Memphis-Crowell Game To Be Played Here Friday

The Memphis Cyclone plays its first home game of the year at Cyclone Stadium at 8 p.m. Friday night by hosting the Crowell Wildcats. The game promises to be an exciting affair.

The Wildcats are a big, strong, powerful team this season, and have defeated Quannah 13 to 7 and Seymour 14-6 in two prior outings, and held their own in a scrimmage against Childress.

Memphis, on the other hand, is going into the game seeking its first victory of the season, after a victory was denied by Childress in the final minutes of play last Friday.

About the Childress game, Coach Clyde McMurray said, "It was a hard one for us to lose, but we lost it . . . We feel our defense played well enough to win the game. Offensively, we didn't execute well enough, and we had only 43 snaps to try and score."

"Dick Hutcherson did one of the best jobs at linebacker we have seen," Coach McMurray said, "he was in on 17 individual tackles and 11 assists."

The coach said that Kenneth Fields was in on 10 tackles and seven assists, Matt Monzingo on eight tackles and seven assists and Joe Reyes on six tackles and six assists.

Tommy Tamplen, 150, junior. Adding to the size and strength of the Wildcats are tackles Melvin Westover, 205 lbs., and William Backman, 180 lbs. Both these lads are fine linebackers on defense leading the Wildcats 5-2 defensive unit. David Bell has enough speed in the 200-lb. frame to play a deep safety position on defense.

