COUNTY NETS \$6000 ON POT CHARGES

District Attorney, Tully Shahan, announced Wednesday that the Kinney County Treasury was \$6000 richer over the guilty pleas of three admitted marijuana passers.

John W. Bloomer and W. Albert Getzwiller of Casa Grande, Arizona, and Leslie Eugene Mason of Chandler, Arizona plead guilty in County Court of Law for possession of over 2 oz., but less than 4 oz. of marijuana. Each were fined \$2000 Wednesday.

The trio were apprended by Highway Patrolman, "Buddy" Burgess on February 22nd.



Time has come for assessment and work on potted plants-especially those outside. Many plants in pots and hanging baskets outside are apparently dead from winters cold. Some of these, however, will come out with the coming of warm weather and with watering. They should be given a chance-they will make better plants generally than new ones started. The soil should be loosened in these planters and plants should be fed.

Many plants in various types of outside planters are simply dead and must be replaced. Now is the time to do this in most cases. The spring season generally is the best growing time of the year for these plants. It is cool, but not cold; it is warm generally but not hot; the humidity is generally higher. This combination is hard to beat. Get your plants off to a good start now, give them a chance to develop a good root system and get new growth well started. When the blazing heat of summer comes you will be glad you started early. Your plants will be better through the entire season. You get more for your time and energy spent now then any time in the year.

McBEE NAMED TO COMMITTEE

AUSTIN-----State Rep. Susan McBee of Del Rio has been named to the special House Committee studying drug abuse by Texas children by House Speaker Bill Clayton.

Rep. McBee replaces Rep. Billy Hall of Laredo as one of five House members on the committee. There are four lay members of the committee which is chaired by Rep. R. B. McAlister of Lubbock.

"I am delighted to have an opportunityto participate in this important study and I am optimistic that we will reach some positive and concrete results," Mx. McBee said.

Clayton instructed the committee to find out what can be done in classrooms to alert youngsters to the threat of drugs; find out how good ongoing programs for addicts are faring; and what might be done by law to dry up supply routes through Mexico.

Additionally, the committee is being given flexibility to explore new avenues in approaching the drug problem.

The committee is expected to hand Clayton a report by October with possible recommendations for the 65th Legislature.

"Rep. McBee will be an important member of the committee. She is a proven leader in the House and her ideas will greatly benefit the work of the committee," Clayton said.

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



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Watching Washington

In many cases, government purchasing practices that are intended to save money for taxpayers wind up costing them more. Sometimes, a lot more.

The practice of buying equipment and supplies from the lowest bidder, for example, has been long-established in government as the most effective way to eliminate favoritism and make sure taxpayers are getting the most out of their money.

But government bidding procedures lag behind modern business and management techniques. Too often, only the initial purchase price is taken into account with no consideration given to operating costs or maintenance. But operating costs—especially in a time of energy shortage—can add substantially to the price of equipment purchased by government.

For example, the General Services Administration recently compared prices on two different air-conditioners. One of them cost \$16 less than the other. But that would have been a false economy since the cheaper model cost \$64 more to operate over a 7-year period.

And, when buying for the Federal government—as the General Services Administration does—these dollar differences add up quickly.

As a result of its comparisons, the GSA decided to buy more expensive air conditioners. 27,000 of them. And it figures to save \$400,000 in the bargain.

Unfortunately, many government agencies still consider only the initial purchase price when calling for bids, with no thought given to the costs of operation.

This approach has long been considered sound business procedure, and it's time government made more use of it. Even with limited use in government this practice is paying rich dividends to taxpayers.

In one case, the GSA is buying some 8,000 hot water heaters that use 11 percent less energy than earlier models. They cost a bit more, but over the long-run they'll save an estimated \$300,000.

Another example is the recent purchase of 26,000 electric and gas ranges. They use energy much more efficiently than older models the government used to buy. During their lifetimes, these ranges will save \$780,000.

Considering operating and maintenance costs along with the initial purchase price is hardly a new idea to businessmen who have to keep a close eye on the balance sheet. But it has been used far too little by the Federal government.
