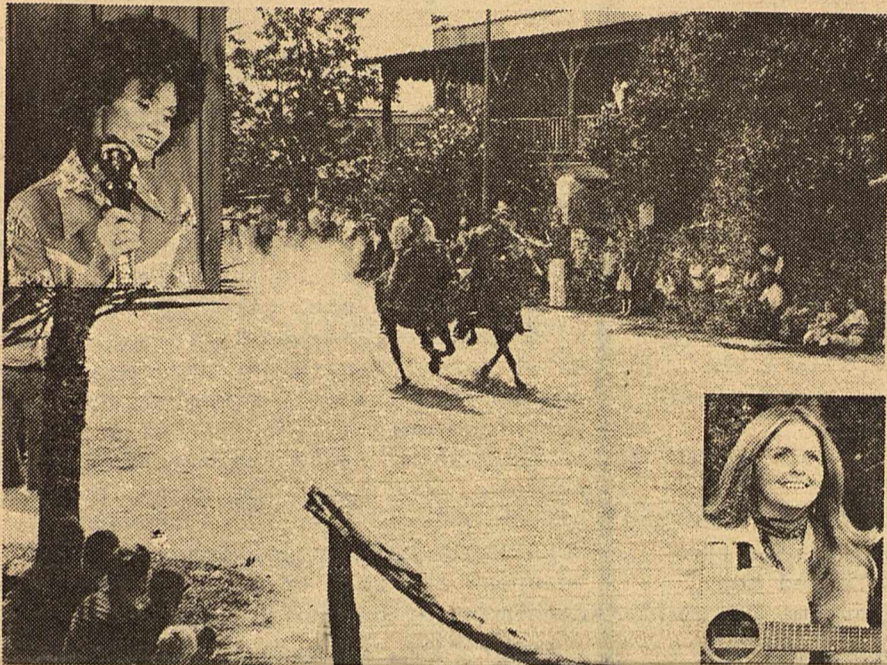

Cowboy race, singing stars on Alamo Village festival



Cowboy horse races will be the big feature of the day at Alamo Village's 17th annual Labor Day celebration in Brackettville, while special stars of the day will be Roni Stoneman, country music's most versatile

entertainer, upper left inset; and Dotsy, Texas' own folk singer now popular nationwide, lower right inset. The entire shindig will be open to the public.

Cowboy horse races at the annual labor day celebration at Alamo Village mark the highlight of the season.

Any cowboy riding saddle who feels his horse can win is invited to enter. Excluded are stud horses, race horses that have been on the track, and registered horses.

Races will get underway immediately following the Texas-style outdoor barbecue lunch.

Aside from the races, Alamo Village near Brackettville in Southwest Texas offers rides aboard an authentic stagecoach, horseback rides, a shooting gallery and plenty of time for browsing through the museum-type walk-ins and picture gallery.

Live entertainment is planned for the entire day. The witty and talented Roni Stoneman, banjo pickin' star of Hee-Haw fame, along with Texas' own Dotsy, RCA recording artist with current chart-buster "After Sweet Memories Play Born to Lose Again," will team up and are set to entertain the guests at the 17th Annual Labor Day Cowboy Horse Races at Brackettville.

Roni Stoneman has earned the reputation of

being the most versatile woman in country music. No comedienne has a better sense of timing. She can sing any kind of song and play almost any musical instrument though she specializes in the banjo.

She has appeared in three popular movies and held the most extended engagement at the Diamond Horseshoe in Disneyworld of any entertainer.

The beautiful Dotsy is one of five daughters who grew up in Seguin, Texas. She began her first personal appearances as a young girl singing and picking the guitar with Clark Grein—and they made their way to the Grand Ole Opry. She won numerous contests; and then at the age of 14 appeared weekly on KSAT-TV in San Antonio.

In 1970 she won first place in the talent division of the State Junior Miss Contest.

At her initial year at the University of Texas, Dotsy formed her own band. She became more and more popular.

In 1972 she met Happy Shahan, owner of Alamo Village at Brackettville, who began promoting her. In two years they had made it to Nashville. She began

climbing in popularity, made recordings on RCA, and Happy Shahan is still her manager.

