





With all the rain it's about time to think of fall gardens. In our perticular area you can grow almost anything in the fall you can in the spring. Green beans, tomatoes, greens of various sorts, turnips all do very well indeed in a fall garden. A little later you would do well to plant cabbage, brussel sprouts, lettuce and the like. These do better in cooler or cold weather so you should have these all through the winter. If you plan to have a fall garden its about time to prepare your soil. Loosen it well, fertilize it and be ready. Most things for the fall garden can be planted soon. You should count on about 90 days for a harvest of vegetables. 

SAN ANTONIO-The number of cattle driven from Texas the present year is 311,390. Of these 190,580 have passed Fort Worth, 108,810 have passed Fort Griffin and 12,000 came up the Pecos. The number driven North is 259,530, the balance being held in Northern Texas.

AUSTIN-Company C of the Frontier Batallion overtook the raiding Indians of the head waters of the Colorado, a few days ago, and took from them a lot of horses stolen from the frontier. The savages subsequently recaptured the stolen stock. The casualties, if any, are not known.

SEGUIN-The convicts employed on the Pierce road are constantly escaping. The guards say they can not hold them; the country is so overgrown with brush that when they get outside of the roadway you can not see them. They say they have no doubt that an escaping prisoner would kill a man for a suit of clothes.

AUSTIN—The House Committee of Finance has reported the General Appropriations Bill. The total budgeted for the next fiscal year is \$1,202,032. Among the items included for the Executive Department are \$4,000 for the governor's salary and \$10,000 for recovering fugitives from justice. Protection of the frontier will be budgeted \$150,000 and \$20,000 is alloted for the purchase of arms and ammunition. The Lunatic Asylum is allocated \$40,460 and the Blind Asylum \$15,170 for operating expenses. An extra session if required will cost an additional \$25,000. more more more

1973 Rates Can't Cover CPL's 1976 Costs

We're making every effort to reduce expenses at Central Power and Light Company, but our costs continue to grow at a more rapid rate than our revenues. Virtually every aspect of our operation has been hit hard by inflation.


The last increase in our base rate, in 1973, added only about \$1.50 per month to the bill of the average customer. (Recent increases in your monthly bill have come from the fuel adjustment charge, which recovers the rising cost of the fuel needed to generate electricity.)

Meanwhile, CPL must spend considerably more than it did even a year ago for nearly all products and services necessary to provide you with reliable electric power.

- Although we have fewer employees on our payroll, salaries were 8.6% more in 1975 than in 1974.
- Taxes were up 13% in 1975.
- And during the same year operating expenses other than fuel, purchased power and salaries rose 9.9%.
- In contrast, the company's base revenues increased very little during 1975 — only 1.2%.

Inflated expenses, coupled with an out-of-date rate schedule, obviously are making our job much more difficult. If CPL is to continue a high standard of dependable service, we cannot go on absorbing these rising costs.




