

Graduation, 1976!

Congratulations are in order to the graduates of area schools, for they have reached the cross-roads of their lives, the point when they have completed their required schooling and a point where society and the state determine individuals become adults.

Soon, each graduate will be taking his or her place in the adult world, either by going to college, serving in a military position, entering the labor force, or just drifting around seeking a place to begin.

Unfortunately, there is no "big, wide, wonderful world" awaiting for you out there; rather, there is the same old world there has always been, full of the same old troubles and injustices. However, many before you have made for themselves a place in this world whereby they can live a happy and useful life, and chances are that you can also if you but try.

You are graduating during a period of time when your country is not at war, but during a year when peaceful warfare is "hot" internationally, as well as in this country with the National Elections.

You are completing the "slow" years of your life . . . when time seems to drag by, and just beginning to enter the "middle" years, when time seems to go by at a faster, and faster clip.

Whatever thoughts for the future are buzzing around in the heads of our graduates this month will shape, for the most part, the future course of their lives. Many of the older generation can still remember the days of their own graduating, and the many decisions they made at that time. ABOUT THOSE "CROSS-OVERS'

President Gerald Ford, on a nationwide news broadcast Sunday, blamed his defeat in the Texas Presidential primary on the allegation that "there were many cross-overs from people who ordinary vote in the Democratic primary.

The President obviously believes that Democrats crossed-over to vote for Ronald Reagan in the Republican primary. We've heard this story before. But he is wrong about that.

Democrats don't "crossover" to vote in Republican primaries in Texas. They never have . . . and if they did, it certainly wouldn't be to vote for Ronald Reagan. No one who believes in prin ciples of the Democratic Party could logically support Reagan, whose political views are about as far from Democratic as it is possible to get. Democrats in Texas never have "crossed-over" to vote in Republican primaries, because that's never been where the action is. On the rare occasions when Republicans hold a primary in Texas, there's precious little to vote

SPRING IS HAY-PRODUCING TIME

It takes moisture and fertilizer to produce high quality hay. With good moisture over many sections of Texas at present, farmers and ranchers are urged to fertilize properly to produce an abundance of quality hay. Applying 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre can triple hay yields and al-most double the percentage of crude protein in the hay, points out a soil chemist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Increasing the amount of nitrogen increases hay tonnage as well as the per cent and amount of crude protein. High protein hay requires harvesting at about 30-day intervals and then refertilizing to produce new growth.
