
The first caller complained "That an illegally parked in-operative cars blocked his vision, which caused an accident."

CITY HALL


A meeting was held at City Hall Wednesday evening, to discuss regulation of traffic and parking during football games. During the few years this has presented congestion problems in the football field area.





August is "survial" month for flowers, plants and lawns. The heat makes it hard to maintain a good show with these. The season is up for insects and fungus on almost everything. If your flowers leaves turn gray or there are fine thick webs on the you will soon lose them if you do not treat them with insectides. If leaves turn gray and seem to be drying up these need treatment for fungus. There are many things you can use. Just go by the instructions on the label.

One of the best all around things to use is wettable dusting sulfurs. Either dust it on or mix with water and spray.

To keep your lawn going good--it should be fed with any good lawn
fertilizer. Most soil in this area
is iron deficient so a fertilizer
containing iton will keep the lawns
healthy and green ----if you water
the lawn as needed. Always water
the lawn heavily then wait a while
before watering again. Better
still pray for rain it's better
than hydrant water--and cheaper.

HERE'S HOW IT'S DONE

If you're a donor with other employees of your company, you get to lie down on the job!

That's right. We will set up in a convenient spot on the company premises where you lie down on a cot.

In about 30 minutes it's all over. There's no sensation or feeling while you're giving blood. Then you rest for a few minutes, have some refreshments and you're up and back to work. You might even feel BETTER, more relaxed. That often happens.

The only time people might feel a little faint is when they haven't eaten anything all day or had enough sleep the night before and their body isn't READY to give blood.

O.K.? THEN HERE'S THE PITCH

If you're scared, you can be honest about it because lots of folks are. But there's nothing to be afraid of, really. Giving blood is a quick, simple process.

HERE'S A VERY IMPORTANT POINT

If you especially, and everyone else who can, will be a donor regularly, giving to the community, no one in our community need ever be without life-saving blood. That's our goal. We hope you'll make it yours, too.

HOW MUCH BLOOD IS TAKEN? Just a pint.

ISN'T A PINT A LOT TO GIVE?

Not really because the average person has 12 to 13 pints and the one isn't missed. The body replaces the blood quickly.

HOW OFTEN COULD A PERSON GIVE BLOOD?

You <u>COULD</u> give every two months if you wanted to but if everybody gave only twice a year, your community blood center wouldn't be faced with their emergency worries.

CAN ANYONE GIVE BLOOD?

Not everyone, but most healthy people between 17 and 66 can.

FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE DONOR & RECIPI-ENT, DONORS CANNOT BE ACCEPTED UNDER THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS:

IF YOU HAVE EVER HAD

 \square hepatitis - jaundice \square cancer, other than skin

IS ALL BLOOD THE SAME?

No. There are four main types — O, A, B and AB, either positive or negative. O+ is the most common, AB- the rarest.

DOES THE BLOOD BANK REALLY "BANK" QUANTITIES OF BLOOD, KEEPING A SUPPLY FOR 6 MONTHS, A YEAR, OR LONGER?

No. Whole blood can only be kept for 21 days! That's the big problem . . . having enough donors on a regular basis to maintain an adequate supply.

Donating <u>after</u> an emergency doesn't guarantee anything because it takes time to process the blood.

It's normal to be scared at first, but look at it this way: If you needed blood to live, would you understand if no one gave for you?



Soil Conservation

SEnator George McGovern will make the keynote address at the 30th Annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America in San Antonio, on Monday, August 11.

Theme of the meeting, which runs from August 10-13 will be "Land Use: Food and Living."

The Senator is a long-time friend of the consevation interests and served as a special assistant to President John Kennedy and director of the food for peace program prior to his election to the Senate in 1962.

Other speakers during Monday's opening session include Mrs. Francine I.Neff, Treasurer of the United States; San Antonio Mayor Lila Cockrell; and Ms. Peggy Toben, San Antonio Conservation Society. Program Chairman Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Temple will preside.

More than a thousand professional conservationists from the United States, CAnada, and Mexico are expected to attend the four-day meeting, which begins Sunday, August 10, with registration and a reception.

The Society is a non-profit scientific and educational organization dedicated to advancing the Science and Art of Good Land Use. It has about 14,000 members throughout the world.

Official hosts for the San Antonio meeting are the members of the Society's Texas Council of Chapters.

Speakers at Tuesday's general session include: Dr. A.H.Hannah, Assistant Deputy Minister, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Ontario, CANADA; Dr. Gerald Thomas, President New Mexico State University, Las Cruces; and Mel Davis, administor, Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D.C.

At the general session on Wednesday, August 13, speakers will include Dr. Anson Bertrand, Dean of Agricultural Science, Texas Tech University, Lubbock, John White, regional administrator, Environmental Protection Agency, Dallas; and Dr. Kieth Arnold, director, Division of Natural Resources and Environment University of Texas, Austin.

Other speakers at a series of 10 concurrent technical sessions will donsider the land use implications of meeting domestic and foreign foods demand. They will also discuss the impacts expanded agricultural production will have on the nation's soil, waer, and other natural resources.

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
