


ALL SPORTS BANQUET





If you have plants, you should inspect them carefully and often. At this time many insects thrive. Just a casual glance at plants may not reveal them. The most prominent one now is a small creature that looks like a minute light green watermelon. They are prolific and multitudinous. They will cover a plant, Usually they begin at the center or heart of the plant and will cover the stems, trunk and leaves. As soon as noted they should be sprayed with an effective insectide. There is no better spray available across the counter than Diazanon. It is marketed under many brand names. In this area the most popular one is Spectracide. It can be bought in liquid condensed form, diluted as per instruction on the container and sprayed with any household sprayer. It is available also in aerosol containers. Don't hesitate to use the aerosol sprays any time.

CP&L NEWS

Customer bills from Central Power and Light Company which begin going out this week will reflect the changes required by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

CPL Manager Jerry Simpton said "the rates ordered by the commission were the first to be reviewed by the PUC and reflect a change in CPL's rates. Customers are first billed on the basic cost of service, then a level charge per kilowat hour for energy usage. Also for the first time the fuel cost factor

will be set out as a separate item. The basic charge for service inside

smaller towns and in rural areas is \$5.35 which includes the first 50 kilowatt hours. Additional usage is billed at the level charge of 2.29 cents per kilowatt hour. Customers inside the city limits of larger towns and cities will be charged \$4.35 for the first 50 kilowatt hours. Other charges are the same for all residential customers.

Added to the basic charge will be the fuel adjustment representating the cost of fuel used to generate those kilowatt hours. Bills will also show sales taxes.

Simpton said that a customer inside the city limits using 500 KWH (kilowatt hours) would pay \$26.23 including fuel and taxes, or \$49.08 for 100 KWH. He noted that the amount would vary from month to month due to fuel cost differences. Other changes include a \$5.00

(formerly \$2.50) customer account fee which will be charged for each new account when service is connected at the customer's request, and a \$4.00 return check fee accessed for checks that have been returned from the bank and redeemed by the company.

The commission required rates to be "Cost Effective," saying "That the Commission is sensitive to the need to move all rates in the direction of costs, but is also aware that such movement should not be so abrupt as to place undue hardship on any one class of rate payers, therefore, the Commission is adopting a modified version of the rate structures proposed by the company and the Commission Staff."

Out of the \$36.7 million requested by the company the Utility Commission found that CPL needed \$23.4 million in new revenue to maintain standards of service and be financially sound.



District Extension Agents Doyle Moore and Gloria Schwarzlose will preside over the day's activities which will conclude with a question and answer panel.

2 tblsp. butter or margarine ½ cup finely chopped onion ½ cup finely chopped celery ½ cup chopped pared carrots ¼ cup snipped parsley ½ tsp. crushed dried rosemary 1 can (16-oz.) whole tomatoes, drained (reserve liquid) 2 cups dry white wine 1 bottle (8-oz.) clam juice 1 tsp. salt 3 tblsp. flour 3 tblsp. softened butter or margarine 8 ozs. flounder or ocean perch 8 ozs. pike or rainbow trout 8 ozs. haddock or halibut 8 ozs. minced clams (opt.) ½ cup light cream

a) Heat first 6 ingredients in saucepan to boiling; cover. Boil until vegetables are tender, 10-12 minutes. Drain vegetables, reserving 2 cups broth.

b) Melt butter in Dutch oven; stir in flour. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is smooth and bubbly. Remove from heat. Stir in milk and reserved broth. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Cut cod into ½-inch pieces, stir into mixture. Add dill. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer uncovered until fish flakes easily with fork, about 8 minutes.

c) Stir cucumber, lemon juice, paprika and vegetables into chowder. Heat until hot. Garnish with egg slices. (Makes eight ¾-cup servings).

YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS:

Senator Bill Patman said today he found it "very strange" that the "number one, star witness for SB 615 at the Senate hearing last Monday was not a representative of the finance companies who have the biggest interest in this bill and should be proving their own case. Instead, he was, by his own admission, a big time banker whose giant bank holding company--First International Bankshares, Inc, of Dallas-has 7.2 billion dollars in assets, but does less than 5% of its total business in the field of consumer loans."

