## LONGHORNS

J.T. "Happy" Shahan, longtime rancher and owner of Alamo Village, had the Grand Champion Bull, Alamo Dandy, TLBBA #1058 at the Fourth Annual South Texas TEXAS LONGHORN SALE on the YO Ranch in Mountain Home, Texas. Shahan also had a reserve champion cow and calf pair, Miss Shahan 170, TLBBA #6463 and the six entries in the Texas Longhorn sale bred and raised by Shahan averaged \$1,158.00. New owner of Alamo Dandy is Gary Green of Ft. Stockton, Texas and the reserve champion cow and calf pair is owned by Herman Bennett of Brownwood, Tx. Quote, Charles Schreiner, IV, of host YO Ranch: "It was great. Three new Longhorn world records were set." When asked what was the funniest thing that happened at the sale, he commented "The guy that bought the Grand Champion Steer, John R. Blocher of Houston, is on the Board of Regents of Texas A&M...and the proceeds of the Grand Champion Steer went to the University of Texas Ex-Students Association!"

Happy Shahan will, next year, be celebrating 20 years in the breeding and raising of Texas Longhorns. His longhorn herd began in 1958 with 102 head as a result of movie companies needing this particular breed when filming at Happy's movie location on the Shahan Angus Ranch. He has since steadily added to his herd by pur-

chasing cattle from registered breeders and of course, breeding from his own cattle. In 1976 his herd numbered 562, but since then has sold some, and now his herd is approximately 450 head. The longest set of horns he has seen is a pair measuring 9 feet 1 inch, which is mounted and on display at Alamo Village. Many of his current herd have horns measuring over 60 inches. Happy has donated longhorns to Texas A&I University, Sul Ross University, and West Texas Boys Ranch for their research programs; he has also offered cattle to Texas A&M and Texas Tech. when their programs of this nature begin. One of Shahan's longhorns was shipped to Ohio in 1975 as an exhibit. Shahan began ranching in 1939 and continued the breeding of Black Angus cattle as is traditional on the ranch, now making 62 years of continuous breeding. Happy is Vice President and Director of the Texas Longhorn Breeders Association of America, and is a past president of the Texas Angus Association. In 1973 he was elected to the Agricultural Department Hall of Fame, S.W. Texas State University, and is listed in Who's Who in Texas, 1974. In addition to ranching, Happy is quite active in the entertainment industry, developing, training, and promoting such talent as RCA recording artist, DOTTSY.

### KINNEY COUNTY 4-H CLUB HOLDS ANNUAL HORSE SHOW

The thundering beat of hooves and the sound of creaking leather announced the annual Kinney County 4-H Horse Show which was held in the local rodeo arena in Brackettville on June 5. Under a bright Texas sun twenty-three eager young 4-H horse participants competed for honors and were judged in halter, western pleasure, pole bending, barrel and reining.

Judging the various events was Rusty Jones, former county agent at Kendall County. Serving as ring stewardess was 4-H leader Mrs. Neely McCarty. Time keepers and recorders included 4-H leaders Mrs. Bob Latham, Mrs. Hadley Wardlaw, Mrs. Charles Causey and Mrs. Neely McCarty. Selling refreshments during the horse show was Mrs. Jim Voss. Mr. Bob Latham, Mr. Jim Voss and Mr. George Lopez 4-H leaders all helped in the arena with the setting up of equipment and keeping the show running smooth.

We owe a great big "Thank You" to these good people who gave so generously of their time and talent to aid and assist us with our show said Kinney County Agent Carl Esser.

Competition was stiff as the young people put their mounts through their paces and it was evident by their performance that they had spent much time in the saddle. The 4-H equestrians were judged on a point system with the top honor, the overall high point trophy going to Lashawn Wardlaw, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hadley Wardlaw, after accumulating a grand total of 37 points. Lashawn riding her gelding Frankie Fly place fifth in western pleasure class, sixth in barrel racing, first in the pole bending and was chosen as exhibiting the grand champion gelding of the show.

