

FARM TO MARKET AND FLOOD CONTROL FUND

Jim Faith, County Auditor, met with the Court and explained that the County should open a new account, Farm to Market and Flood Control Fund, to meet state requirements.

Commissioner G.C. Talamantez made a motion to open the new account and budget the tax rate as follows:

WINTER GARDEN AREA PECAN SHOW PLANNED

More than 200 entries of the finest pecans in the Winter Garden area are expected to compete for handsome prizes in the 6th annual Winter Garden Area Pecan Show on December 2 & 3rd in the City Hall in Hondo, according to Glenn Bragg, Medina County Extension Agent.

The Winter Garden Area Pecan Bake Show has been planned and organized by the Medina County Home Demonstration Council under the supervision of Gaye Bippert, Medina County Extension Agent, and Phyllis Muennink, Home Demonstration Council Chairman.

The Grand Champion Pecan will receive \$25.00 cash prize and the Reserve Champion will receive \$15.00, courtesy of McCrea Pecan Shelling Plant, Yancey, Texas.

Pecan Growers and Homemakers in Medina, Uvalde, Kinney, Kerr, Real, Edwards, Zavala, Dimmit, LaSalle, Frio, and Maverick counties are eligible to compete in the Pcan or Bake Show.

PECAN SHOW RULES

A Pecan entry must consist of 45 nuts produced by the grower in 1975. Each entry should be entered in the show by 10:00 a.m. December 2, and identified with the grower's name, and address and thepecan variety.

Growers are limited to one entry of each improved or papershell variety, and as many entries of native or seedling varieties as desired.

First and second place winners will be entered in the regional pecan show scheduled in San Antonio in December. A copy of the rules and regulations are available in the County Extension Office.

Central Power and Light Company of Uvalde is sponsoring handsome plaques, rosettes and ribbons which will be presented to the winning entries. ,

Clarence O. Würzbach of Rio Medina is chairman of the Medina County Pecan Sub-Committee staging the event. Other members include A.V.McCrea, Dan McCrea, Yancey; Father Victor Schmidtzinsky and Wayne Cheney, D'Hanis; Ervin Fry, Tony Zerr and George Koch, Hondo;

Yancey Russell, Matalia; John Leach, Devine; and Mrs. Carroll Keller, Rio Medina. PECAN BAKE SHOW RULES

All Food when entered becomes the property of the show. Place food on disposable dishes, cover with clear plastic wrap or plastic bag and place your name and food category and division on bottom of container. Wach entry must contain at least one cup of pecans.

REcipes of the entry must be in the County Extension Agent's office not later than November 21,1975. The Food Categories which may be entered include Cake, Pie, Cookies, Candy, Miscellaneous (cheese rolls, tarts, snack foods, etc.) and Breads (quick and yeast).

Their will be a senior division for adults and a junior division for those under 18 years of age.

Food entries are due at the Hondo City Hall in Hondo between 10:00 and 10:30 a.m. on December 3, 1975. Food will be exhibited in the City Hall at 3:00 p.m. on December 3, 1975. The presentation of Awards will be at 4:30 p.m. with the Bake SHow Sale immediately afterward.

Medina Agricultural Products, Incorporated, of Hondo will sponsor ribbons and cash prizes through third place, with the Grand Champion being presented \$50 and the Reserve \$25 and First Place Winners in all division



7th issue of the Cavalryman, entitled "There is no such thing as a free lunch."

It is certainly not the intention of this writer to write a critique on "LOOS-ISM", for it seems that "LOOS-ISM" is all too evident as being "rehearsed rather than researched" philosophical propraganda targeted towards selected (one?, all?) Kinney County elected officials (via journalistic means) who are and have been in compliance with a 1973 Congressional Mandate. (For more information research national legislation passed and

enacted in 1973.)
At the meeting of Kinney County Commissioner's Court on October 24th, the sentiments of the "less fortunate" were unanimanously considered, for Kinney County elected officials demonstrated their sensitivity, paramount knowledge and understanding of the socio-economic ills of a significant segment of people in Kinney County and the surrounding area.

Had the end result of the vote for the proposed Vocational Skills Training Center, to be based in Kinney County, been contrary to the much needed efforts conducive towards the up-mobility and well-being of their (elected officials) constituents in need, then "LOOS-ISM" would be the real Hallmark of Democracy, and perhaps also the solution to Kinney County Commissioners' Court endeavors

towards human betterment. "That there is no such thing as a free lunch!", by Jimini, you're right. In order for the migrants to participate in the vocational education program, they have to make a personal commitment to changing their lifestyle to go from what is known into what is unknown. There is a commitment to overcome fear of that unknown, because no matter how bad a situation is, if it is familiar, it is much easier to simply maintain the status quo than to make that leap from what is to what may be. Secondly, the commitment involves time, time to attend classes, and time to study. Time is the same element that puts bread into the mouths of the migrant and his/her family. Committing that time to be used for study instead of working in the fields or wherever work can be found is totally alien to the migrant's way of life. Is it so unfair, so undemocratic for the migrant to receive some form of commitment in return from the society in which he lives? \$2.10 an hour may seem a great deal of money to some who were never priviledged to receive pay for going to school to "better" themselves, as you so quaintly refer to it in your editorial. The object of the vocational training is not "betterment" of the individual, it is, more to the point, to provide an opportunity for those who wish to take it to learn skills which will make them employable on a permanent basis in permanent community; in short, to remove some of the tax-burden from those "good citizens" you are so worried about in the form of taxes that go to pay welfare to these same migrants who are currently unemployable because they lack the skills available to them through vocational training programs like the one approved by the County Commissioner's Court. As a taxpayer myself, I would much prefer to pay the tab to get a man or a woman onto their own feet in the job market and off my back as a welfare


You attempt to compare the monies received by Vietnam veterans for their educational assistance with that received by the migrants If you wish to make a comparison, at least take the time to make an accurate one. The veterans are eligible for \$270 per month for up to 36 months of schooling for a total of \$9,720. The migrants are eligible for a period not exceeding 6 months at \$336 per month for a total of \$2,016. Veterans have the same right to claim dependent deductions as the migrants, but few of them have 6 or 8 or 10 deductions to claim or to support for that matter.


Breaking the migrant cycle is not a simple matter by any means. It takes more than just providing an opportunity to learn skills. The migrant people have come to believe that "hard times" are part of their life. They have no conception of what it is like to be able to compete in a skilled market and do so successfully. The money they can earn by going to school not only assists them to take care of their families while they do something more long-range, it gives them a feeling of worth in terms of dollars that many have never experienced before. Hopefully, it will give them also the determination to complete their training and go on to become productive, competitive, contributive, tax-paying citizens like the rest of us, and my feeling is that this tax-payer personally and also on behalf of the Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs and the Texas Migrant Council, commends "Kinney County Commissioner's Court" for having the good sense and

humanity to support such a program.

SAGEBRUSH

It soon will be tree trimming time. When the trees drop their leaves it's good to carefully trim them. Certainly all dead wood should be removed. Any branches that are grwoing in such a way as to break the symmetry of the tree should be removed. If you want the tree to be tall and stately remove the lower branches.

Trimming a tree is like anything else---there is a right way and a wrong way. Never cut a limb and leave a stump sticking out. The limb should always be cut close to the very base of the limb. This not only looks better but it also gives less chance of the tree being permanently damaged. The exception to this rule is when you top a tree. Many times a tree that is not doing well cam be topped and it will put out new growth and make a much better tree.

When a limb is cut from the tree, the place where the tree is cut should be painted. This keeps moisture and insects from entering the cut and so prevents rot, disease, and insects from injuring the tree.


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
