

## EDITORIAL

#### **Tips For Saving Energy!**

Americans are entering into the Christmas Season, as well as beginning the winter season of the year, and because of cold weather, increased travel, and Christmas lighting, high energy useage will be the order of the day and night.

Utility rates have increased during the past year and citizens would be wise to study the increased costs in light of the family budget, and not be caught short come bill paying time.

This editor, however, is not one to encourage the shutting off of Christmas lights as a means of saving energy. Children in every family get a special thrill from seeing the beautifully decorated homes at Christmas, which makes the holiday season so special in their lives. We would encourage citizens to participate in Christmas decorating, because of the pleasure it gives.

Area citizens might, however, read the following condensed listing of thirty "Energy Saving Tips" and apply them if they desire to cut energy costs this winter.

1. Set thermostat at 68 degrees and remember to lower it to 60 degrees at night. Wear warmer clothing if cool.

2. If you can feel cold air blowing around window frames, the cracks should be caulked, or weatherstripped.

3. When putting antifreeze in your car, get a tuneup also, it'll save about 10 percent in gasoline costs.

4. Two light-weight sweaters are warmer than one heavy one.

5. Check your radiators or hot air registers to make sure they're not blocked so warm air can flow freely around the room.

6. Remind your children to turn off the lights in rooms not occupied by family members.

7. Use cold water to run food through your sink disposer.

8. A well-maintained furnance, with a clean filter, uses less fuel and saves you money.

9. In cool weather, open drapes, shades and shutters to let the sun shine in. Close them at night to minimize heat loss.

10. Save small light-weight stems until last, when drying clothes in a dryer, you may be able to get them dry after you turn off the dryer with heat retained by the machine.

CATTLE OUTLOOK AND **GRAIN PRICES** 

Whether grain prices go up or down will affect both fed and feeder cattle prices, points out a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Service. High grain prices will mean fewer cattle placed in feedlots this fall and thus higher fed cattle prices next year. On the other hand, a drop in grain prices could boost placements in feedlots, and fed cattle marketing by next spring and summer could be burdensome. In the short run, this would, however, provide more strength for feeder cattle prices than if grain

**Plan For Next Year's** Sunflower Crop COLLEGE STATION - Sun-

flowers literally "blossomed" up throughout Texas in 1975 and chances are good that the crop will continue to become more important to the state's agricultural industry in the years ahead.

Good prices caused the sunflower crop to mushroom to more than 375,000 acres in 1975 compared to only 5,000 acres a year ago. However, yields ranged widely over the state due to adverse weather conditions and a lack of knowledge about the crop.

So, an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service they took in cutting away trees advises producers who intend to plant sunflowers next year to plan ahead carefully.

"Producers planning to grow sunflowers in 1976 need to take a close look at their farming operation in preparation for next season's crop, points out Dr. John Bremer.

He lists a number of items for farmers to consider.

"First of all, choose your planting area carefully. Stay away from home sites and cotton fields since problems arise when attempting to desiccate the crop. "Do not plant the crop on the

same land year after year as this leads to increased disease problems.


"Plant only high quality seed. "Inexperienced growers should plant only small acreages of the crop. There are a lot of questions still unanswered about proper management practices for sunflowers.

"Look closely at the market situation before planting sunflowers. Due to the expected increase in production, the market may be less attractive than this past season. It's important to get a price

commitment from a buyer. "Control volunteer sunflowers in next year's crops where sunflowers were planted in 1975. Volunteer plants can cause moisture and harvesting problems in other crops if they are not controlled.

#### Insulation Cuts Heating Costs

COLLEGE STATION - Don't let the high cost of heating a home put you out in the cold this winter, Those high heating bills can be cut way down with a little insulation in the right places, says Dr. Bill Stewart, an agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A" home that is completely insulated can cost 20 to 50 per cent less to heat than an uninsulated one," Stewart points out. "And with a little time, work and initiative, you can do the insulat-ing yourself."

