

Tower Construction Completed




THE TALLEST TOWER----- between

Texas Volunteer Week Proclaimed

Texas Volunteers will be recognized for their contributions to the growth of various state services during Texas Volunteer Week, September 19-25. The week-long commemoration is being sponsored by eighteen state agencies as a means of honoring Texans who volunteer to help in the delivery of services to the public through state government agencies.

In proclaiming Texas Volunteer Week, Governor Dolph Briscoe said, "I am proud to designate a special week to pay honor to the thousands of volunteers who give so much to

their state and its people.
They give not only of their
time and talents, but they give
our state services a special,
unique quality—the quality
of person to person caring and
attention.

"During Texas Volunteer Week, it is my hope that every Texan will learn of the year-round volunteer opportunities available to them through volunteer service with a state office," Governor Briscoe added.

"I am also very proud that for the first time in our state's long history, eighteen state agencies have joined in a cooperative project to recognize our state's most precious resource: the giving of one's time and talents to benefit another," Governor Briscoe concluded.

Texas Volunteer Week will be highlighted by a two-day volunteer workshop in Austin, September 21-22. The workshop is entitled "The Utilization of Volunteers for Maintaining and Enhancing the Quality of State Government" and will feature Dr. Eva Schindler-Rainman of Los Angeles, California. Dr. Schindler-Rainman is a wellknown volunteer trainer and advocate of volunteerism.

The public is expected to learn of the volunteer opportunities through the mass media of Texas. Newspaper articles, television public service announcements, and radio public service announcements will be the sources of reminders to the prospective volunteers that their services can be used.

RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCIÓN

ELECCION GENERAL DEL 2 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1976

NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)

Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.



The PTA will meet on the second (2nd) Tuesday of each month, except January.







STATE BAR OF TEXAS

Austin -- A State Bar of Texas-sponsored program which has placed nearly 300 ex-offenders in jobs around the state recently received special recognition from a statewide inmate group which is based at the Walls Unit of Huntsville State Prison.

The Inmate Welfare Club, a non-profit service organization of inmates, presented a plaque to the State Bar's Comprehensive Offender Manpower Program (COMP) in appreciation of COMP's "vital and valuable services performed...in their work with offenders and exoffenders in particular, and with the criminal justice field in general."

The plaque was presented during the IWC's annual awards banquet in Huntsville. COMP

staff members Albert "Race"
Sample, a former inmate of the
Texas Department of Corrections,
and Jim McNabb accepted the
award. They were joined at
the banquet by TDC Director
W.J. Estelle, Jr. and 350
quests.


Funded through the Governor's Criminal Justice Division, COMP is a federal grant program designed to expand employment opportunities of ex-offenders, thereby curtailing criminal recidivism.

COMP's ex-offender program activities include direct job placement services, efforts to modify employment restrictions, publication of a state= wide directory of services, numerous public information projects designed to promote the effectiveness of ex-offender employment in curtailing criminal recidivism, publication of the monthly newsletter (The Alternative) on community-based corrections, and technical assistance to local ex-offender programs throughout the State.

COMP technical assistance teams have worked with 32 such programs in Austin, Beaumont, Belton, Borger, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Edinburg, Fort Worth and Galveston.

Also, in Houston, Huntsville, Mineral Wells, Port Arthur, San Antonio, Tyler and Waco.

Staff members also have been regular contributors to the <u>Joint Endeavor</u>, a monthly magazine published by the Inmate Welfare Club for its members.

Watching Washington

Price Fixing-which results in a \$2 or \$3 item being sold for \$10 or \$20 or more—is illegal in this country, and has been

Years ago the American people made it known that they don't like the idea that a handful of companies which control the market in a given product can conspire together to force millions of people to pay more than a fair price for that

The problem is that our price fixing laws have never worked well. But that will change if a new anti-trust bill approved recently by the Senate is enacted into law.

This new bill puts some teeth in our anti-trust laws. Under it the Attorney General of Texas would be able to roll back prices that have been forced up by price fixing conspiracies. It is not

surprising that the law has the fullest support of Texas Attorney General John Hill.

Under existing law companies accused of price fixing can defend themselves by insisting that each individual consumer who may have been damaged appear as a witness. This would often mean millions of people and years in court, making most anti-trust suits impractical to try.

The new bill makes it much simpler to prove damages in an anti-trust lawsuit. The attorney general of a state would now be able to prove his case by using the books of the company involved to show how much of the product in question was sold in his state and at what price. Numerous witnesses would no longer be necessary.

