Continuing Texas Leadership!

This is just one of many reasons why inflation makes all our lives more demanding if we are to survive.

Also, we read recently, that the modern day industrial revolution has been grinding to a halt. There just have not been enough new inventions to spur industrial expansion as in the past few decades. In order for our economy to grow and prosper, new jobs must be created by new industries, because older industries are turning more and more to mechanization, utilizing fewer, more techically trained employees.

Also, the future may require much higher degrees of knowledge and education for the working man. This presents the greatest challenge of all, because despite continued increases in expenditure of public funds to improve the public education system in this country, our colleges and universities report that high school graduates are making poorer marks on entrance exams now than ever before reflecting a continuing decline in all caliber of basic education in this nation.

If our nation is to continue as an industrial leader in the world, continuing strides must be taken in fields of research to solve the many problems, especially in fields of power sources and technology.

Every year about this time the stories begin to appear in newspapers: "A 16-yearold boy, wearing a squirrel skin cap, was shot to death on a hunting trip with his cousin." "A 21-year-old hunter has been charged with involuntary manslaughter in the shooting death of another hunter." "An 18-year-old deer hunter has been shot to death only 10 days after his

father died in a hunting acci-There are some 22 million licensed hunters in the United States, or about one American in 10, and they thoroughly enjoy the hunting seasons. But, if the current hunting season is typical, several hundred of them will die in accidents and several thou-

sand will be injured. Hunting accidents are not a major cause of death or injury in this country compared to automobile accidents, or even accidental fails. But there is often a special sense of tragedy about such casualties because many victims are shot by a relative or close friend. Craig Waters wrote recently in New Times magazine: "A father kills his son; one brother takes the life of another . . . And . . . in all except a handful of instances, the accident could have been

avoided. Hunter safety courses have been developed by many organizations including state game commission, private hunting clubs and the National Rifle Association. Today all of the states have some kind of hunter education or safety training programs, but there are great differences in state requirements. The courses are mandatory in 25 states. Most of these require training only for teen-age hunters or hunters taking out licenses for the first time. Hunters who have been licens. ed out of these states are usually exempt. Twenty-six states require hunters to wear "blaze orange" or other brightly visible attire and this rule usually applies only during deer season

Last year hunters spent nearly \$1.3 billion on licenses and equipment, and the numof hunters is growing rapidly. In 1965, there were 13 million licensed hunters in the United States; today there are 22 million. And many new hunters are novices who are not at home in the woods or fields.

Hunting is a good sport, To millions of Americans there is nothing more enjoyable than a day in the fields or woods, often accompanied by their dogs, and there is nothing more tasty than game carried home in the vest pocket or the truck. But the danger is there and only if these nunters practice safety every step of the way will we be able to reduce the number of tragic deaths.



"The 'scarf look' includes large square or rectangular panels with border designs around the four outside edges. Often the design includes a prominent design along the center, spreading toward the borders," she







per acre have actually declined since 1971 for most grains. Bad weather, he said, has been a factor, but other auses are activation of less productive crops in the U. S. and zooming costs of energy and fertilizer.

Average U. S. yields are approaching experimental yields where all known technology is applied, the speaker pointed out. The simple fact is that farmers are consuming technology faster than it being produced by research.

Kunkel also emphasized the need for more basic research in agriculture.

"Demands for applied research solutions to problems of food and fiber production are continual and seem in. queapable", he said. "Yet, those solutions must draw from the body of basic research while at the same time competing for the support needed for fundamental research. It is the reservoir of basic or high risk research relevant to agriculture and food that has been diminished to the critical point."

But Kunkel also expressed optimism for the future. He said such agencies as

the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station are providing new developments, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is getting that information to farmers and ranchers.

The overall goal is to boost the absolute levels of food, feed and fiber and to do it with the most efficient utilization of resources, especially those that are renewable.

"We can do it, provided scientific and technological innovation occur and farmers receive the technolgy. Only scientists develop new technology. Only farmers and ranchers produce food. Motivation and incentives will be important for both scientific discovery and production of food and fiber," Kunkel



Public Welfare Has Set Up New Child Support

The State Department of Public Welfare (DPW) hopes to collect \$291,600 in child support payments for welfare mothers in the 40 - county Panhandle and South Plains regions, during fiscal 1976-77, according to Natalyn Col-

lins, DPW regional attorney. The department has estab. lished special child support units in a move to shift responsibility for support of children receiving public assistance back to the parents who are legally responsible for their support, she said.