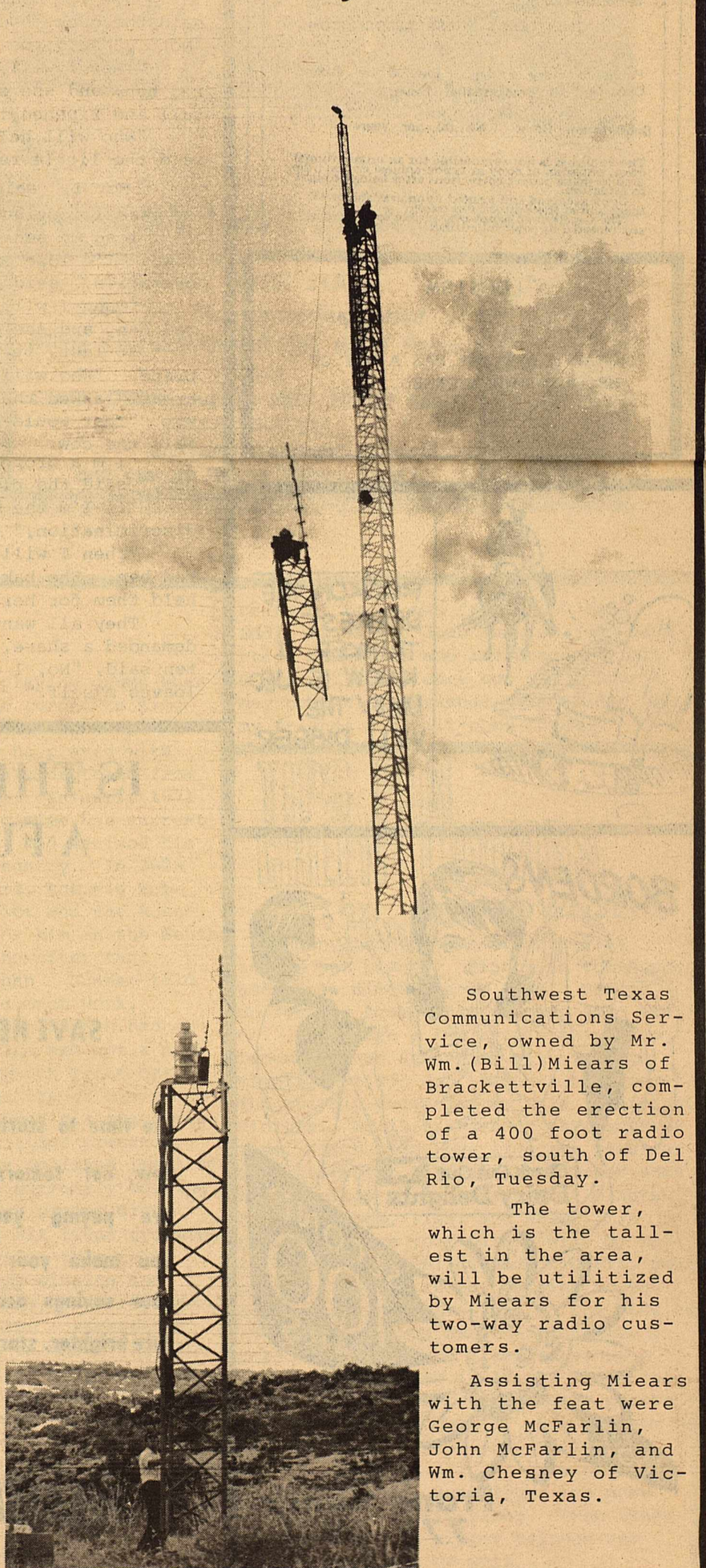
Guests at the labor day celebration at Alamo Village will have a real and unusual musical-entertainment "treat" for them when Dotsy and Roni Stoneman will team up to entertain the guests.

Joining the two popular women will be Edna's Richard Vasquez, the Texas Twisters and a cast of Alamo Village Stars. Also there will be Seguin's Clark Grein and the Eezy Riders Band, who were a tremendous hit at last year's Alamo Village Labor Day festivities.

Other guests include Actor Jim Brewer, Nashville VIPs Bob and Charlene Bray and Cecil Davenport, entertainment coordinator for the christening of the USS TEXAS nuclear cruiser.