First runner-up with a total of 36 points was Doug McCarty, son of Mr. and Mrs. Neely McCarty. Doug showed twenty-two which placed second in the grade gelding class, first in western pleasure, first in reining and third in pole bending.

There is no way that a few miles of roses, or bouganvillaea, or oleander, or any other plants will put a dent in the cost of a foot of highway that men have been working on for years.

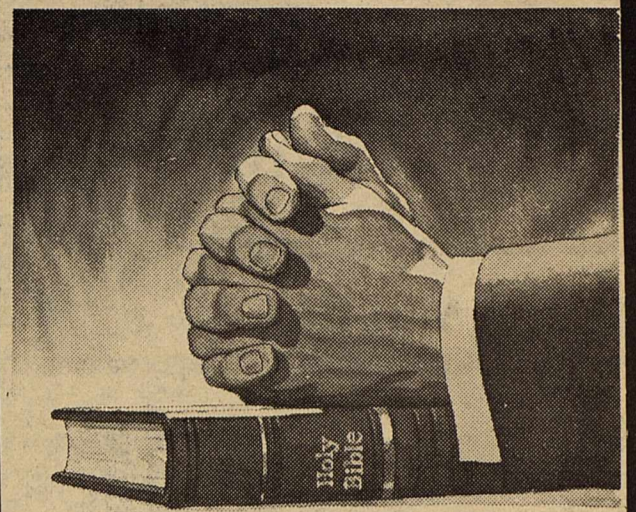
I am for giving a woman credit--not the blame--for beautifying America's highways. The men, if they choose to do so, may take the blame for the potholes.