Under an amendment to the Social Security Act that became effective last year, applicants for Aid to Families With Dependent Children (AFDC) must cooperate by identifying the parent who is not supporting the child, and assisting in locating that parent, if the child support payments are not being received. DPW uses state and federal parent locator ser-

vices to find the parent in order to require layment.

Only 2,230 of the state's 95,600 AFDC cases are in the 40-county area, according to October statistics. Most AF-DC cases are mothers with children whose father has deserted them, or who fail to pay court - ordered child support after a divorce, or mothers of illegitimate child-

When child support payments are received for three months equaling or exceeding the amount of the welfare grant, the situation is considered sufficiently stable to remove the family from the welfare rolls. Average AFDC grants for a mother with three children is \$140.00 per month in Texas.

Paternity suits may be filed in instances when the father refuses to voluntarily legitimate a child and when the evidence supports the mother's claim. Two paternity suits have been filed to date in the 40-county area, both in Lubbock. Ms. Collins said more are expected to be filed in the near future. Fourteen instances of voluntary legitimation has been filed in the area, some involving more than one child, she said.

Q. What are the facts on holiday driving hazards?

What about those icy bridges in Texas?

A Avoid sudden braking or steer-ing movements, as either can trigger a skid. Let up on the gas and keep the steering wheel as steady as possible to maintain maximum

QWhat if a car does begin skidding?

A Don't slam on the brakes, that only makes a skid worse. Let up on the gas and steer into the skid until you regain control. Don't panic or over-correct; skids can be controlled.

QDoesn't this technique conflict with our automatic responses?

A We do have a tendency to hit the brakes in an emergency. This is often the worst thing to do, especially in winter driving situations. Anticipating dangers and skillful steering will get you out of most hazards. It's a good idea to build confidence through practice. Find an empty parking lot on an icy day, and explore how steering into a skid feels and works.

What is "hydroplaning?"

A You are driving at 50-55 mph on a rainy day when suddenly your car feels like it is floating This happens because even with tire tread good enough to pass state inspection, at the right speed on a wet roadway your tires can release the road surface and begin running on the thin skim of water coating the highway.

What can be done about it?

Let up on the gas and slow A Let up on the gas and address. Hydroplaning is a combination of speed and a wet surface. By diminishing speed, your tires will regain contact with the road.

QWhat can I do to improve bad weather visibility?

Freezing conditions can make A windshield wiper blades hard and brittle. Check them regularly, especially in the winter.

What about my lights?

A Use them, even if it is daytime, in bad weather. Make sure Use them, even if it is daytime, other drivers can see you. For the same reason, be generous in signaling. Texas law requires you to signal even when changing lanes.

How do I avoid being blinded by my own headlights in bad Qhypnosis?"

QHow else can I fight "highway hypnosis?"

Rely on your low beams in fog, A snow and rain. High beams reflect off precipitation to actually reduce visibility. And be careful not to overdrive your headlights.

QAny other winter driving pointers?

A Remember that carbon mon-oxide, a deadly gas, can build up inside a closed vehicle. Open a window occasionally to ventilate

QWhat is the importance, of "speed differential?"

Minimizing the difference in Aspeed between cars helps reduce potential conflicts. In highway driving, the safest technique is to keep a proper interval and "go

Qlust what is the right interval between cars?

A The easiest rule of thumb is to allow at least two seconds between you and the car ahead. Count it off as the vehicle passes a fixed object. Of course, in bad weather you should lengthen the interval.

What about safety belts? Do they really make a difference? A Safety belts are especially important when confronting the

hazards of winter driving. In an accident they keep you from being thrown from the car, thus increasing your chances of survival five-

QHow much drinking does it take to affect driving?

QHow often should I take a trip.

Every two hours. Texas has an Aexcellent system of rest stops Don't become glued to the steering wheel in a battle with the clock. Relaxing for 15 minutes, even trading drivers if possible, makes the trip safer and more pleasant.

Read what the pros have to say.

