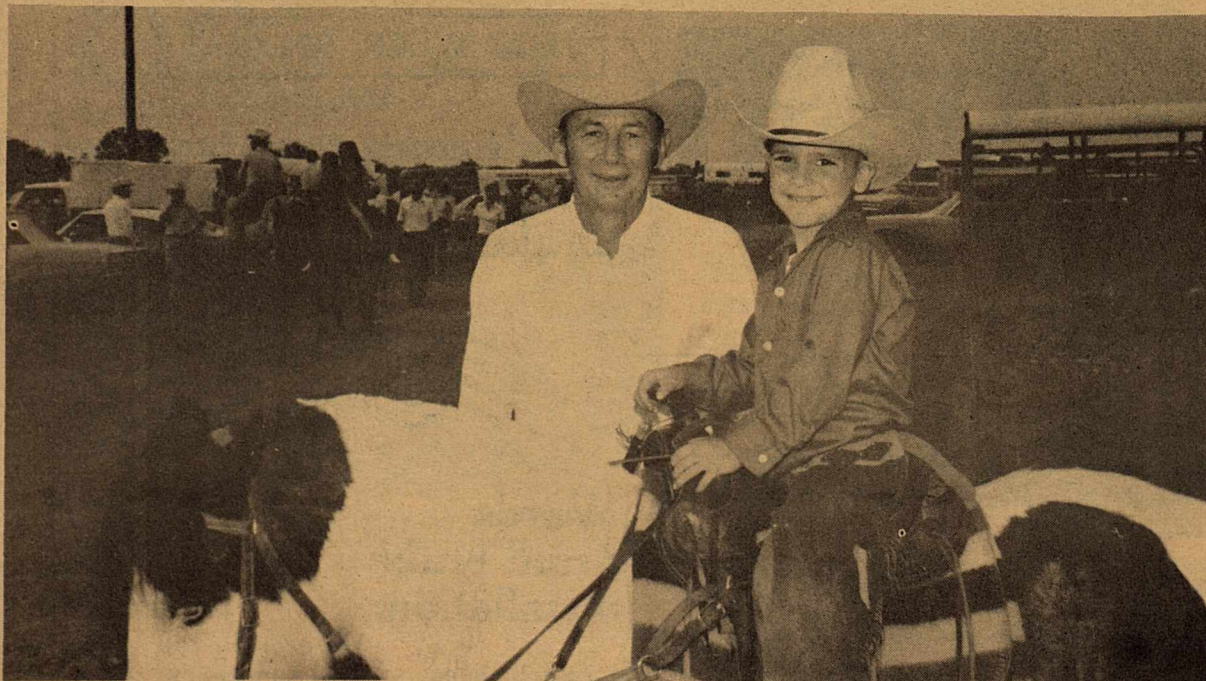

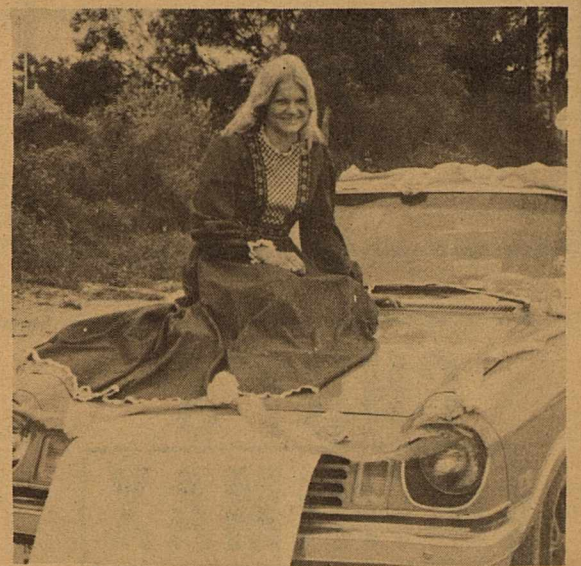

As we begin the last month of the legislative session, major issues that have been pending are coming rapidly to a head. School finance will be the first of the important items to be taken up by the House. There will be lengthy floor debate, and various substitute measures are expected to be offered. Many observers anticipate final details of the plan will be hammered out in a Senate-House Conference Committee. Utility regulation will follow and is expected to be a volatile subject. The utility regulation bill passed by the Senate differs markedly from the one passed out of the House State Affairs Committee. The House version will be up for debate first. Again, there will be many floor amendments offered; and then it will again be a question of if the Senate and House agree on them. The appropriations bill will then be the next order of business.