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## CB BREAK

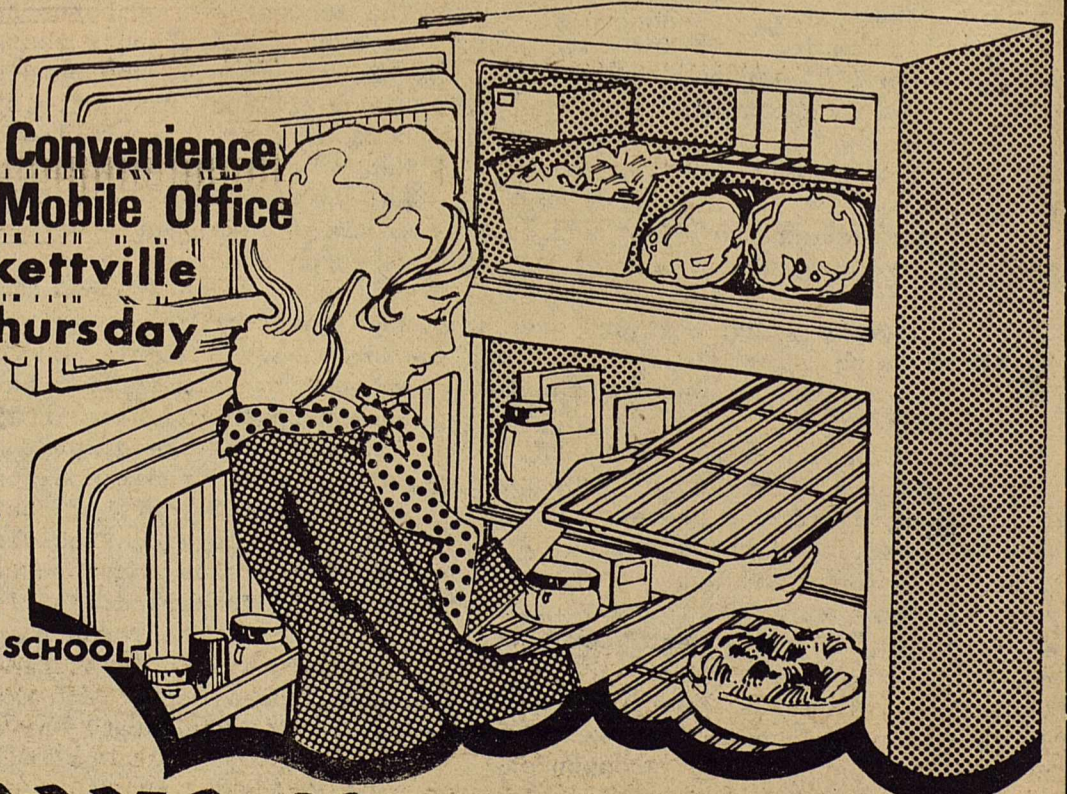

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# Ticks On Increase

RISE IN GULF COAST EAR TICK POPULATION THIS SEASON IS PREDICTED BY EXPERT

Favorable moisture conditions in the Gulf Coast and Southwestern portions of Texas have prompted predications of one of the highest Gulf Coast ear tick population in years, according to a top research entomologist in Texas.

The Gulf Coast tick has become an increasing problem for cattlemen in the last few years. The adult tick attack the ears of cattle causing swelling and cracking of the skin. These wounds are a favorite egg-laying site for the screwworm flies. Screwworm larvae feed on the ear and in extreme cases can eventually kill the animal, say entomologists.

"All indications are we're going to have to have a tremendous (Gulf Coast) tick population this year," says E. H. Ahrens, research entomologist with the USDA Screwworm Eradication Laboratory, Mission, Texas.

Ahrens explains that due to the cold winter, there are fewer reports of actual screwworm infestations that last year. However, he adds, the tick population will be "one of the highest of the last few years."

"The cold just doesn't affect the tick as much," Ahrens notes. We've already seen calves that have as many as nine males (ticks) per ear."

Another reason for the growing concern over the Gulf Coast tick problem is the inland spread of both tick and screwworm infestations.

In the past, the tick usually was associated with the more humid Gulf Coast region. But recently, Ahrens says, reports of infestations have come from ranches 300 miles inland in Texas as well as Northeast Oklahoma and Southwest Kansas. Ahrens and other attribute this spread in part to migrating birds where tick larvae are often found, and the possibility of a new strain capable of surviving in less humid conditions.

The Gulf Coast ear tick, in itself, is not so much a problem as is its association with the potentially deadly screwworm fly.

Tests conducted in south Texas last year showed that 90 percent of the screwworm infestation in cattle ears was a direct result of wounds caused by the Gulf Coast Tick, according to Ahrens.

"Screwworm flies have a five-to-six-day larval period and are constantly laying eggs," explains Texas Agricultural Extension Entomologist, Mike McWhorter. "And it is highly possible if conditions are right--that within three to five days an animal could become so severely infested it could be down and severely damaged."

Last year, entomologists tested various products to combat this problem. Plastic ear tags, impregnated with insecticide, were found to be the most effective method of controlling these ticks on the tested cattle. There was no screwworm infestation reported among the cattle with ear tags, Ahrens said, while the cattle without tags showed a 50 percent incidence of one or more screwworm cases. The tests also concluded that Shell Animal Health's Rabon Ear Tags

