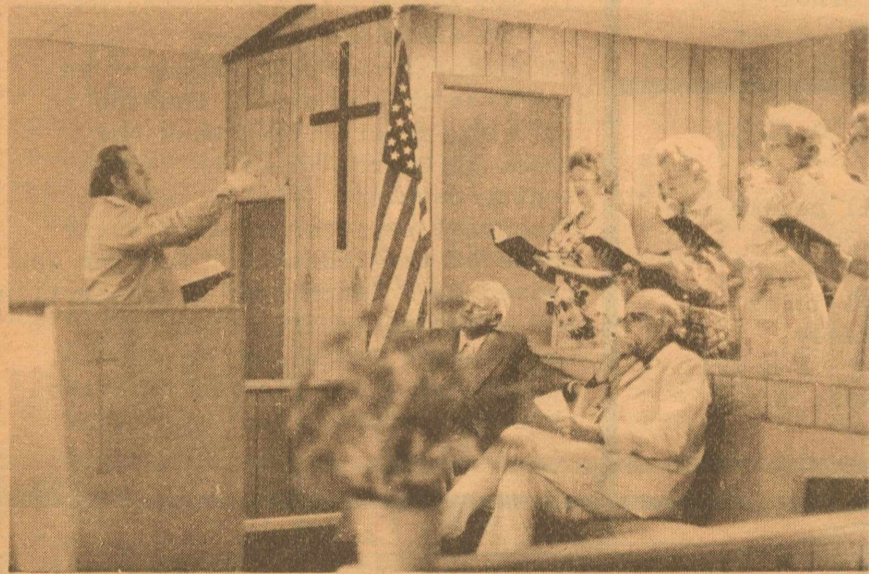

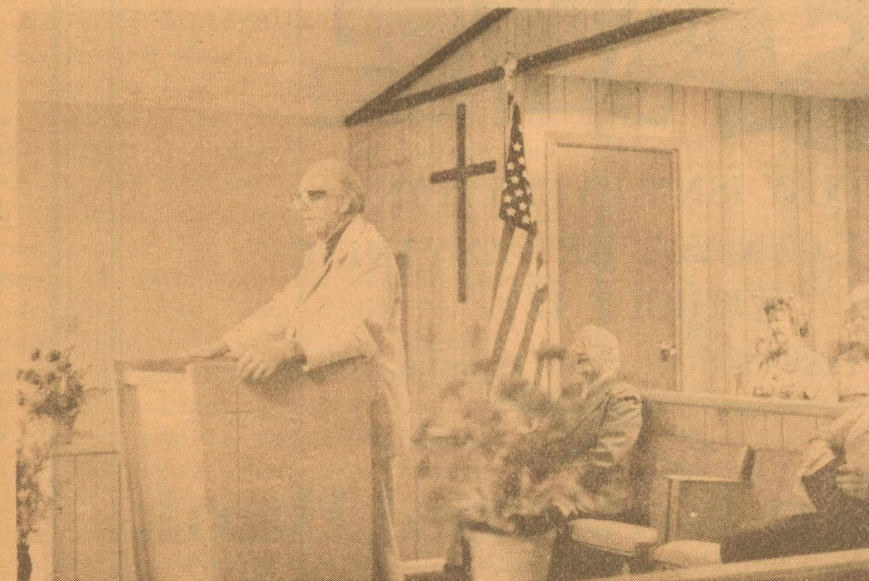
FRONTIER BAPTIST CHURCH DEDICATED

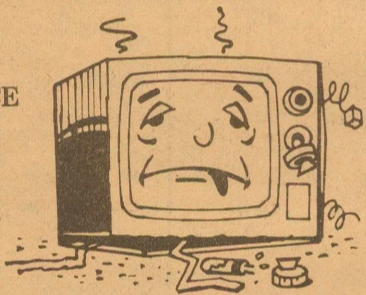

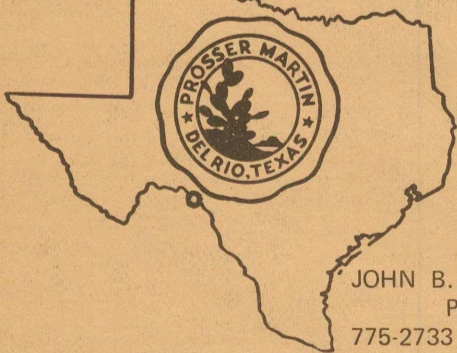

Reports Needed From Farmers, Ranchers

Some 75,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire during the period from mid-November to early January. This roundup survey of crop production and livestock numbers is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, work together to provide comprehensive information on Texas Agriculture.

Producers from each of the 254 counties in Texas are selected proportional to size of operation. The small producer sampled represents many others of comparable size while the very largest producers will represent only themselves. It is equally important for all farmers and ranchers receiving a questionnaire to complete and return it promptly. The individual report is confidential --available to no other government agency or anyone except the few persons required to process the data. The state and county estimates published are available for everyone at the same time.

County Agriculture Statistics Available

County statistics for 1975 and January 1, 1976, are available on Livestock, Poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P.O. Box 70, Austin 78767, or by writing John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin 78711.