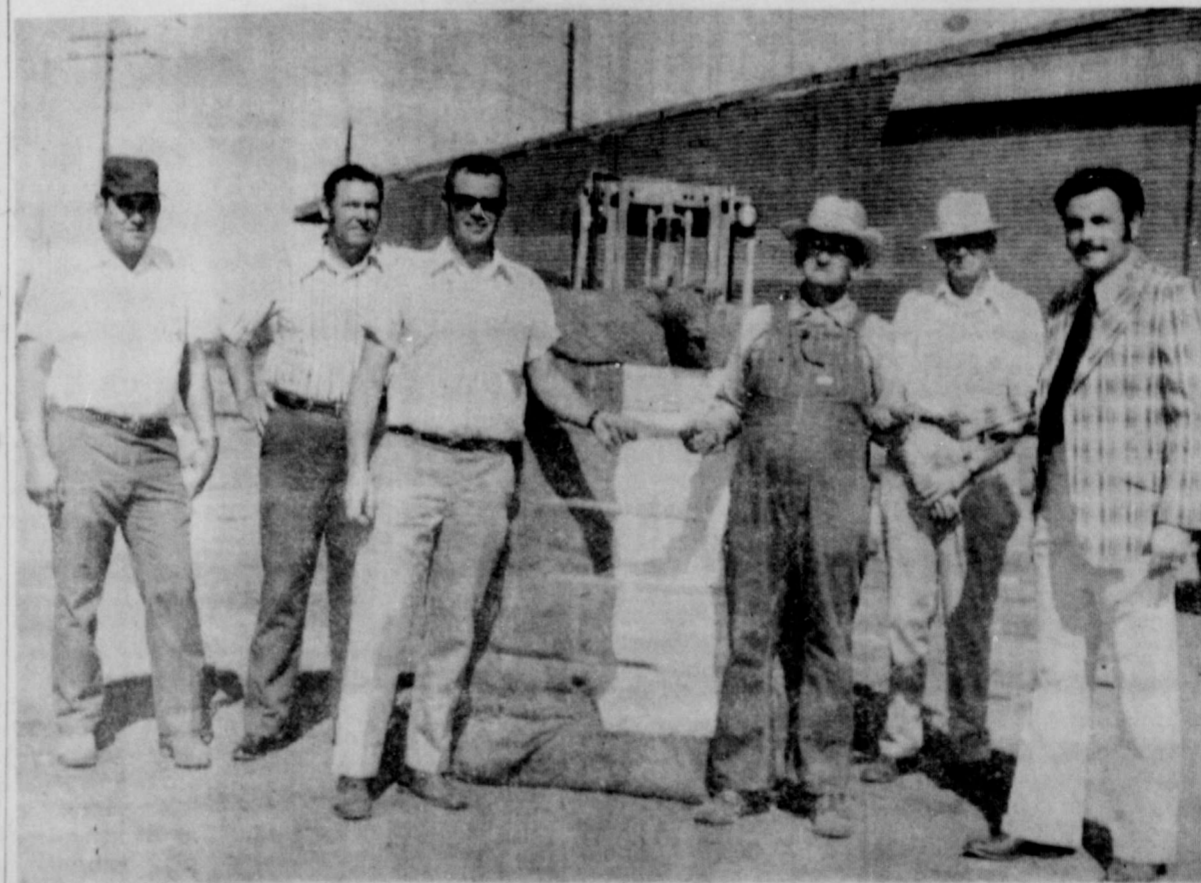

Persons are invited to attend local churches before going to the park Sunday at noon for the Barbecue dinner. The meal will be served at 12 noon under the direction of the Lions Club of Hall County and the Rotary Club will be in charge of the clean up task.

Mr. Messick said 2,400 lbs of beef has been processed to be cooked Saturday by Pete Land and Memphis Volunteer Firemen and all the food and supplies for the meal Sunday has been ordered.

Following the meal, a short business session will be held and visiting will continue throughout the afternoon.

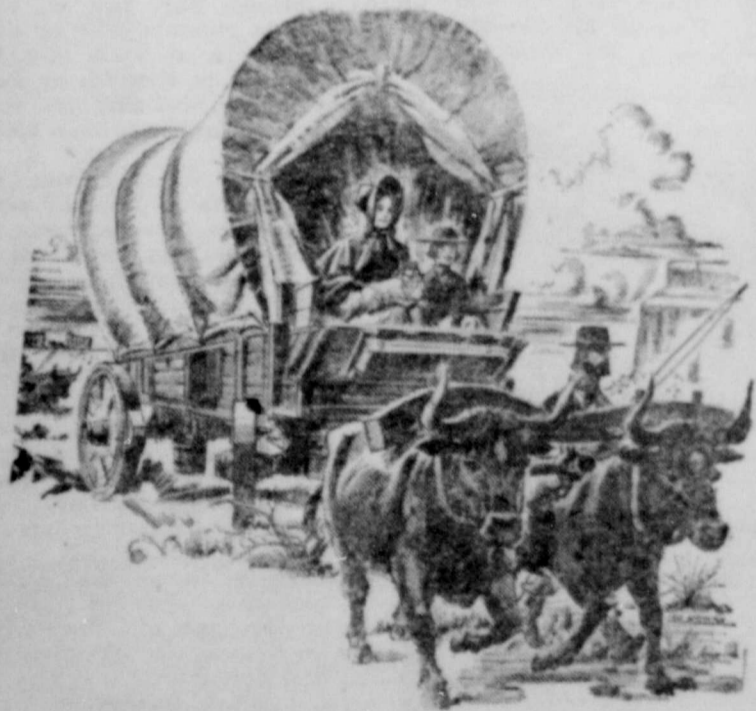
Little Mr. and Little Miss Hall County contest is set for Saturday night sponsored by the Memphis Business Women's Club.

SIPHONING OUR GAS

Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon said recently that it would be a "rape on Texans" if the federal government siphons off Texas natural gas reserves to make up for shortages in other states this winter.

Langdon says it has cost Texas \$1 billion to build its reserves. Indications are that there will be a 15 per cent shortfall in interstate gas pipelines this winter, with states such as Pennsylvania and Ohio experiencing shortages of two to three times the national

average.

When the cold weather hits, and the natural gas gets short, there will be cries of emergency and demands that gas from Texas and Oklahoma and Louisiana be diverted into interstate pipelines so it can be burned in the states experiencing the shortage.