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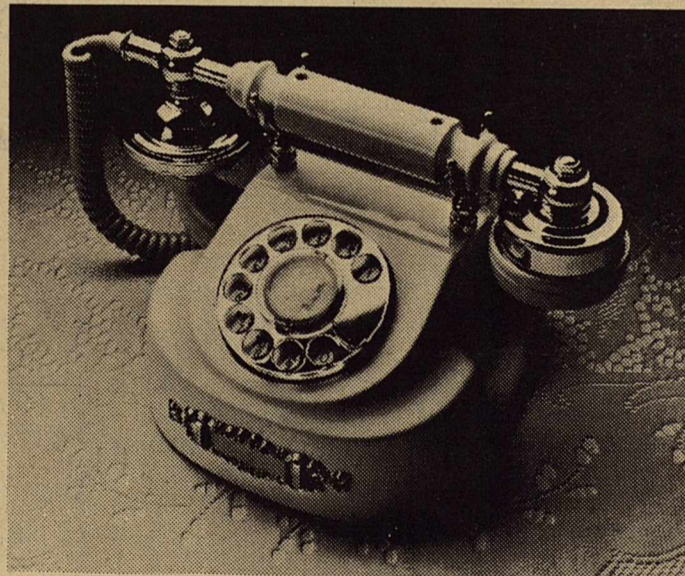
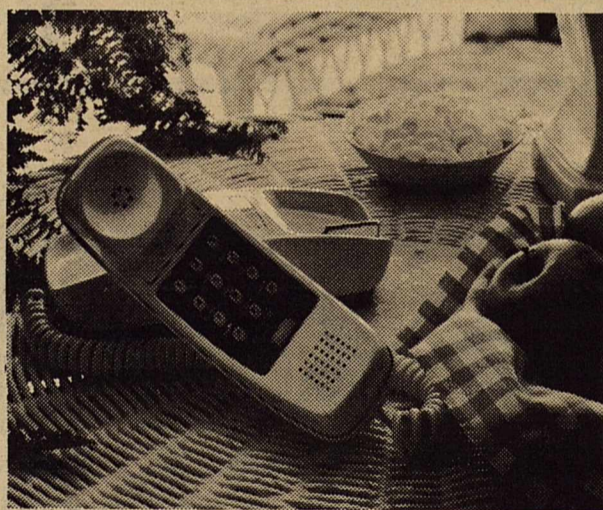

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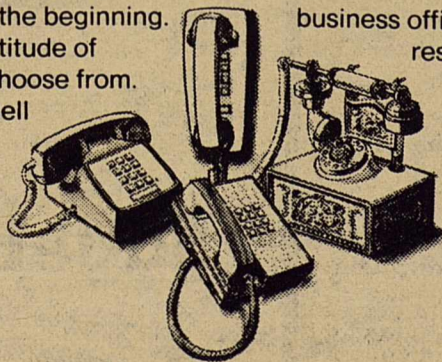
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## DESERTERS ETC.

KAZEN IN WASHINGTON

"Equal justice under Law" is a fundamental element in our American system, and one of the responsibilities I bear as a Congressman is constant vigilance that our laws are fair. At present, two specific questions loom as examples of how we in the Congress must be alert to possible effects of our actions.

One concerns that status of Vietnam deserters who seek to return under President Carter's amnesty program. The second is proposals to curb "double dipping" by government employment of retired military personnel.

Our Texas colleague Ray Roberts, as Chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, is about to hold significant hearings on the program for veterans who did not complete honorable military service.

### SPECIAL TREATMENT SEEN

Chairman Roberts tells me that his attention has been drawn to instructions to our border stations when fugitive veterans return to the United States. Immigration officials have been instructed to treat these men with courtesy and consideration, as though they were active military personnel, but what concerns Ray Roberts and me is that custom officials may have been instructed to pass them without examination of anything that they might bring into the country.

If this is true, it is conceivable that some could bring in drugs or may violate other laws covering imports. Certainly it makes no sense to give these men preferred treatment, so I'm glad the Roberts Committee is investigating.

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### PROTECT TAXPAYERS

The Committee will also ask about proposals to restore full right as citizens to many of these deserters. I recognize that the President, as commander in chief, or the Secretary of Defense as his agent, possesses the legal authority to determine what class of discharge a veteran might get. But if dishonorable or general discharges are upgraded to honorable, a question that arises as to whether these men are entitled to the same privileges which other veterans earned when they served honorably and well.

Should they, for example, get the same G-I educational benefits that now cost taxpayers \$13,000 per eligible veteran? Should they get VA medical care? I would think not. I still believe each case should be examined separately, as was done after other wars. I may be that the nation should forgive, but I am not prepared to reward them for turning their backs on their country.