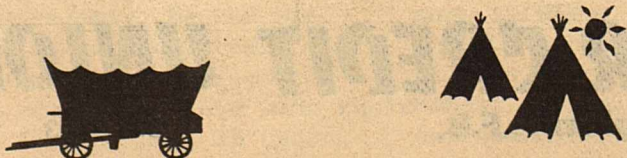
Tall Tower Erected By Local Firm

Between Us

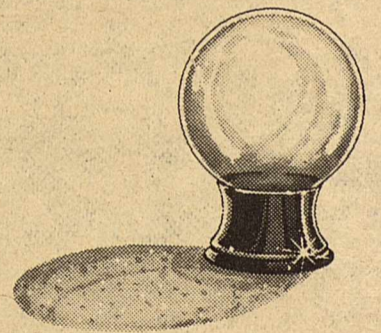

RICHARD VASQUEZ, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Vasquez, Sr. of Edna, will be sharing the stage with DOTTSY, RCA recording artist, and RONI STONEMAN, famed banjo pickin' star of television's HEE HAW, at the 17th Annual Labor Day Cowboy Horse Races, Monday, September 5th, at Alamo Village in Brackettville.

Richard was born September 3, 1948, in Granada, Texas and was reared in Alligator, Mississippi. He and his family migrated as cotton pickers until 1959 at which time they returned to Jackson County where they have made their home, in Edna, for the past 18 years.

Richard started playing drums when he was 14. In 1969 he turned to singing and decided that that was what he really wanted to do. He played with several bands, singing everything from Spanish to soul to pop. In early 1971 he helped form and organize his current band, Tequila Country, and decided his homebase is clearly country. In 1975 he cut his first record, the old Bob Wills classic "A Convict and the Rose". The record did well for him in the South Texas region. Not long after that Richard met Happy Shahan. Shahan told the boy that he needed much work. Richard listened to what Shahan had to say. He took his advice and got a much needed tonsillectomy which since has improved the tonal quality of his voice tremendously; he followed his suggestion in how to improve his stage presence, and has graduated to a polished level of showmanship; and he's currently working on a daily exercise and proper diet program in developing his final grooming for his trip to Nashville this fall.

When he's not busy singing and serenading the señoritas, Richard likes to participate in sports - especially boxing - and he loves to cook. But the majority of his time, on stage and off, is spent perfecting his music, striving for that goal: becoming a professional singer and entertainer. "I owe so very much to Happy for his interest and belief in me. I can't begin to repay him for all the hours he has spent working in my behalf and helping to develop my voice and showmanship to the fullest...I am so

grateful to my two friends in Edna, Eddie Hajek and Jean Perkins, who have stood behind me and encouraged me all along...I don't care how big a star I may become, my friends will always be my friends and will come first."

TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS

Many people have trouble with inside pot plants. Plants in the house add a new dimension to life. Plants do for the house what nothing else can do. There are a few simple things to remember. Be satisfied with foliage plants that you don't expect to bloom. The one big exception to this is African Violets. We'll talk about them another time. Each plant has it's own peculiar characteristic. There are however some basic things to remember about plants. They need food, light and water. In proper balance your plants will do well. If leaves turn yellow and drop off, most often the plant is not getting enough light. If the leaves dry on the ends or edges the chances are the plant needs more water. If the plant takes on a sickly green color it likely needs food. Filtered light is best for most plants and the more the better. Fluorescent is of some help. Incandescent light is like no light at all. A growing plant needs more food, more light and more water than a static plant. Keep these three factors in proper balance and your plants will do well.

SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS NEWS

It's been going on now for some time, but it may be coming to a head in the near future. Oh, "it" is the federal plan to include parts of the Rio Grande and the Guadalupe River in the Wild and Scenic Rivers System.

What is a "Wild & Scenic Rivers" system? It is the out growth of a federal act passed a decade or so back in which certain rivers, or parts of same, could be designated as--you guessed it--wild and scenic rivers. Sounds kinda like a federal decree officially designating that round thing we've been rolling on for centuries as a "wheel".

But there's much more to it than that, as there always is. The basic idea is to see that these rivers are preserved in their wild and scenic state so that our descendants in years to come will be able to discover for themselves what a river used to be.

Admirable thought, no? What shakes this pretty scene is that this program is designed to give the bureaucrats the authority to do the preserving. Unmentioned is the fact that these folks spring from the same stock as those who did such a fine job of making a total mess of their own habi-at back east.

Now that their part of the country is deteriorating at a proper pace, they're pulling at the traces to come out and give us a learned hand in protecting ours.

