Deskins Wells . . . A Newspaperman!

When life draws to a close for someone who has had a great deal of influence on your life, especially in a professional way. it is difficult for an editor to pass up an opportunity to give credit and write from deep felt convictions. Such is the case of Deskins Wells, long-time publisher of The Wellington Leader, who died recently.

Mr. Wells is more responsible for the Combs family running a newspaper in Memphis than any other individual, save for respective parents in the family. He was the man who gave Herschel A. Combs his first job.

Mr. Wells was a journalist, school trained, dedicated to his profession whole-heartedly, and believed strongly in the high ideas of journalistic ethics. Deck and Herschel were close friends, both sharing and believing in their chosen profession and the good that could be accomplished in their respective communities.

Both newspapers won numerous awards for excellency in the profession, and both men served as officers in Press Associations in this state. Probably, the greatest legacy both have left, are communities active in civic affairs and united behind Bass last weekend during a banstrong citizen leadership.



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



Information Given On Using CB In **Emergency Cases**

Citizen band radio fans can ave lives using their radios. Yet many operators do not know about code 10-33 and channel 9, two valuable aids for getting help in emergencies, the Texas Medical Association says.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) says channel 9 is to be used exclusively for obtaining aid. This channel, which usually is not very busy, is intended mainly for use during serious emergencies. However, the FCC says it does not have to be life-or-death situation. One veteran operator says car trouble on the freeway would be a legitimate reason to use channel 9. Many law enforcement agencies and some CB clubs monitor this channel continuously.

Announcing a code 10-33 should doctors also have CB sets. get attention on any of the 23 CB channels, including channel 19, the most commonly used channel. A 10-33 notifies listeners there is serious trouble, usually a medical emergency.

An emergency call might go like this:

"Break 19 for a 10-33." (The caller is asking to interrupt a conversation to tell about an emergency). "Go ahead, break." (Phrases

are limited only by operators' imaginations but most will acknowledge a break some way after the first or second request.) "There's a bad wreck two miles north."

Law enforcement officials of-

most officers currently only receive and cannot transmit on their CBs. So a caller does not know if a "smokey" has heard the message. To make sure the call reaches the proper people, a caller can ask a listener to "10-5" it. This is a request to relay a message, usually until it reaches a town where a listener can telephone authorities. Often a message will be relayed through several operators before it reaches its destination. A caller also can ask for a base station (stronger and more powerful than a vehicle unit) to relay a message.

One problem transmitting emergencies on channel 19 is the large number of inexperienced operators who do not know codes like 10-33. Someone needing help should feel free to say whatever is necessary to be understood Rudeness or profanity usually creates an uproar of answers from listeners. Profanity on the air also is illegal. But simple, straightforward communication will get the job done. Codes like 10-33 and 10-5 just help speed communication in critical situa-





Driver Licenses Contain Blank For Holder to Make Anatomical Gift

All drivers licenses issued af- sence. ter January 1, 1976, will contain a statement whereby the holder of the license may designate any part of his body as an anatomical gift at the time of his death.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety which issues the drivers licenses, said the 64th Legislature enacted the measure that became effective the first of

Accordingly, all drivers licenses issued after Jan. 1, will contain the statement which specifies any or all of the donor's body that may be used as an anatomical

If a person does not desire to participate in the anatomical gift program, Bell said, he need not do anything regarding completion of the statement. Drivers license will continue to be laminated on of the licenses may sign the state-

The anatomical gift statement of the donor's operator's, commercial operator's or chauffeur's license. The gift is invited on expiration, cancellation, revocation or suspension of the license or by lining out that portion of the state-

Bell added that another method of voiding or canceling the statement would be to secure a duplicate drivers license in which case the reverse side of the permit would be left blank.

For the gift provision of the license to be valid, the statement must be executed each time the license is replaced, reinstated or renewed. The document must be signed by the donor in the presence of witnesses who must sign



Cattle Numbers Moving Down

COLLEGE STATION - The passing of 1975 marked the passing of the peak year of the current cattle cycle, says Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This year and the next will be years of cutting down cattle numbers.

placement heifers reported last year, only 81 per cent were added to the breeding herd, points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

There was also a much lower calf crop in 1975 than in previous years because of a low calving rate, explains Uvacek. The final calf crop figure for 1975 was 50.4

About 11.5 million cows were slaughtered in 1975, reducing the cow herd by about 1.8 million head, Uvacek says. "If cow slaughter keeps up at that rate, the breeding herd size should be down to a favorable level by 1977. However, a sudden buildup in herd size this year could lengthen the recovery time.

must have a custom rod, the next step is finding a builder. Ideally, he will be someone in your area, or even better, from the area where you fish, so that he will best understand your specific fishing needs. Check with fishing resorts and tackle shops nearby for the names of local builders.

Go around and talk with the builders who have the best reputations. Tell them what kind of fishing you want your rod for. Find a builder who understands and empathizes with the kind of

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

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