The resolution to rescind the Equal Rights Amendment is still in a sub-committee in the House.

The proposed new state constitution will be up for approval by the voters in November. Before that time, every registered voter in the state will receive a copy of the draft of the constitution. In addition, my office will mail out an analysis of the new constitution and also a comparison of it with the present constitution. Target date for mailing the material is late summer and early fall.

My recent trip to Washington was most interesting and worthwhile. Meeting with the President and Secretary of State was informative, not to mention exciting. It was also very enlightening to have a chance to exchange ideas with the leaders of the other 49 states who attended the conference. I was pleasantly surprised to find that, as inefficient and ineffective as we often criticize our state government of being,

Texas seems to be dealing with our problems in a more progressive and successful manner than many of the other states. It might seem hard to believe, but it's true!

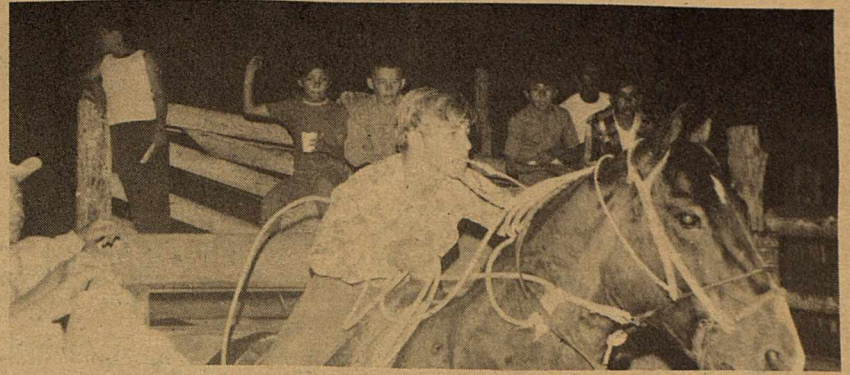

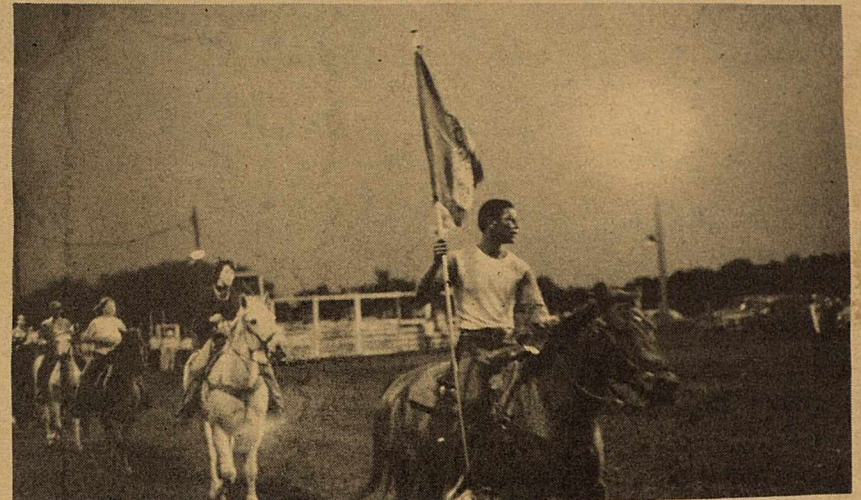

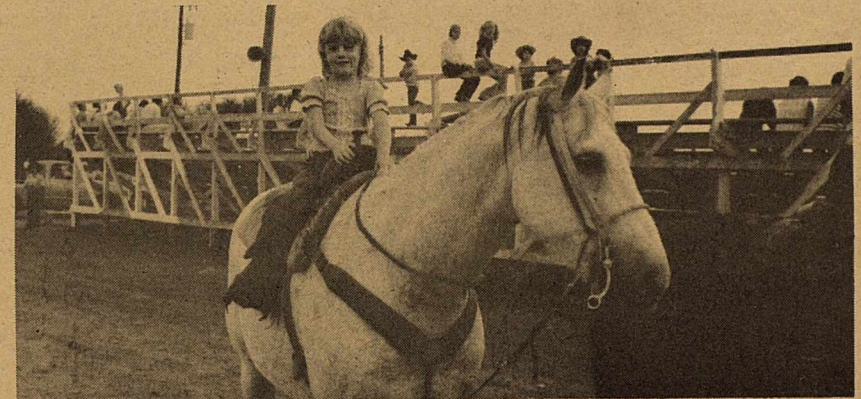

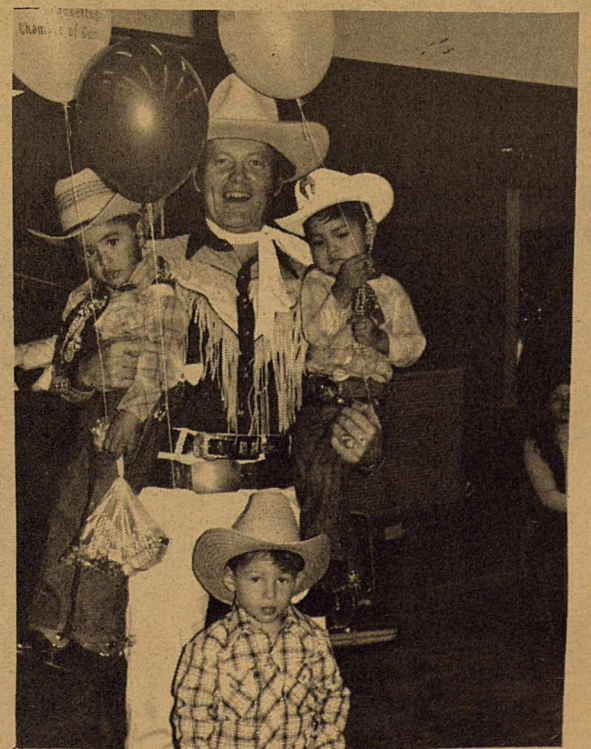

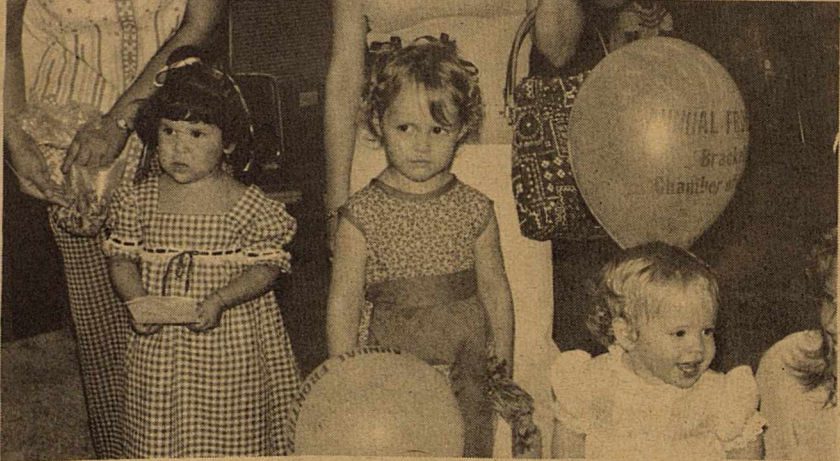

REGULAR MEETING----May 12, 1975

Judge Seargeant called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. with the following members present:

T.H.Glover; Commissioner, Precinct No.1
Manuel Fuentes, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2