Avoid staring at a fixed point, A such as at the road just in front of you. Keep your eyes moving. Glance at your mirrors. Check what is going on down the highway in the distance. You can often see trouble developing a long way off.

QWhat is a major cause of accidents on holiday trips?

A Lack of preparation. Holiday drivers frequently start off on trips of 500 miles or more under the worst conditions possible.

OCould you explain?

Here is a typical example. The A Here is a typical example. The family stays up late the night before packing. 

Food Key To Peace, Health and Prosperity

perity and human health in the next few decades ahead will depend more than ever on food production and distribution, Texas A&M University's dean of agriculture said here Monday (Oct. 11).

Dr. H. O. Kunkel, speaking during a meeting of the Dallas and Fort Worth Agricultural Clubs, said there is enough food produced to feed the world now. People are malnourished not because of Agricultural limits but because of problems of delivery and economics.

'The issue is getting the food to where the people are and providing an income so that they can buy it," he

There is no doubt more food will be needed, however. The dean said that even the most conservative population watchers estimate a jump from the current 4 billion to about 7 billion by centruy's

He emphasized the need for significant breakthroughs in productively to meet future food demands.

"We know some of the areas where such breakthrough are possible, increased efficiency in photosynthesis, nitrogen fixation and genetic manipulation," he said. "We also know that the research and development cost involved in such break. throughs is very high."

Such advances become almost imperative, Kunkel emphasized, because the entire world has reached the point of near total dependence on one region - North America for its surplus food supplies.

The situation is not helped by the fact that crop yields per acre have actually declined since 1971 for most grains. Bad weather, he said, has but other causes are activation of less productive crops in the U. S. and zooming costs of energy and fertilizer.

Average U. S. yields are approaching experimen tal yields where all known technology is applied, the speaker pointed out. The simple fact is that farmers are consuming technology faster than it is being produced by research. Kunkel also emphasized the

need for more basic research in agriculture.

"Demands for applied research solutions to problems of food and fiber production are continual and seem inescapable", he said. "Yet, those solutions must draw from the body of basic research while at the same time competing for the support needed for fundamental re. search. It is the reservoir of basic or high risk research relevant to agriculture and food that has been diminished to the critical point."

But Kunkel also expressed optimism for the future.

He said such agencies as the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station are providing new developments, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is getting that information to farmers and ranchers. The overall goal is to boost

the absolute levels of food, feed and fiber and to do it with the most efficient utilization of resources, especially those that are renewable.

"We can do it, provided scientific and technological innovation occur and farmers receive the technolgy. Only scientists develop new technology. Only farmers and ranchers produce food. Motivation and incentives will be important for both scientific discovery and production of food and fiber," Kunkel





Q. What are the facts on holiday driving hazards?

Read what the pros have to say.

What about those icy bridges in Texas?

A Avoid sudden braking or steer-ing movements, as either can trigger a skid. Let up on the gas and keep the steering wheel as steady as possible to maintain maximum

QWhat if a car does begin skidding?

Don't slam on the brakes, that Annly makes a skid worse. Let up on the gas and steer into the skid until you regain control. Don't panic or over-correct; skids can be

QDoesn't this technique conflict with our automatic responses?

We do have a tendency to hit Athe brakes in an emergency. This is often the worst thing to do, especially in winter driving situations. Anticipating dangers and skillful steering will get you out of most hazards. It's a good idea to build confidence through practice. Find an empty parking lot on an icy day, and explore how steering into a skid feels and works.

What is "hydroplaning?"

You are driving at 50-55 mph A You are driving at on a rainy day when suddenly your car feels like it is floating. This happens because even with tire tread good enough to pass state inspection, at the right speed on a wet roadway your tires can release the road surface and begin running on the thin skim of water coating the highway.

What can be done about it?

A Let up on the gas and slow down. Hydroplaning is a combination of speed and a wet surface. By diminishing speed, your tires will regain contact with the road.

QWhat can I do to improve bad weather visibility?

A Freezing conditions can make windshield wiper blades hard and brittle. Check them regularly, especially in the winter.

What about my lights?

Use them, even if it is daytime. Ain bad weather. Make sure other drivers can see you. For the same reason, be generous in signaling. Texas law requires you to signal even when changing lanes.

