Central Power and Light Company

Central Power and Light Company has announced plans to file applications for new electric rates later this month which will provide an increase of approximately 11 percent in the company's total operating revenues.

The rate request, only the second general increase in the company's 60-year history, is scheduled to be filed the week of August 23 with city commissions in the 104 South Texas cities served by CPL. New rates for CPL customers outside of the incorporated areas will go into effect the same week.

Copies of the new rates also will be filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, which assumes jurisdiction over electric rates outside of incorporated cities September 1. City Councils continue to serve as regulatory agencies for electric rates in incorporated areas.

CPL's last general rate change, which amounted to a six percent revenue increase went into effect in April, 1973.

CPL District Manager, Allen C. Wallace, said the rate increase was needed to offset rising prices for "Just about everything we use to make electricity." He said that CPL's rate of return has been dropping sharply for the past two years.

Although customer electric bills have risen substantially in the past few years, these increases have been the result of skyrocketing costs for natural gas. These costs are passed along to the customer through fuel adjustment clause in CPL rates.

The CPL spokesman noted that construction costs have increased rapidly since the company's last rate increase, and pointed out that the average interest rate the company pays to borrow money for new plants and equipment has more than doubled in the past few years.

CPL and other Texas utilities, which have traditionally used natural gas as power plant fuel, have ex-

tensive programs underway to build nuclear and coal-fired generating plants to produce electricity in the future.

The Texas Railroad Commission has ruled that utilities must reduce their natural gas use 10 percent by 1981 and 25 percent by 1985.

CPL's first coal-fired power plant is being built between Goliad and Victoria. It is scheduled to begin operation in 1980. The company also is one of four participants in the South Texas Project, which will begin producing electricity the same year.

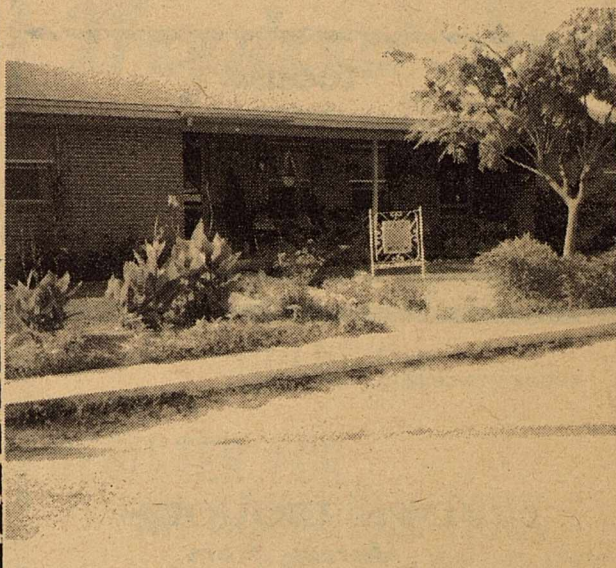
The rate request will be based on CPL operations for the one-year period ending June 30.

When the revised rates go into effect, CPL plans to show the amount of the fuel adjustment as a separate item in each customer's bill. Sales tax also will be shown separately.

The CPL District Manager said the new rate increase was needed to enable the company to continue to provide dependable electric service. He emphasized that the company has had a stringent cost reduction program underway for the past several years.

"We've done everything we can to reduce expenses, and we are still losing the battle against inflation," the CPL District Manager stated. He pointed out that in the past year and a half, CPL has cut its supply inventory by \$3 millions, and deferred or eliminated several major construction projects. He said the company is not replacing many employees who retire or resign, and now has 182 fewer employees that at the beginning of 1975.

Soil Conservation



PLAINS BRISTLEGRASS, A DEEP ROOTED PERENNIAL GRASS, PRODUCES ABUNDANT GROWTH WITH DEFERMENT FOLLOWING RAIN FALL.

A real opportunity exists for stockmen to stretch the benefits of recent rains in Southwest Texas. Livestock should be grouped where possible and graze a minimum number of pastures. This will also allow other pastures rest for range improvement and a buildup of forage reserve for grazing in winter months and dry periods.

The rains will stimulate the protein and mineral content of range forage above the normal for the late summer months. Grouping of livestock into fewer pastures will encourage grazing on opportunist type plants that make most of their production following rain. This will relieve the grazing load on the deeper rooted perennial plants in deferred pastures. The deep rooted perennial plants are the ones that have to carry the grazing load during dry and or stress periods.

The deferment of pastures is a necessary factor in seedling development and the resulting increase in a greater variety of the better rangeland plants. Research and ranchman's experience has shown that the nutrition and performance of both livestock and deer is greatly improved on range lands with a wide variety of native plants compared to ranges with only a limited variety of plants.

The type of deferment program or grazing system needed will naturally vary from ranch to ranch and with different types of rangeland and growing conditions, etc. Any grazing system should be based on the needs and objectives of the individual rancher, his grazing resources and livestock. The Soil Conservation Service is available to assist ranchers with their grazing systems, needs through out Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout Southwest Texas.
