Murder Charges Filed Today On Antonio Garza

Antonio (Tony) Garza, Jr., was formally charged with murder this morning following the shooting death of Mrs. Arora Garza, his separated wife, at 11:15 p.m. Wednesday on the parking lot of Hall County Hospital.

Mrs. Garza punched out of the Hospital at 11:11 p.m., road with a friend from one parking lot to where she had parked her car, and was shot several times in the body, before she could get into her car.

The lady who let her out heard the shots and fled the scene. Mrs. Garza fell and died several yards away from her car following efforts to get back inside the Hospital.

Shortly after the shooting, Garza called the home of Sheriff Elmer Neel and told the Sheriff's wife he wanted to give himself today in golf, and scheduled to up. He later did so at the Memphis Police Station.

Garza was taken before Justice of Peace Ruby Roden this morning where bond was denied.



Two Million Pike Flown To Texas

AUSTIN - Texas received two million northern pike fry in early April as part of a trade for channel catfish with South Dakota and Nebraska.

The two northern states received some 40,000 surplus four - to five - inch channel cats last fall, full time job taking the place fry were flow to Texas from the and recently the two million pike Gavins Point Federal Hatchery in Yankton, S. D., and Nebraska's North Platte Hatchery. Each hatchery provided one million fry.

One million of the fish were stocked at Amistad Reservoir. Additionally, three ponds in Del Rio leased by the P&WD received some 200,000 fry. They will be reared to fingerling size and then

released in Amistad. P&WD's recently acquired fed-eral hatchery at Fort Worth received some 250,000 fry; the San Angelo and Dundee Fish Hatcheries each received 200,000 fry.

Also, the Jasper Fish Hatchery in Jasper County received 120,-000 fry, while Pinkson Reservoir in Shelby County was stocked with 30,000 pike fry.

Inland fisheries personnel plan additional northern pike stockings for this spring. Eight Texas lakes,

including Amistad, tentatively are scheduled to receive pike fry. In some waters, like Lake

Greenbelt in the Panhandle, pike have proved useful in controlling rough fish populations and providing trophy - sized catches for anglers. Greenbelt currently holds the Texas State Fish Record for nortern pike, an 18-pound, twoounce fish.

The Del Rio hatchery ponds are to be drained in late April and results of fish growth recorded prior to stocking fingerlings at Amistad.
