YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

AUSTIN---State Rep. Luther Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Elections of the Texas House of Representatives, today announced the appointment of a special subcommittee to be chaired by State Rep. Susan McBee, Democrat of Del Rio.

Jones daid the subcommittee is to explore the possibilities of creating a single elections office in county government and of developing a "Population bracketed" election code which would set different requirements according to the population of a county.

He noted that several bills to create an elections office combining the duties now split between the countd clerk and the tax assessor-collector either into one of the two offices or into a new, separate office were considered by the 64th Legislature at its recent Regular Session. Several more were introduced during the 63rd Legislature in 1973.

"These bills have shown that there is a real interest in this idea," Jones said, "However, each of the bills took a different approach and none were based on a thorough study of the need for such a change, if such an office is to be created. Hopefully, the McBee Subcommittee can produce an answer to

the questions raised by those bills and guide the actions of the next legislature."

Jones said he was also looking forward to the Subcommittee's findings on the possibility of developing a "Population bracketed" election code.

"This would be a whole new concept which would recognize that the smaller counties just don't have the same problems and the same resources as the more urban areas, and as such, may be should not be asked to do the same things as the larger ones," he explained.

Jones noted that the 64th Legislature took one step toward recognizing the differences between the circumstances in the urban areas and the rural by passing H.B.784, by the Representative McBee which allows the smaller counties to establish smaller sized voting precincts than are authorized for the more populated counties. "This bill recognized the fact that the minimum precinct size the old law set for all counties no matter what their size, resulted in major inconveniences to the voters in the less populated areas because it made them travel many miles to vote where voters in the more urban areas had to go only a few blocks," Jones said. He said the McBee Subcommittee is to determine whether similar approches can be taken in dealing with subjects like voter registration and polling place requirements.

Other members of the Subcommittee named by Jones are State Representatives R.C. "Nick" Nichols, Democrat of Houston, Pike Powers, Democrat of Beaumont, James E. "Pete" Laney, Democrat of Hale Center, and Hamp Atkinson, Democrat of Texarkana.

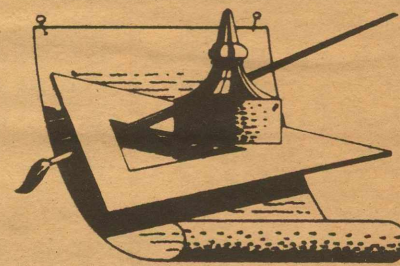
"Each member was chosen because of the special skills and insight they can bring to the study and to give the panel a balance between rural and urban interests," Jones said. For

example, he noted that Representative McBee represents the largest land area of any member of the House; Representative Nichol comes from the larges county in the state and has been a long-time advocate of creating a special election office; Rep. Powers represents an urban area where the idea of a single election office may be attractive; Rep. Laney comes for a rural district; and Rep. Atkinson's district is a combination of rural and urban areas where there may be interest in both concepts.

Representatives McBee and Atkinson are first-term legislators. Powers, Nichols, and Laney are veteren members of the House of Representatives.

Under the terms of Jones' announcement the subcommittee is to complete it's stude by early next summer and report back to the full Committee on Elections which will make the official report to the next Legislature.

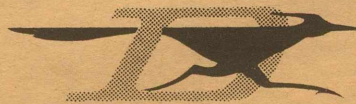

The couple plan to live in Brackettville where Mr. Peachee is employed by the City.

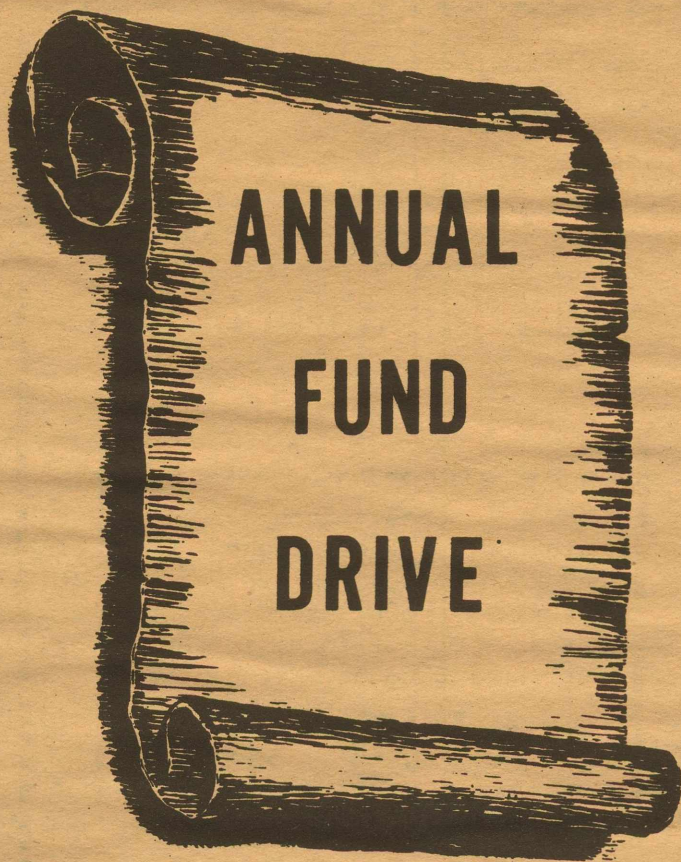
