Four polling places will be open for the Second Democratic Party Primary Election to be held Saturday, June 5, and one local race is the center of interest in Precinct No. 1 in Hall County.

The County Commissioner, Precinct No. 1 race is between Glenn Bruce, co-owner of Bruce Bros. Mobil and Floy E. (Chuck) Anthony, an employee of County Precinct No. 1. Both men are long-time citizens of the precinct.

In talking with the two candidates, both seeking their first elective office, they expressed interest in seeking a good voter turnout from the precinct. Both have been actively campaigning since the first of the year, and continued their efforts during the weeks following the first primary when the run-off race developed.

Also on the ballot, will be two state-wide races.

The race for Railroad Commissioner is between Jerry Sadler and Jon Newton. This race has had high public interest due primarily to the fact that the Railroad Commission controls companies which sell natural gas to consumers over the state, and natural gas prices have been soaring.

The race for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals—Unexpired term, has Carl Dally and W. T. Phillips in the run-off. The Amarillo Daily - News endorse Mr. Dally editorially Wednesday. He has served as a law professor and is highly respected. W. T. Phillips, highly respected in the Waco area, graduate of Baylor University and has strong support in that portion of the state.

The Railroad Commissioner race is between Jerry Sadler, who was defeated in his last bid for Land Commissioner and who has been in political life in Texas since the 1930s. Jon Newton is about half Mr. Sadler's age and a relative new - comer to the political scene.

Absentee voting at the County Clerk's office has seen 102 voters participate, unusually high for a run-off election. A large percentage of those voting absentee are from Boxes Nos. 1 and 13, the Memphis commissioners precinct.

This indicates the high interest voters are showing in the Precinct Commissioner's run-off race.

Voting boxes No. 1 and 13 will be combined and held in Memphis Community Center, Saturday. Estelline voters will be casting ballots in the Estelline City Hall, Turkey voters in the City Hall at Turkey, and Lakeview voters in the Lakeview Grade School Auditorium. Polls close at 7 p.m.

**THE ROLE OF ISSUES**  
Jimmy Carter's rise to prominence has made an issue out of the role issues themselves should play in a presidential campaign, and forced many Democrats to question their assumption that it takes a programmatic liberal to win the party's nomination.

The complaint from many Democratic liberals is not that Carter is a conservative, but that he has failed to run an issue-oriented campaign. Some Democratic leaders, including such people as George McGovern, worry that the temptation of victory is leading the party away from a discussion of issues the country needs to hear.

In recent years, the most conspicuous successes of the Carter-type approach have been at the congressional and state level. Many of the upset victories of 1972 and 1974 were won with a style similar to Carter's — a lot of emphasis on personality and character, and only a little discussion on specific issues.

than the McGovern - Reagan strategy. We are more concerned with a man's character, his sincerity, his moral principles, than we are his specific views on specific problems about which he knows too little from his seat on the outside.

Almost every president who promised specific programs in advance of his election defaulted after he came face to face with the problems, seeing them from inside the White House. Eisenhower in particular made this mistake. He, in 1952, just like Reagan in 1976 had too many pat solutions to offer which were formed on the basis of too little knowledge.

**Future FFA Students To Attend Workshop**

Don Morrow, Randy Conners and Joe B. Nivens, Esquire High School vocational agriculture students, will attend the 16th annual farm certification workshop sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company. More than 100 Future Farmers of America members and vocational agriculture teachers will take part in the workshop to be held June 7, 8 and 9 at West Texas State University.

Rounding out the instructional staff will be Tom Deane, Dumas; Bobby Brown, Texline Vocational Agricultural teacher; Frank Kennedy, Vega High School instructor and Jay Eudy, Turley High School instructor. The program for the convention was coordinated by Walter Labay of Plainview, area vocational agriculture supervisor and Sam Thomas, Southwestern Public Service Company's agricultural development manager. Glenn Abel, SPS power sales engineer will moderate the general sessions.

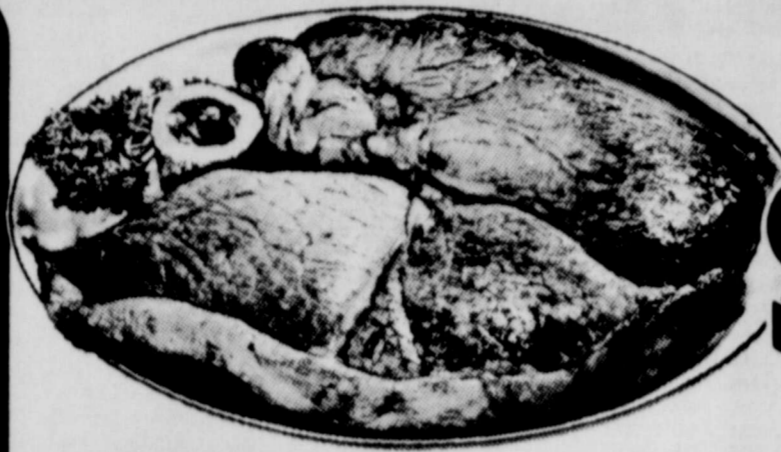