### SEEK "DOUBLE DIP" CURB

When the Defense Department appropriations bill comes before the House soon, it will contain a section that would bar any use of funds to pay retirement benefits to military personnel employed by the federal government after October 1, 1977. I recognize concern about "double dipping", a term applied to retired military getting civil service jobs, and I could accept a law applying to those entering military service after October 1, 1977, but I do not believe we should change the rules for those now in military service. I do not believe the government should break its contractual obligations for full retirement benefits earned while in uniform.

I see another factor that should be considered. If a retired person has skills needed in a government job, and perhaps is even better qualified than any other prospective employee should not be hired at a pay rate proper for that job? To ask it another way, should the government not get the best possible return for the taxpayers' money?

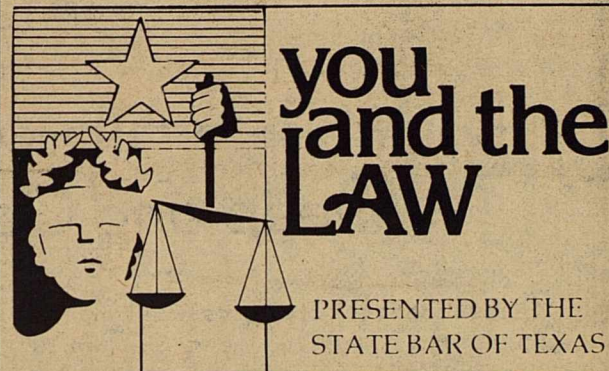
### AGAINST FAVORITISM

I am not in favor of protecting generals or admirals who use their service-connected friends for good jobs after retirement, but I am concerned about the average military retiree, officer or enlisted, for whom retirement pay is about \$5,500 a year. Because of inflation and the high cost of living, most of them must work to support their families. The federal government cannot tell them they can't be hired by private industry or even another unit of government, such as the

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**Q: Is there a formula for determining the size of a lawyer's fee for handling an estate or is the fee negotiable?**

**A: You've put your finger on the source of one of the biggest problem areas between lawyers and their clients. Just about the first item for discussion when sitting down with your lawyer should be that of fees. To answer your question, there really isn't any set formula, and that's best. A small estate could require a lot of work, and a large estate might be a relatively simple matter. A lawyer can predict the services that he will perform and then give an estimate based on the amount of work involved. By clearing up fee questions at the beginning, problems can be avoided later on.**

**Q: A few years back, a lawyer drafted a will for my wife and me. We promised each other that after one of us was gone, the other would not change any of the provisions of the will. I've been wondering...can that will be changed legally, or is it binding forever?**

**A: During the lifetime of those making the will, it can be changed simply by one giving notice to the other. After death, however, changing it can present a problem. The big question is whether it is a "contractual will". If it is deemed to be a contract, it can be breached, but the other beneficiaries could bring an action to get control of the property as outlined in the will.**

**Q: My neighbor's yard has a huge oak tree which hangs several feet onto my prop-**

**erty. The neighbors allowed me to cut off a branch resting on my roof. But, they do not want any more branches removed from their tree, which drops leaves directly into my swimming pool. What is my recourse?**

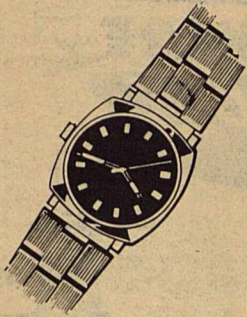
**A: Common law property rights give the owner of land the ownership of the land beneath the property and the space above. A neighbor's tree limbs extending onto your property may be cut at the point where the limb crosses the property line. However, your neighbor has a legal right to require that his permission be given before you can trespass on his property in removing tree limbs.**

**Q: I got a divorce last year and I left all of the lamps, pictures, kitchen utensils, bedspreads and similar furnishings when I moved out of our home where my former husband is still living. My former husband refuses to let me have these furnishings. Is there any way I can get them back?**

**A: All property accumulated during a marriage is disposed of in the divorce decree. To determine whether you have a right to make a legal claim for these furnishings in the home where your former husband lives, you must look to the provisions of the court order entered in your divorce case. The attorney who represented you in your divorce should be able to advise you whether your divorce decree entitles you to these furnishings.**

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### Sheep and Goat Industry News

Texas mohair producers will have a chance this week to meet the world's leading mohair users as the International Mohair Association winds up a week activities here in the state.

