Memphis High School trackmen and golfers are now in Austin to compete in the Class A State Track and Field and in Class A State Golf Meet.

MHS golfers, in order to win state, will have to shoot better golf than defending champions Rankin, the team that defeated them in region two week ends ago. Rankin is favored to repeat as champion.

The MHS trackmen, in order to win a State Championship as a team, need to win or place second in both relay events, and Rickie Spruill will have to capture big points in the long jump and 100 yard dash.

"We have a shot at a state crown," Coach George Berry commented. There is only one other school which has both relays at the meet.

The sprint relay team last weekend in a State qualifiers meet ran its fastest time of the year, breaking old school records, so Coach Berry has reason for being optimistic. A lot, however, depends on the MHS mile relay, a team which came into its own at region, and presents a concern to the coach, Eddie Williams, the anchor man on this team, stepped on a sharp object and cut his foot and the cut required stitches to close.

"Eddie should be ready by this week," Coach Berry said.

The MHS golfers, at region, shot a 630, seven strokes behind Rankin. Don Cofer had a 77-74, 151; Matt Monzingo a 81-76, 157. Steve Browning a 82-79, 161, Rodney Hall an 82-79, 161, and Ricky Guy an 85-78, 163.

Last week's write-up of the Region track meet, some copy was left out of one paragraph. Rickie Spruill placed third in the 220 with a 22.2 and Charles Bryley was fourth in the 220 with a 22.3. Eddie Williams was third in the 440 with a 50.4 time.

Memphis has Rickie Spruill in the 100 and long jump.

The sprint relay is composed of Pedro Salinas, Fred Alexander, Charles Bryley and Rickie Spruill.

The mile relay will be Darryl Smith, Pedro Salinas, Kirk Fields, Eddie Williams.

Tina Foxhall Wins Class A Medalist

MHS Freshman Tina Foxhall, overcoming a wet golf course and humid conditions, won the Class A State Individual Girls Golf Crown by being medalist on the Morris Williams Golf Course in Austin.

She shot an 85-87, for a total 172 to win by two strokes over Farwell's Penny Hughes who carded an 85-89 174 for runner-up. The two girls were tied at the end of the first day's play, Thursday, with 85s.

"Competition at the state meet was pretty tough," Tina said this week after she returned home. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Foxhall, and Coach Bill Montgomery accompanied her to Austin.

The weather the first day was humid, she reported, and her round went pretty well as she carded an 85. "I had only two three putts on the first round and no penalty strokes," Tina said.

The second day saw the tournament postponed three hours due to rain, and when the first groups went off after lunch it was still drizzling. "I played the first holes in a light rain, but then it cleared off," Tina said. Her tee off time in the last group was 1 p.m.

When asked about her competition Tina said, "I was playing in the same group with Penny so I knew how I stood all the way." Tina said Penny missed some shots early in the match, and at the end of the first nine holes, she had a three stroke edge. This increased to four strokes on the back nine. "I got in water on one hole and had to take a penalty stroke, and I didn't putt as well."

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EDITORIAL

Graduation, 1976!

Congratulations are in order to the graduates of area schools, for they have reached the cross-roads of their lives, the point when they have completed their required schooling and a point where society and the state determine individuals become adults.

Soon, each graduate will be taking his or her place in the adult world, either by going to college, serving in a military position, entering the labor force, or just drifting around seeking a place to begin.

Unfortunately, there is no "big, wide, wonderful world" awaiting for you out there; rather, there is the same old world there has always been, full of the same old troubles and injustices. However, many before you have made for themselves a place in this world whereby they can live a happy and useful life, and chances are that you can also if you but try.

You are graduating during a period of time when your country is not at war, but during a year when peaceful warfare is "hot" internationally, as well as in this country with the National Elections.

You are completing the "slow" years of your life . . . when time seems to drag by, and just beginning to enter the "middle" years, when time seems to go by at a faster, and faster clip.

Whatever thoughts for the future are buzzing around in the heads of our graduates this month will shape, for the most part, the future course of their lives. ABOUT THOSE "CROSS-OVERS"

President Gerald Ford, on a nationwide news broadcast Sunday, blamed his defeat in the Texas Presidential primary on the allegation that "there were many cross-overs from people who ordinarily vote in the Democratic primary."

The President obviously believes that Democrats crossed-over to vote for Ronald Reagan in the Republican primary. We've heard this story before. But he is wrong about that.

Democrats don't "cross-over" to vote in Republican primaries in Texas. They never have . . . and if they did, it certainly wouldn't be to vote for Ronald Reagan. No one who believes in principles of the Democratic Party could logically support Reagan, whose political views are about as far from Democratic as it is possible to get.

Democrats in Texas never have "crossed-over" to vote in Republican primaries, because that's never been where the action is. On the rare occasions when Republicans hold a primary in Texas, there's precious little to vote for.