This sounds like the humane thing to do, and after all, Texans and Oklahomans and Louisianans are not callous people who would let fellow Americans freeze to death.

Yet they can't help remember-

ing the political battle put up by the non-producing states to keep this sort of thing out of their environment.

The entire cluster of states along the Atlantic seacoast, which will do no doubt get cold this winter, have successfully fought off efforts to establish refining capacity in this area and have thus far kept any oil companies from developing the rich offshore area where huge deposits of natural gas and crude oil exist.

These eastern states, through their legislators, have been mighty blunt in telling representatives from the oil producing states that

lection of artifacts that we had on display. They were in Memphis to check up on Raymond who was injured in a car accident a few days ago. They reported he was coming out of this accident wearing a brace for a time.

From Oliver Wendell Holmes, "The Old Friend" — "There is no friend, like the old friend, who has shared our mourning days. No greeting like his welcome, no homage like his praise."

I had a short visit with Bob Seeds of Shamrock a few days ago. He has been called "Suitcase Simpson" Seeds. I did not understand the name until after I talked to him and found out his quarter of a century baseball program. He was born and reared in the Shamrock area, until he started his baseball playing in 1926 with the Oklahoma City Southsiders. He also played with the Amarillo club 'n 1927 and '28, with Kansas City, played in the World Series and went with the Cleveland, Ohio, team. He was traded to the Chicago White Sox in 1932, traded to the Boston Red Sox in 1933 and back to Cleveland in 1934. In 1935, he went with the Detroit Tigers and went to Montreal, Canada, and played in the International League. In 1935, he went with the New York Yankees for one year. Next he was back in the International League with the New York Giants, 1938-1941. He was manager of the Little Rock, Ark., team from 1942 until 1944 and went with the Amarillo Gold Sox in 1946. He owned and operated the Amarillo team in 1949 and 1950. I asked if he ever had time to slip up enough to find him a wife. They have two daughters and one son. He has put away his suitcase and retired from baseball after many years of activity in the outfield. He was in Memphis doing banking business with Ben Parks who was one of the school-day baseball players on their sandlot. Someone did give me the information that Bob always had good understanding as he wore a size 13 shoe. He and his family are now enjoying a great life on his farm a short distance from Shamrock. I forgot to ask Bob how many suitcases he wore out in that quarter century traveling with different ball clubs.

There is always a lot of happiness and love shown each year at the Hall County Picnic. There is a thought of sadness when you miss so many loved ones and friends as they dwindle away each year. That is part of life that our Maker intended. We are very grateful for having known these good people who have passed away.

I had a short visit with Blackburn Montgomery of Minneapolis, Minn. He will be remembered as the son of the late J. P. and Mrs. Montgomery of Memphis. Blackburn graduated from MHS. I received a letter this week from Roy Alvin Massey listing the things which would be on loan to us this weekend for the Hall County Reunion. He stated that

these items would be exhibited in other museums over the country, but Heritage Hall would be the first to display them. To be shown are: (1) A pair of black lacquered spoon-backed chairs which belonged to Napoleon. According to information in the British Museum, Napoleon got these chairs from Prince Borgia who married Napoleon's sister, Princess Pauline, and were used in his (Napoleon's) palace on the Isle of Elba; (2) An Egyptian tomb boat complete with rowers and model of the person buried in the tomb. This dates from the 12th dynasty, about 2,000 B. C. so it is about 4,000 years old; (3) A piece from an Egyptian mummy case of the 18th dynasty, about 1,500 B. C. The piece is painted with hieroglyphics; (4) An original copy of the "Columbian Centinel" newspaper, printed in Boston March 26, 1774. The front page features a bill passed by the first session of the Third Congress of the United States and signed by George Washington who was president at that time; (5) An original copy of the "Gazette of the United States" published in Philadelphia January 5, 1791; and (6) A collection of Precolumbian bowls, vases and tomb figures from South America, dating from 700 to 1200 A.D.

