#### CITY COUNCIL HAS PROBLEMS

At the regular meeting of the City Council, Monday, July 11, the Council devoted most of their time to save the necessity of raising taxes and water rates.

The budget as drafted for the City shows a deficit of some \$37,000,000, this is due to the construction and operating of the Solid Waste Program, unless some other means of raising this amount is found it will be necessary to raise the taxes.

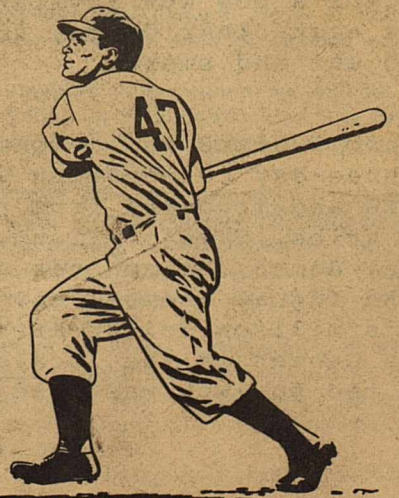
The high cost of electricity for the pumping of water has become a major problem. The cost of power has jumped from an average of

\$263.00 a month to \$1,126.00 a month this is 25% of the water revenue, it is almost a certainty that the cost of water will have to raise. The Water Department was instructed to make every effort to collect all accounts as they become due to try to stall the increase as long as possible.

Among the other items handled by the Council was the approval of the application for the Solid Waste area, also an application for Manpower funds to clean and level the Las Moras Creek that runs through the City.

The Council set a special meeting for July 26, 1977, to further study the Budgets, Tax rates and water rates.

INDIAN ODESSEY

EL PASO, TX. Even a thousand years ago American Indians didn't think twice about traveling hundreds of miles. Pacific Coast abalone was used in jewelry by Indians in this area in pre-historic times.

Still the Tigua Indians were somewhat suprised when Siliias Peters, a Yakima Inidan from Toppenish Creek, State of Washington, said he'd be down with his family for July 4th.

Also, said Siliias, his family is twelve persons plus maybe a cousin or two, traveling the some 2500 miles in two cars. So the Tigua dancers here dedicated a dance every day for good fortune to smile on Peter's trip back.

The Tiguas, along with a number of other El Pasoans, had never seen the Willow, the Eel, or the Farewell dances of the Yakima Inian; nor had they traded their crafts and tasted each other foods--and that's why Indians will travel any distance to accept a pow wow invitation, to see each other dance, to swap, and to eat and smoke.

Other Indians who helped in the three-day celebration were: dancers and frummers from the Kiowa tribe, Navajo, Sioux, Comanche, Jemez, Matachines dancers and the Tiguas themselves. The Tigua's million dollar Arts and Crafts Center is the locale in which the pow-wow was held.

4-H REPORT

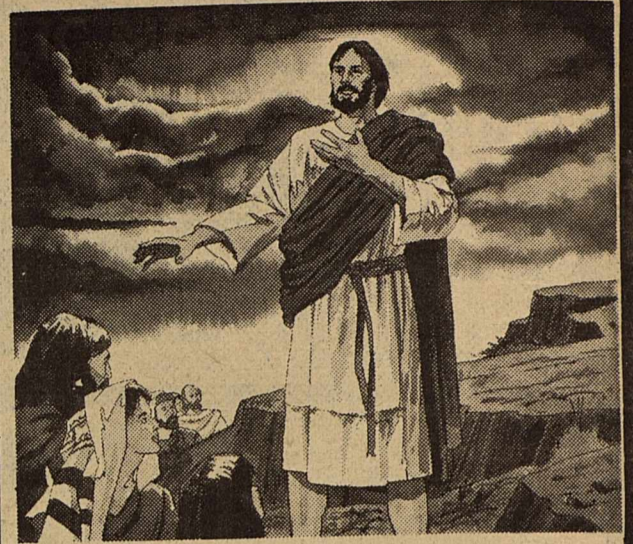
4-H'ers TO LOOK AT "OCEANS OF OPPORTUNITY"

Some 600 senior 4-H youth from across Texas will be learning about "Oceans of Opportunity" at the 1977 Texas 4-H Congress. That's the theme of the annual event that is scheduled for July 19-22 at the LaQuinta Royale Motor Inn in Corpus Christi. 4-H members representing Kinney County 4-H, who will be attending are Candy Smallwood and Kimberly Trant.