Granted, they of all people could be expected to have learned the lessons, but they have learned them in a totally different classroom. And they may have learned too late, a situation that almost guarantees overzealous evangelism.

The Wild and Scenic Rivers program will require a scenic easement of any kind will be allowed within sight of the subject property. Well, private or commercial development, that is. The government will have to construct access roads to and from the area, of course, but these don't count. Neither

does the fact that the access roads will march right across even more privately-owned property.

In some cases roads may have to cover scores of miles of private property. And in the case of the portion of the Rio Grande in question, these roads would end up hundreds of feet above the river, peeking over the edge of massive canyon walls. In order to get sight-seers and canoeists safely and comfortably from the road to the water, would the federal planners simply remove a few million cubic feet of cliff?

At any rate, the proposal seems a little foolish when you stop to think how rugged and isolated such areas are. Still, the matter resurfaced just this spring, when President Carter included the Rio Grande and Guadalupe projects in his environmental program. It's a lot like parents who remember all of the regrettable things they did growing up, and vow to prevent their children from doing the same things. Many of them never stop to think that the kids may have already learned the lesson by example, or that they've got too much sense to try something that stupid in the first place. 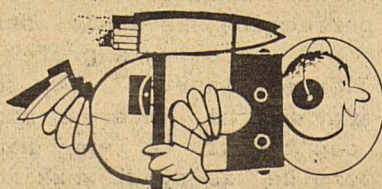
We run on a very close budget. Our fee for Emergency Transportation is very, very reasonable. If you only have a dollar a week or month to pay on your bill, please make an effort.

you and the LAW

Q: I lost my credit card. Do I have to pay for charges made on my credit card by someone else?

A: If you immediately notify by letter or telegram the company which issued your credit card, you are not liable for any charges made after the card was lost. If you fail to notify the company that your card is lost, the company has the right to require you to pay up to fifty dollars for charges made after the card was lost.

Q: How do I go about getting both my first and last names changed legally?

A: A district judge in the county of your residence can grant a request for a name change. In deciding whether to grant the request, the judge will determine whether the name change is in the best interests of the person seeking the change and whether the change would result in any damage to anyone else. In the case of a person under the age of 18, both parents must be notified of any name change request and the father must consent unless his parental rights have been terminated by a court.

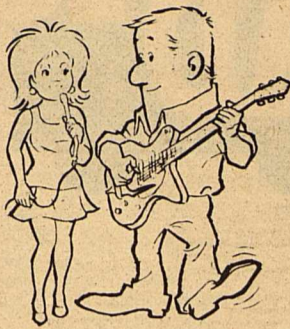
Q: My wife and I have a large estate. Our wills say that the entire estate will be left to the surviving spouse. We are now retired, and I want to keep control of my property. However, I want to know how we can save money if one of us should die. After we both are gone, we want to leave it all to our children.

A: You might want to consider putting the estate -- with the exception of the home, furnishings and automobiles -- in a lifetime trust with the surviving spouse as a co-trustee, instead of leaving the property outright. After the death of the other spouse, the trust arrangement can guarantee that the estate will go to the children. The idea here is to keep all of the estate from being taxed twice. You might want to see your bank's trust officer or your lawyer.

Q: The vacant lot next door has never been cleared of trees and brush, and no taxes have been paid since 1928. The city tax office said the land cannot be sold until the owner is notified, but the city hasn't been able to locate the owner. Can I obtain the land by the squatter's right law?

A: If one person is attempting to stake a claim to land owned by someone else, the general rule is that the person staking the claim must make an obvious effort to take possession of the land. Each case is decided on the individual facts involved, but a typical form of taking possession would be to build a fence or structure on the land. The law sets out many specific rules, including the number of years you must possess another person's land to have a valid claim.

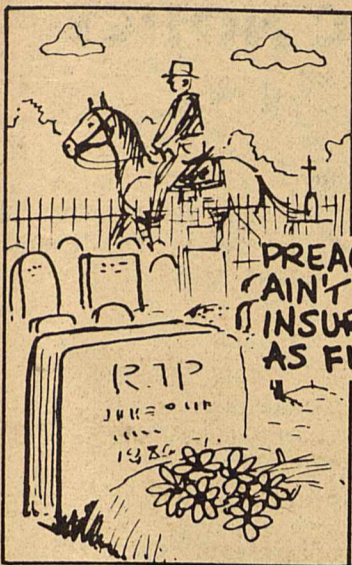
