TRICENTENNIAL

A TEXAS TRICENTENNIAL Setting the scene for U.S. Bicentennial, Texas goes further back to celebrate the 300th anniversary of one of the most momentous of Spain's entradas into the Southwest.

Brutal depredations of European slavers illegally preying on Indian tribes had finally resulted in reprisals from the natives and uprisings that escalated into our own times. Among the groups sent northward to seek out friendly tribes and to report on conditions was the Bosque-Larios Expedition, which crossed the Rio Grande above present-day Eagle Pass in the spring of 1675.

Their meticulously-detailed diary reports that the dozen Spaniards and their escorts of 120 Indian warriors met the chiefs of four tribes about where U.S. Highway 83 crosses the Nueces. The next day, May 16, 1675, Fray Juan Larios offered what was to be the first recorded Christian service in the area before a friendly group of 1172 Indians from several Texas tribes. The expedition ended on the Medina River on May 29th within 27 miles of today's San Antonio.

The event will be celebrated on May 28th this year at San Jose Mission near San Antonio, starting at 6 p.m. Among interesting features will be a colorful Parade of the Nations, led by a delegation from the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation numerous Franciscans, Canary Islander descendants, a Charro contingent, Matachines and groups from the various nationalities which settled this state. At 7 p.m. there will be a field Mass near the famous San Jose cloisters, with Archbishop Francis J. Furey as chief concelebrant and the Madrigal Singers from San Antonio College as a Latin choir.

It is a requirement in the City Limits that a dog have a vaccination tag attached to it's collar.

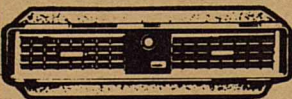

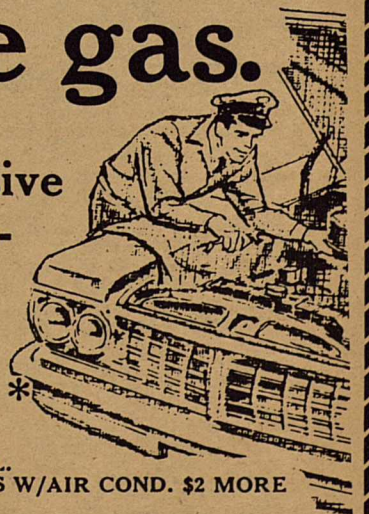

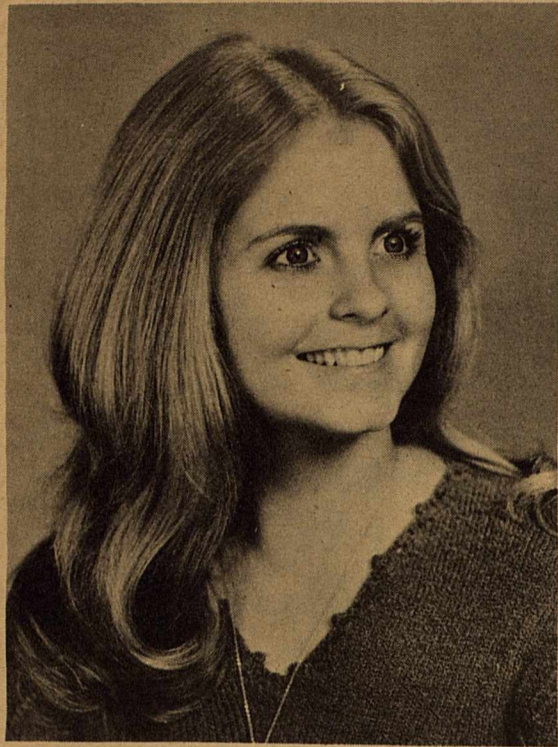

Less than three years ago Tom T. Hall hired a young, unknown guitar player named Johnny Rodriguez, and the kid turned into a country music superstar faster than you could barbecue a goat.

Now Rodriguez (whose prankish goat cooking once earned him a night in the clink that eventually provided the connection with Hall) is taking his turn at talent-finding, bringing to Nashville a Texas college student (who's never been in jail) to record her first single. And Johnny is convinced the same is going to make her a star.

"That second song is a hit record," Johnny said in the studio Tuesday evening after his protegee, Dotsy Brodt, put down the second of three songs she cut that night.

Roy Dea, the producer who also did Johnny's first record, and Happy Shahan, who manages both the singers, agreed.

"Super," was the word Dea used to describe the session. "It's coming out just the way we expected."

The Object of all the attention and excitement---yes, her real name is Dotsy and no, she won't be using her last name professionally-- is from Seguin (that's pronounced Sa-geen) and is about to finish a degree in special education at U.T. (that's the University of Texas).

"I really want to sing," she said, but she also loves her work with retarded children.

"I believe in people," she said, "I love people, and I love music."

And Country is the kind of music she loves.

"I'm just a country girl," she said by way of explanation, and her appearance back her claim of the take-home-to-mother kind of simplicity.

With her (natural) long blonde hair and some of the biggest, warmest, baby blue eyes around, Dotsy has that well-scrubbed look of the perennial girl next door (except the real neighbor never looked that good).