QHow do I avoid being blinded by my own headlights in bad

A Rely on your low beams in fog, snow and rain. High beams reflect off precipitation to actually reduce visibility. And be careful not to overdrive your headlights.

QAny other winter driving pointers?

A Remember that carbon mon-oxide, a deadly gas, can build up inside a closed vehicle. Open a window occasionally to ventilate

QWhat is the importance, of "speed differential?"

A Minimizing the difference in speed between cars helps reduce potential conflicts. In highway driving, the safest technique is to keep a proper interval and "go with the flow.

Qlust what is the right interval between cars?

A The easiest rule of thumb is to allow at least two seconds between you and the car ahead. Count it off as the vehicle passes a fixed object. Of course, in bad weather you should lengthen the interval.

What about safety belts? Do they really make a difference?

A Safety belts are especially important when confronting the hazards of winter driving. In an accident they keep you from being thrown from the car, thus increasing your chances of survival five-

QHow much drinking does it take to affect driving?

A Under Texas law, you are pre-sumed to be a drunken driver if your blood alcohol level is above .10. A 120-pound woman enjoying two mixed drinks in an hour probably has a blood alcohol concentration of .11.

Obreak while driving?

A Every two hours. Texas has an excellent system of rest stops. Don't become glued to the steering wheel in a battle with the clock. Relaxing for 15 minutes, even trading drivers if possible, makes the trip safer and more pleasant.

QHow else can I fight "highway hypnosis?"

Avoid staring at a fixed point, A such as at the road just in front of you. Keep your eyes moving. Glance at your mirrors. Check what is going on down the highway in the distance. You can often see trouble developing a long way off.

QWhat is a major cause of accidents on holiday trips?

Lack of preparation. Holiday Adrivers frequently start off on trips of 500 miles or more under

Could you explain? A family stays up late the night Here is a typical example. The before packing. Feeder Cattle To Be Graded Three Ways

LUBBOCK - Future grades of feeder cattle are likely to be evaluated by characterisites, muscling, frame size, and thriftiness, a federal livestock expert said in Lubbock Thursday of last week.

"Muscling will refer to the thickness and plumpness of the muscles in relation to the skeletal size, and indirectly, to the ratio of muscle to bone, said Ned Tyler, chief of the Standardization Branch, Livestock Division, Agricultural Marketing Service. United States Department of Agriculture

Explaining the proposed revision to the U.S. standards for grade of feeder cattle, Tyler said frame size will refer to the animal's height and body length in relation to its age.

Tyler was speaking at the Second Annual Beef Business Conference at Texas Tech

The final draft of the proposed revisions, he said, will be prepared after Feb. 15, 1977, giving the cattle industry an opportunity to offer comments before the new standards become final.

Thriftiness, Tyler explained, will depend on the apparent health of the animal and on its ability to grow and fatten

TREE TROUBLE

Christmas trees pose a fire hazard by their very existence in the home but people can do a lot to decrease potential problems, the Texas Medical Association

Natural trees need to be fresh as possible. Brittle branches and shedding needles not only increase fire hazards but they make a tree less pretty quicker. Keeping the bottom of the tree in water or damp dirt will help keep it fresher longer.

The tree also noteds sturdy base. Holders can be bought or a fairly secure base can be made by packing and bracing the tree in a large container of damp dirt. A holder can be covered with wrapping paper or a cloth for a more pleasing effect.

Christmas trees present a very subtle danger to some Allergy suffe have to have an artificial tree if they find the trees trigger wheezing, sneezing and red

The most important requirement for artificial trees is that they be fire resistant. Labels on the tree or packaging clearly should state their safety. Artificial trees also need sturdy bases.

Trimming a metal tree with electric lights can be very dangerous so safety authori. ties recommend using colored floodlights aimed at the tree. These lights must be placed so they can't possibly burn people, packages or fur-

Other types of tree lights can be dangerous if the wires are broken, cracked or exposed. Loose connections, broken bulbs and bulbs touching branches also can create problems. Even lights with the Underwriters Laboratory (UL) safety seal can be dangerous if they are old

AUSTIN - The U. S. Secretary of Interior is pressing Gov. Dolph Briscoe to take a stand in a hot controversy between water and wildlife interests.

The issue: replacing wildlife habitat destroyed by the waters of major new reservoirs.