PUBLIC NOTICE

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (S.J.R. NO. 11)

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the judiciary provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article V, The Judiciary, is amended to:

Establish a unified judicial system consisting of the supreme court, court of appeals, district courts, and circuit courts. Existing county courts and county judges are continued until otherwise provided by law. All judges (except municipal judges), district attorneys and district clerks must be elected by the people. The supreme court and the court of criminal appeals are merged into a single court of last resort, and this supreme court is authorized to provide for efficient administration of the judicial system and to balance case loads. Individual rights for a trial by jury and appeal by the accused are continued. The state is granted the right to appeal in criminal cases in limited circumstances, and the legislature is permitted to establish methods of appeal to the courts from decisions of state agencies.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections, is amended to:

Provide for registration and qualifications for voting including voter residency requirements to be established by law. A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years of age and who meets the registration and residence requirements provided by law is a qualified voter unless the person has been convicted of a felony and for that felony is incarcerated, on parole, or on probation, or unless the person is mentally incompetent as determined by a court. Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting

requirements, for the administration of elections, and for the protection of the electoral process. The general election for state and county officers is to be held in even-numbered years on a date prescribed by law.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VII, Education, is amended to:

Provide that the Permanent and Available School Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax of ten cents on \$100 valuation is continued as the source of revenue for the Fund. The ten cent higher education tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Permanent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance, is amended to:

Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a

tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must be taxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present deduction of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The "pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt property owned by veterans' organizations, non-profit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery or parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds, prescription drugs or medicine, or food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption. An assessment voted by marine food or agricultural producers on their product sales is not a tax if provision is made for the individual producer to receive a refund of the assessment when the producer does not desire to be assessed.

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:

Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county offices are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create additional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the general provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article X, General Provisions, is amended to:

Provide the basic requirements relating to public officeholders such as the official oath and residency requirements. The provision defining the separate and community property of spouses is retained, and the protection of a homestead from forced sale is continued. The legislature is required to protect certain personal property from forced sale. Current wages for personal service are not subject to garnishment. A private corporation may not be chartered except under general law, and no bank may engage in business at more than one place in this state. The legislature must provide for the regulation of bank holding companies. The present system of local-option elections for the prohibition or sale of alcoholic beverages is continued. The legislature is required to prohibit lotteries and gift enterprises but may permit certain bingo games and raffles. The presently existing provisions for retirement benefits of teachers and other public employees are modified to allow the state to con

tribute more than 10%. A policy that the quality of the environment of the State of Texas is to be protected is established, and the legislature is required to implement and enforce this policy. No state funds may be used to remove surface water from the river basin of origin if the surface water is necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable water requirements of the basin for the ensuing 50 years, unless the removal of water is sufficiently replaced to the point of removal from outside the state or is on a temporary, interim basis. The seaward beaches of the Gulf of Mexico and coastal submerged lands belonging to the state are held by the state in perpetual trust for the people, and subject to reasonable limitations prescribed by law, the public has the free and unrestricted right of use and benefit of the beaches. The provision is continued that, except as otherwise provided by law, a rate of interest in excess of ten percent a year is usurious, and that if a contract does not specify a rate of interest, the rate under the contract may not exceed six percent a year. Discrimination against handicapped persons is prohibited, and a goal of the state is established to provide every resident access to adequate, comprehensive health care.

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Revising the mode of amending provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposed article will be the last article of the constitution. If only Proposition No. 8 is adopted, the article will replace Article XVII of the present constitution. If other propositions are adopted, the article will be appropriately renumbered to remain the last article of the constitution. If all propositions are adopted, the article will be Article XI. Article XVII, Mode of Amending the Constitution of the State, is amended to:

Establish a procedure for constitutional amendments requiring a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and majority approval by the voters. The question of whether to call a constitutional convention must be submitted to the people every 30 years.

