

AUSTIN, JUNE 1---Over sixty South Texas science students and teachers are learning about continuing fusion at the University of Texas at Austin.

While attending the 16th Annual Science Symosium, held June 1-4, the participants are also learning about the Texas Tokamak, a fusion research project located at the university. Those attending from South Texas are sponsored by Central Power and Light Company which, joined with nine other investor-owned electric companies in Texas, form the Texas Atomic Engery Research Foundation.

Dr. W.E.Drummond, a leading nuclear physicist, said here today that nuclear fusion, which is the joining together of light atoms to form heavier ones, may someday be the source of fuel for electric generation. Man's efforts to control fusion, responsible for the energy generation in the sun and stars, is becoming a reality, he said.

"High heat energy is released when light atoms are fused or combined, and this energy can hopefully become fuel for operating a conventional steam power plant," said Drawwoond.

"This is potentially more productive than nuclear fission, which derives energy from splitting heavier atoms."

Important to the energy issue is the fact that fusion would use heavy hydrogen atoms, known as deuterium, as a basic fuel. "Deuterium is a universal component of water, is cheap and virtually inexhaustible."

The 500 students and teachers attending the annual conference are assuming roles of nuclear scientists for almost a week. They are working on complicated math and physics problems, and will attend lectures and participate in basic nuclear research.

Two afternoons will be spent touring University science laboratories, including those where research projects sponsored by the foundation are being conducted in thermonuclear fusion reactions.

The syposium sessions not only consist of lectures by outstanding scientists from throughout the nation but also provide the students with an opportunity to obtain answers to questions about scientific careers and college curricula.

The students attending the conference were chosen by participating schools on the basis of Scholarship in Science.


You will note, that is states "in a newspaper published in Kinney County."

SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED






Miss Davis, a 1976 graduate of Brackett High School, will major in elementary education with a math specialization.

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

THE SAGEBRUSH by: JOE TOWNSEND

Web worms are in epedemic proportions now. You should check your trees carefully and if you see even the smallest web you should treat the tree immediately. If the web is in reach it is a good idea to cut off the end bearing the web and burn it. If you want to go first class you should spray the entire tree. It is good to mix some household ammonia with the spray mixture. This will markedly increase the effectiveness of the insecticide.

The tree should be saturated, limbs and both sides of the leaves. A good insecticide will leave a residue that will keep on killing for several days. One of the best is diazanon. This is sold by a number of companies under brand names. Spectracide is perhaps the better known and most widely used in this area. By all means follow the directions and warnings on the labels. They mean just what they say. These Insecticides are not to be treated lightly. They can be dangerous. As early as the worms are starting they can decinate the Trees of the area before frost. Protect your trees now and by all means don't be guilty of letting web worms spread from your trees to your neighbors.

KAZEN IN WASHINGTON

The arrival of June is annually marked in my office by increased mail from constituents planning family trips to Washington. The bicentennial celebration makes the nation's capitol even more of a magnet for travellers so I offer some suggestions.

Advance preparation are essential for housing reservations at hotels or motels, and should be made directly with the reservation managers. Indications are that the larger establishments anticipate heavydemand for rooms, but still can handle requests for July and August. Similarly, if constituents want my help on arranging White House tours, advance notice is essential. Tickets for these tours are limited, I shall do my best to make arrangements.

Tours of the Capitol building, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Pentagon can be arranged by my office. As usual, if visitors want admission to the House or Senate gallery to observe Congressional sessions, passes may be obtained from my office.

AIR MUSEUM OPENING

The several buildings of the Smithsonian institution provide a great variety of attractions, perhaps topped by the newest-the National Air and Space museum which opens July 4. The museum will have the Wright brothers' airplane, Charles Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis," John Glenn's space craft, an Apollo command module that landed on the moon, and even one of the rocks brought back from the moon. There'll be a wide variety of other displays of man's progress in flight and space tra-

The Kennedy Center, Supreme Court, Library of Congress and many other historic sites also welcome visitors, as does the National Zoo.

MONUMENTS INSPIRING

The famous monuments in and near Washington always delight and inspire visitors. The tourist can get a full view of the area from atop the Washington monument, and with the summer rush, preparations have been made for advance ticket sales (at 10 cents) for the elevator ride to the top.

The majestic Lincoln Memorial now has a new elevator for use by the handicapped and aged, as efforts increase to make historic sites available to persons hindered in their mobility. The Jefferson and Iwo Jima memorials, the grave of President Kennedy and the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington cemetary, and the new Lyndon B. Johnson grove and Theodore Roosevelt memorial, on Potomac River Islands are all nearby attractions.

PARKING IS A PROBLEM

Though the height of the tourist season is still ahead, I am compelled to warn visitors that parking is a constant problem in Washington. Many

people find it wise to forego use of their cars in the city, and to rely on tour bus transportation. One

attractive system provides a series of vehicles Following a prescribed route, with holders of daily tickets permitted to leave a bus at any stop and catch another later one after a sightseeing interval.

I should warn that highway police in the east generally enforce the 55 mile per hour speed limit, which leads me to another reminder as a footnote. Persons making quite different plans and intending to go to Mexico this summer are warned the drug laws are rigidly enforced. Experience has shown me that I can give sympathy but no help to a youngster arrested for transporting marijuana or hard drugs in Mexico or across the border. Those who suggest drug traffic as an easy way to finance a holiday trip are brutally misleading some young people who could face years in prison for their violations of Mexican Law.