"This year's Congress is designed to help 4-H'ers learn about our vast marine industry and our marine resources", points out Tom Davison, 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and program chairman for the Congress. "We hope to provide quality educational experiences for older youth by utilizing the uniqueness offered by Corpus Christi and the surrounding coastal area."

Featured talks will deal with "Man and the Sea" and "Future of the Sea." Special discussion will concern non-renewable resources from the sea, marine biology, and maritime career opportunities.

A major highlight of this year's Congress will be a variety of tours designed to provide valuable learning experiences for 4-H members, notes Davison. Among these will be tours of Rockport, Aransas Pass, Corpus Christi public elevators, Jackson Marine, Corpus Christi Compress, Baker Marine Corporation-DuPont, Texas University Marine Science Institute, Brown and Root-DuPont, Producers Grain Port Terminal, U.S. Coast Guard, sports fishing, Southwest Research Institute, Central Power and Light Co., Texas A&M University Marine Resources, port of Corpus Christi, marine Drilling Co., and Boyd-Campbell, Inc.

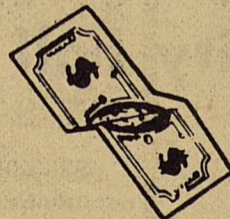

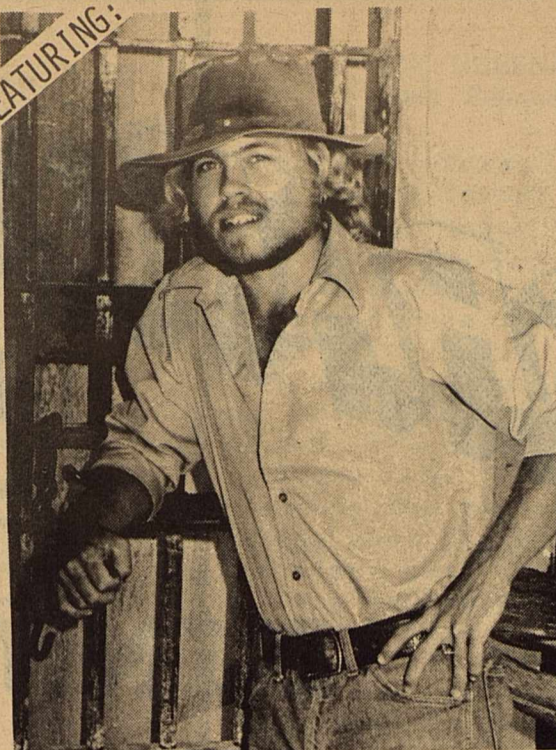

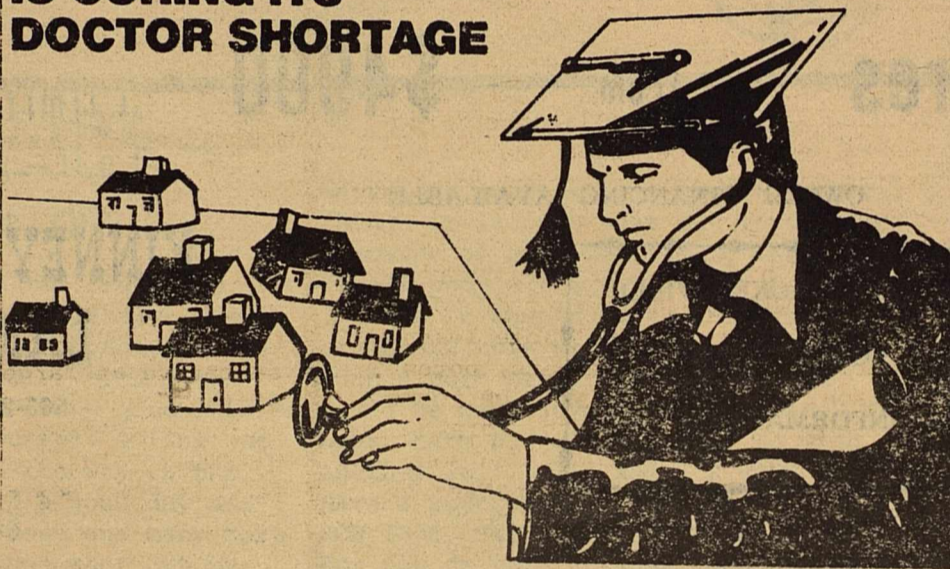

While city dwellers bemoan the doctor's overcrowded waiting room, rural communities today are confronted with a graver problem: too few or no doctors at all. To combat the shortage, Martins Ferry, a steel town in eastern Ohio, has started an unconventional program. Four years ago, at the suggestion of a local medical student, the town initiated a loan policy for prospective MDs. The conditions are these: The Hospital Association of Martins Ferry pays for a student to go to the medical school of his or her choice. In return, the student must either practice medicine in the community for a minimum of three years or repay the loan with interest. If the policy succeeds, Martins Ferry will fill the new wing of its hospital with young doctors, and students who never could have afforded medical school will have received an education free of charge.

Although local applicants are generally favored because of the greater likelihood of their returning to stay, any would-be doctor who has been accepted by an accredited school is eli-

gible to apply. The contract does not legally oblige students to practice in Martins Ferry, but the admissions committee stresses the moral obligation to do so. When an applicant is seriously considered, she or he is usually asked to spend a few days in the area to develop a feeling for the way of

life and to appraise the medical facilities.

So far the hospital has sent ten students to school at a cost of \$80,000. But the money, raised from hospital earnings, is considered an investment in Martins Ferry's future. "We have only seven doctors practicing in Martins Ferry today,"

hospital administrator Frank Fulton says, "and only four of these are under the age of fifty." Thanks to some innovative thinking, this small town will no longer be threatened by a shortage of qualified medical personnel.

### TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS by:

There seems to be an excessive amount of pill bugs or sow bugs this year. There are a number of flower beds that I've checked where these bugs have stripped the plants. They work mostly at night and can ruin a bed in one night. The best way to get rid of these pests is to treat the soil with a good insecticide. Diajarion granules is perhaps the best. These can be spread on the soil and watered in. It will destroy not only pill bugs but any insect in the soil. Ants, grubs chinch bugs or anything in the way of damaging insects.

This treatment applies to lawns also. St. Augustine grass has continuous problems with insects. A once a year treatment is most helpful. It's better to keep lawns and beds free of insects than to have to get rid of them after the damage and have to regrow.

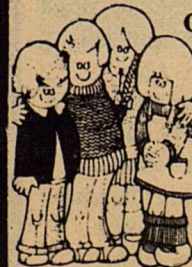

### Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

Although the United States is leading the world in agricultural production, it has been badly outdistanced in aquaculture.

Aquaculture—which means literally "the cultivation of water"—can be used either to increase natural seafood supplies or to produce commercial seafood products.

By 1973 fish and shellfish production had become a \$191,480,000 industry in the United States. Yet seafood produced through aquaculture still accounted for only 3 percent of all U.S. consumption of fish and shellfish.

This is hardly adequate for a nation in which seafood consumption has been steadily rising. It seems even less adequate when statistics show that in Japan and Czechoslovakia aquaculture produces 10 percent of the fish and shellfish consumed.

Although the percentage of fish produced through aquaculture in this country is now up from the 3 percent figure given in 1973-74, the amount of seafood produced domestically for consumption is still not impressive.



Currently the U.S. is having to import more than 50 percent of our fish products, and in 1974 this amounted to \$1.5 billion.

Twice I have introduced legislation providing for the development of aquaculture in the U.S. If passed, this bill would result in the opening of a major new American industry.

We know that there is a great untapped wealth of food production in aquaculture out there waiting.

My bill would not only enable us to increase our supplies of valuable seafood, but would at the same time lower our dependence on the seafood production of other countries.

The Bentsen Aquaculture Bill, which is being cosponsored by ten other Senators, would establish a national aquaculture plan, provide information and technical assistance from the federal government, offer research grants to colleges and universities, and guarantee loans for building aquaculture facilities.

With more emphasis on aquaculture we can both seed the oceans for greater seafood production, and farm fish inland. Right now we are on the verge of a breakthrough in breeding salt water shrimp in captivity.

In Corpus Christi there have been hopeful experiments in breeding salt water shrimp in thermal effluent from a nearby power plant. As a result of this operation it may well be possible to spawn shrimp in bays and estuaries the length of the Texas coast, in a commercial process that has become known as "ocean ranching."