G.C.Talamantez, Commissioner; Precinct No. 3
L.S.Johnson, Commissioner; Precinct No.4

Tully Shahan, County Attorney
Dolores Raney, County Clerk
Mrs. Emil Schafer was present as a spectator

Absent: Sheriff Sheedy was called away but okayed his bills for payment.

1975-1976 PARKS & WILDLIFE PROCLAMATION

Commissioner T.H. Glover made a motion to approve the 1975-1976 Parks & Wildlife Proclamation after deletion of Section 4.04 pertaining to javelina. Commissioner G.C.Talamantez seconded the motion which passed unanimously. The Clerk was instructed to mail a copy of the approval to the Parks & Wildlife Department.

There was a discussion of the possibility of closing doe and spike buck season in Kinney County for several years. The Court decided to call a meeting of local ranchers to get their views on the matter.

Court recessed to organize as a Board of Equalization.

Court reconvened at 10:00 a.m.

APRIL BILLS & REPORTS

The April bills incurred by Kinney County were examined and approved for payment. The reports for April of the following County Officials were examined and approved:

Commissioner T.H. Glover made a motion to approve the bills and reports for April and Commissioner L.S.Johnson duly seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

COMMUNITY CENTER RATES

County Attorney Shahan and Judge Seargeant will draw up a rate for the Community Center, using the Uvalde and Del Rio Rates as a guideline, and then the rate schedule will be presented to the Court for approval.