Officers Elected For Conservation Association

District directors from Texas' 196 soil and water conservation districts elected Kenneth Kuykendall of Cherokee, Texas, president and Charles Wood of Lubbock, vice president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts at the thirty-sixth annual state meeting of district directors held recently in McAllen. Approximately 800 persons attended the meeting.

Kuykendall, a rancher, has served as director and alternate director of the state association for the past nine years. He has also served as a director and chairman of the San Saba-Brady Soil and Water Conservation District for 15 years. He is past president of the Hill Country Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts and was named as San Saba-Brady Soil and Water Conservation District's Outstanding Conservation Rancher in 1968.

Kuykendall helped organize and is a former vice-president of the San Saba Valley Resource,

Conservation and Development Project. He is also past president of the San Saba County Property Owners Association and a trustee of the Cherokee Home for Children.

Wood, a farmer and rancher, has been a Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District Director for 10 years and a board chairman for five years. He has served as secretary, vice-president and president of the South Plains Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Wood served as an alternate state association director for five years. He was also honored as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer for Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Other directors of the state association are David Tong, Atlanta; Gene Gilbreath, Dublin; and Bill Goldsberry, Edinburg. Dee Brune, immediate past president, also serves on the Board as an ex-officio member.

The purpose of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts is to

conduct educational, scientific, charitable and religious work concerning the conservation, maintenance, improvement, development and use of soil, water and renewable natural resources. Headquarters for the state association are located in Temple, Texas.

District directors of the West Nueces-Las Moras Soil and Water Conservation District who attended the state meeting are John Davis, Jr., Rocksprings; Nevill Smart, Jr., Rocksprings; and P.H. Coates, III, Brackettville.

She resided in Alpine for 20 years before moving in January 1976 to Del Rio.

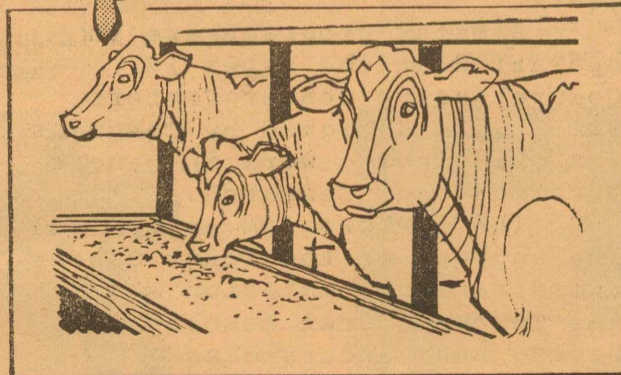

BY THE SKY PILOT

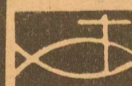

AUTO DEALERS TO DISCUSS STATE ROAD AID

San Antonio - A videotaped appearance by Gov. Dolph Briscoe and a discussion of a program on customer relations will highlight the Texas Automobile Dealers Association's annual workshop in San Antonio, November 9, according to Ted Mahone, past president.

Gov. Briscoe will present his proposals for increasing highway funding to allow for new construction and upgrading obsolete roads and bridges. Briscoe pointed out last August 4 that even though the economy of the state is tied directly to the highway system by agriculture, industry and tourism, there will be no state or federal funds available within 10 years for new construction or upgrading projects if steps are not taken immediately.

The one-day session will include discussions on the growing consumer costs and

confusion resulting from government regulation of the auto industry.

According to TADA executive vice president Gene Fondren, a major portion of a dealer's time is spent in explaining "the often contradictory, always expensive, requirements which have been imposed on every transaction."

Fondren said, "Customers are beginning to seriously question whether regulatory benefits justify the added cost," adding, "I foresee a growing rebellion against the assumption that people have too little sense to transact any business without the guiding hand of big brother --especially when it costs them money."

TADA AutoCAP (Automotive Consumer Action Panel) will unveil its new "let's Talk About It" campaign assisting customers in handling complaints.

Other speakers scheduled for the meeting are Bob Townsley, Director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation; Bob Brewer, MVD Chief of Titles; Phil Broosk, head of MVD's Internal Review Section; Jack Ridgway, TADA general manager; and David Sapp, the association's assistant general counsel.

Frank Gillespie, Jr., TADA Director, said that automobile dealers from 21 counties in the San Antonio area will attend the seminar, set to begin at 8:45 a.m. in the St. Anthony Hotel.

CANCER INFORMATION SERVICE AVAILABLE TO KINNEY CO.

A new "weapon" against cancer is now available in Kinney County to provide the public with current, factual information on cancer, its prevention and early detection.

Called the Cancer Information Service, the new program utilizes a toll-free phone line (1/800/392/2040) to answer public inquiries on cancer. The service will be extended to all residents of Texas by late this year.

The CIS is part of a public educational effort sponsored by the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute with assistance from the American Red Cross, American Cancer Society and many other health agencies in Texas which provide services to cancer patients and their families.

Funded by the National Cancer Institute, the CIS functions as part of a nationwide network.

Open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays, the phone lines are operated by trained American Red Cross volunteers. All background material used to answer questions is reviewed by physicians to insure accuracy.