Secretary Kent Frizzell wants the governor to explain his opinions on "mitigation" - steps which should be taken to reduce destructive effective of reservoir building on habitat - at the 11,000-acre Palmetto Bend project near Edna.

At the same time, the National Wildlife Federation is pushing Briscoe to provide \$3 million in local and state money to purchase 3,700 acres for wildlife management in the reservoir area.

Briscoe has supported federal action to speed Limestone and Choke Canhon reservoir projects without specifying steps to reduce harmful effects on wildlife habitat.

Although Frizzell's question pertains specifically to Palmetto Bend, the governor's answer, in effect, will spell out his position on the broad issue.

Insurance Fight

Another major insurance battle - over product liability coverage - is predicted by industry spokesmen for the 1977 legisla-

The industry is prepared to lobby for legislation to place limits on awards for punitive damage and pain. Another proposed bill would provide immunity from product liability suits if product designs are certified as having risks reduced to acceptable levels. Other proposals would regulate attorneys contin ency fees and establish compulsory arbitration. High risk businesses have expressed concern product liability suits could ruin

VRA Review Set The U.S. Supreme Court is going to review the contest over whether Texas really should be subject to the expanded federal Voting Rights Act.

The controversial act requires U. S. Justice Department approval of any state or local government act bearing on elections or voting rights. Only about 25 decisions of Texas governing bodies (there are 4,000 political subdivisions in the state) have been overturned under VRA. But a House committee recently estimated the act

has cost the Texas taxpayers \$190,000 and forced local governments to devote 35,000 of manpower to

necessary paperwork to

A U.S. appeals court has held against excluding Texas. The high court will hear arguments next March on the appeals lodged by Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Secretary of State Mark White who claim Texas was improperly brought under the act.

Campaigns Costly A handful of statewide races cost candidates about \$2 million this year.

Most of the money went into U.S. Senate and Railroad Commission races. U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, in his successful reelection campaign, reported spending \$623,492 and raising \$650,856 in contributions. The unsuccessful Republican Senate candidate, U.S. Rep. Alan Steelman of Dallas received \$646,024 and spent \$627,223.

Railroad Commissioner-Elect Jon P. Newton of Beeville reported contributions of \$581,395 and expenditures of \$548,768. The GOP commission candidate. Walter Wendlandt of Austin, reported spending only \$19,398 and receiving \$19,131 in contributions.



How Builders Can Reduce Housing Cost

One of the best ways to bring more new homes within pocketbook - reach is to reduce the cost of building a home. And lately, everybody's been getting into the act.

Lumber and plywood manufacturers have now drawn up detailed plans to help homebuilders, designers and carpenters lower wood framing costs by using more efficient construction techniques.

These cost-saving ideas are covered in a series of six folders distributed by the Southern Forest Products Association.

Here are some highlights of those ideas:

Preplanning can save as much as 25 percent of wall framing costs by eliminating such practices as using extra studs where partitions meet exterior walls, blocking at mid-height of walls, and use of double studs and headers for openings in non-load bearing walls.

Between 6 and 17 percent of many floor framing costs can be saved if the builder correlates lumber spans to standard lengths, thereby avoiding waste of too-long pieces.

Anywhere from 6 to 8 per cent of joist framing costs can be saved by utilizing full span capabilities of lumber and changing either the joist grade, joist spacing or house depth.

Heating and cooling costs can be reduced by as much as two-thirds by using 2 x 6 studs at 24-inch intervals, thus allowing thicker insula-

New Tax Legislation Will Affect Estate Planning

COLLEGE STATION—
The new tax legislation that has just become law will have a big effect on farm and ranch families, contends Tom Prater, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Most of the legislation is effective after Dec. 31, 1976, although gifts are effective as of Sept. 8, and trusts as of April 30.

"One item in the legislation that will affect the estate planning and management of Texas farm and ranch families will be the 'current use base for establishing the value of farm and ranch lands," says Prater. "This will reduce the valuation below the fair market value approach which is now used."

However, there are qualifications for using the "current use" value:

50 per cent or more of the

50 per cent or more of the adjusted value of the gross estate consists of real and personal farm and ranch property passes to a qualified heir (member of fam-

25 per cent or more of the adjusted value of the gross estate consists of such real property.