Patman said "it is hard to understand the connection, although I have recently discovered that two of Mr. Presley's fellow Directors of the First National Bank of Dallas are also on the Board of Directors of Associates Corporation of North America. ACNA, of course, is the big finance company in Dallas whose president persuaded Senator Adams to sponsor SB 615. Perhaps Mr. Presley was speaking for these friend.

"Or perhaps Mr. Presley was thinking of those banks like his which issue <u>Bank</u>-Americard and/or Master <u>Charg</u>e cards. Present rate charges on these credit cards sould be raised, if SB 615 passes--and not just charges on <u>loans</u> made against these cards, but also on regular monthly payments that are late.

"The gut issue regarding SB 615," Patman continued, "is whether the finance companies and others who will benefit from this bill can show a real justification for the high increases they are asking. So far, they have given us not one shred of evidence that this heavy added burden on the Texas consumer is really needed.

"In fact, the only concrete evidence we have heard -evidence presented last Monday by my witness against the bill-proves that at least one huge national company that does business in Texas, Dial Finance, is doing extremely well at present rates."

Patman's witness at the Monday hearing was Mark Leymaster of Boston, Massachusetts, an attorney for the National Consumer Law Center, Ince. Leymaster produced records form an exhibit that Dial Finance Companu submitted at a rate hearing last year in Massachusetts. At that time, Dial maintained that Texas was the 11th most profitable state of the 35 in which it does business. Dial's exhibit revealed a 17% profit on its equity during its Texas operations in 1975.

"If these big out-of-state loan companies are sincere in their claim that they need higher rates to stay in business, let them open their books fully and give us all the facts about their operations in Texas. Then, and only then, can we decide realistically whether we must, as they insist, tighten the financial thumbscrews on the people of Texas."

"This strongly suggests," said Patman, "that other finance companies with efficient management in Texas are probably doing well, too. Sixteen of these national conglomerates do 85% of the small loan Business in Texas.

The fuel charge you have been paying is now shown as a separate

item on your bill from CPL. The money from this charge is used for only one purpose — to pay for the fuels needed to produce your electricity. None of this money is used for profits or for any other expenses.

Your bill will be similar to the one shown here with base rate and fuel cost charges included among the separately listed items. We've prepared a line-by-line guide that should make these items clear:

LINE ONE — is the base rate portion of the monthly bill. The sample bill shows: Rate 11 (a residential rate); the previous meter reading of 6974, and the latest meter reading of 7974, the KWH (kilowatt hours) used (7974, less 6974), for total KWH use of 1000, and the amount of this portion of the bill.

LINE TWO — shows the fuel cost you have been paying as part of your old total bill, but which is now broken out separately. Your fuel charge is based on the total kilowatt hours you use each month. The eight-digit number shown to the right of the word FUEL is the fuel cost factor. It is determined by dividing the amount of money CPL spent for fuel by the kilowatt hours the company sold. This fuel cost factor is then multiplied by the number of kilowatt hours used by you, the individual customer.

LINE THREE — is PREVIOUS FUEL. Because of the time lag between the date CPL bills you, and the date our fuel suppliers bill us each month, we have to estimate a small part of the fuel expense. The PREVIOUS FUEL line allows us to make an adjustment as needed — either lower, or higher — to adjust the previous month's fuel cost estimate to actual cost.

LINE FOUR — shows the amount of SALES TAX. This tax is collected for, and remitted to the State of Texas.

LINE FIVE — indicates the due date and total amount you owe.





WILDLIFE GRASS PLANTING


Improved grasses have made a major impact on increasing the quality and quantity of forage produced in Southwest Texas. The spring planting season offers stockmen an opportunity for increasing the acreage of these profit stretching plants.

Kleingrass, one of the more popular grasses for livestock, can also be managed to increase food and cover for wildlife. Kleingrass produces a slick seed and is preferred food for quail and dove and many non-game bird species.

A dove hunter last fall bagged his limit of dove in a sunflower field about 1/4 of a mile from a Kleingrass planting. Kleingrass seed was the major constituent in the crop of all birds taken.

To achieve maximum production from Kleingrass for both livestock and wildlife, pastures should be deferred from livestock grazing following planting until Kleingrass is well established and has produced a seed crop. Following Kleingrass establishment, by grazing no

more than one-half of the annual

soil adaptations, seeding dates, rates and methods on all types of range and pasture planting is available from the Soil Conservation Service.




