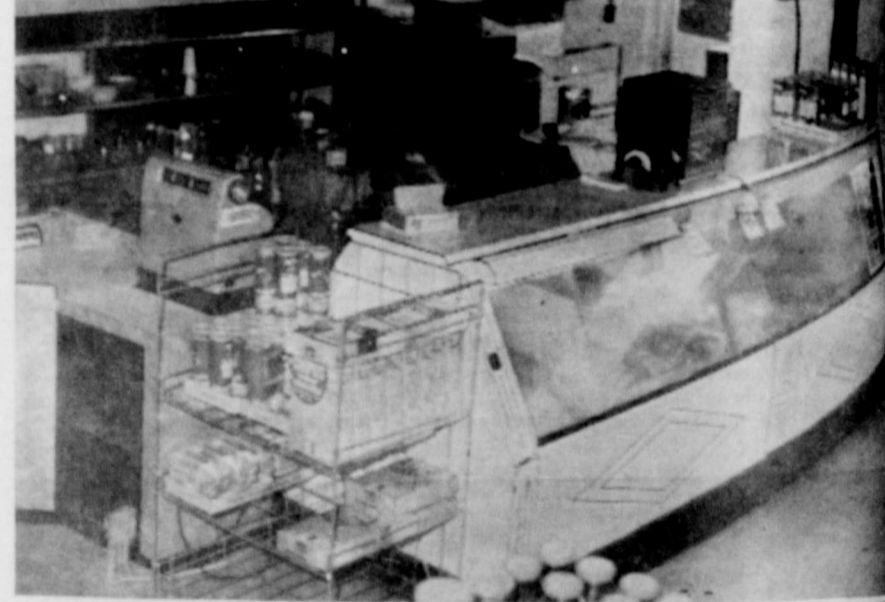

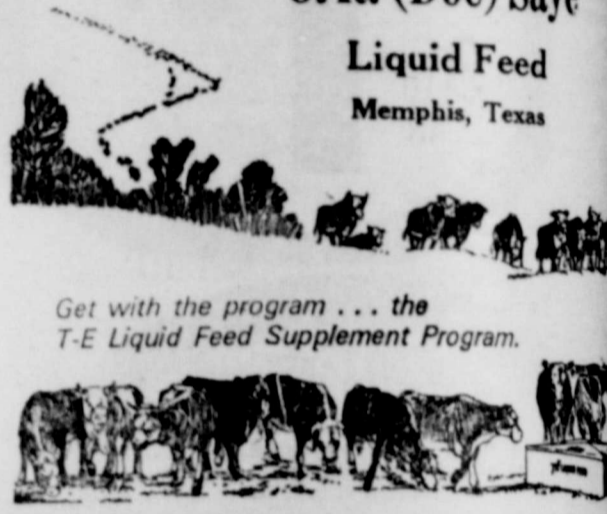
