## Memphis City Council Drafts New Ordinance, Appoints PRPC Reps.

The City Council of the City of Memphis, meeting Tuesday evening, approved an ordinance, set a budget hearing date, made several appointments, and continued with negotiations with General Telephone Co. officials over rate increases.

The Council was also informed that their request for federal aid in building a sewer life station from the Housing and Urban Development had been denied.

City Secretary A. L. Gailey said that most recent information on the city's request was advise to re-submit a new request in future months.

The Council passed an ordinance restricting motor vehicles to use of public roads and designated parking areas in the Memphis City Park only. The ordinance has come out of the abuse of the park by vehicle owners and riders of motorcycles in cutting new trails all over the park area. City Attorney John Deaver II is in the process of drafting the exact wording for the ordinance.

In the meantime, citizens should restrict their vehicles to use of roads and parking areas in the City Park or find themselves in violation of the new ordinance.

The Council called for the annual budget hearing, open to the public, for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 1, 1975, in the City Council room. Expenditures for the budget year 1975-76 will be approved in this budget.

The Council voted to reappoint Mayor Kenneth Dale, and appoint Councilman W. R. Parker to serve as city representatives to the Panhandle Region Planning Commission. Councilman Parker replaces Troy Phillips on this commission. Municipal officials were urged to attend a meeting a 10 a.m. Friday, June 13, in the Memphis Community Center, for a conference with members of the Texas Airport System Plan staff of the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

"This conference will focus on the airport development needs for Briscoe, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall Counties," H. Merrill Goodwyn, Aviation Planner, said in a letter addressed to the City of Memphis.

"The Texas Airport System Plan staff is endeavoring to consider the economic and social goals of a community and its citizens as well as aviation demand forecasts in developing this plan," Mr. Goodwyn said.

### Tim Paulsel, Former Resident, Dies In Ft. Worth

Tim Paulsel, 65, former Memphis resident, died early Tuesday morning in Fort Worth, according to information received here.

Mr. Paulsel, who had recently undergone open heart surgery, suffered a stroke about a week ago, according to relatives here.

Mr. Paulsel was employed in Memphis in the 1930 with Cameron Lumber Company and was married to Cora Ethel Thornton during that time. Mrs. Paulsel preceded her husband in death in 1972.

Mr. Paulsel, who was a Fort Worth Civic leader, opened the Paulsel Lumber Company in Fort Worth after moving from Memphis. A few years ago, Mr. Paulsel donated picnic tables for the Memphis park. The tables are still in use at the City Park.

He was a member of the Broadway Baptist Church in Fort Worth and was serving on the Board of Trustees at Baylor University, Waco.

He is survived by one son, Lee Allen Paulsel of Fort Worth; two grandchildren, 3 sisters and one brother and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Lee Thornton of Memphis.

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## EDITORIAL

### Wheatmen Are Finding Out Too!

The only thing wrong with high production costs of farming is low market prices for the product after it is produced. Farmers figure production costs closely, and cotton farmers last year saw a whole crop go on the market selling for less than they had in it.

Now, region wheat farmers are figuring they will have to have a yield of 30 bushels per acre and get above \$2.00 per bushel to realize any profit from this year's wheat crop. One farmer in the Wichita Falls region said, "We've got more than \$60 an acre invested in the crop. If the market falls to \$2 a bushel we'll have to have a 30-bushel per acre yield to just break even. I surely don't need the experience of farming for just the experience."

A test cutting on a portion of his field yielded 27 and 28 bushels per acre so he was understandably upset over the situation of declining markets on wheat, effected by the government control of foreign export and urging by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for wheat farmers to plant fence to fence.

Hall County has few wheat farmers, but the principle holds true for cotton just the same as for wheat and other grains. Area farmers are checking closely the cost of planting seed, weed control applications, costs of running their farm equipment, labor, and are discovering soaring figures on their operations.

The U. S. Government has been in the business of controlling agriculture in this country since the days of the great depression. Even during good times, agriculture was "subsidized" by the taxpayer who was, as a consumer, enjoying the lowest prices in food and fiber of any consumers in the world. Farmers were getting some of their money from agricultural markets and some from the federal government.

