Hall County is experiencing one of the wetter summers, it appears, as two general rains, Monday night and Tuesday morning, and early Wednesday morning, left valuable moisture over much of the county, with the heaviest amounts in the western and northern portions

Memphis received 1.8 inches Tuesday and another one-half inch in Wednesday morning's rain. Hedley area received about two inches in both rains.

The area east of Memphis has received about three inches this week as, has the Plaska area, Oxbow crossing areas, and much of the Tur-

key area. Heaviest reports were from an area south and east of Turkey, the Welk Flat and Bridle Bit areas, where four and a half and five-inch amounts were listed.

Lakeview area got from one inch to two inches in both rains, but amounts were lighter through the Brice area. Amounts were light in the Estelline area, it was indicated.

The rain in the Hedley area was most welcome for these are the best rains this area has received since May, and conditions were getting serious before the rains came this

One farmer stated that with rains he has received the last two weeks, since he has early cotton, these would just about be enough to see his crop through to harvest, unless temperatures got extremely hot this month.

Cotton farmers in the county are hoping for good yields this season as prices appear to be strong in the market place for their product. The rains coming in early August will certainly boost yield prospects.

However, with Aug. rains, comes the added worry by farmers of worm damage, not particularly a problem when the weather is hot and dry.

One farmer explained this year as a year of diversified conditions. "I have some cotton that's the best I've ever had," he said, "but then I've got some of the sorriest cotton I've ever had too."

He explained that he planted all of his cotton in May, but lost a portion of it. He replanted again in June, lost some of this and had to replant in late June and early July. He replanted one field four times.

Generally, most of the farmers who were able to save their May cotton have good prospects. June cotton was damaged several times due to wind, rain and hail, so many of these fields have partial stands. Some early July cotton looks good, but the question remains whether it will have time to mature before frost.

Considering the adverse weather conditions in the planting season, county farmers have done remarkable jobs of planting their crops, and many are engaged in battling

A Picture Of Business Activities!

The Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas, Bob Bullock, is doing one heck of a job of keeping Texans informed about the activities of his office, and most recent release from this office was entitled Sales Tax Analysis By County Code, for the first quarter of 1976.

This release mailed last month is interesting because is lists the number of business outlets in each county, gross sales, gross taxable sales, deductions, use tax purchases and amount subject to taxes for the first quar-

All this might read like an uninteresting thing to the average reader, but when comparing one county to another, some interesting things appear.

For instance, Hall County has 156 reporting outlets, meaning 156 businesses reporting collections of sale taxes. Childress county has 166, just 10 more. Collingsworth had 108, while Donley County has 112. Hardeman (the county with Quanah) has 148, and Wheeler

Looking at gross sales, Hardeman had \$13,060,359. far ahead of other area counties. Wheeler was next with \$7,869,505, Childress next with \$6,226,910. Donley had \$3,264,882 and Collingsworth had \$3,051,891.

This gives a good indication of the business climate in these counties. Harris County in Texas (Houston) did \$7.8 billion on gross sales, about 40 percent more than Dallas Co.

Comptroller Bullock has announced that he will recommend to the 65th Texas Legislautre that inheritance tax exemptions for surviving family members be increased to ease the financial burden imposed on many Texans, particularly farmers and ranchers.

The present \$25,000 for the surviving spouse and each surviving child was set in 1923 and has not been changed. He explained that \$25,000 in 1923 would be worth about \$79,000 today. Rural land that sold for \$20 to \$25 per acre in 1923 sells anywhere from \$350 to \$750 per acre today.

Comptroller Bullock is again urging the U. S. Banking Committee to approve a change in the Federal Reserve Act to permit banks to pay interest on state and local government checking accounts. Each day, Bullock stated, there is one billion tax dollars sitting idly in state and local government checking accounts in Texas banks.

Many of the projects Bullock had undertaken, have been for the good of the taxpayer, and for the state and local governments. We watched Bob Bullock in his campaign for the office, spoke over a dozen times with him. He has certainly lived up to his campaign promises to the voters of this state.



Mixed Drink Taxes In Texas Are \$10.8 Mil.

Bob Bullock said Wednesday that mixed drink tax coldections during the April-June quarter of 1976 totaled \$10.8 million.

Bullock said he has mailed checks totaling \$1.6 million to 188 counties and other checks totaling \$1.5 million to 310 cities as their share of the tax collected.

The remainder \$7.7 million, stays in the state general revenue fund, the Comp-

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and represents 10 percent of all gross receipts from the sale of mixed drinks. Bullock explained that the

Comptroller's Office remits to counties and cities 15 percent of the total mixed drink tax collected within their boundaries on a quarterly

He noted that the \$10.8 million collected is 21 percent more than the \$8.9 million collected in the second quarter of 1975 and 41 percent more than the \$7.5 million collected during the same period in 1974.

Hall County's share was \$146.97 and the City of Memphis received \$146.97 also.

Hall County Has Two Traffic Accidents In June

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June, 1976, shows a total of 49 accidents resulting in ten persons killed and 336 injured, as compared to June, 1975, with 572 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 455 persons injured. This was 23 less accidents, 15 less killed, and 19 less injured in 1976 at the same period of

The ten traffic deaths for the month of June, 1976, occurred in the following counties: three in Jack; two in Potter; and one each in Deaf Smith, Hutchinson, Wheeler, Clay and Parker.

Juvenile Probation Officer For Area Has Handled 108 Cases in '76

Bob Watson of Wellington, chief juvenile probation officer for this area, released information covering the period of January 1 1976 to June 30 1976. Counties covered include Collingsworth, Childress, Carson, Donley and

A total of 108 cases have been referred to the probation department during this six month period. Of this number 79 cases have been resolved without court action, seven cases are pending and 22 have been referred to Juvenile Court for further official action, Mr. Watson stated.

Eighty-one of the children referred had no prior referral while 27 had one or more prior referrals. Of this number 79 were county residents while 22 were out of the county and seven were out of the state of Texas.

It was interesting to note that 59 of the referred children lived with both parents, 34 lived with one parent, 2 lived with relatives and no adoptive children were referred. The academic progress of children referred included 24 had finished the sixth grade or below, 19 had completed the 7th grade, 22 the 8th grade, nine the ninth grade, 10 the 10th grade and four had completed the 11th grade; 18 had dropped out of school between the 7th and 10th grades and two had been suspended or expelled from

Among offenses listed for the juveniles were one for rape, one for aggravated assault, nine for burglary, 26 for theft, three for controlled substances, 26 for school attendance, two liquor vio-