The program is designed to help create a positive sense of awareness about cancer that will encourage the public to seek physician evaluation for early detection and prompt treatment of suspected cancers.

"Important diagnostic, treatment, rehabilitation and research developments are occurring more frequently now. If people could overcome their fear of cancer many more people

would seek medical help at an earlier stage--when the rate of successful treatment is much greater," said Dr. R. Lee Clark, president of M.D. Anderson.

In addition to answering questions on the telephone, the CIS staff mails many pamphlets published by health organizations, professional societies and government agencies involved in health education.

Information not readily available from existing files can be obtained by the staff from an advisory panel of over 75 clinicians and other qualified sources outside Houston.

"Because the CIS is based at M.D. Anderson and is part of a national communications network, we have easy access to information on important work done at many other cancer centers," explained Dr. Clark.

Similar programs are in operation at the other 18 Comprehensive Cancer Centers which were designed by Congress for outstanding work in cancer treatment and research.

The new program enjoys the support of the Texas Cancer Coordinating Commission and the Texas Medical Association, having been endorsed as a "worthwhile educational program" by TMA's committee on cancer.

Other public services of the program include a monthly news column "Cancer Answerline." Jointly sponsored with the American Cancer Society, the Column is run in many Texas newspapers to provide readers with current information on cancer.



HALLOWEEN BRINGS STORYBOOKS TO LIFE

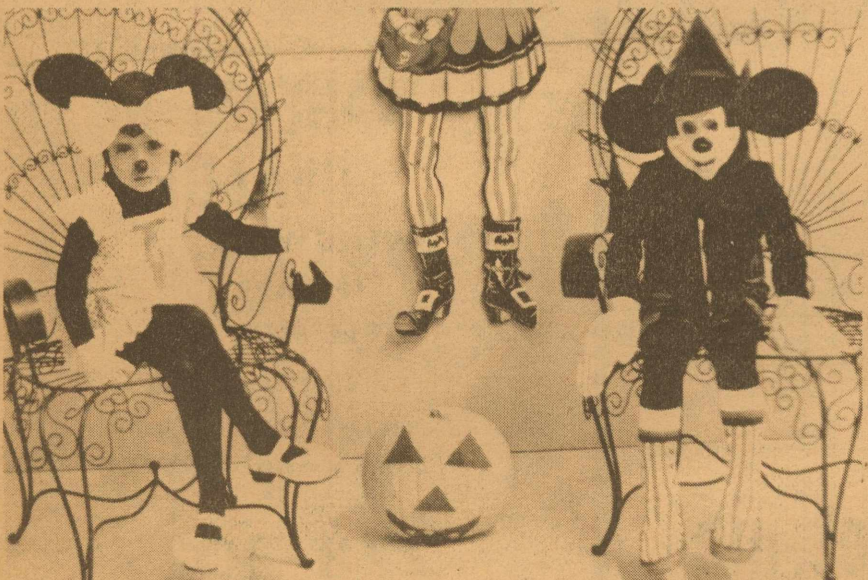

SWTJC

Uvalde - Construction of two new buildings totaling more than \$156,000 was approved here last week as the Southwest Texas Junior College Board of Trustees met in regular session October 21.

The board voted to construct a 10,000-square-foot annex to house the art and drama departments, faculty offices and general purpose classrooms. The annex will be connected to the Imogen Tate Fine Arts Center by a covered walkway and landscaped patio area.

With architecture similar to that of the Tate Center, the brick and stucco building will be constructed at an estimated cost of \$120,000 and financed by local funds derived principally from stock dividends and

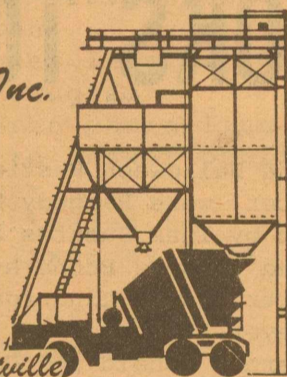

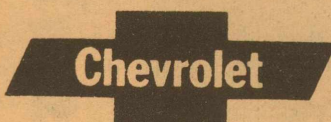

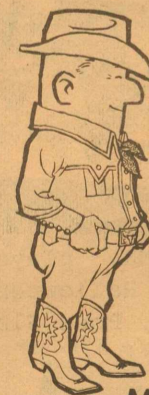

In addition, the board authorized continuation of construction efforts on the new farm machinery mechanics shop. The foundation for the new structure was laid last spring by students enrolled in the farm and ranch management program of the college as a class project.

Located next to the rodeo arena, the 6,000-square-foot shop will cost an estimated \$36,000 and will be financed in the same way as the new annex. Although the frame and roof of the new farm machinery building will be constructed by low-bidder Robert S. Henry Co. of Houston, the college maintenance department will complete both structures.

The board also heard a report from Owen Williams of the Zavala County Bank presenting a remodeling proposal previously approved by the bank directors. Since the college owns a majority of the bank stock, the trustees went on record as supporting remodeling of the bank up to a maximum of \$225,000.

In its final action of this session, the trustees approved the hiring of James H. Welch Jr. as assistant instructor in the aviation technology program of the college.