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

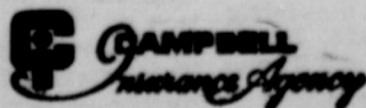

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — A big state land trade has been proposed to obtain a scenic new park on 30-mile-long Matagorda Island.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong suggested the swap of 18,000 acres of state-owned land near Fort Bliss in El Paso County for the federally-owned share of the island.

A joint House - Senate committee unanimously decided the state should own the island which lies south of Port Lavaca.

The U. S. Air Force has decided it will not continue use of Matagorda as a bombing range, but the U. S. Interior Department wants it as additional refuge for the whooping crane.

Armstrong said Matagorda offer among the best sports fishing and hunting in the country, and it is within easy auto range of Houston, San Antonio and Corpus Christi citizens.

Matagorda's beach is growing rather than expanding, the committee was told.

Federal holdings on the island total nearly 19,000 acres. The state owns 16,369 acres and private interests 15,570 acres.

Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Pearce Johnson questioned wisdom of the trade, however.

Rates Set

The State Insurance Board has set medical malpractice rates in the state's assigned risk pool 40 per cent lower than the industry asked for. Doctors insured through the risk-sharing pool will pay 18 to 20 per cent more than the highest rates charged by companies writing insurance voluntarily.

New rates for the Texas Medical Liability Insurance Underwriting Association (JUA) will cover physicians, surgeons, hospitals, podiatrists and nurse anesthetists who cannot obtain professional insurance on the open market.

The Board asked JUA to re-submit its rate filings, terming those first submitted excessive.

Base premiums for \$100,000-\$300,000 limits for non-surgical physicians in Harris County were set at \$1,800 and at \$1,200 for the same class of physicians in the rest of the state.

Rates were adopted for more than 30 classes of physicians and surgeons including doctors, normally classified as "high risks."

Neurosurgeons and orthopedic surgeons will pay highest premiums — \$14,000 in Harris County and \$9,600 in the rest of the state. Harris County plastic surgeons will pay \$10,800, those in other areas \$7,200.

Hospital rates are \$420 per bed plus \$42 for every 100 outpatient visits.

Constitution Aired

Secretary of State Mark White announced a program to encourage voter registration for the November 4 constitutional revision election.

White also said an all-out effort will be launched to encourage voters to study the proposed

document.

Proponents and opponents of revision will outline their views at a conference sponsored by Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association and Texas Association of Broadcasters here Sept. 19.

AG Opinions

Texas Department of Public Safety may provide criminal history information to the State Bar of Texas and Department of Public Welfare to assist in licensing responsibilities, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

Texas Student Publications at The University of Texas is no longer a legal entity and cannot hire an attorney without regents' approval.

Temporary and parttime state employees accrue sick leave, but leave for the part-timers in acquired on a proportionate basis.

The Employees Retirement System of Texas may grant credit for service as a county attorney to a qualified member of the System.

The Teacher Retirement System can purchase insurance for liability under the Texas Tort Claims Act. Insurance for the System's building, contents and papers may also be purchased, but workman's compensation coverage may not be.

Texas should not have a severe natural gas shortage this winter, Governor Briscoe said after an organizational meeting of his new energy council.

The Governor said he does not believe Congress will allocate Texas gas to other states.

Briscoe and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby urged more emphasis on developing new sources of energy — including solar, wind, geothermal and waste material burning.

Short Snorts

Texas officials filed suit in Washington in an effort to keep the state out of federal Voting Rights Act coverage.

An Austin district judge refused to grant a temporary restraining order sought by Texas Association of Proprietary Schools to prevent enforcement of New Board of Education rules.

Oscar Laurel of Laredo has resigned as Good Neighbor Commission director effective December 31.

Sept 21-27 has been designated Highway and Transportation Week.

Cigarette stamp taxes increased \$5.2 million in the last fiscal year — to a total of \$247.6 million.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said \$22.9 million in unemployment benefits were paid to jobless Texans last month.

Texas Animal Health Commission declined to change with new federal standards for control of brucellosis in cattle herds.
