

### LET'S KEEP OUR LIBRARY



This past week the CAVALRYMAN had heard the story that it may be necessary for the Kinney County Library to either close down or considerbly reduce hours of operation due to lack of funds.

This was confirmed by an interview with Mrs. W.H. Golemon.

One of the problems is that the Library no longer receives funds from the United Fund. The only source of income is the \$650.00 contribution by the County, approximately \$100.00 donations by the "Friends of the Library" and \$25.00 from fines.

Mrs. Golemon stated, "That she has worked for a number of years as a volunteer" and her help has been volunteer, also, except for a few part time helpers provided by the County.

The work on the Library, such as buildingbook shelves, has come from Volunteers, the only cost on any improvements has been the cost of the materials only.

"I have worked and built this Library for a number of years and I would now like to see it become an accredited State Library. Which means we must receive \$5,000. per year income, half of which must come from local Government agencies, this would allow us to have a full time, paid, Librarian."

"We have been working on an actual expense budget of less than \$10.00 per month, YET WE HAVE CONTINUOUSLY GROWN".

"We need a telephone and certainly air conditioning would not be an inconvenience. I am 78 years old, I have worked with the Library for years and will continue as long as I am able."

"We have been to the City and County for additional funds but I feel our real salvation are the people of Kinney County, particularly those who have school age children that have deeply appreciated our services.




### THE

So the price of groceries is high and you want to plant a garden, and besides fresh vegetables from the garden taste so much better. This all makes sense.

However, there are some things to remember. Time is short on some things. A very early fall is in the offing and most things must produce before frost. Unless tomato plants are almost to the bloom stage, forget it——they won't have time. Green beans may make it; if you're lucky you may get one good picking.

Radishes, if well watered have plenty of time. if you want corn, BUY IT, -- it's to late to grow it. Peppers of all kinds, if almost to bloom stage, may make a few--otherwise don't waste the effort. Turnips-you have worlds of time, head lettuce, mustard, cabbage, cauliflower, brussell sprouts, cllards, carrots---have a ball, you'll have good eating on these. Cucumbers, squash, pumpkin, okra, black-eyed peas, beets---depend on the grocery store--you'll never grow them this year. Prepare your soil well, fertilize good, follow instructions on seed packets, keep out the weeds, hoe after every water ing or rain and you'll have lots of good eating. If you have more than you need. I'll be glad to eat the surplus.



### COUNTY AGENT REPORT

Hedging agricultural production in the futures market is one marketing tool that is used by only a limited number ofproducers. According to County Extension Agent Carl Esser, a seminar to explain this concept has been scheduled in Uvalde at the Civic Center beginning at 9:00a.m. on September 9, 1975. Lunch will be served and the m-eting will adjourn at 4:00p.m. A registration fee will be charged to cover the meal and other costs, and anyone interested can contact County Extension Agent Esser at 563-2442 or write to STAR Program Drawer 1849, Uvalde, Texas, 78801

Topics to be covered include: Overview of the Future Markets, Contract Specifications and Requirements, Role of the Broker, Trading Techniques and Mechanics, and Hedging Techniques. Speakers include a representative from the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, connodity broker and economists from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

After Lunch, the group will split into sessions involving grain and livestock to get into the specifics of each commodity. Examples will be worked out and problems given to the participants. This will be a very informal session and should be valuable to all. Questions will be answered and each person will have a chance to actually work out a heging solution.

Registration may be limited to available facilitesa and Mr. Esser ncourages interested persons to register early. The cut-off for registrations is September 3, 1975. The Program is sponsored by the Agribusiness, Beef Cattle, and Field Crops Task Forces of the STAR (Southwest Texas Agricultural Resources) Program.

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
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