What happened Saturday, perhaps, is that quite a few Republicans who normally vote in Democratic primaries did "cross over" to vote in their own, in order to support arch-conservative Reagan. Even then they didn't do it in overwhelming numbers . . . the size of the Republican primary vote proves that.

In Hemphill county, for example, the Republican primary attracted a near-record 129 votes . . . enough that party officials has to rustle extra paper ballots in order to accommodate them, since only 100 ballots had been ordered. But in normal times, there will be four or five times that

number of Republican ballots cast in the November general election, by Republicans who had "crossed-over" to vote in the Democratic Party primary, where local races are always decided.

It wasn't Democrats "cross-over" who beat President Ford in Texas Saturday. He'll have to lay his troubles to his own party members. Maybe if enough of them had stayed out of the Democratic primary and voted in their own, the story might have been different . . . but we doubt it. Among Republicans, Texas is Reagan country.

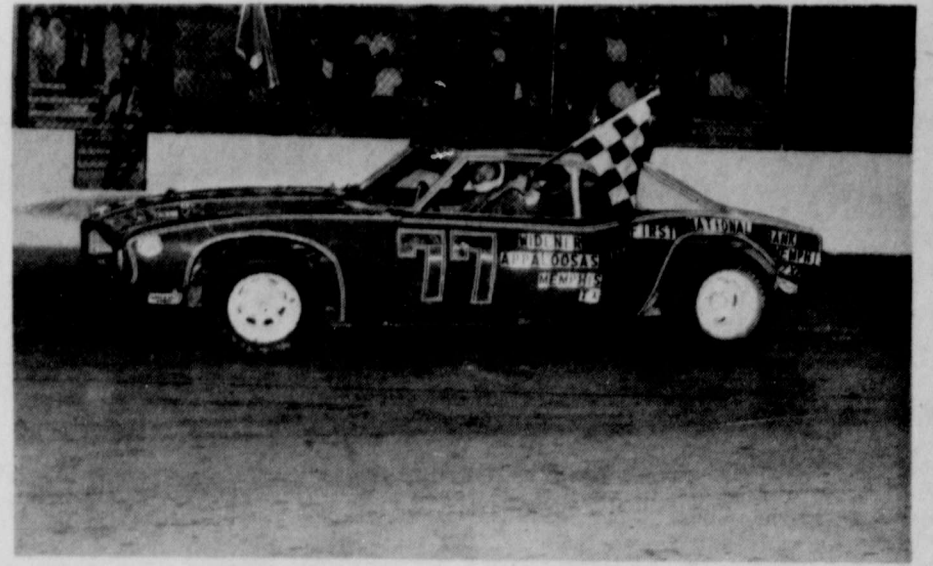

AUSTIN—A hot Railroad Commission runoff campaign between Jerry Sadler, 68, and State Rep. Jon Newton, 34, is under way.

Sadler, a pre-World War II Railroad Commissioner and former Land Commissioner, led the big May 1 Democratic primary field of candidates for the oil and gas regulatory agency.

Newton, a state lawmaker from Beeville, came in second and is rounding up endorsements from most of the other Democratic candidates.

Sadler, of Grapeland in East Texas, is zeroing in on Newton's campaign financing from oilmen. He says he will accept no oil money above the filling station level.

Newton, who barely mentioned Sadler in the first primary campaign, is citing the former commissioner's record which includes a reprimand by the House of Representatives in 1969 and refusal to open some of his land office records to the press.

Another statewide runoff on the June ballot is for the Court of Criminal Appeals. Carl Dally of Houston and W.T. Phillips of Waco are the candidates for the judicial place.

Don Yarbrough of Houston was a surprise winner of the May 1 State Supreme Court race over veteran Court of Civil Appeals Judge Charles Barrow of San Antonio. Some lawyers talked about chances of an independent candidate or write-in candidate against Yarbrough, but it's too late for an independent to get on the ballot.

Recession Ending

Texas worst recession since the 1930's seems to be coming to an end, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

The rate of inflation has been reduced substantially, and business activity for the first quarter of 1976 was 14 per cent above the first quarter of the previous year and seven per cent above February level, the bureau reported.

About the same time, Secretary of State Mark White reported Texas led the Central U.S. in new businesses formed in January — with 1,709 new business corporations formed.

Liquor Sales O.K.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission offered guidelines as to how out-of-state-owned firms can continue to sell alcoholic beverages and stay within the law specifying ownership by Texans.

ABC set off a flurry of

concern with an announcement it would enforce the in-state ownership law.

New guidelines tell how such chain operations as grocery stores and hotels can sell beer, wine or liquor at their premises by setting up a separate Texas firm to obtain the required state permit. The Texas entity would then lease space from the parent corporation. Joint cash registers could be used, with separate coding for the alcoholic beverage sales.