Adding to the image, Dotsy's been going with the same boy for nine years, though no marriage plans are in the works.

Shahan first heard of Dotsy through her home town newspaper publisher. But she was too shy and, she thought too young at 17 to call the manager, even after the journalist made the initial contact for her.

Nearly three years later, Shahan saw her perform at a convention in San Antonio and asked to meet her.

"You're not going to believe this," she told him that night, "but I'm the girl who never showed up."

Shahan knew her immediately and took her to meet Rodriguez. The same evening, upon hearing her sing a little, Johnny asked her to appear with him at an up-coming rodeo in Austin.

That was the big beginning that led to the recording session Tuesday night at RCA's studio number two.

Gripping the pockets of her blue denim jacket tightly, she excitedly approached the microphone

with a voice stronger and fuller than her slender build would imply.

"We're recording positive, me-to-you type songs--all-American songs," Dea said, "because that's how I think of her, as an all-American girl. She's the kind of girl I would want my daughter to be; she appeals to all kinds of people."

Dea and Shahan both said that Dotsy has the same kind of "charisma" that attracted them to Rodriguez.

"But she has one thing going for her that Johnny didn't have, Shahan said. "She has Johnny going for her."

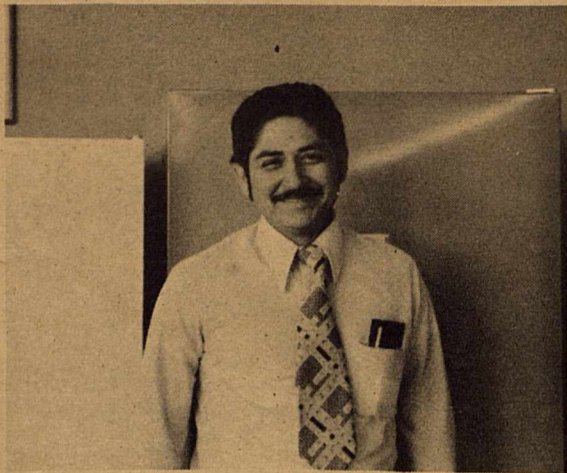

## New Del Rio Wards Manager



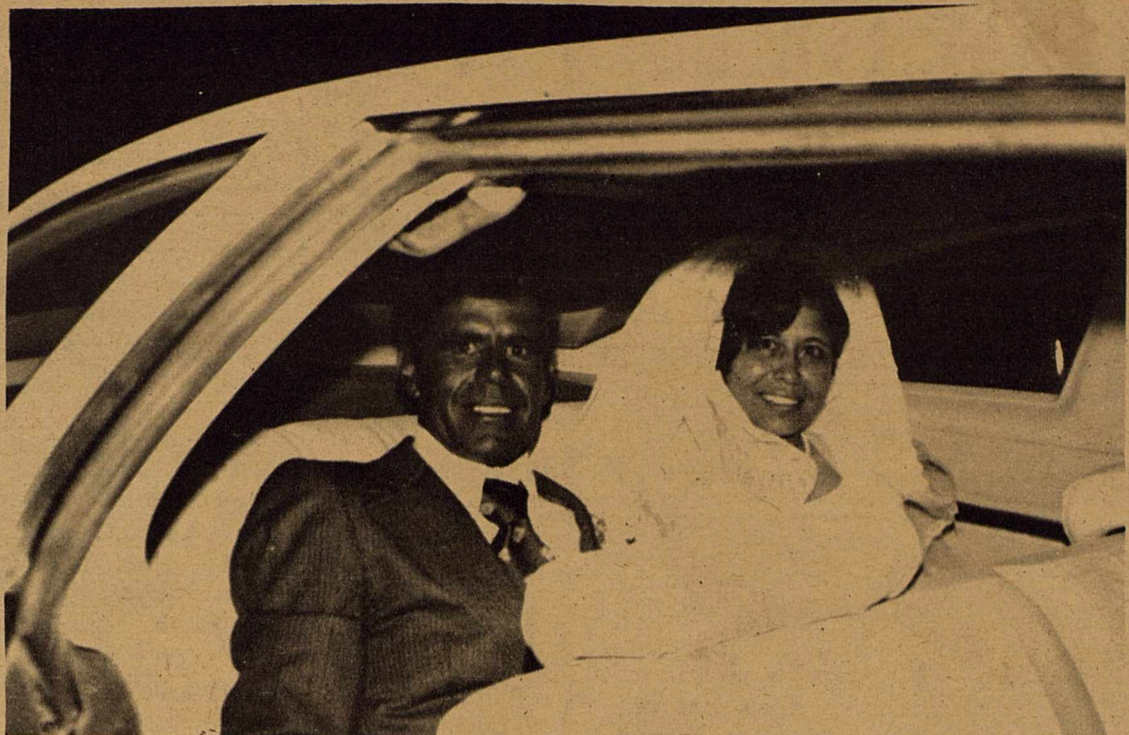
Adan F. Rangel has recently been appointed as Manager of the Del Rio Montgomery Wards Store, the company announced.
