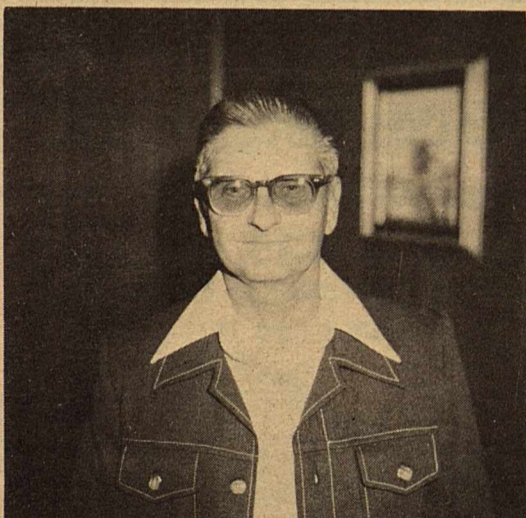
CAVALRYMAN: What is your opinion of our community?

GORDON LACKEY ELECTED DIRECTOR OF FIRST STATE BANK

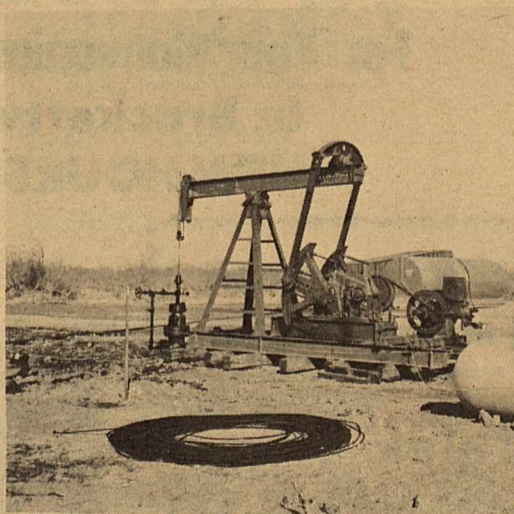


Gordon Lackey was elected as a director of the First State Bank at their last meeting, announced Bank President Albert Postell.

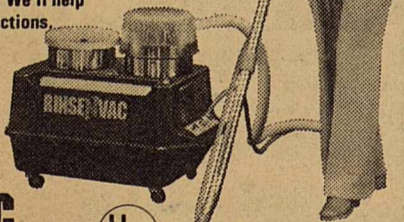

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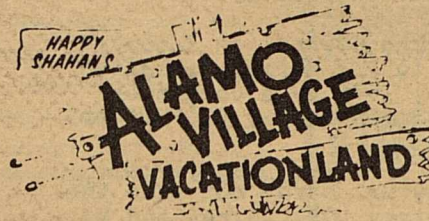

Dear Citizen:

To bring you up to date on the latest developments of the Central Power & Light proposed changeover.

As per the resolution passed by the Council on January 19, 1976, it was hand delivered to Mr. Hardy, executive director of CP & L on January 26, 1976 by a committee composed of Mayor Mendeke, Councilman Gomez, J. Fritter and Secretary Williams.

The committee was not only met by Mr. Hardy but also the President of the company, Mr. Autrey. Mr. Autrey and Mr. Hardy seemed genuinely concerned by the situation as it has developed here in Brackettville. Making note of the numerous letters they have had from concerned people, Mr. Autrey told the committee that they would review and give the matter another long look before any further moves were made, and that the City would be notified. They both assured us that we would not be without a service man, but did not specify his time.

One encouraging fact was brought to attention, that they were concerned with office space and that they would have to find another office if they decided to stay in the City.

The committee was impressed with the results of the meeting feeling that we had accomplished something with the help of all our citizens. Now it will be a period of waiting to see what their decision will be.

We have talked to our Attorney, Ralph Brown, since our conference and he was pleased with the results, saying that he hoped we could settle the matter without litigation as that would be a long drawn out affair and expensive.

We will keep you informed of any further developments, and again thank you for your help.

Dear Mr. Hardy:

I represent the City of Brackettville.

On January 19, 1976, I attended a City Council Meeting in Brackettville at which a resolution opposing your proposed removal of personnel, equipment, and facilities from the City of Brackettville was unanimously passed and approved by the City Council. I am sure that by now you have received a copy of this resolution, and have been made aware of the very serious problems which are certain to occur because of long interruptions in service occasioned by the distance service personnel will have to travel.

In addition to the practical considerations, however, there is a legal problem inherent in your proposed removal from the City of Brackettville that I feel should be brought to your attention; namely, your agreement dated July 12, 1960, which provides that "the service furnished hereunder to said City and its inhabitants shall be first class in all respects . . .". It appears that such service cannot be "first class" in the absence of personnel, equipment and facilities situated on site to provide such service. Additionally, there is an inherent discrimination in removing your facilities from the City of Brackettville and continuing to maintain such in other county seat cities and towns throughout South Texas.