Such properties use for which five of the past eight years before the descendant's death was qualified and was used in business in which the descendant or a member of the descendant's family materially participated.

"The new tax law will also increase the exemption level as far as estate taxes are concerned," points out Prater. "A unified tax table would include estate taxes and gifts."

The economist cites these examples of estate taxes. Starting in 1977, there will be a tax credit of \$30,000 for any estate having a death; \$34,000 in 1978; \$38,000 in 1979; \$42,500 in 1980; and \$47,000 in 1981 and thereafter. Comparing this to the exemption equivalent would

mean \$120,667 in 1977; \$134,000 in 1978; \$147,333 in 1979; \$161,563 in 1980;

The new tax bill also provides a change in marital deductions, enabling one spouse to leave \$250,000 or one-half of the estate, whichever is greater, to the surviving spouse. In addition to this deduction, there is an additional \$100,000 lifetime marital deduction gift exemption that one spouse can give to the other spouse with no tax, notes Prater. This has to come from separate property.

"Another important feature is the privilege of paying estate taxes over 15 years at 4 per cent interest if 65 per cent of the adjusted tax estate qualifies as a farm, ranch or closely held business. The federal government will have a first lien on property during this period of tax payout," explains Prater.

The recapture of estate taxes is also affected by the new legislation. If a farm or ranch is sold out of a family within 10 years, estate taxes on the total fair market value can be recaptured. If the property is held 10 to 15 years, the taxes can be partially re-

captured.

State of Texas inheritance laws remain the same.

"All of these plus other changes brought on by the new tax legislation make it important for managers and owners of farms and ranchers to review and revise estate plans so that all management opportunities are realized," emphasizes Prater.



Skateboard Safety Is Essential Warns Consumer Specialist

COLLEGE STATION -The return of the skateboard craze has many parents fearing for their children's safety. Rightfully so, says Claudia Mitzel, consumer information

"Last year skateboarding accidents sent more than 27,000 children to the hospital and this year the accident toll is expected to be even higher." she pointed out.

Miss Mitzel is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M Un. iversity System.

"Skatboarding is especially popular with teens and preteens. Magazines, movies and television have popularized

"Today's skateboards, different from the original boards of 10 years ago, have new polyurethane wheels which give a faster, smoother and quieter ride. The better quality boards of today are made of aluminum, flexible fiber glass or heavy duty

She noted that since the mechanical improvements enable the experienced skater to perform exotic tricks, peer pressure insures that they will try. In fact, in many communities, a youth cult is rappidly developing that glamorizes both the risk and pain associated with the sport.

"Parents who permit skateboarding can take several precautions that will at least help minimize its dangeers. Start by examining the equipment," she said.

Look for polyurethane wheels that are rough textured to have the greatest surface grip and to be flexible. Spin the wheels to be sure they are well-ailgned and turn freely, but not loosely. Listen to the ball bearings; they should allow the wheel to turn without rattling.

The length and shape of the boards vary with use. A wider board is easier for beginners to balance. Longer boards are more flexible on roght surfaces or going around bends.

Trucks, the mechanisms which attach the wheels to the board, are the most important part of the skateboard. Be sure they are iron rather than lighter duty sheet metal and are bolted through the top of the board rather than just into it.

"In examining the bolts, look at their lock nuts. Be sure the lock nuts are lined with nylon insets to

prevent them from working loose easily. Also, check lock nuts on the axle bolt; this is especially important. If you can't see the nylon insets, ask about them."

Trucks should be readily adjustable so that a skateboarder can make a tight turn without spilling. Trucks that allow for insertion of additional shocker pads are even safer.

Beware of inexpensive boards made of britle plastic and cheap materials which will break apart easily. Skateboards are available for prices up to \$125.

'Parents should encourage children to 'play it safe'. If they are willing, have them wear lightweight helmets and knee and elbow pads. At the very least, rubber-soled shoes long pants and long sleeved shirts are essential.'

Encourage them, also, to periodically check the wheels and shocker pads and replace them when they show signs of wear. This may be as frequent as every two or three months with regular use, she added.

"Also, ask your children to listen to the ball bearings as the wheels spin to be sure none have fallen out. Replace all the bearings when the wheels start to sound noisy.

"Be sure your children use only powdered graphite to loosen the bearings when stiff. Never use oil because it will disintegrate plastic and polyurethane.