Today however, things have changed. Government subsidies to U. S. farmers have been cut off. No one is paying "parity" to farmers anymore, so farmers must derive all their income from the market place. However, Uncle Sam has stepped in to prohibit international trade in many markets, after urging farmers to plant fence to fence.

The big question is whether or not the Government can direct "national economic planning" without driving this nation's economy into the rocks. The American consumer has enjoyed several decades of "cheap" farm prices. It has become a major goal of big city congressmen to bargain with rural congressmen over any type of agricultural legislation.

But the situation has come to a head. Just as Detroit's assembly lines shut down because there was no demand for their cars, so will the plentiful supply of agricultural products be shut down when there are no buyers at a market place. Farmers, whether they be grain, cotton, or vegetable, can not stay in business long operating much below the break even mark.

How many wheat farmers can exist losing from \$2 to \$10 per acre. Cotton farmers saw good profits from the 1973 crop year disappear with increased operating expenses in 1974, plus declining per pound rate for fiber after the expensive crop was harvested. Estimates are the 1975 crop will be even more expensive to plant and harvest.

Detroit operates on the theory of no sales, no production. That's the way the U. S. economy has operated for the past 200 years. Will the same become true for agriculture?

#### DEMO CANDIDATES ARE NOT PYGMIES

Senate Republican leader Hugh Scott, who at times substitutes name calling for celebration, has described the Democratic presidential candidates as "a parade of pygmies."

It's easy to understand why Scott, a partisan to his fingertips, deprecates the other party's hopefuls. If the public buys his line that the Democrats are misfits, the electoral chances of his own Jerry Ford are much improved.

Without taking sides or choosing favorites this early in the game, it's worth seeing how Scott's targets fit his scornful appraisal.

Start, for example, with Washington state's Henry Jackson. After 35 years in Congress, he's probably the single most powerful senator. He can hijack the Senate on issues like energy, Russia and Israel and make the White House tremble with him like a foreign potentate. A pygmy? Hardly.

Don't count out that articulate Texan, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, who can speak authoritatively on most national issues. He hasn't the rank and file support, as yet, but many Democratic leaders concede he might easily be the compromise candidate if the convention is faced between a choice of an extreme liberal and a Democratic conservative.

Then take Teddy Kennedy, who attracts more adulation and violent dislike than anyone else in national politics. Any declared non-candidate who still is the heavy choice of his party's rank and file can't be put down as a small and insignificant man.

What about George Wallace, the most skilled demagogue to emerge in decades? He may be a threat to rational debate of the issues, but he's no political dwarf.

Hubert Humphrey and Edmund Muskie are men of compassion, experience and ability; though

Humphrey often disguises his attainments by his refusal to stop talking.

Morris Udall has been a useful and reformist member of the House for 14 years, and anyway who ever heard of a 6-foot-4 pygmy who used to play pro basketball?

All of which suggests that Scott is taking political cheap shots, and it recalls Scott's own greatest moment: When he was shown partial and doctored transcripts of White House tapes and then informed the world that John Dean was a liar and Richard Nixon would be cover-up. Now that was a real bit covered up in the Watergate of intellectual pygmyism.

#### WORK OPPORTUNITIES REMAIN

Are small businessmen bellwethers of the economy? If so, and many economists believe in their performance as precursors of general trends, our economy already is beginning to recover from the 1974-75 slowdown.

#### CHRYSANTHEMUMS FOR FALL COLOR

Chrysanthemums can provide fall color for the home landscape after other annual plants have died, notes a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Rooted cuttings planted in late May or early June will make smaller plants that need little staking if pinched back properly. The flower bed should be fertile and elevated for proper drainage. Fertilizer should be broadcast before planting, and a sidedressing should follow six weeks after planting. Mulching around the plants along with proper watering and pruning will produce beautiful blooms.