According to the new bill, suits against price-fixing firms can be made for three times the amount of damages. Suits for triple damages are strong medicine for anti-trust violations, so artificial price fixing should become a thing of the past without further government control.

The case of the antibiotic Tetracycline is an example of how and scalled quail in the Concho anti-trust action can effectively force prices down. Over a Valley. ten-year period, as a result of lawsuits filed by the Justice Department and by the attorneys general of individual states, the price of Tetracycline was reduced from \$50 for 100 tablets to \$3 for 100 tablets.

Clearly the present anti-trust laws are difficult, if not imossible, to enforce. This new bill is needed to clear away he cobwebs and put the laws in order.







Prison Rodeo To Feature Singers

Huntsville -- Five of the nation's foremost country and western singing stars will share honors with convict riders at the 45th Annual Texas Prison Rodeo to be held here each Sunday in October. All events are scheduled in the prison's 26,000-seat stadium, which adjoins the Walls Unit of the Texas Department of Corrections. The rodeo gets underway at 2 p.m. and lasts two hours.

For the opening performance on Oct. 3, the featured attraction will be Faron Young, followed by Red Steagall on Oct. 10; Freddy Fender on Oct. 17; Tanya Tucker on Oct. 24, closing with Tom T. Hall on Oct. 31.

Termed the "wildest, roughest rodeo behind bars," this year's bicentennial event will include such hair-raising events as bull riding, saddle bronc and bareback bronc riding, the Mad Scramble, a wild horse race, "Hard Money" bulls, plus several events for convict cowgirls from the women's units of the prison.

Prior to the opening of the rodeo each Sunday, convict entertainers will perform in the arena on the midway, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Reserved seat tickets at \$4 and \$5 each may be obtained at Sear's Stores in Texas and at Foley's in Houston. Tickets may also be obtained by mail from Texas Prison Rodeo, Box 99, Huntsville, Texas 77340.

Net proceeds from ticket sales are earmarked for more than 21,000 inmates of the prison system for rehabilitative services.

Astronomer Predicts Space Colonies

UVALDE--- A noted astromer predicted here Monday that by the year 2000 human beings will move out into space colonies that will "multiple like mushrooms in the rain."

The director of the McDonald Observatory, Dr. Harlan J. Smith, told more than 300 persons in separate lecture sessions on the Southwest Texas Junior College campus that construction of long cylinder space colonies is scheduled to begin in about 25 to 30 years.

But the workhorse that will bring the space age to true reality, he said, is a space shuttle which will fly its first test mission in 1979. This airplane-like transport will proably provide weekly trips to far-off points in the universe "and by 1981 or 82 we will see space never lacking inhabitants."

"Some human beings will spend years in space colonies," said Dr. Smith, who heads the Unversity of Texas Department of Astronomy, "while others will spend just months. If the budget permits, we will have space shuttles once a

week, and our lives will resemble the movie 2001".

Dr. Smith stressed that the reality of millions and even billions of human beings living in space is not fictional material for Buck Rogers comic books but the "Hard and cold facts of the future."

As an astronomy instructor at Yale University is the 1950's, Dr. Smith predicted space travel to the moon before 1970. "All the scientific information we had pointed in that direction," he said, indicating that he expects to keep his accuracy record in predicting millions of human beings living in space.

It took four billion years of evolution to produce the human race, he said, but one touch of a nuclear war button by a world power could either destory the human race or set back its progress so drastically that tapping space resources may never be possible again.

"If we get over the next 10 to 100 years," Dr. Smith said, "we have the possiblity of infinite life by establishing space colonies.:

The University of Texas astronomer implied that space colonization may be the means of continuing the human race in the event of a nuclear power war on earth.

After the pressurized spheres are built, he siad, "It will be like living in a greenhouse with water, trees, ferns, plants, butterflies.....and any atmosphere we wish. We can and will have apartment houses, factories, and farms. One of the most marvelous games for our children will be strapping on wings and flying like birds.

"People will not be satisfied with small spheres. The will want something to support hundreds of thousands of people--perhaps a long cylinder 30 or 40 miles long and maybe five miles around. The time scale to start construction of these size colonies is around the year 2000."

Dr. Smith, who heads the twelfth largest observatory in the world, doubted the possibility of human beings living in large numbers on other planets in the solar system because of the extreme differences in atmosphere and temperature compared to life as we know it. He did expect, however, that many of these problems might be overcome

of these problems might be overcome on some planets such as Mars and groups of human beings may someday colonize these planets.

Dr. Smith cited space colonies as one alternative to the current energy shortage on Earth. By living in space spheres, people will have 10 to 12 times more energy available than on Earth because of sunlight will provide the necessary energy.
