Of major concern in Memphis has been the physical condition of several of the Cyclone's most experienced players. Coach Clyde McMurray announced Wednesday after workouts, "Our team is ready, everyone who will suit out will see action." The only player not expected to suit out is Fred Alexander who is recovering from a neck injury.

The Skyrockets and the Cyclones will be on equal footing, have depth in their backfield but could possibly be lacking depth of quality linemen should injuries ccur in the trenches. The Cyclone has improved its depth prospect with the return of several inured players who rested through the Lubbock Christian game last

week. The Rockets have an experienced squad in that many of their players were starters last year, and this experience, especially in engineering the wide-open running and passing offensive attack has led to the Rockets climb to the No. 7 position in Class A state-wide.

Wellington has two fine quarterbackers. No. 10 George Brewer, 160, and No. 11 Shane Tarver. HB Dan Ford, 170, FB Jessie Davis 170, and Wingback Edward Thomas 145, round out the Rockets backfield. Split end is Joe Baumgardner at 170 and tight end is Paul Hanna 145. The Rockets throw the football to all eligible receivers.

George Brewer was named Amarillo Daily News' Class A player of the week this past week for his contribution to Wellington's 13 to 13 tie of Childress.

Rocket linemen are Tackles Allen Sanders, 170, and Jackie Black, 200, Guards Don Allred 180, and Danny Morris, 180, and Center Randall Maxwell, 155.

On defense, Baumgardner, Sanders, Black and Allred make up the defensive line, with Randall Sims, Cliff Pennon, Davis and Thomas as linebackers and cornerbacks, and Ford, Brewer and Tarver as safeties.

The Cyclone will have a starting offensive lineup of Ends Joe Reyes and Steve Browning, Tackles Kenneth Fields and Mike Bloxom Guards Matt Monzingo and Randy Orcutt, and Center Mike Murphy.

The Backfield will be Don Cofer at quarterback, Charles Bryley and Kirk Fields at running backs, and Darryl Smith at wing-

Defensively, according to Coach McMurray, Reyes and Cofer will be at ends, Fields and Paul Ables at tackles, and Mike Bloxom at noseguard. Linebackers will be Monzingo and Orcutt, with Pedro Salinas as rover back, and safeties Rickie Spruill, Glenn Johnson and Charles Bryley.

Friday Is A Deadline

For any "unregistered" voters in Hall County, Friday, Oct., 3, is a deadline for these persons to go to the County Tax Assessor-Collector Office and register to be an eligible voter in November 4th Constitutional Amendment election.

Most citizens have now received from the Secretary of State a newspaper looking document about the Proposed Constitution of the State of Texas and in that document is a form whereby citizens can register to be eligible voters if they get their forms to the Tax Office in the County Courthouse in

Also included is a sample ballot for citizens to study and decide how they will mark their ballot come election time on the eight propositions. Also included are pages containing explanation of the eight propositions and a history of constitu tional revision in Texas.

There is plenty of reading matter for everyone to bone up on if they want to be intelligent voters in the election come November 4th. Otherwise, they can just go mark their ballots as they see fit.

It has taken several years to bring about this election on a new consitution for Texas. In 1971 the State legislature proposed a constitutional amendment, adopted by the voters on Nov. 7, 1972, calling for the Texas Legislature to sit as a constitutional convention in 1974. This amendment also required the legislature to establish and fund a constitutional study commission before convening as a convention. After nine months of study and public hearings held throughout the state by 37 citizen-members, the Texas Constitutional Revision Commission submitted its recommended new state consitution thing you read in the public opinto the legislature on Nov. 1, 1973.


Our society needs competition and goals. Our young people need the challenge of facing the adversary with determination, persistence, and patience which can often make a dream come