"In addition, both parents and children can bring the neighborhood skateboarders together to develop safety rules. Children are more likely to observe rules they have helped formulate.

"Parents can also help children select low traffic streets and low risk hours for skateboarding. Or encourage your city to set aside skateboarding areas in local parks or school areas," she sug-

AUSTIN . . The Comptroller's Office is in the process of issuing new state sales and use tax permits to all retailers who now hold

I hope every retailer in the state will be on the lookout for the new permits so they won't be misplaced. In addition, they should read their new permits carefully to make certain all the information on them is correct. If it isn't, they should contact my nearest field office immediately for corrections.

This isn't an easy job. There are 290,931 retailers or retail outlets currently holding sales tax permits and another 4,594 holding use tax certificates.

The new gold-colored permits will replace all existing green permits, which then will become void.

Sales and use tax permits have never been reissued since the inception of the sales tax. Retailers are supposed to get their permits corrected should their address or ownership change, but many have not.

The result is that many of the old permits-some dating back to the early 1960's-are illegible, incorrect or, in some cases, lost.

All of the new permits should be in the mail December 10. However, because of the Christmas mail rush, retailers should not be alarmed if they don't receive theirs before the end of the month.

This issuance of new permits will be followed by a strong effort to make certain all retailers display them properly in their place of business. The law requires

In fact, the new permits carry the message in large letters on the front that "This permit must at all times be prominently displayed in your place of business."

Memphis Democrat-Thurs., Dec. 16, 1976 Foot Care Puts A Spring In Your Step

COLLEGE STATION -Question: What part of the body receives the most abuse, carries the heaviest load, but many times gets the least care?

Answer: Feet.

Marlene Odle, clothing specialist, points out that daily foot care should include bathing or cleanliness, creaming for softness, hot and cold baths or alcocol for stimulation, exercise for relaxation and powder for protection.

"Wash the feet thoroughly with soap and a washcloth. Use pumice or an emery board on callouses to remove dry skin while the feet are soft from water. "Use a lotion to soothe and

soften tired feet. Massage the entire foot with the fingers while applying creams or lotions. "By alternating hot and cold water, foot baths will

stimulate circulation and relax the muscles. You can also use it to warm feet in cold weather."

This specialist is with the Texas Agricultural Extension

Service, The Texas A&M Uni-

versity System. She noted that periodically exercising the feet relieves tension and reduces tiredness. "With shoes off, try to Curl toes under, attempting

to pick up an imaginary pen-"Another exercise is to stand with feet side by side, about six inches apart and hands on hips, rock from the heels forward on the outside of the foot toward the little toe and then up on the ball of the foot with most of the weight on the big toe. Rock back. Repeat.

"Powdering the feet and shoes helps to absorb moisture and eliminate odors. Powder also helps combat fungus growth by keeping the feet dry." she said.

A weekly pedicure keeps feet looking nice and prevents wear on socks and hosiery. File nails relatively straight across, keeping toe nails shorter than the toes, she ad-

This specialist said that most foot problems are caused by ill-fitting shoes. New shoes should feel as good as old shoes. Shop for shoes in the afternoon when feet are the largest. Consult a specialist at the first sign of foot problems, she advised.



Cattle Feeding Shows Increase

COLLEGE STATION -Although many people are talking about the return of grass-fed cattle because of increasing feed prices, the latest cattle-on-feed statistics show significant increases are still coming in cattle feeding, notes a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Services.

Dr. Ed Uvacek points out that the number of cattle on feed in the seven major cattle feeding states on Sept. 1 was up 8 per cent over last year's totals, at a total of 6.4 million head. In Texas, the number of cattle on feed was even up higher - 10 per cent above year ago levels.

Placement of cattle and culves on feed during August was up 10 per cent over last year in these seven states, while Texas figures showed a 25 per cent increase in feedlot placements during that month.

On the marketing side, Uvacek points out that fed catle marketings were above a year ago by 31 per cent in the seven states during August, while Texas marketings showed a 38 per cent jump.

"The interesting thing about this data is that they indicate a somewhat more positive attitude about catle feeding among Texas feedlots", contends Uvacek. "It might also indicate that more covy-calf operators are placing their stock on feed, rather than selling them as feed-