Reversing earlier rulings, the State Supreme Court held Farmers Branch can collect property taxes on Panasonic television sets and Honda motorcycle parts warehoused within the city.

The Court of Criminal Appeals turned down a request for a new trial by a Nueces County man sentenced to from two to 10 years imprisonment for letting a baby starve.

A burglary case was remanded by the Court of Criminal Appeals to the trial court for a hearing to determine if an appeal waiver was made knowingly.

The Court of Criminal Appeals, in a rape case from Coryell County, directed a further hearing on competency to stand trial.

Travis D. Shelton of Lubbock will be the new president-elect of the State Bar of Texas. John Mark McLaughlin of San Angelo is vice president. Fred Micks of Galveston won the junior bar presidency.

Gov. and Mrs. Dolph Briscoe will vacation in England May 25-June 5. They will fly to London on the supersonic jet Concorde.

May 9-15 has been proclaimed small business week honoring firms which account for 55 per cent of total Texas sales and 44 per cent of manufacturing.

Gross sales taxes increased 20 per cent during the last quarter of 1975.

Gov. Briscoe told the Texas Criminal Justice Conference reducing crime is the biggest challenge of the generation.

Texas' public school breakfast program in 1,044 schools is the second largest in the nation. It has grown 59 per cent annually and will provide 28 million meals to pupils during 1976-77.

Cigarette tax revenue increased \$563,256 — to \$21.5 million — last month over April 1975.

Texas Taxes

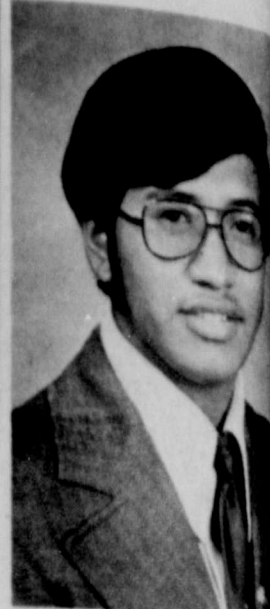
Since I became Comptroller of Public Accounts in January, 1975, the productivity of the Comptroller's Office in identifying unpaid taxes owed the state and collecting those delinquent taxes has, in many cases, been doubled or tripled.
As a result of steps taken by this administration—including changes in personnel and improvements in audit and collection techniques, the Comptroller's Office has saved the honest, taxpaying citizens of Texas literally tens of millions of dollars.
In the past eight months alone, field audits have revealed almost \$41 million in unpaid taxes—more taxes owed than were discovered in the previous two years combined. This record reflects an increase in productivity of more than 300 percent.

Expenditures of this administration have been greater than those in the past. But the return on every tax dollar invested has been significantly greater, just as we assured the Legislature last year.
Enforcement audits identified an additional \$10,280,466 in delinquent taxes owed in 1975 and \$6,500,329 during the first four months of this year. No comparable figures exist for previous years.
Tax liabilities identified by field audits in the first quarter increased by more than \$1 million—seven percent more than the previous quarter—and delinquent taxes revealed by enforcement audits to date this year are up \$2.83 million, 77 percent better than the last four months of 1975.
Collections of back taxes in the field have increased by almost 200 percent. Collections for fiscal year 1974 were only \$33,700,000, while they totaled \$66,555,000 in fiscal year 1975 and \$38,583,000 in the first six months of the current fiscal year.
Virtually all of the Comptroller's 46 local Field Offices have experienced significant increases in productivity—up to almost 1000 percent. Only a handful of the Field Managers held comparable posts in the previous administration.
If the Comptroller's Office does its job better, as it has during this administration, the taxpayers of Texas are better off. We know that and we want you to know it, too. There will be a surplus of about \$800 million in the State Treasury at the end of this year to prove it.
We will continue working to insure that every penny of taxes owed the state is collected, but that no taxpayer pays more than the law requires.

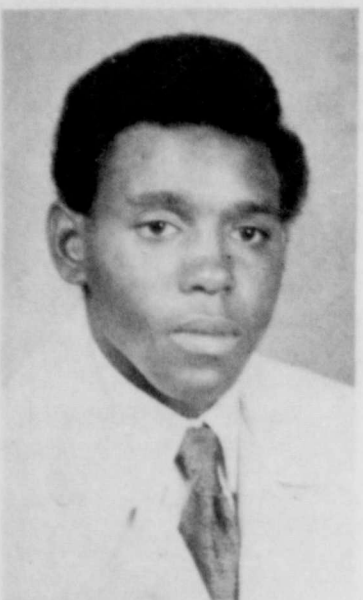
MRS. DEIDRA LYNN BRUMBALOW