I join with the City Council and others in strongly urging you to reconsider your decision. In the event you do not, I have been authorized by the City Council of Brackettville to seek appropriate relief in the District Court for Kinney County.

Please advise me of your decision within 5 days after receipt of this letter. Your favorable consideration will be appreciated.

Youth ages 14-19 will compete in the Senior Division while the Junior Divi- sion involves age 11-13 and Pre-Teen are 9-10 years of age.

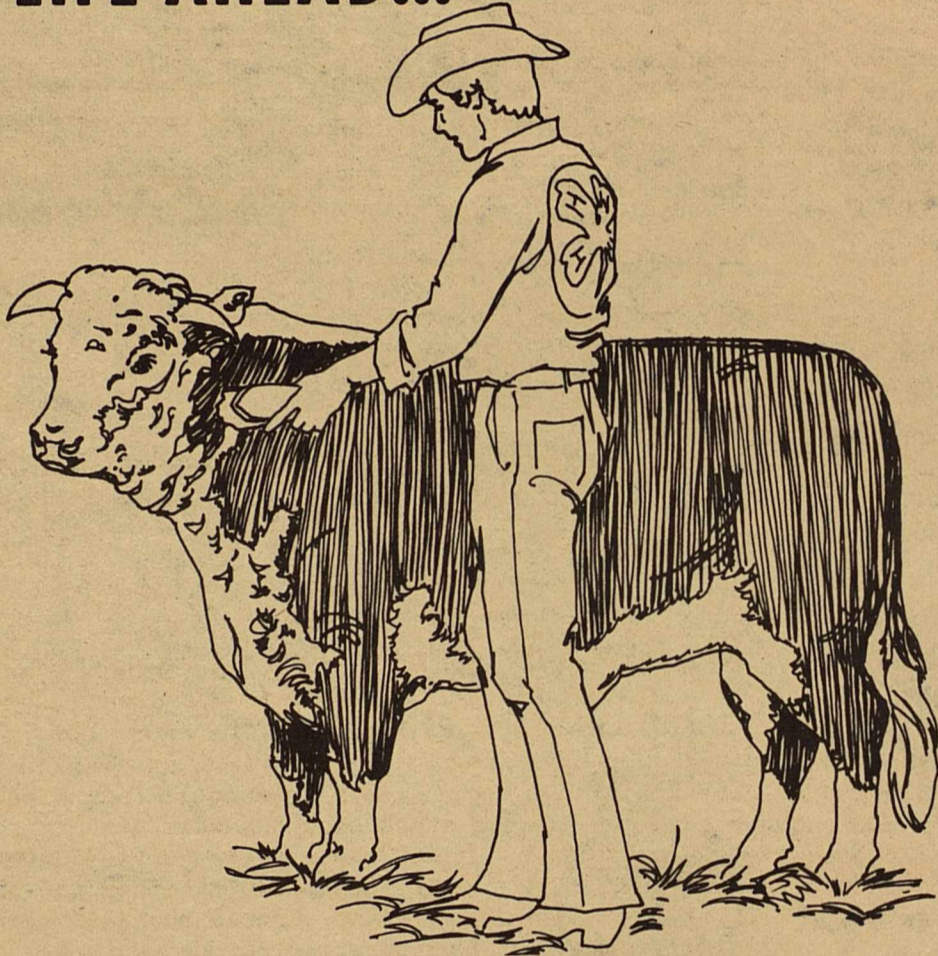

Kinney County 4-H Food Show is spon- sored by the Morrison Milling Company Inc. with Texas Agriculture Service and the Texas A&M University System.