NEPOTISM IN PUBLIC OFFICE

County Attorney Shahan received an opinion on nepotism from the Attorney General's Office. The opinion states that no officer can vote in favor of his family within the second degree by affinity or third degree by consanguinity unless the family member has worked for two years before the officer is elected. Mr. Shahan informed the court that Mr. Talamantez and Judge Seargeant should not have voted on motions involving their relatives.

Judge Seargeant informed the Court that there will be a meeting concerning Kinney County's Revenue Sharing Funds before the end of June. The Revenue Sharing Budget must be published in a newspaper of general circulation in this County before funds are available for Kinney County.

Commissioner T.H.Glover said the Court was not fair to officers about salaries and requested an opinion to settle differences. Mr. Shahan informed the court that the Attorney General's Office could give us opinions to help the Court run the county. but that the Attorney General couldn't settle each County's problems. Mr. Shahan said that he would write Mr. Douglas, head of the Texas Association of Counties and that he might possibly have information on how other counties have settled their salary problems.

JUSTICE OF PEACE & CONSTABLES PRECINCT 3

Commissioner G.C.Talamantez again made a motion to cut the salaries of the Justice of the Peace for Precinct No. 3 and Constable of Precinct No. 3 to \$1.00 per year, with Commissioner T.H. Glover seconding the motion. The motion failed to carry with the following vote: Ayes: G.C.Talamantez & T.H.Glover. Noes: Manuel Fuentes and L.S.Johnson.

CONSTABLE PRECINCT NO. 4 SALARY

Commissioner Glover wanted to make a motion regarding the salary raise for Constable Emil Schafer, but was informed that any raise in salary required notice to be posted for ten days before the meeting and would be put on the agenda for the June meeting.

1974 AUDIT REPORT

Mr. Jim Faith of the auditing firm of Meredith, Coleman & Dalrymple presented the 1974 Audit Report to the Court and Commissioner G.C.Talamantez made a motion that the Court Accept the audit. The motion was seconded by Commissioner T.H.Glover and passed unanimously. Mr. Faith reviewed the audit report with the Court and Mary Senne County Treasurer and Odilia Gomez were present. Mr. Faith also presented suggestions and recommendations to the different officers to help in expediting the annual audit and giving better control over activities of the offices.

SWIM PARK OPERATION BIDS

Commissioner G.C.Talamantez made a motion, duly seconded by Commissioner L.S.Johnson, that the county advertise for sealed bids on the Swim Park Concession. Motion passed unanimously.

The minutes of the March REGular Meeting and March Special Meeting were read and after correction were approved on the Motion of G.C.Talamantez seconded by T.H.Glover and passed unanimously.

Meeting adjourned.

The District 13 4-H Council Members from the eighteen counties in District 13 will sponsor a 4-H Career Day to be held in San Antonio, June 10. All 4-H members between the ages of 14-19 will have an excellent opportunity to view and tour different businesses and possible career programs. Among those being offered to the 4-H members include Air Transportation, tour of the San Antonio International Airport, Traffic Control Tower, Airport and Commercial Airplanes, Communications Radio and T.V. Stations and Newspapers, Livestock Marketing and Processing facilities at the San Antonio Union Stock Yards and Swift & Company, Medical at the University of Texas Health Science Center, and Parks and Recreation, which will include the Northeast Preserve San Antonio River and Recreation Complex. 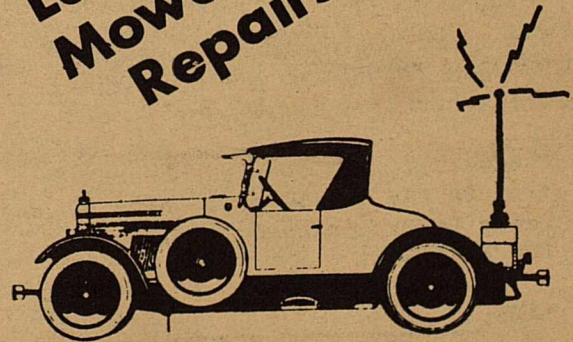

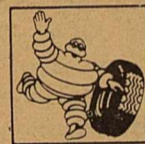