Insulating all ceilings, walls and floors in the home provides the best, most complete protection from cold, says the agricultural engineer with the Texas A&M University System, However, if

funds are limited or temperatures don't get extremely cold, the most important thing to insulate is the attic floor of your home. "This is because warm air rises and the greatest heat loss usually

If you plan to do the insulating Stewart recommends yourself. using batt type insulation for ease tion such as mineral wool is difficult to apply uniformly by hand; it should be blown in by machine. Ceilings of homes in Texas should receive at least six inches of insulation or the equivalent to an "R" value of 22. Walls should be insulated to an "R" value of

13. Additional insulation above these amounts will not be justified unless the home is tightly weatherstripped and storm windows are installed. "Insulating an existing home

should start with the attic," points out the engineer. "Purchase batt type insulation of the proper width. Most ceiling joists are speced 16 inches apart so you will patient. A special thanks to my need wide batts. Check your attic first because some homes are built with a 24-inch ceiling joist spacing, in which case the batts need to be 23 inches wide."

siderable time and skill. The most economical method is to have insulation poured or blown into the stud spaces by a skilled insulator. An insulating panel may also be applied over the wall surface,' notes the engineer.

Homes with crawl spaces can benefit from insulation between the floor joists. Use a batt type insulation which can be stapled to the floor joists. Then use wire mesh or similar support to prevent the insulation from falling in the event the staples come loose or the covering gives way. Because of mild Texas winters, only four inches of insulation can be justified for beam and prior floors.

In a home with well insulated ceilings and walls, the major source of heat loss will be due cold air infiltration through to cracks. Therefore, Stewart recommends applying weatherstripping around all windows and

doors. Also, keep the fireplace damper closed tightly when not in use. For centrally heated homes, try to provide combustion air for the fireplace through a window as near the fireplace as possible to keep heated room air from escaping through the fireplace.

"Covering screens with plastic can provide a temporary means of reducing heat loss through windows. When constructing a new home, consider using insulating or double glazed windows," advises the engineer.

"Remember, things you do to save on heating this winter will also aid in reducing summer cooling costs and will make home more comfortable," says Stewart.



The interior decor of the gal lery has a taste of the "Old West". Old wood from various farms and ranches has been contributed for use as paneling on the walls.







This is the time of year many families make plans to fix up various parts of the house. Because of the amount of time many homemakers spend in the kitchen, it often tops the list of fix-up projects.

Whether you hire a professional or do-it-yourself, there are some basic approaches to kitchen remodeling that you should consider before you start.



First, make a list of things you don't like about your present kitchen, such as cabinets, colors, traffic patterns, counter placement, etc. Then decide what you would like to change and how you would like to do it. You may want to consider such custom features as a counter bar, a completely lighted ceiling, coordinated cabinet doors and wallcoverings or additional storage space.

If you seek outside help, be sure to check out the remodeling firm carefully before it starts any work. A call to your local Better Business Bureau should be a must. You also should talk

with several of the firm's recen customers.


Once you've satisfied yourself as to the firm's integrity, then plan everything that is to be done before the job starts. Projects added after the start of a job generally cost more than if they were included at the beginning. Be sure to have a written contract listing specifically what the remodeler is to do, what grade of materials will be used and when the job is to be completed. Ask the remodeler for his thoughts on how you should remodel your kitchen. He may suggest coordinating the doors of your refrigerator with the front panels of your kitchen cabinets or your wallcovering. Highly styled decorator refrigerators, such as those recently introduced by the Admiral Group of Rockwell International, are designed to accept such materials of X6- or X4-inch thickness, so that the refrigerator door matches the other colors and patterns in the room.

Pay particular attention to his proposed layout of your new kitchen. Basically, there are three main work areas: storage (refrigerator and pantry), preparation (sink and countertop space) and cooking (range and oven). These should be arranged so that there is a logical work flow.

Accept the remodeler's suggestions for what they are-suggestions. You probably are the best judge of your needs. You, not he, will be the one who has to live and work in your kitchen for years to come.