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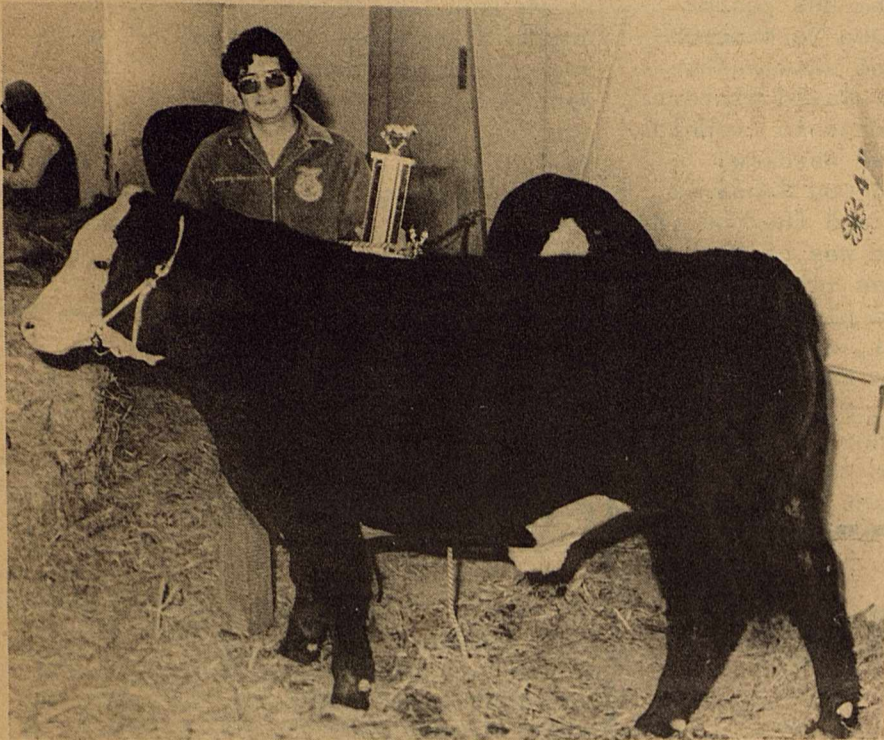

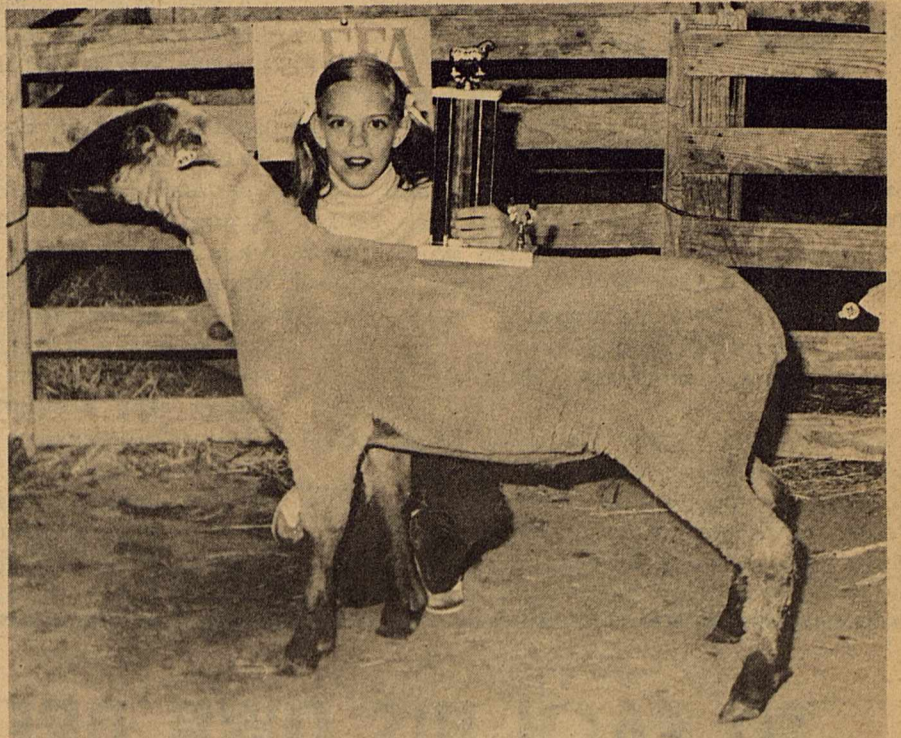

Rep. Susan Gurley McBee has announced that she has filed in the Democratic Primary for re-election to the position of State Representative District 70.

District 70 includes Brewster, Crockett, Edwards, Kinney, Maverick, Sutton, Terrell, Val Verde, and Zavala Counties.

"It has been a privilege and a pleasure to represent this area during the past year, and I look forward to doing so again," Mrs. McBee stated.

During her first legislative term, Mrs. McBee served on the Agriculture and Livestock Committee, the Elections Committee, and the prestigious Calendars Committee. She also represented the Texas House of Representatives at a meeting of the National Conference of State Legislatures in Washington, D.C.

CYSTIC FIBROSIS DRIVE

Mr. Chris Gomez has been named chairman of the Cystic Fibrosis Spring Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Chuck Laurent, President of the Lone Star Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Mr. Chris Gomez has been active in previous community activities such as; - Social Club, Red Cross and now the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. This Spring Mr. Gomez will lead local volunteers to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema".

Cystic Fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C/F patients are living longer and hoping for the future. This kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F. Through campaigns all over Texas the goals of education, research and patient care are reached.
