# **Packing the Perfect Picnic**

From the first signs of summer through Labor Day and beyond, one of America's favorite pastimes is picnicking. Whether it's part of an outing for two or 200, a picnic can be a simple, perfect way to enjoy the outdoors during the warm weather.

No one is really quite sure just when and where the first picnic took place; however, most believe it derived from a European farmers' tradition of taking food into the fields to eat during work breaks. This "continental" picnic typically consisted of a loaf of bread, cheese and wine

While Americans have embraced this custom heartily, they have introduced their own elements into picnic fare over the years. Early additions to the menu included cold meats. smoked fish, tomatoes and fruits for dessert. Today, every food imaginable has found a place in the picnic basket. So although the classic continental picnic is still a favorite, it is not unusual to find chilled lobster. pasta salad or paté sharing space on the picnic blanket with cold-cut sandwiches. And that, in fact, may be the secret to the picnic's popularity. A picnic is one of the few things in life that can be whatever you want it to

Here are a few suggestions for simple but delicious additions to your next picnic basket



### **Davy Crockett**

August 17 marks the birth anniversary of Davy Crockett, legendary American frontiersman, politician and adventurer. Crockett was born in Hawkins County, Tenn., in 1786. He first made a name for himself fighting in the Creek War from 1813 to 1815, a U.S. victory over Creek Indians in Tennessee who were actually British allies.

Crockett was elected to the Tennessee legislature in 1821 and served for two terms. He then was elected to the U.S. Congress in 1827 and served two consecutive terms. He lost the election in 1831 but was elected to serve a final term in 1833.

Crockett perhaps is best known for his last contribution to his country. He was part of the American forces that perished on March 6, 1836, defending the Alamo. Iil

# ASCS NEWS BY Jerry Stone

#### EMERGENCY HAYING AND GRAZING

Borden County has been approved for emergency haying and grazing of ACR and CU for pay effective immediately. Interested producers must come to the county office to designate the acreage to be hayed or grazed and sign a register prior to any haying or grazing.

Producers need to keep the following provisions in mind:

 The emergency haying and grazing period begins immediately and ends December 31, 1990.
 Hay or grazing may be sold to anyone at any

price. 3. After haying or grazing, producers may plant another approved cover for haying or grazing.

4. Producers shall not:

a. Remove cover to the extent that the land is not adequately protected from wind and water erosion.

b. Harvest the approved cover for grain or seed.

c. Hay or graze land that has been irrigated this year.

This authority does not apply to land enrolled in CRP. ACP

Remember that we are operating ACP with a continuous signup period. When you recognize that you need ACP cost sharing that is when you need to file an application. The county committee each month reviews each request on file and if funds are available, will approve as many requests as possible. The August and September committee meetings will be devoted to obligating as much of the outstanding ACP funds as possible in this fiscal year.

#### MEASUREMENT SERVICE

Well, here it is the first of August, the skies have been cloudy for three weeks, and no slides have been flown for the county. The September 1 deadline to complete measurement service rapidly approaches. Were it not for the requests we completed on the ground, we would be in a worse predicament.

As soon as slides come, we will do everything possible to complete the requests by September 1. In the event we are unable to timely service the request, we will be forced into cancelling your request, refunding your measuring service fee and requiring you to certify your acreages by September 1.

### 1988 AND 1989 OVERPAYMENTS

A few 1988 and 1989 overpayments were made to producers due in large part to the restriction on producers receiving both deficiency and disaster payments on the same pound or bushel on the farm. These overpayments are due and payable on July 31, 1990. Notices have gone out and reminder letters every 30 days will continue until the overpayment is repaid. Thirty days will be allowed for the overpayment before interest accrues. After 30 days, interest of 9 percent will apply. If the repayment is not made within 90 days, an additional 3 percent interest will be added. A prompt payment will save you money and us a lot of paperwork.

## FAILED ACRES

Program crop acreages that fail due to natural causes must be treated properly to receive planting credit. Do not mechanically destroy failed program crop acres until the following has occurred:

- sal to ASCS, if applicable.
  2. File form ASCS-574 with ASCS after crop
- acreages have been reported.
- 3. ASCS will make a field visit to measure total acres of crop that failed and review insurance appraisal, if applicable.
- 4. ASCS will release the failed acres to producer for disposition.

A producer without crop insurance may request a crop appraisal on failed acres. ASCS wil appraise at the rate of \$25 for the first plot and \$5 for each additional plot. The only reason for an ASCS appraisal would be for disaster purposes in the event a disaster program is approved later. ACR MAINTENANCE

All ACR and CU for pay must be maintained until December 31, 1990. By maintained, we mean kept free of weeds and protected from wind and water erosion. If you planned to fall-seed your ACR, please notify the county office when these acres have been seeded.