But aquaculture can be an inland activity as well. Near Pecos—hundreds of miles from the coast—there are very promising experiments involving commercial shrimp ponds that are fed by salt water pumped from an ancient ocean that still exists deep underground.

Our efforts to farm the land should begin to be matched by those to farm the waters. The Bentsen Aquaculture Bill is a big step in that direction.

The other day I sat and watched a barn Swallow's nest. In it were six baby birds. The nest was little more than head high to me with people and cars stopping and going within a few feet. Four of the baby birds were crowding the edge of the nest with their heads out over the rim. Two others were hidden most of the time being in the back of the nest. The parent birds were busy feeding their young. These young ones did not yet have their eyes open but this in no way affected the opening of their mouths. When they opened their mouths you

could scarcely see the birds. When a parent bird flew up all mouths opened enthusiastically. As soon as one bird was fed the mouths all closed. Other birds flew near and there was no reaction from the bird's babies. They only became excited when the parents approached. Have they distinguished without seeing I don't know. In fact I hardly see how they could tell the difference if they could have seen. The last bird fed was just as enthusiastic in his begging as the one longest from being fed. Some how the parents seemed to know whose turn it was to be fed. They disregarded all the open mouths but the one whose turn it was, even the ones hidden behind the front row. When the parent bird flew away all the babies were quiet and peace reigned.

## WANTED- OLD PLASTIC PILL BOTTLES

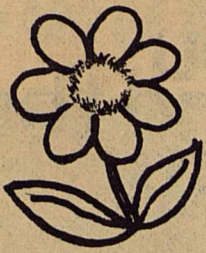

FORT WORTH--Texas' foremost champion of the farmer urged President Carter today to do for the beef industry what he has done for the domestic television, sugar and shoe industries: HELP IT..

State Rep. Joe Hubenak, chairman of the powerful House Committee on Agriculture and Livestock, told the U.S. Trade Commission studying the impact of beef imports, that the position of independent cattlemen is critical.

"The independent cattlemen were the first to meet the challenge of full production," Hubenak daid. "And what has been their reward? Decreased prices resulting from fewer markets and increased imports of foreign beef."

Hubenak pointed out that last year "our state lost over 2,000 Farms and ranches" because of the critical state of agribusiness.

He said recent attempts by the Legislature to help the beef producing industry were held unconstitutional. These included restricting state agencies to buying domestic-produced beef, and labeling processed foods containing imported meat.

"This Commission has been successful in the past in alleviating the unfairness of imports on such items as television, sugar or shoes," Hubenak said. "I am confident you will understand the crisis that faces our cattle producers and that your recommendations to the President will help stabilize our market and allow our farmers and ranchers to make a fair return on their investment."

Hubenak stressed to the Commission- that he favored a quota system, rather than tariffs, to restrict beef imports.

**you and the LAW**

**Q: I've been needing the answer to this question... How can a person get in touch with a reliable lawyer in another state to handle a legal matter?**

**A:** Well, there are a couple of ways to go about it. You can contact your lawyer here and ask him to handle it, for one thing. That might be best, because the out-of-state lawyer may need to consult with a Texas lawyer before acting in your behalf anyway. Or, you can write the State Bar of that particular state. They will most likely plug you in with that state's lawyer referral service. By the way, you can reach the Texas Lawyer Referral Service by dialing toll-free 1-800-292-5409.

**Q: I was divorced many years ago, and my wife received custody of our two children. Not long after that, she remarried and had the names of the children changed to that of their step-father. Would the children be legal heirs to any part of my estate when I die?**

**A:** If you should die without leaving a will, your natural children could be legal heirs. It really doesn't matter whether their names were changed. It wouldn't matter even if they were legally adopted -- they are still your natural children. However, if you do have a will when you die, your es-

tate can be left to anyone of your choice -- your children or anyone.

**Q: I'm considering buying a home with money I acquired before I got married. Because the property would not be purchased with money owned jointly by me and my wife, would I have a right to retain ownership of the house if my wife and I later are divorced?**

**A:** A married person's separate estate generally is included among property which is subject to being divided between the husband and wife in a divorce decree. However, in the event the title to the couple's home is in the husband's name, and the home was purchased with funds from his separate estate, the judge could not divest the husband of title to the house.

