

JUDGE UPHOLDS ANIMAL LAW

In an Oct. 15 hearing with city judge Victor Couture, Ray Smallwood agreed to move a number of sheep outside the city limits. The animals' being within city limits constituted a violation of a city ordinance which has stringent sanitation provisions.

Judge Couture gave Smallwood a ten day period to comply with the ordinance. The law stipulates that each animal must have at least 200 square feet of concrete or some other hard surface.

Smallwood expressed intentions to abide by the law, for the present by moving the animals out of Brackettville, and for the future by constructing proper pens that could earn approval from the local public health officer.



CHILD CARE HEARINGS SLATED

A public hearing regarding the administration of child care licensing procedures is to be held in San Antonio 9 a.m. on October 22 at the Fair Avenue Apartments, 1215 Fair Avenue. The hearing will be conducted by the Texas Department of Public Welfare for the purpose of gathering public comment on a proposed general licensing handbook.

The general licensing hand-book is a description of procedures to be used by Department of Public Welfare employees involved in day care licensing, agency and institutional licensing and the licensing of child care administrators. The hand-book details the operating procedures involved in the administration the sixteen sets of minimum standards for child care facilities and placement agencies.

A draft of the licensing handbook has been published in the Texas Register as proposed rules. The document is available through the Texas Register at a cost that is published with the notice. In addition, the Department of Public Welfare is making available selected

sections of the proposed handbook at no cost to persons who wish to comment on it. The handbook is divided into five sections; the introduction, day care licensing procedures, agency and institutional licensing procedures, the licensing appeal and institutional administrator's licensing.

Persons interested in receiving selected portions may write Ms. Anne Leatherman, Director of Standards and Policy, Licensing Division, Department of Public Welfare, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas 78701. Complete copies of the handbook, including proposed forms to be used in the licensing process will be available for review at each local day care licensing office, at the office of each institutional licensing representative, and in the office of the State Licensing Division.





TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS

It soon will be tree trimming time. All trees need to be trimmed from time to time. Mulberry trees especially need to be trimmed every year. After the trees have dropped all their leaves, you should wait two or three weeks, then trim them. Of course, all dead limbs should be removed. cut off any limbs that are necessary to give the free a good shape. It's almost impossible to trim a tree too much. In fact, sometimes the best thing you can do for the tree is cut off even the major limbs to within a few feet of the base of the individual limbs. Many a tree, half dead in appearance, can again be a healthy, beautiful tree when the new growth comes on. It is best not to leave a short stump of the limb removed. It is better to make a smooth, clean cut at the base removing all the limb possible. Never cut a limb in such a way it will fall or peel off part of the remaining stub. Every cut should be clean and smooth throughout the entire limb. Never make a cut parallel to the ground. Always slant it so water will run off. If cuts are properly made there is no necessity to paint the wound. It will heal over and seal itself. If cuts are not properly made, paint can sometimes seal the wound, thus, preventing water, insects, etc. from entering the tree or causing rot.