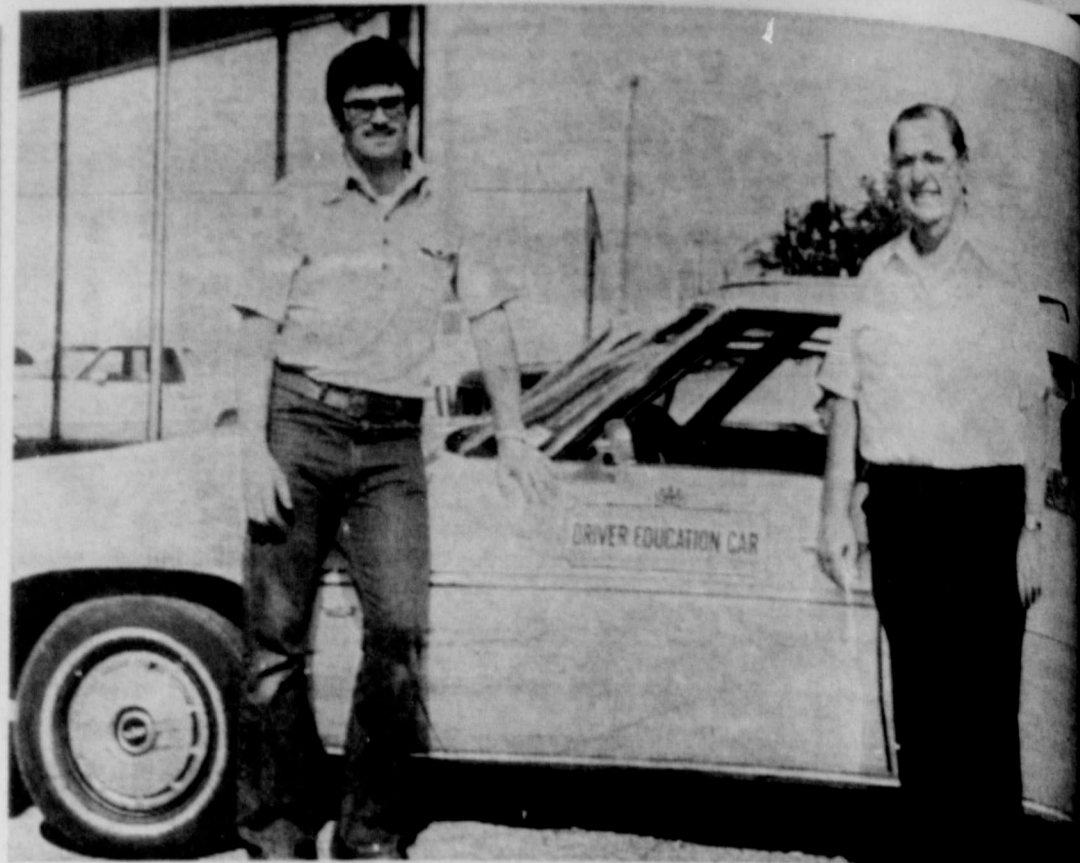

He left Memphis for Long Beach after graduating from High School. In his high school years here, he remembered the work he did was pulling bolls, worked for Abie Stanford, Wiley Orr and Perk's Cafe when hamburgers were selling for 5c each. He met Bonnie Miksch who was reared in the Iowa corn state. He met Miss Bonnie at the Community Hospital of Long Beach where she was working and she is a registered nurse. They have one son and one daughter, two grandsons and two granddaughters. Dub has been working the past 30 years with the Kobe Industries, who manufacture and sell oil well supplies. The only true constant is change. This universal cliché may take on some special economic meaning for the cattle industry. Some of the top ag-educators & officials of the beef business are now saying cattle feeding on a commercial scale may be permanently changed. Reason for the change is as simple as up and down. Rising input costs (especially grain) and lower market prices make it quite often an unacceptable business risk to feed cattle on grain rations for the conventional 120 to 180 days in a commercial feedlot. Advocates of a 60 or 90 day feeding program are becoming more popular. Some proponents of the change are backing a current study to revamp the quality grading systems now used for beef classification. In essence the proposed overhaul would reduce the relative standard of palatability (taste) in favor of an absolute test of tenderness.