**Q: Could I sell our family car without my wife's consent?**

**A:** Yes, you can sell your family car without your wife's consent if the title certificate is in your name alone. If the title certificate is in your wife's name or both your names, generally her approval is needed before the car can be sold or traded. The buyer of the auto will want the signatures of anyone whose name is on the title certificate.

- Make sure your house has insulation equal to at least an R-19 rating in the ceiling and R-11 in the walls. Insulation pays for itself within a few years in reduced heating and cooling costs.
- Weatherstrip windows and doors, then keep them closed.
- Eliminate excess heat with draperies, storm windows, reflective films, window shades and overhangs.
- Set air conditioning thermostat at the highest comfortable setting, around 78 degrees.
- Clean or replace air conditioner filters every month or—even better—every two weeks.
- Have leaky hot water faucets repaired immediately; they waste both water and the energy used to heat it.



- Check the temperature control on your water heater. For most needs, the correct setting is 135 degrees; water heaters used for baths only may be set at 110 to 120 degrees.

UVALDE--A traffic coordinator to assist a nine-county area will begin work at Southwest Texas Junoir College during August pending approval by the college board of trustees this month.

Walter K. Stueck, who presently serves as traffic manager for New Braunfels, will work with local governments in the counties of Uvalde, Real, Val Verde, Sutton, Kinney, Dimmitt, Maverick Zavala and Edwards.

The traffic safety program, which is funded by the Texas Office of Traffic Safety, is a new concept being conducted on college campuses throughout the state in an effort to assist local governments in determining traffic problems areas by providing them with technical assistance.

The traffic planner position will be funded for one year with an option to renew the contract and continue the program if a need is established by the local governments who will be assisted.

Stueck, 27, has a bachelor's degree in urban geography from St. Louis University in St. Louis Missouri, and a master's degree in community and regional planning from the University of Southwestern Louisiana.

He is a member of the American Institute of Planners, the American Society of Planning Officials and the Texas Association of Traffic Safety Managers.



**KRUEGER ANNOUNCES FOR U.S. SENATE**—Bob Krueger hosted an old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration to announce his plans to seek the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate. Over 5,000 friends and supporters from across Texas braved the 90 degree-plus temperature in New Braunfels to listen attentively as the articulate Krueger made his campaign for the U.S. Senate official. The announcement itself was met with cheers and applause as Krueger began the year and a half journey campaigning for the job. Following the announcement and celebration in New Braunfels, Krueger devoted the remainder of the week traveling to 21 Texas cities meeting with supporters and holding news conferences announcing his candidacy.

### KRUEGER OF TEXAS

U.S. Congressman Bob Krueger of Texas, who announced July 4 that he will run for the United States Senate, has pledged to attempt to visit "every town in Texas" during his campaign.

"For too long, persons seeking statewide office have concentrated their efforts in only the major metropolitan areas and have forgotten the people in the smaller cities and towns that make up so much of Texas.

"As one who grew up in a small town (New Braunfels) and as one who has always been close to the land, I think it extremely important that persons in public office make every effort to not only visit rural America, but to understand that often it is in the nation's smaller cities where our values were set, where our heritage remains strongest."

Krueger, himself part of a ranching family, stressed the importance of agriculture during July 4 announcement speech:

"I pledge to work to strength one of the most powerful forces in our economy--agriculture--by enlarging opportunities for agricultural export."

Krueger, as member of the U.S. House of Representatives, has co-sponsored legislation calling for additional agricultural exports.

Krueger said he will also work to attract light industry to rural Texas, "The kind of industry that will provide additional jobs but will not pollute the air, jam thoroughfares and result in housing shortages, but the calibre of industry that will make life better for people who live in areas outside of metropolitan centers!"

"We also must recognize that agriculture, though not the massive employer it once was, remains a major industry for Texas and we must keep it that way with programs for farmers and ranchers to give them the incentive to want to continue as farmers and ranchers but to also provide their sons and daughters the incentive to want to follow in the footsteps of their parents."



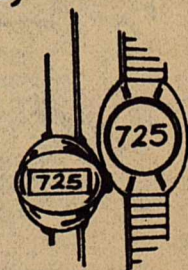
