founding of the United Nations in 1945. And, 45 years later, the U.N. appears to be ready to take a meaningful role in trying to correct the military invasion of Saddam Hussein.

President Bush was correct in his decision to act quickly in support of Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. I strongly endorse his actions, which are necessary not only to protect the integrity of our friends but to protect our world energy supply.
It is encouraging to see U.S. and Soviet officials jointly criticize the actions of Iraq. Even Castro's Cuba could not bring itself to vote against a condemnation resolution before the Security Council of the U.N.
It is interesting to note that the actions of Saddam Hussein may cause some Members of Congress to re-evaluate
their opposition to producing new sophisticated military aircraft to replace the deteriorating fleet of B-52 bombers that are no longer produced.

Over the past 200 years, our freedoms have been gained through the sacrifice of far too many lives. The tombs of the Unknown Soldiers and the Vietman Memorial starkly remind us of our need to stand reary to resist aggression against the free world wherever it occurs.

We cannot allow a cancer to develop on the face of the earth. If it is allowed to go unchecked, it can take our lives.

While our hearts will be with those who are on the front line in another part of the world, now is the time to excise the threat of Saddam Hussein.
One Hitler in the world was too many.

Board President Jack McPhaul called the meeting to order.
Community Input
No visitors were present at the regular board meeting.
Minutes
Minutes of the August 6, 1990 and August 17, 1990 board meeting were read. A motion was made by Kenny Hensley and seconded by Joel Dennis to accept the minutes. Motion carried unanimously.

School Car
No bids were received on the school car. A motion was made by Kenny Hensley and seconded by Randy Adcock to check into the possibility of having a dealership sell the car for the school district. Motion carried unanimously.

Milk Bid
Superintendent Thomas read the milk bid from Gandy's Dairy of San Angelo, Texas. A motion was made by Scott Clayton and seconded by Jon Monger to accept the milk bid from Gandy's for the 1990-1991 school year.

Motion carried unanimously.
Bills
Bills for August were reviewed for payment. A motion was made by Tom Ed Vestal and seconded by Jon Mongenninto approve the bills. Motion carried unanimously.

Accreditation Report
The official 1989-1990 accreditation report was presented by Superintendent Thomas. The two items to be corrected were addressed and the procedures for corrections were presented to the Board.

Internal Revenue Service - Section 125
Superintendent Thomas explained the Internal Revenue Service - Section 125 Benefit Program to the Board. Randy Adcock made a motion to allow Superintendent Thomas to present the program to the staff and allow participation in this program on a voluntary basis. The motion was seconded by Tom Ed Vestal. How Air Bags Work.


Under normal drving conditions, the air bag is uninflated and packed like a parachute inside the steering wheel hub. When a frontal or near-frontal collision occeurs at speeds of approximately $8-12$ mickes per hour or more, crash sensors trigger the inflator module, causing
chemicals sealed inside the module to undergo a reaction and inflate the bag. This cushion splits open the cover of the wheel and protects the driver. The entire inflation sequence takes place in less than $1 / 10$ of a second. After inflation, the air bag automatically begins to deflate in less than one second.

Annual Sheep And Goat Field Day Honors Kelton

SAN ANGELO--The Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center's Sheep and Goat Field Day September 6 here is being dedicated to Elmer Kelton, noted western author and West Texas journalist.

The annual event begins with a 45 minute registration period starting at 9:00 a.m. at the Center located eight miles north of San Angelo on U.S. Highway 87. Coffee and donuts served during registration are provided by Tom Green National Bank.

The morning program will consist of outside tours under the direction of Dr. George Ahlschwede, San Angelobased Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist. The tour stops and speakers will include: "Potential Contributions of the Australian Merino Breed to Sheep Production in the U.S.", San Angelo-based Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (taes) Animal Science Professor, Dr. Maurice Shelton; "Effects of Supplemental Feeds on Weaned Angora Kids on Rangeland", Dr. Ed Huston, taes Animal and Range Science and Dr. Chris Lupton, Wool and Mohair Lab Superintendent, San Angelo and Dr. Charles (Butch) Taylor, Sonor Research Station Superintendent.
Also, "Treatment of Individual Mesquite with Herbicides", Dr. Jake Landers, San Angleo-based Extension Range Specialist; "Reducing 'Pearmouth' and Other Health Problems in Sheep Caused by Prickly Pear", Dr. Darrell Ueckert, Professor of Range Science, TAES San Angelo; and "Safe Use of Cotton ByProducts as Feed

Ingredients", Dr. Millard Calhoun, taes Professor of Animal. Science, San Angelo.

A catered lunch will be served on the Center's grounds following the morning tour. Ample time will be provided during the noon break for participants to view the many commercial exhibits set up on the grounds.