The group, representing both mohair producers and product manufacturers, officially began the week with three

days of meetings at the historic Menger Hotel in San Antonio. A chartered bus tour is set to follow, allowing IMA participants an opportunity to see first hand the mohair producing region of Texas.

Stops on the bus tour include Sonora, Rocksprings, and Uvalde, where area growers will have a rare chance to meet with the men who eventually buy, process and manufacture consumer goods from their product. A group of about 30 South African mohair growers will also be making the tour.

Thursday's activities include the Junction and Sonora stops, both hosted by area wool and mohair warehouses. Friday, the IMA group will visit the Earwood Ranch south of Sonora, then move on to a noon barbecue in Rocksprings, hosted by Rockspring warehouses, banks, area producers and state and national goat breeder associations.

The final item on the Friday agenda will be a stop at the Uvalde Country Club, also warehouse-sponsored.

The activities are centered around the IMA annual conference, and representatives will be present from England, Scotland, France, Germany, Turkey, Japan, Australia, Italy, South Africa, and Losotho.

Begun in 1974 when a series of organizational meetings were held in Holland, Germany and England, the IMA is composed of representatives of all phases of the mohair industry, from initial production through consumer marketing.

IMA chairman, T.W. Hibbert, British Mohair Spinners, Ltd., Bradford, said recently in the IMA newspaper, Mohair World: 'Although the object of the IMA is to promote the outstanding qualities of mohair in all its various forms, one of the main benefits which has resulted from its formation has been the closer cooperation between grower and manufacturer and the elimination of district which has existed in the past.'

Texas is especially important to the mohair industry in that it produces approximately one-third of the world's supply of the natural fiber.

state or local government, so I don't believe we should tell them that they lose retirement pay if they continue to serve their country.

I doubt that "double dipping" has generally been used to cheat taxpayers, so I do not now believe that we need to fight it with a federal law. We need to hold departmental superiors responsible for obtaining quality work from their people, to let them know that old buddies should not benefit from hiring favoritism, but we need to respect the principal of "equal Justice under law."

which were given special clearance for use in Texas were the most effective device in controlling the ticks.

McWhorter says an important result of the tests was that the ear tags held their effectiveness during the entire three-month summer period when ticks are most active.

Other methods were also used, including asphalt-based aerosol sprays, specially-treated neck bands and grease-based formulas. None was as effective as the ear tags, these tests showed.

The spread of the Gulf Coast tick Ahrens concludes, "has allowed the screwworm population to build to tremendous numbers. We feel we are going to have to control the Gulf Coast tick if we're ever to eradicate the screw-worm."

**TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS**

It is dry! If you stop and think we haven't really had any rain in quite a long time. In the last two weeks we've had a good many calls to come look at trees and or lawns and plants, etc. When we get there more often than not we find the greatest need is water. The heat, the sun, the wind, the sometimes low humidity saps things of moisture. If you want plants, lawns, trees, shrubs, etc. to stay pretty you must take time to see they are properly watered. I say "Properly" because much watering is inadequate. Many times people take the hose and water. They see water standing on top of the ground and think things are wet enough. Most of the time when watering is done this way things are not sufficiently wet. Time should be taken to know that the ground is tho roughly wet. Using a sprinkler is usuaually best. The hot dry weather plants evaporate a tremendous amount of moisture into the air. This must be replaced if the plants and grass are to survive. If the lawn or plants look bad the first guess is they need water--water--and more water---of course we're talking about outside--not house plants.