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ADemocratic Night in TEXAS

A Salute to Robert S. Strauss June 17, 1976

The Texas Democratic Party's
"Salute to Bob Strauss," a June 17
political extravaganza in Houston,
is taking on national implications
as a preview of the Democratic
National Convention which follows
less than a month later in New York
City.

"The eyes of Texas and the entire nation will be on this tribute to Bob Strauss because of its timing just prior to the national convention and the fact that all major Democratic presidential contenders will be in Houston," said Texas Democratic Chairman Clavin R. Guest.

Jerry Brown, Jimmy Carter, Frank Church, Hubert Humphrey and Morris Udall have all accepted invitations to participate in the tribute to Strauss, the only Texan ever to serve as National Democratic Chairman.

"Each candidate's supporters seems to be trying to outdo the other in a last-minute show of strength, possibly aimed at influencing selection of the 32 additional delegates and 70 alternates to be named at the Texas Democratic Convention beginning the day after the Bob Strauss salute," said Guest.

"The national importance of this event increases daily," said salute, producer, Gordon R. Wynne, Jr. of Wills Point. " It will be the biggest national political event ever held in Texas and will be overshadowed in 1976 only by the National Convention which is just a short three weeks after the Salute."

"The National importnace of this event is reflected by ticket reservations we've received from Democratic leaders in 16 other states," said Wynne.

"We have received reservations from senators, governors, mayors, and business and labor leaders, including Sen. Wendall H. Ford of Kentucky; Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas, Rhode Island Governor Philip W. Noel, Gov. Wendell R. Anderson of Minnesota, Mayor Abraham Beame of New York, Mayor Kevin White of Boston, Mayor Henry Maier of Milwaukee, Henry Ford II, Edward Bennett Williams, New Mexico Gov. Jerry Apodaca, Don Anselmi, Wyoming Democratic Chairman, Don Fowler, President of the Democratic State Chairman's Association from South Carolina, and businessmen Ron Saypol, president of Lionel from New York, and Charles Ward, president of Ward Bus Company in Arkansas.

"Reponse continues to amaze me, said State Chairman Calvin R. Guest of Bryan. "If current trends continue, this will be the most financially successful single fundraising event ever sponsored by the Democratic Party of Texas. We've already raised over 100-thousand dollars and the figure grows daily."

The show will include many Hollywood celebrities and state and national leaders.

"Peter Duchin and his orchestra will provide music for the show which will be emceed by Hollywood star Lorne Greene," said Wynne.

"The list of persons attending will look like a who's who in Washington and Hollywood and the block-buster show will make full use of all this talent," said Wynne. We'll have a million dollar cast in a ten-million dollar facility."

Most of the Democratic National Convention staff will be present at the event, led by convention chairman Representative Lindy Boggs and Director Andrew Shea. Members of the Texas congressional delegation plan to fly on a special plane which will bring guests from Washinton.

The salute will be staged at
The Summit in Houston, a new multifacted sports and entertainment
arena.

Included in the show will be multi-media presentations on the statewide Democratic officeholders, taped and live entertainment, live broadcasting of interviews, speeches, and happenings and a special multi-media salute to Bob Strauss.

The Salute included a \$50 per person reception at 7:00 p.m., followed by the \$25 per person dinner and show at 8:00 p.m. Sponsor boxes are \$1000 per box or \$250 per seat. Tickets are available from Democratic county chairmen throughout.

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
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

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

Watching Washington

BENTSEN SEEKS THOUGH TERRORISM PENALTIES MOVE AGAINST TERRORISTS AND COUNTRIES THAT HARBOR THEM

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Senator Lloyd Bentsen thursday introduced bills to make acts of terrorism a Federal crime, with a mandatory death penalty when someone is killed, and to withhold foreign aid from countries that harbor terrorists.

"No form of lawlessness is more senseless or vicious that an act of violent terrorism: a bomb left in a luggage locker at an airline terminal to kill and maim indiscriminately, a building set on fire, a sniper's bullet," Bentsen said in Senate remarks.

Under one of the two bills introduced by Bentsen crimes of terrorist organizations -- such as kidnapping, sabctage, destruction of Federal property --- would be punishable by the normal sentence for the offense in question plus an additional twoto-ten year sentence. Two years additional would be the minimum with no possibility of probation or parole.

If the terrorists act results in someone's death the offense would carry a mandatory death sentence.

Under the second Bentsen antiterrorism bill the President is required to suspend foreign aid, loans and trade preferences to any country which wilfully aids and abets international terrorism.

" In spite of the fact that international terrorism has continued to grow, no legal solutions are in site. Many nations, particularly those in the The World, are unwilling to cooperate in efforts to combat terrorism which, they say, can be justified under certain circumstances, Bentsen said.

"SOurces report that almost half of those terrorists captured in the last five years have been released. The unwillingness of these nations o bring the full force of the law to bear against These international outlaws threatens the safety and peace of all nations."

Senator Bentsen said that 800 people have been killed, 1700 injured in international terrorist incidents since 1968. One hundred and fourteen U.S.Citizens have been involved, he said, 24 of them iklled.

"The time has come for laws that state clearly and decisively that violent crimes to further a political viewpoint will not be tolerated. We will not put up withmurder in the name of some higher cause. We will not allow violence under the guise of somehigher belief, Bentsen said.

"we cannot permit an individual or group of individuals to seek to impose their beliefs through the destruction of lives and/or property, without incurring the severe punishment that such conduct deserves," Bentsen




